Local residents host Thanksgiving dinner for those in need or without families

For most
Americans, Thanksgiving is about
spending time with our loved ones:
the family and friends for whom
we are grateful. We enjoy a feast
of turkey, ham, mashed potatoes,
cranberry salad, and, of course, the
pumpkin pie, followed by watching
football or classic Christmas movies.
We chatter, laugh and remember
the good times in our lives.

For others, Thanksgiving Day can be a lonely and depressing day if they are not surrounded by loved ones. Maybe their family lives far away, or they grieving the loss of a family member or friend.

Area resident Beth Vidales understands this feeling.

Seven years ago, Beth's husband, Darryl "Doc" Martin, a Vietnam veteran who served in the Air Force, passed away from Non-Hodgkins lymphoma. He developed cancer as a result of exposure from Agent Orange.

"He had gotten a liver transplant when we reunited," said Beth, who first met Doc in the 80s, when they briefly dated. They eventually went their separate ways. She had her own family until they met up again several decades later, after she was divorced. "He was never a complainer (but) he complained of stomach pains. His abdomen was extended, and he couldn't get his pants on one day and he said, 'honey, I'm not doing good," she recalled. "I took him to the VA, and he was diagnosed with stage 4 cancer. He lived not quite a year after he was diagnosed."

Beth, whose adult children now live away, decided to help others after her husband's death by hosting Thanksgiving for anyone who was without family on the holiday. At that time, she was involved with the Ladies Auxiliary at the Whiteland VFW and invited veterans who were alone, in addition to neighbors without family.

"I invited several people but some of them hesitated to come to my house," she said. "The most we had was eight people." Some of the veterans were unsure of going to Beth's house as they barely knew her.

"That's when I transferred (to

Greenwood VFW Post 5864). "I asked Steve Milbourn (commander of the Greenwood VFW), if I could start having it here and he said 'absolutely."

"I actually thought it was an excellent idea from the very beginning," Milbourn said of Vidales' idea. "One of our core ideals is to help veterans and their families and this goes along with that."

Last year, 23 guests arrived at the Greenwood VFW. "Many soldiers have never been away from home, let alone by away from Christmas," Milbourn said. "An invitation and free food is always wonderful. Likewise, it is always nice to have the families of our brothers and sisters in arms be a part of this type of celebration."

Beth received some special help last year while preparing for the Thanksgiving meal from a local veteran who previously served in the 101st Airborne Division during the War in Afghanistan: Joe Vidales.

"We started talking in September and we had our first date in October," she said. "As soon as we started talking, he said he knew that I was the one. Our first date was Oct. 23 and he said that night was when he knew he was in love with me."

The newlyweds will once again host Thanksgiving this year at the VFW.

"Please join us on this day so that you will not have to be alone," Milbourn said. "We would enjoy meeting people with ties to the military, men and women, and 'breaking bread' with them."



identified, including connecting Greenwood's Summerville Park with New Whiteland's Proctor Park, and extending the trail south to Franklin, linking Edinburgh to Johnson County Park and connecting Greenwood to Whiteland adjacent to U.S. 31.



Holiday Recipes

Mama's Sour Cream Banana Pudding

- 2 (3.4 ounce) packages instant vanilla pudding
- 2 cups cold milk
- 1 (8 ounce) container sour cream
- 1 (8 ounce) container frozen whipped topping
- 3 o 4 bananas
- 1 (11 ounce) box vanilla wafer cookies

Combine the pudding and milk and whisk by hand for two minutes, until thickened. Whisk in the sour cream. Set aside ½ cup of the whipped topping and whisk in the rest. Mix well.

Cut the bananas into 1/4-inch thick slices.

Spread 1/3 of the pudding mixture in a 2-quart casserole dish. Cover the surface with a layer of wafers, flat side up. Top each wafer with

another rounded side up. Place a banana slice on top of each wafer pair. Fill in the spaces between the cookies with sliced bananas.

Repeat with another layer of the pudding, wafer pairs and banana

Repeat with the remaining pudding, wafer pairs and banana slices. Top with the reserved whipped topping.

Cover and refrigerate overnight.

Upside-Down Apple Pie

- 6 tablespoons butter, melted and divided
- ½ cup packed brown sugar
- ½ cup chopped pecans
- 1 double recipe pie crust
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1/3 cup flour
- 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 5 large firm apples, peeled, cored out and cut 1/2-inch thick

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Coat deep-dish pie plate with nonstick cooking spray and line it with waxed paper. Coat waxed paper with cooking spray.

In small bowl, combine 4 tablespoons butter, brown sugar and pecans; mix well. Spread mixture evenly over the bottom of the pie plate.

Roll out pie dough into two crusts. Place one crust into pie plate, pressing the crust firmly against the nut mixture and the sides of the plate. Set aside.

In large bowl, combine granulated sugar, flour, cinnamon and remaining 2 tablespoons butter; mix well. Add the apples and toss gently to coat. Spread into crust. Place second crust over the apple mixture. Trim and flute edges to seal. Cut four 1-inch slits in the top.

Bake for 1 to 1 ¼ hours, or until crust is golden. Carefully loosen waxed paper around the rim and invert the pie onto serving plate while still hot. Remove waxed paper and allow to cool slightly. May be served warm or cold.

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





Do you know the key to growth in 2020?

There is no secret that it's important to find ways to retain top talent and in 2020, this will continue to be a challenge. Training, recognition and leadership: These are all keys to retaining and building a cohesive team, but I don't think anything is more important than building trust. An employee's relationship with his or her supervisor and team are the most critical factors in creating a work environment that encourages productivity, employee engagement and company loyalty. Without a strong sense of mutual respect, the people you lead will always be looking for other opportunities.

Trust isn't just your feeling of assurance that someone will do a task correctly or will behave in a certain way. The type of trust that is needed starts with vulnerability. This allows everyone to be open and transparent. This isn't easy to develop, but it starts with the leader. When teams

allow themselves to become vulnerable, then they can confidently ask others to do the same. One of my favorite quotes by Patrick Lencioni is: "At the heart of vulnerability lies the willingness of people to abandon their pride and their fear, to sacrifice their egos for the collective good of the team." Trust creates a comfortability for open conversations. Here are two team exercises that start building foundational trust.

- 1. Take 15 minutes and have everyone share something personal. Structure it with a few questions that allow people to talk about themselves. The key is for each person to share something that others may not know about themselves and something that they struggle with.
- Use some type of profiling tool to help your team discover their strengths and understand their weaknesses. I personally like to use tools like DISC and

StrengthFinders. Then, have each person share their top strength or dominate communication style and discuss how they use their strength and style each day.

If you're looking for ways to grow and retain your team in 2020, a great place to start is by building trust. A team that has a high level of transparency and vulnerability can handle conflict, keep commitments, hold each other accountable and ultimately reach goals. This type of a team will create job satisfaction and employee engagement, resulting in retention of the top talent at your company.

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
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How to get the next-to-last word

It was almost inexplicable. She was married to a man she loved and had beautiful children who held her heart. So why was she feeling so down about her life?

Hailey sought the counsel of a nun, who advised her to spend time each day reflecting on something for which she was grateful. As a result, Hailey began a project called 365grateful. And every day she took a photograph of something for which she was grateful. As a result, it changed her life by allowing her to see things she had never noticed. For example, Hailey had always thought of her husband as unromantic. But one day she took a picture of him serving up dinner, the thing she was grateful for that day. She noticed for the first time that the largest portion of pie was placed on her plate. She realized that the largest portion was always placed on her plate and that this was one small way her husband showed his love for her.

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Support for survivors of suicide

Kathleen Ratcliff helps form coalition to help those struggling with suicidal thoughts and launches event for those affected by a loss due to suicide

In 2017, Johnson County's suicide rate was 14.3 deaths per 100,000 individuals. Kathleen Ratcliff is working toward reducing those statistics by helping to form the Suicide Prevention Coalition of Johnson County. Ratcliff is a state suicide prevention coordinator for the Indiana Suicide Prevention Network Advisory Council (ISPNAC).

The coalition, which began in May, recently hosted an event at the Franklin Branch of the Johnson County Public Library. The International Survivor of Suicide Loss Day is held at locations around the world, and this is the first year that Johnson County participated.

"The intent of the day is to help support survivors of suicide realize they are not alone," Ratcliff said. "it's meant to be right around the holidays to help individuals get through the holidays. It's meant to be a day of healing and remember those who have died to suicide and remember and support those that are still here."
