

Giving through golf

Erin Smith pays it forward in her Johnson County, Center Grove community with golf outing on Sept. 11

"In order for the community to grow, you

have to be able to collaborate," said Erin Smith.

Since Smith moved to the Center Grove area in 2001, she has worked to do just that. The upcoming Pay It Forward Johnson County golf tournament on Sept. 11 at The Legends Gold Club is an example of just one of the ways she has worked to team up with community leaders and nonprofits to make her community a better place.

Smith said she and her husband, Trey, chose to live in Johnson County because the schools system in Center Grove was where they wanted their two sons, Bailey and Ben. She said the area appeared to provide a nice, comfortable lifestyle. In 2002 she started her at-home business, The Stitch Smith. She became actively involved in the Greater Greenwood Chamber of Commerce as a way to network. She increasingly became involved in her sons' school, helping them raise thousands of dollars. She then got involved with Habitat for Humanity and is on the

executive committee of the Johnson County Community Foundation.

"I realized I enjoy helping great causes raise funds to implement the programs that it takes to increase the quality of life in our community," Smith said. "I think my most favorite part of what I do is bringing other likeminded folks together to tackle whatever that goal is. We work really hard but we have great fun, too. Most people know if they're working with me on a committee, we get stuff done. We have fun, but we work hard."

Smith partnered with Susan McCarty of Franklin Printing in 2011 and they merged to

create Spotlight Strategies in Franklin, a business marketing solutions company. They now belong to both the Greenwood and Franklin chambers.

Four years ago, Pay It Forward Johnson County held its first event. The golf tournament began when current PGA president and owner of The Legends Golf Club in Franklin, Ted Bishop, came to Smith and a group of the event's founders.

"He said I know how to run the golf event but I don't know how to help all the people in the county," Smith said. "Together we came up with a neat plan that involves charities making an application that is very simple."

Twenty-nine nonprofits applied to receive the proceeds from this year's event. Pay It

Forward held a chance drawing on July 24. The organizations came together to learn which three would benefit with a check from the golf tournament. Tara Treatment Center, Youth Connection and Johnson County Senior Services were chosen. If all of the nonprofits attend the golf tournament, another name will be selected.

"It's so neat to be around all these people who are so passionate about their little slice of what they do to move the community for-

ward," Smith said. "The other great thing that gets me excited about this is a lot of times the nonprofits are so focused on what they're doing that sometimes they don't always come to the table with strong business skills. All the education we wind up providing when we have this event. We help them interact with all of these golfers coming through. We help them think of creative ways to get their message out. Think about your board. Are you missing any skill sets on your board? Maybe you'll find someone who's interested in what your organization is all about. All they have to do is meet one golfer that day that has a true passion for what that organization is all about and you'll have a donor for life. You have to network."

Pay It Forward Johnson County has raised \$84,000 in three years. Smith says they hope to raise \$30,000 this year, selling out at 54 foursomes, but they still need sponsors and

New this year, Pay It Forward will work with Aspire Johnson County, a grassroots community initiative to make Johnson County a better place to live, work and play. The group looks at economic development, quality of life issues and branding of the county.

"Knowing that I have this asset of Pay It Forward Johnson County, I went to the other founders and said I believe in this program so much, we should make them one of the major sponsors this year," Smith said. "If we put our efforts into supporting the big picture of what Johnson County can look like in the future, we will have exponentially grown these resources available to these nonprofits. This seemed to me to have an incredibly larger impact. Anytime I get involved with something, I'm looking at what kind of impact at are you going to have. If you are asking people to give up their

time and talent, you want to be passionate about what you're doing but make sure you're making a difference."

Smith said she is looking forward to the event, an unforgettable experience for everyone involved. As the event grows, she said she will continue to search for the best way to give back to her community.

"I am able to do those things because of my business partner, Susan McCarty, and my family," Smith said. "I probably have taken my kids to and exposed them to a lot of opportunities. Without their support, I wouldn't be able to do as much as I do for my community. I know they're getting something from that, but I hope that's influence stays with them. It's not just a feel-good thing. I feel it's a sense of duty that we as good citizens give back."

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Beech Grove city council to vote on proposed 2015 budget at a special Sept. 8 meeting

While the city council prepares to vote on the proposed 2015 budget at special public meeting and budget hearing on Sept. 8, 7 p.m.

at the city council chambers, Mayor Dennis Buckley and Clerk/Treasurer Dan McMillan say they feel the city is headed in the right direction.

"This budget, in our opinion, is really good," Buckley said. "We certainly hope the council will approve it."

This year's budget will be \$817,000 more than last years. Included, full-

time city employees will receive a cost of living adjustment, a raise of 2 percent. Retired city employees will receive a cost of living adjustment for a second year.

"We have not laid off one employee since we took office and that's something we're really proud of," McMillan said. "We're finally coming full circle and the employees raises are something we've really wanted to do since we've taken office. We've improved every building that the city owns. We've bought a new fire truck, an ambulance, the list goes on and on. Paving is something the citizens have really appreciated."

Many departments will receive new equipment, including four new police cars and \$100,000 worth of computers for the police department, a car and a bus for the senior center, and new IT equipment for city hall. Currently, the city runs one ambulance 24 hours a day, seven days a week. A second ambulance runs at night, staffed by Franciscan St. Francis. Next year, Franciscan St. Francis will staff

that ambulance 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The department also has civilian paramedics and firemen on the ambulance. At some point next year, the firemen come off the ambulance and Franciscan St. Francis will fill those positions so there will be more firemen on the fire truck, Buckley said.

"What we're trying to do, because there's only so much tax dollars, we're working smarter with our money, whether it be with grants or as far as the ambulance revenues being way up (collecting reimbursement money and additional revenue sources)," McMillan said. "We're trying to do this in every department because we don't have the tax dollars to work with. All the things we're doing, we're getting done with the same tax dollars. We're just trying figure our different ways to come up with money to fund each department."

Buckley and McMillan said they feel this budget will be approved, as three of the city council members served on a budget committee. "We feel very confident that it's a very good budget," McMillan said. "Our financial advisor, Jeff Peters, has worked with us on this. He's looked at it and he feels it's a good budget... I think it's a good budget from the standpoint of all of the departments are getting more: additional equipment, additional manpower. There are a lot of good things. Is it where we want to be? Absolutely not. We'd like to have more. Realistically, we're way ahead. We've improved the service and that's what we need to keep doing."

What's included in Beech Grove's proposed 2015 budget?

- Two percent raise for all full-time city employees
- \$26,787 for lease/purchase of four additional police cars for a total of eight
- \$100,000 for police computers
- \$28,500 for a patch machine
- \$43,000 for sidewalks
- \$510,000 for paving. In 2012 the budget was \$205,000
- \$15,000 for updated servers and IT equipment at city hall
- \$40,000 for compliance officers
- \$25,000 for cash purchase of a vehicle for the senior center
- \$12,000 for lease/purchase of a bus for the senior center
- \$20,000 for a part-time clerk in court, as requested by the judge




Burkhart book buddies improve reading skills

Miracle Mile Parade recognized as a Southside tradition



How can you help in developing the old Southside?

The Old Southside Neighborhood Association will meet Sept. 4, at Sacred Heart Parish Hall, 1125 South Meridian St. with the Fuller Center group (fullercenter.org) to discuss development on the old Southside.

"We've been working trying to get some development in the neighborhood," said John Sauter, who has helped to organize this event. "The Fuller Center is similar to the Habitat, though it has a different model. We approached them a couple of weeks ago after looking at some of their projects. This is a follow-up meeting to get to know their process, what they require from a commitment standpoint... We're going to use this to communicate. There is an awful lot going on that people may not be aware of. For instance, we have a community block grant we have put in for. We would like to get more support from these projects and commitment..."

Also expected to be in attendance will be many interested Southside groups: Paint the Town, Riley Area Development Corporation, Sacred Heart and St. Patrick's, Southside Catholic Business Professionals, Stadium Vil-

lage, as well as city of Indianapolis officials. An over view of what has been going on in the way of development will also be given. Similar to Habitat for Humanity, according to information on its website, the Fuller Center for Housing is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization "that seeks to eradicate poverty housing by promoting partnerships with individuals and community groups to build and rehabilitate homes for people in need." 

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

Recollections of Atterbury Job Corp haunts

elinda Zell continues her recollections of the Atterbury Job Corps:

"Rosa Parks Dorm was haunted

by a little girl that bounced a ball. She was always heard at night. There was also a blonde woman in a long, white gown. The dorm often smelled of cookies, and you would hear shoe heels on the tile floor."

"I became terrified of Belamy Hall. Walking past it one night, I glanced up into the windows and something was glaring back out, and not the Halloween decoration skeleton hanging from the inside of the windows. At that same moment

I had a memory that was not my own: It was what the medical hospital looked (like) in its prime. There was a wounded soldier in my vision (the face in the window), along with an old time nurse. I heard screaming in the distance and

suddenly felt panic. My vision passed...I didn't see the man anymore. He had been replaced by the Halloween decoration."

Some of the students who attended the corps with Melinda weren't immune to the creep factor on the campus:


Christopher M Stanley—"...the fog that would roll over the dorms within minutes?"

Dawn Highley—"I remember in D wing at

Rosa Parks when I saw a girl come out of one of the doors and she wore an old fashioned dress. Also, going to the dorms from work by Bellamy and Pat Hall, the fog was so thick and I thought I saw someone standing in the fog. Then I looked again and it wasn't there...." Alisha Holman—"When I was in Rosa Parks

> I would hear heels going up and down the halls and smell cookies baking all the time. I would be walking in front of the building on the outside—when no one was around—I would see figures in the windows on the top floor."

> Jonette Moore—"I remember the old hospital building. A bunch of us wanted to check it out, but before we went inside I saw a little girl pounding on the window."



Melinda also adds-"One girl went into Bellamy Hall to disprove the ghost theory. What she experienced was so bad she refuses to speak of it.

She never went near the building again!"

"I made friends that became like family because of the things experienced. It [the Job Corps Center] was where skeptics became believers."

Southside Art League celebrates 50 years, bringing the community together to create and appreciate artistic diversity.

Through its classes, galleries, exhibits and community involvement, the Southside Art League Inc. has promoted arts in the community for five decades now. As the organization prepares to celebrate its 50th anniversary, members also rejoice in the fact that it has continued to grow, gradually, through those

"It's just wonderful we're still active, vibrant. growing in our art," said Marge Dietel, gallery coordinator. "Our founder, Sally Kriner, her hope was that it would live for many years to come and we have. When Sally Kriner first started, she passed along the word and was amazed at the interest she saw. I think that's still true today."

SALI was organized in May, 1964 as a non-

profit with 39 charter members. Today, the organization has nearly 200 members. Dietel

said in the early days, members didn't have a set location to meet, so they held classes and gatherings in banks, churches, firehouses and people's homes. They purchased the property at 299 E. Broadway, Greenwood, in 1987. The building had previously been a mechanic's shop and needed a lot of work to transform it into the gallery and studio that exists today. The structure was also once a historic building: A hotel where people would

432 Conservatory Dr., Indianapolis.

come all the way from Chicago for the miner-

al water. The building burned in 1911 but the pump house, where art classes are now held, still remains.

"It's a wonderful campus, but we tend to be a secret from a lot of people," Dietel said.

Much has changed through the years, but a constant is the feeling people get from participation with SALI.

"I felt so welcomed by all the people; (David Tipton, former watercolor instructor) made it look so easy," said Beverly Mathis of her first

> impression SALI in 1988. "I thought I would join. I felt this was a place I wanted to get active in my art again. The way you can network with other artists and if you have a question, there's always someone who can help you. These were the nicest people in the world. Artists are so generous because everyone wants to share what they know."

Classes at SALI are an example of those relationships. Walk into

Ron Mack's oil painting class at the Southside Art League and see two rooms filled with

> painters, canvases halfpainted with images that inspire each individual. Each student is working alone, but they're peers around them are willing to offer advice and encouragement if needed. Mack, the longest remaining active member and a past president, said he's always enjoyed teaching, especially at SALI.

"I come down here, I'm on my own," said Mack, Franklin Township resident. "Down here, I feel free to paint and to teach. I just enjoy it. It's close to me."

Members such as Dietel and Mathis, both Center Grove residents, said they were inspired to join the league because of the teachers.

"My husband and I had a business and I thought I'd wait until I retired," Dietel said. "Then I thought, I can make the time. I loved it. (Tipton) was a wonderful teacher. I loved the people. I loved the fact that I could do this. I got active and began to paint. I was thrilled."

Mathis began teaching watercolor classes after her teacher, Tipton, passed away in '96.

"I just get so excited when I see someone blossom into this wonderful artist," Mathis

said. "That desire to create and do artistic things is a God-given thing and it has to come out."

SALI will celebrate its anniversary in a few ways this year. Members have three paintings in recognition of the 50th year hanging at the

new Greenwood City Building. The paintings will hang for a year, which Dietel said they feel is also a good partnership with the city, showing its support of the arts. On Sept. 5, 6-8 p.m., SALI will have a reception for its 23rd Anniversary Competitive Membership Show, which will run through Sept. 30 at the Greenwood Public Library. The all-member reception is open to the public, as community participation is always encouraged.

"It promotes the arts, gives an outlet for artists," Dietel said. "Even if you're not an artist, it gives you an appreciation for art. We have many Southside artists that are exceptional. It's a community thing, not just a personal thing for artists."

Spreading arts through the community is a priority to SALI. Along with its two galleries in the studio, it also encourages relationships through the Art About Town program, where businesses can hang SALI members' work for a period of time, allowing the artist another platform to display their creations.

As SALI moves beyond its 50th year, Mathis and Dietel said they hope to see the organization remains as vibrant and self-sustainable as today, growing even more in its membership and event offerings.

"I hope it keeps going and gets stronger," Mathis said. "We have people that come along and want to teach. It takes an active board of directors. Ongoing, we hope this will continue for many, many years."

The November Man... A bloodier, grittier Bond film

f all film franchises, it would be difficult to name one that has experienced more

financial and critical success than the Bond films. One of the major reasons the films about the British spy who prefers his martinis shaken have been so successful is its unprecedented and unmatched longevity. The films string decades and decades with some of the biggest names in Hollywood taking their turn at the helm as the suave MI-6 operative. One actor who took over for a time as the Sir Ian Fleming created character was Pierce Brosnan. While Brosnan's latest film,

The November Man, may not be a Bond film, the similarities are undeniable.

The November Man is the story of retired CIA operative Peter Devereaux who, as luck would have it, is called back into action. Devereaux, The November Man because "after he passes through nothing survives," is pitted against his best friend and former CIA pupil. As the film progresses, Deveraux uncovers a decades-old conspiracy and finds himself on the other side of the CIA and the newly elected Russian president.

As far as the story and overall plot is concerned, it's very similar to something you would find in a Bond, Jason Bourne, or any other spy/thriller/action flick. The story does go along pretty much as you expect, hitting every single mark as a film from of this genre normally does. The twists are fairly predictable with the possible exception of one or two.


The acting, while not horrible, will not garner any Oscar nominations either. With the only exception being Brosnan, everyone

With so much misinformation

about our favorite foods and how they affect human health, making healthy food choices can be a mindbender. If you knew eating something would make you ill, of course your survival instincts would kick in and you wouldn't eat it.

When you know the truth, I can't imagine you'd deliberately eat foods that science claims cause human disease. Or, would you put your hands over your ears and blurt, "Well, I gotta die from something?"

Hopefully you've transcended this self-abusive mindset and made the rock-solid connection between a poor diet and disease?

First and foremost, I'm convinced when you feed the holy temple heavenly building blocks of cellular health: real, unaltered food, you're giving the self-healing temple its best chance to defend, manage and even cure some disease.

Everyone on earth is subject to disease. The questions are: do you feed disease, put out the welcome mat, and make it comfy and well fed? Or, do you starve it and make your temple an inhospitable host? It's a conscious choice you must make daily; fight the self-abusive urge to eat nutritionally bogus foods that do not service your greater good. Your temple is a perishable item. Treat it accordingly.


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recreate the expected mouth feel.



- 1/2 teaspoon xanthan gum
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter
- 4 eggs

4. Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until cookie is lightly browned and brownie is set. Cool on baking sheets 1 minute. Remove to wire racks; cool completely.

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

"When we first got married, we've been married 45 years, we said on our wedding

night that it's he and I and God together. That's always been a central part of our relationship. Our whole backgrounds were very religious, very similar. We both went to Catholic colleges, met at a Catholic alumni club. So there's never been a separation of faith and our family. We have three daughters that are married now. We tried to live what we believed. I can't really imagine life without that grounding of my faith. We can look and see we've gotten so much back from God than we've given. That's why it's always been an integral part of our marriage." - Lois

What is one meaningful event that has taken place at your place of worship?

"Five years ago, a group took a liturgy to Illinois and brought back a display called the Real Presence. They're slides of posters around the world. We went to get this display and put it up for people we believe in the real presence of God for the Host." - Bob

"It's places where people have failed to believe. They're miracles that have happened, Eucharistic. It's a display of miracles that happened throughout history relating to the Book." -Lois

Why would you recommend your place of worship to someone?

"We've had some very wonderful priests. Father Todd happens to be phenomenal. There are a lot of ministries that go on in our church. I'm involved in one that goes downtown and feeds the homeless under the bridges and such. I'm tired at the end of the day, but Jesus said there will always be the poor among us. It's worth it. There's a youth choir, hand bell choir, men's choir. There are so many groups. We're becoming a very multicultural church. The school is a wonderful school. You just see a lot of really interesting new projects that are constantly happening." - Lois

"One of the things I like about our church, we're small but we've had issues among our pastors — not bad. One died, another had to leave. But people in the church kept the church going. The parish stayed a parish. When Father Todd came, we had a viable church. It's not a huge parish, but it's a nice, welcoming parish." - Bob

"And the Lord said unto Satan, Hast thou considered my servant Job, that there is none like him in the earth, a perfect and an upright man, one that feareth God, and escheweth evil? And still he holdeth fast his integrity, although thou movedst me against him, to destroy him without cause. And Satan answered the Lord, and said, Skin for skin, yea, all that a man hath will he give for his life. But put forth thine hand now, and touch his bone and his flesh, and he will curse thee to thy face. And the Lord said unto Satan, Behold, he is in thine hand; but save his life."

~ Job 2:3-6

Is it true? What Satan said to God, is it true? God once again calls Job to Satan's attention

because God has great confidence in Job. He says of him, "There is none like him in the earth, a perfect and an upright man, one that

fears God and avoids evil, and still he holds fast his integrity even though you moved Me against him, to destroy him without cause."

I wonder if God sees me or you the same way that He saw Job? Do we give God reason to believe that at least one or two members of the race of humans that He created have full confidence in Him?

I believe I can answer that question with at least some certainty. There are people of such faith in God that they
