**Bids solicited for
 19-acre Greenwood
 redevelopment site**

Bids are currently being solicited for redevelopment of the former Greenwood Middle School property at 523 S. Madison Ave, with builders already expressing an interest in the 19-acre site. Five potential building sites/parcels are outlined in the plan, according to Greenwood Capital Projects Manager Kevin Steinmetz, in addition to three small parcels at the south end of the pie-shaped site, resulting in the possibility of requesting five or more developers. More than 20 different firms have already contacted the city.

An inner city haunting to remember: the conclusion

The story continues. ...

“The house was unnerving ... scary ... I was always uneasy,” Laura admitted about her experiences in the house – not only in her childhood years, but also later as a teenager. “It started when you had your hand on the front doorknob and entered. It was in every nook and cranny. The stairway leading upstairs was utterly terrifying as was the basement steps. During my teenage years I felt it a lot stronger than my mom (Jennifer) who at that time seemed not to have a relationship with ‘It’ as she had in the past. Maybe she was blocking that out?”

Perhaps blocking was a coping response? What had started in the 1960s as a curious game play soon transformed the house into something dark and foreboding. “People visiting for a short time noticed something was not quite right, then they left,” Laura offered. “Those living there full time continued to deal with what had been brought in. The house was alive and really intense!”

Laura lived there for eight months. She worked the graveyard shift at White Castle, returning to the apartment she shared with her mother the following morning. It became a session with the living room sofa rather than her bed. And sleep was always fleeting. “It was never that deep, relaxing sleep that I had when I was younger. I always felt something was watching me,” she said.

“Throughout the house there were ‘pockets’ that I felt uncomfortable with. These areas really gave a bad feeling. In our apartment this included the bedroom, closet and bathroom. These areas were really hot and radiated it!

Yeah, I heard knocking and rapping, but by then that was rather commonplace, and a yawner.”

When Laura moved in, the activity originating from the Ouija board sessions of the 1960s had dissipated – somewhat. “Considering the past history, these people who had been a part of that, my mother included, seemed oblivious to it now. Whatever was there was not completely gone, only had retreated into the shadows. I discovered I was ‘sensitive’ and still detected a presence there. Others in the house seemed not aware ... couldn’t feel it.” Denial?

During those Ouija encounters of years ago the family described seeing faces in the bay window. Laura saw them herself when she was 15, but never afterward. And the apartment? Before Laura and Jennifer occupied it, renters came and went on a regular basis. Most offered no explanation; however, one renter was quite vocal for her reason for vacating. She stated that the figure of a man had suddenly strolled into the apartment, leaned over a playpen containing her baby, studied the child for a moment and then said “Boo” before disappearing.

“That place just wasn’t right!” Laura still feels. And most likely – still isn’t.

Not long ago, Laura and I pulled up to the house and stepped out upon the sidewalk. Her eyes moved up to the upstairs apartment window. She tried to get some sensation ... a blast from the past. We rang the doorbell, hoping to talk to the current owner. No one answered. We left. Maybe we will try again someday.

Breast cancer survivor and Franciscan Health nurse creates program for those diagnosed with cancer

It's hard to get past some things. Life is fraught with unexpected ups and downs, and some of those downs come with a lot of baggage. Like cancer. Never mind just getting past the moment you hear the diagnosis when the fear sets in and you wonder if you've just been given a death sentence. With each day, a new worry crops up and you feel alone, wondering how you will ever get on the other side of this tremendous setback in life.

That is where a program like Moving Beyond comes into play. Developed in 2015 by Kim Ziner and Dr. Erica Rager, the program's focus is on a patient's journey through cancer diagnosis, treatment and survivorship.

A breast cancer survivor herself, Ziner treats each class as a small group with many opportunities to offer individualized care and attention.

"What we do in the program is evidence-based," Ziner said. "It's based in science. Shelly Ferguson is our healthy lifestyle coach. She's certified in exercise and has ways of helping people exercise no matter where they are in treatment. We also have licensed mental health counselors. They counsel patients through diagnosis and treatment and through Moving Beyond. Those are the two most important things for people to hear. We want to tell them the best things they need to know at their care point. We can individualize their care around what they need at the moment."

Guests also come into the program to

discuss things like financial and spiritual well-being.

"It was wonderful," Millie Martin of Center Grove said.

Marin was diagnosed with breast cancer for the second time in 2017.

"The doctor suggested I go through Moving Beyond," she said. "I was dealing as a caregiver for my husband, and my doctor suggested it for my spiritual well-being. The encouragement I received and information on how to take care of myself and handle stress ... between the cancer and my husband, it was wonderful."

Martin said she learned how to handle stress and balance her nutritive intake.

“They’ll even visit the grocery store, and teach you how to read labels on products,” she said. “It’s a closeness – meeting the people. It’s such an encouragement. Listening to other people share what they’re going through is very helpful.”

Someone else who found it helpful was Kim Mullaly of Beech Grove.

“I just completed the Moving Beyond program,” she said. “It was educational. When I heard about the program, I was afraid it was going to be more like a support group, and that wasn’t what I was really wanting. I had enough of those woe-is-me-times in my life, but it turns out I was educated on medicines and on treatments – stuff I hadn’t even heard about from my doctor.”

Mullaly was diagnosed in February and is still going through treatment.

“The program is just done with love and support and Christian stewardship, and I think that’s important,” she said. “It’s not a clinical setting, which is nice. When you first hear you have cancer, so many people just bombard you with love and support, but then it stops and they all go home and you’re left and still need someone. This group is that someone that you can still talk about it and have your anxiety even when everyone thinks treatment is over and you’re OK. You still need that.”

“The program is at no cost to our survivor and caregiver participants,” Ziner said. “We do fundraising every year with our St. Francis Health Foundation and our 24-hour biking/walking event scheduled for next June. Moving Beyond is a beneficiary of that event every year.”

Ziner is a nearly 30-year cancer survivor.

“I was diagnosed around this time of year 29 years ago,” she said. “This time of year is a time for celebration as well as a little angst. I try to concentrate on the positives and celebrating birthdays. Almost 30 years ago, I had no idea I’d be turning 65 and living well. It’s a great cause for celebration.”

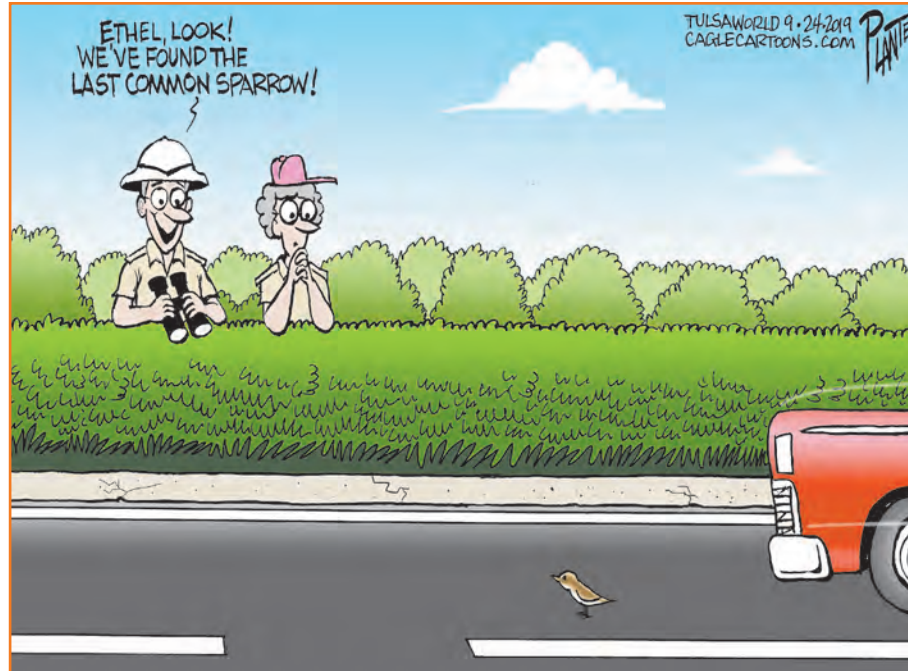

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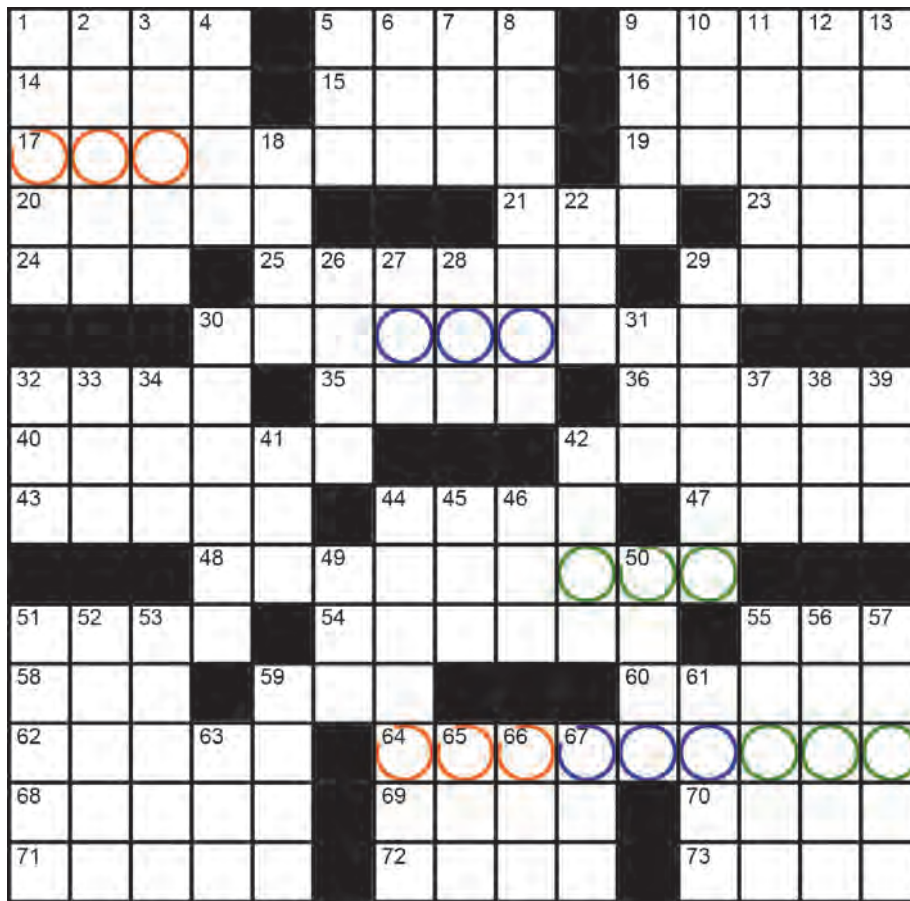

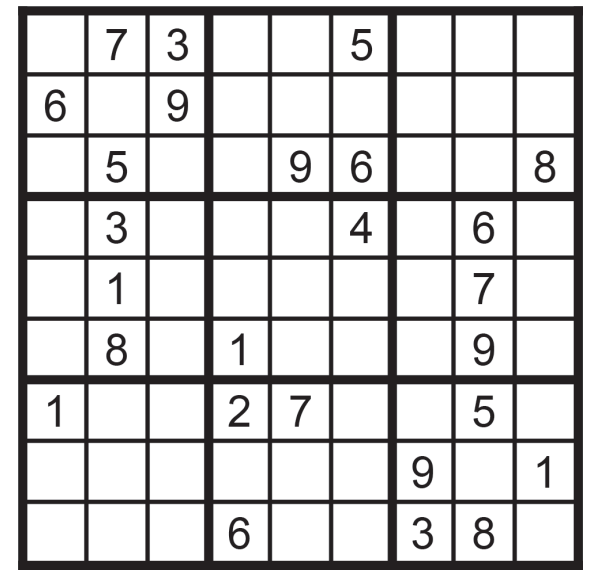

PERSONNEL MATTERS

What do you need to change to finish the year strong?

This past week I was at a conference in Chicago and had the opportunity to listen to Jon Acuff speak on "Finishing." As we only have a couple months left in the year, his speech was thought-provoking and made me reflect on how we finish.

Most start the year with annual goals, plans, action items, etc. Around this time of year, you are either tracking to hit your goals or you are feeling the anxiety of falling short. After listening to Jon's talk, I quickly ordered his newest (No. 1 on the Wall Street Journal Best Seller's List) book titled *Finish: Give Yourself the Gift of Done*. I would tell you my biggest takeaway was simple – **Embrace Imperfection!**

Perfectionism often is our biggest obstacle to hitting our goals. A quote from Jon's book is, *Perfectionism will do its best to knock you down when you work on a goal. At every turn, it will kick you in the shins, steal your lunch money and fill you with doubt.*

At the beginning of the year, you might have been a bit overambitious. You had great goals but then you found yourself overthinking tasks and trying to execute on

everything perfectly. Below are the items I found thought-provoking about finishing as strong as possible:

- **DEVELOP A TOLERANCE FOR IMPERFECTION** – we tend to quit if things are not perfect. Or we slow things way down by looking for perfection before we start. If we want to get things done, we must allow ourselves to get started and be OK with the fact that it might be messy. According to Acuff, *the harder we try to be perfect, the less likely we are to accomplish our goal.*

- **SIMPLIFY YOUR GOAL** – we make things complicated. If you are going to get things accomplished, we need to do the counterintuitive, we need to make things easier. We must make sure the things we are doing really matter and that we aren't doing them just because they make us feel good.

- **STOP DISTRACTING YOURSELF** – we find ourselves hiding in places doing tasks that are not helping us reach our goal. They are likely good things but may not necessarily move the needle closer to finishing. What are you doing that is distracting you from staying on task and reaching the goal?

- **LOOK AT THE DATA** – if you don't review your progress, how do you know if you're on pace? You can't adjust and learn from what you have

done. Without data, you are basing everything off emotions. According to Acuff, the data will allow you to do one of three things if you are behind schedule:

- Adjust the goal – it may be that the goal needs changed for many reasons.

- Adjust the timeline – does it matter if you push it back 30 days?

- Adjust your actions – sometimes you need to reevaluate how you're spending your time.

- **LOOK TO MAKE IT FUN** – it doesn't have to be miserable. Make the goal fun and enjoy the journey. Look for ways to celebrate the small wins and use that energy as momentum.

I hope the items above help you embrace imperfection and spur ideas like it did for me. I would also suggest you pick up Jon's book – and finish it!

Spinning for Myeloma

Southport Elementary hosts a bike-a-thon fundraiser to raise awareness of multiple myeloma

Third-grade teacher, Jennifer Bolen, stood before her class at Southport Elementary with a smile upon her face. You could tell she was proud of their participation and engagement in a project they had taken ownership of over the past few weeks – awareness of multiple myeloma. They were in the home stretch of the project. “The first thing we did on Aug. 12 was had a special guest about multiple myeloma. On Oct. 4 we'll have a fundraiser for people to give,” student Amir Cabrera-Gomez explained the process, pointing to handmade logos and charts in the classroom window.

Multiple myeloma is a cancer that forms in a type of white blood cell called a plasma cell. These are what help you fight infections. This condition causes cancer cells to accumulate in the bone marrow, crowding out healthy blood cells. Rather than producing antibodies, the cancer cells produce abnormal proteins that cause complications. Multiple myeloma almost always starts out as a benign condition called monoclonal gammopathy (MGUS). The benign condition will change each year for about 1 percent of these people, with them developing multiple myeloma or a related cancer. Myeloma is presently incurable, so the only option is to fight it.

Southport Elementary has adopted Project Based Learning (PBL), a learning style allowing the students to engage in solving authentic problems in the community. They develop their own goals and questions to guide their learning throughout the project, then complete tasks and activities leading

to a solution to a real-world problem. PBL results with students attaining a real purpose to connect to their content and lessons. These students have focused in upon multiple myeloma.

“Southport Elementary is working with Meghan McFadden, Ms. Lizzie Conkle and Ms. Emily Jones from the Office of Gift Development at Indiana University Melvin and (Bren) Simon Cancer Center,” Bolen stated. “My third-grade team is partnering with the Office of Gift Development for the Miles for Myeloma 2019 (M4M2019) fundraising efforts.” The PBL project, reflecting the student's hard work, culminates Oct. 4 with an event called the Southport Spin for M4M.

“We have 120 third-grade students working on this project in hopes of generating awareness and donations for this meaningful fundraiser,” Bolen stated.

For Jennifer Bolen, multiple myeloma hits a little close to home. “This PBL project is especially near and dear to my family as my father-in-law lives with this treatable, but incurable disease,” she said.

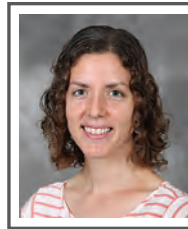
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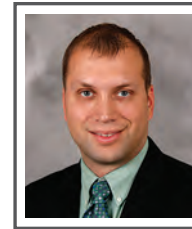

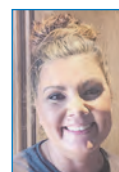

Free Solo Revisiting the 2018 Best Documentary Academy Award Winner

Documentary filmmaking is perpetually challenged by a simple question: to what degree can you film a subject without affecting their actions? *Free Solo* pushes that question to its extreme by upping the stakes to a life or death scenario. The ethical questions behind filming an extremely dangerous athletic feat are intriguing and certainly visually stunning, but it's the intimate character study of its subject that separates *Free Solo* from a crowded space of other feature length documentaries.

Free soloing is a form of rock climbing that involves no ropes or any other equipment, completely unassisted. Alex Honnold, our subject in *Free Solo*, is the world's foremost rock climbing, and more specifically, free soloing expert. He became the first person to ever free solo the northwest

face of Half Dome in Yosemite in 2008. A 2,000-foot-tall sheer cliff, with nothing but his body and a chalk bag to scale it. It's a crazy thing to try and free solo any cliff, much less El Capitan, 3,000-foot-tall cliff, and generally regarded as one of the most challenging routes in all of climbing. *Free Solo* documents Honnold's free solo attempt of El Capitan, the actual climb, but more than that, it documents the limits of human dedication, discipline and skill.

Alex Honnold has trouble expressing his emotions to others, and even to his partner. But when Honnold gets onto a wall, he finds his place. It is clear from the moment Honnold sets foot on a wall, that there is absolutely nowhere he would rather be. This does not mean Honnold is invincible, though; in fact, much of the film's ideological presentations are questioning whether or not filming someone in a scenario where any wrong move means certain death is ethical at all.

The first impression most will have after they view *Free Solo* for the first time will most

definitely be the white-knuckled tension and awe of the actual attempt. It is filmed with stunning cinematography and conveys so much entirely visually. However, the final climb works so well thanks to a well-crafted and expertly framed set-up that gives the climb an additional emotional weight.

Free Solo succeeds through Honnold's sheer force of will. It is a beautiful, often thoughtful portrait of the depths of human dedication. *Free Solo* is available for free with a Hulu subscription and can be purchased or rented through any video-on-demand services.
