

Creative Grounds Fine Arts Academy welcomes all who want to perform

Auditioning for a role as an actor, dancer or singer, even if it's for a community or youth theater, can produce a number of fears and anxiety. What if I blow my lines onstage? What if I'm too tall, too short, too young, too old or have a disability?

Anyone interested in participating in a production at Creative Grounds Fine Arts Academy is guaranteed a spot.

An all-inclusive youth theater

"We are all inclusive," said Mark Landis, a Center Grove resident and executive director and co-founder of Creative Grounds. "We have students with autism, Down syndrome and other chromosomal disorders; they are totally immersed in our productions."

"If they audition, they get to be a part of the production," added Katie Landis, Mark's wife. "It's not just about being inclusive, it's about integrating students as part of our organization. They belong as much as anyone else."

The Southside nonprofit began in 2014 as an extension of the worship ministry through Center Grove Church, where Mark was a worship pastor at the time. The ministry became so popular that the number of schoolchildren involved doubled in size after each of the first several musical productions. By June of 2018, "the ministry grew more than the capacity (for it); there were 200 kids in the program," Katie said. Mark and Katie felt called to continue the

program and started Creative Grounds as a nonprofit. Children ages 8 through 18 are invited to participate in youth productions, and those ages 16 and over may participate in adult productions.

As well, the nonprofit is open to anyone in the metropolitan Indianapolis area, regardless of their religious affiliation. "We still have devotions, we're values-based, but we don't push (Christianity) down their throats," Mark said.

Students have choices when participating in musical productions if performing is not an interest. They may assist with set building, props, ushering or serving on the student leadership team. Student leaders may help those with disabilities get on or off the stage, serve as a buddy or tend to someone who seems alone or lost.

Sensory-friendly productions

They also may assist those with autism attending sensory-friendly productions. Within the past year, Creative Grounds introduced these productions so that those with autism would have a comfortable experience, involved.

ing keeping house lights up for those who have trouble adapting to total darkness, eliminating flickering lights and keeping the volume low. "It's one of my favorite nights performing," Mark said.

Grace Streib of Center Grove High School said she has developed invaluable skills and values while serving as a leader. "If I see students sitting alone, I don't feel

awkward going up to them," she said. "We work on loving more and sharing our love in any situation. I feel more confident about that. I feel closer to God in devotion time."

Meghan Wombles, a recent Center Grove High School graduate, began performing with Creative

Grounds in the spring of 2018.

"I've grown in confidence as a performer and a person," Wombles said. "I'm creating relationships with younger students, I'm able to lead a cast and help ev-

eryone. If I hadn't joined Creative Grounds, I wouldn't be pursuing musical theater in college. To know God has a plan for me is really cool. I'm really thankful I was a part of the program."

A production done by kids

Mark said he challenges students in the production to perform at a professional level – and it pays off. "Patrons in the past said they came expecting to see kids doing a production," he said. "They left astonished to see a production done by kids."

Creative Grounds plans to show two upcoming musical performances: Curtains, a musical mystery comedy, from June 24-28; Chitty Chitty Bang Bang, planned for the end of July and beginning of August and James and the Giant Peach JR. for the end of August.



Christian Brothers Automotive franchise owner offers advice to keep cars in good condition

Although auto repair shops are considered an essential business during the pandemic, they have suffered substantially due to the vast majority of customers working at home and rarely venturing out. Locally, businesses are beginning to reopen and traffic on the road has increased.

"As people have begun returning to their normal lives our workload has picked up significantly," said Dave Barnett, franchise owner for Christian Brothers Automotive in Center Grove. "Our large waiting area can accommodate several customers at a time while maintaining social distancing. We are also happy to take customers home, to work, or wherever they need to go in our courtesy shuffle. Customers can feel safe whether they stay with us or choose to wait elsewhere. Like our building, the shuttle is routinely cleaned with disinfectant."

Barnett said he recommends that car owners rarely operating their vehicles

should take their car for a short drive at least once a week to keep it in good operating condition. He warned of additional problems that can result from lack of use.

"Batteries are one component that often fail when a vehicle is not used regularly," Barnett said. "Other systems also experience degradation when vehicles remain parked for extended periods of time. Small animals can even infest cars that are left sitting. 



A few months ago, schools around the world closed their doors and students were forced to attend classes online. School activities, athletic events, spring break trips and proms were canceled. "In the most unusual ending to a school year I have ever experienced in my career, I remain optimistic about the future, knowing that this class of fine young adults will be leaders of tomorrow," Henderson said. "They may have left the halls of CGHS prematurely and without so many of the traditional experiences of a 'normal' year. but I am confident that they have the compassion, conviction and preparation to leave their mark on the world, no matter what they choose to pursue after high school. I wish them every success as they discover what the future holds for them."



In his book, And the Angels Were Silent, Max Lucado tells the story of a bishop who was traveling by ship to visit a church across the ocean. While in route, the ship stopped at an island for a day. He went for a walk on a beach and came upon three fishermen mending their nets.

Curious about their trade, he asked them some questions. When they found out he was a Christian leader, they got excited. "We are Christians!" they said, proudly pointing to one another. The bishop was impressed but cautious. Did they know the Lord's Prayer? They had never heard of it. "What do you say, then, when you pray?" "We pray, 'We are three, you are three, have mercy on us." The bishop was appalled at the primitive nature of the prayer, so he spent the day teaching them the Lord's Prayer. And before the bishop sailed away the next day, they could recite the prayer with no mistakes.

On the return trip the bishop's ship drew near the island again. When the island came into view the bishop came to the deck and recalled with pleasure the men he had taught and resolved to go see them again. As he was thinking a light appeared on the horizon near the island. It seemed to be getting nearer. As the bishop gazed in wonder, he realized

the three fishermen were walking toward him on the water. Soon all the passengers and crew were on the deck to see the sight. When they were within speaking distance, the fisherman cried out, "Bishop, we hurried to come and meet you. We are so sorry, but we forget the lovely prayer. We say, 'Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be your name ...' and then we forget. Please tell us prayer again." The bishop was humbled and said, "Go back to your homes, my friends, and when you pray say, 'We are three, you are three, have mercy on us.""

As I go through life there are many times when I feel inadequate in my pursuit of God. I convince myself that other believers have a much better approach to prayer and devotion. But then God finds a way to remind me that what matters most to Him, is not the eloquence of my prayers or the pattern of my approach, but the sincerity of my heart. Jesus said in Matthew 5:8, Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God. God sees (hears) our hearts more than our words.

Therapist works with local churches to reduce mental illness stigma

Joel Hutton decided to pursue a career as a therapist after witnessing a number of people hurting from their problems. "People would come to my church asking practical questions and get spiritual answers. There was a disconnect. I started studying social work for the sole purpose of becoming a clinical therapist and filling a clear need as I saw it."

Hutton has practiced therapy for four years, and opened Indy Therapy and Counseling last year. He has recently worked with local TV stations and newspapers to provide advice and promote the importance of managing one's mental health during the coronavirus. He also works with several churches in the area to help reduce the stigma of mental illness by offering group trainings for leadership, small group leaders, ministry departments and the congregation.

"Educating on various mental illnesses, how to support people experiencing mental illness, when to refer to a professional, how to start the conversation and how to better assimilate individuals experiencing mental illness into community life," Hutton said.
