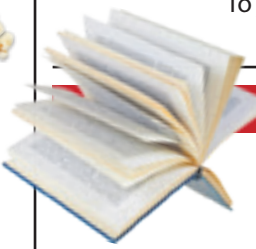

Return to Gettysburg: Part I

This past August was the last Boy Scout Firecracker Ritual for the year. It's something I have participated in for the last 14 years. Multiple individual fires, sequentially dotting woods or meadows and casting a curtain of blue fog-like smoke, always gets me to thinking: the Civil War, and how northern and southern troops had made overnight camps such as these. The Civil War turns my thoughts to Gettysburg, PA. We are returning again. It has gotten into our blood!

The epic battle at Gettysburg marked the turning point of the war effort, effectively resulting in the last Confederate invasion. Even though the war would continue for two additional years after this conflict, the south never regained their momentum. The three-day campaign – July 1, 2 and 3, 1863 – left thousands dead, Union and Confederate. Is the battlefield park haunted? Is the town of Gettysburg itself? I believe that it very much so is. Strong emotions, violence, chaos and sudden death have been known to generate a play-back. For years (even shortly after the battle) the town and surrounding ground has become known for apparitions and the continuing sounds and smells of military conflict; residual offerings emitting tragedy from the past and carrying over into the here and now. There seems to be ghosts aplenty in Gettysburg!

My first exposure to the battlefield was many years ago when I chaperoned my son's fifth-grade school trip to Washington, D.C./Gettysburg. By the time we crossed into Pennsylvania I had somehow contracted a case of food poisoning. My recollection of Gettysburg was a brief looking over the valley from Little Round Top and then lying in the fetal position on the bus, gently moaning

as the kids and other chaperons ate dinner at General Pickett's Buffet. It was a long ride back to Indianapolis!

My wife, Laura, and I made our first visit in 2017, meeting up with our friend Alan Hunter, who took on the duty of tour guide. Alan and his wife, Rhonda, travel to Gettysburg several times a year, and have over the course of many years. So many sites within the park ... so much history that unfolded in those three days ... so little time! There's Big Round Top and Little Round Top; Devils Den, with the nearby Wheat Field, Slaughter Pen and Peach Orchard; Culp's Hill and Spangler's Spring; Seminary and Cemetery Ridges, with the latter culminating in Pickett's Charge across a mile-long expanse of field; and about a hundred other sites all bearing important significance in the battle. You can hold photos of the aftermath of the battle and stand in the exact spot where it all happened or where a soldier dropped in his journey into eternity. Alan told us that wherever you walk, most likely a soldier took his last breath there. It's unnerving to say the least, but also retains a morbid fascination.

We are returning – September 2019 – and the car is gassed, and the trunk is packed. The eastern mountains of Pennsylvania are beckoning, along with a sense of innocence that changed the small town of Gettysburg 156 years ago. For Alan, the battlefield seems to be an obsession. Quite possibly, for Laura and me, it has become ours as well.

HOW TO BECOME A FOSTER PARENT

Guidelines for potential foster parents include a minimum age of 21. Singles and married couples are welcome to apply. Couples must be married at least a year before applying for the program. All potential foster parents must go through state-based training. Foster parents must be CPR and first aid certified. A home study is completed with paperwork, including references and background clearances. There is an interview with a social worker to make sure potential foster parents can offer a safe and stable home for a child. The process takes about three to four months. Fountain Square woman helps migrant children connect with local foster families

Many children are fleeing violence, extreme poverty or other impossible situations and they may arrive at the border alone with the hope of reuniting with relatives in the U.S. through many different means. The overwhelming majority of these children are not separated from their parents at the border. In many cases, desperate parents send their children with a caravan heading toward the border and along the way, families within the caravan care for the child. In other cases, children arrive at the border by means of a coyote or smuggler who has been paid to transport the child. Very young children have been found with the name and address of a relative in the U.S. taped inside their shoe or a phone number memorized.

It's heartbreaking to watch and makes one wonder, "what can I do?"

Well ... you could write a letter to a senator or donate to the ACLU. Or, you could become a foster parent.

Bethany Christian Services is a place-

ment service that has rolled out a new program in Indiana of transitional foster care.

"Bethany is a licensed child-placing agency," Cindy Neal said.

Neal, of Fountain Square, has been with Bethany for 17 years in foster care licensing and recruitment.

"We do social services related to children and families in Indiana as well as several other states around the country and internationally as well," she said.

Bethany offers a program of transitional foster care that is an option for children who might otherwise languish indefinitely in a detention center.

"Obviously it's very difficult to see children who, for whatever reason, are not able to be with their families," Neal said. "In this program - transitional foster care - we're dealing with children who have fled dangerous situations, and it's great to know they'll be around adults who will care for them and do what they can to help them."

The goal with children in transitional foster care is always to reunite them with

their parents.

"Our goal is to always reunite children with families who are already in U.S. as quickly as possible," Tamara Timm said.

Timm is also in foster care licensing and recruitment and has been with Bethany for six years.

"You should have a heart for families and children," she said. "Potential foster parents should want to invest in children and families here in Indianapolis as well as worldwide."

Malinda, who cannot further identify herself or her foster child, lives on the Southside of Indianapolis. She was licensed for foster care in August and received her first placement just over a week ago. A young girl has made a temporary home with Malinda while she waits for the time when she can reunite with her family.

"It's gone really well," Malinda said. "I've been surprised at how quickly she adjusted and how little she's frustrated with us."

Malinda said that she and her husband had always considered foster care and had been planning to wait a little longer until

they heard about the transitional program.

"We felt like we should do something," she said. "There's a lot of hard stuff going on, and it felt like this was something we could do. We're not bilingual, but we thought it was an incredible program."

And has she thought about the time when she'll have to inevitably say goodbye?

"I'm sure it's going to be difficult because she's integrated into every part of our lives at this point," Malinda said. "But we went in knowing that this was temporary - that makes it a little easier for us."

Bethany has had transitional foster care systems in other states since 2012. Since 2013, Bethany has reunited over 7,000 children with their families.

"I think that people should know that this is a huge and ongoing need," Neal said. "This continues to be a huge need. The Office of Refugee Resettlement had more than 40,000 children referred to their care in the first few months of the year. We would love to be able to serve more children and families, but we cannot do that without foster families."

Artcraft Theatre to show movies from Heartland Film Festival

Southside film aficionados, clear your schedules for next week. The 28th Annual Heartland International Film Festival is coming to Artcraft Theatre in Franklin Oct. 15-17.

The Johnson County location is the only venue on the Southside to run movies from the state's largest and longest-running film festival. "To be the location picked is very exciting for us," said Dave Windisch, marketing manager for Artcraft Theatre.

Six films will be shown at Artcraft, beginning with *The Keeper*, Oct. 15 at 5 p.m. The Keeper, a German drama set during the end of World War II, is part of an international program called "Cultural Journey," a tribute to and celebration of the cinema, culture and cuisine of a specific country. Eight feature films will be shown from Germany this year. *Apollo 11*, part of this year's Awards Season Spotlight, follows *The Keeper* at 7:30 p.m. and takes moviegoers back to 1969, when astronauts Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin first set foot on the moon. "I've seen *Apollo 11*; it's absolutely stunning," Windisch said.

On Oct. 16, the theatre will show *Going Attractions: The Definitive Story of the*

Movie Palace at 5:30 p.m. The documentary made in the U.S. and Australia celebrates the American cinemas of yesterday, when theaters housed thousands of seats, and exotic and ornate interiors with balconies, lounges and orchestras. Go back in time with *Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade* at 7:30 p.m., which celebrates 30 years.

When *Last We Spoke*, a family comedy-drama set in 1966 Texas, plays Oct. 17 at 5:15 p.m., starring Corbin Bernsen, Melissa Gilbert and Cloris Leachman. On Oct. 19 at Newfields, Leachman will receive Heartland Film's Lifetime Achievement Award. *Jump Shot*, which shows at 7:30 p.m., concludes all showings at Artcraft with a documentary about Kenny Sailors, creator of the modern-day jump shot in basketball.

Documentary and history buffs may want to consider *Stalag Luft II - One Man's Story*, featuring WWII U.S. Eighth Air Force Bombardier Lt. Charles Woehrl, one of 10,000 prisoners in Stalag Luft III depicted in the film, *The Greatest Escape*. The director of the film is Charles Woehrl's niece, Louise Woehrl.

"My uncle's story of growing up in Pine City, Minnesota, flying in the Mighty Eighth, getting shot down and taken prisoner by the Nazis is quite a saga filled with grit and grace," Louise said. "The film is touching

people in a way that I hoped it would. It is a personal story that spans almost 100 years."

"You feel something when you leave the theater," Julia Ricci, senior programmer at Heartland Film Festival, said. "If you're looking to see something different, there is something for everyone."

Ticket prices for movies shown at Artcraft Theatre are \$7. A limited number of free admission vouchers are available through all Johnson County Public Library branches. For more information, go to historicartcraft-theatre.org/movie-and-events-schedule.

Reducing stress for World Mental Health Day

EAT WELL: avoiding processed foods is key. Whole grains, vegetables and fresh fruit are essential for a healthy body and will help stabilize mood and energy levels.

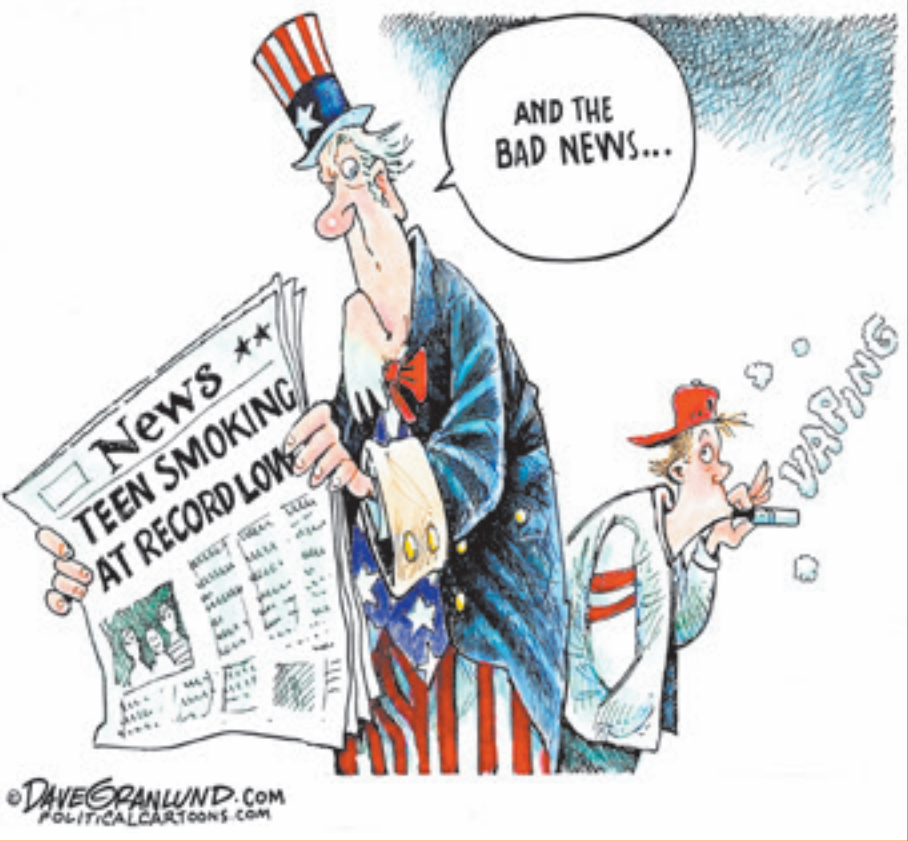
GET ENOUGH SLEEP: most adults need between seven to nine hours of sleep a night. Also, even a brief 30-minute nap during the day can help keep you more alert.

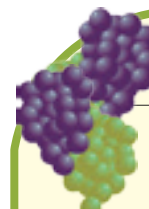

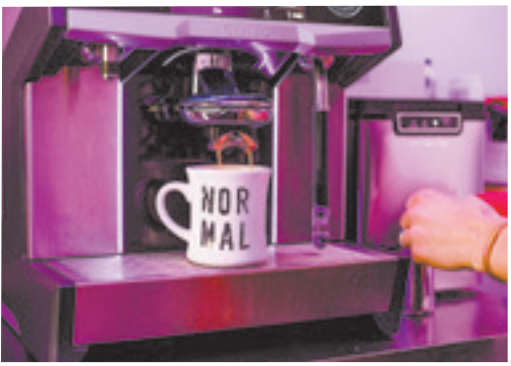

Normal Coffee

Up until six months ago, residents in the Garfield Park area, including students nearby at the University of Indianapolis, had limited choices when choosing a coffee shop that included affordable food and drink options where they could work, meet up with friends or grab a book to relax during regular business hours. Normal Coffee, nestled in a contemporary art museum/community center called the Tube Factory, serves \$2 coffee from Tinker Coffee Co., a locally-owned specialty coffee roaster, and croissants, cookies and biscuits from Amelia's, a bakery in Fountain Square (food is transported each morning by bicycle). Normal Coffee is the brainchild of Jeff Woodward, an entrepreneur who grew up in the area. "He wanted to give back to his neighborhood," said Carlie Foreman, business manager of Normal Coffee. As well, "we wanted to have another amenity for this space, to be able to offer refreshments," she added. Drinks were previously limited in the evenings while patrons attended special events and art exhibits. "(But) when people came in during

the day there weren't many options for them." Guests of the coffee shop may roam around the gallery at no charge or walk around the outside property while checking out the garden, roaming chickens or even the Indianapolis Bee Sanctuary. In addition, "there are a ton of cultural and arts events hosted in this space every month, sometimes during the day," Foreman said. Normal Coffee is open from 7 a.m.-6 p.m., Monday through Friday, and Saturday from 8 a.m.-3 p.m. For more information, go to bigcar.org/project/normal-coffee.

Joker A confused descent into madness

Joker, the newest film from Hangover director Todd Phillips, was the subject of a plethora of main stream media attention even before its release. Countless write-ups have asserted that the film may cause copy-cat attacks by lonely males attracted to the film's titular maniac. These stories warranted real world policy changes too. The AMC theatre I attended on opening night had three security guards on duty in the lobby. Despite all the media scrutiny, the film actually revealed itself to be a movie centered around vague ideas of mental healthcare, empathy and classism. Unfortunately, *Joker* fails to develop any of these ideas into a coherent message and without a world-class talent like Jaquín Phoenix in the lead role, *Joker* would be a hard film to sit through.

In *Joker* we are introduced to Arthur

Fleck, a man out of step with the world around him. He does not understand social cues, and has trouble maintaining any meaningful relationships besides his mother, who he serves as a sort of caretaker. In addition to his mental instabilities he has a condition that forces him to laugh in times of stress, discomfort and everything in between. The film chronicles Arthur's journey to becoming Batman's most dangerous enemy and Gotham's clown prince of crime.

The film's strengths lie almost solely in presentation. The film's cinematography is a clear homage to the film's principle influence, Martin Scorsese's *Taxi Driver*. The streets of Gotham are claustrophobic and drenched in a dingy green hue. The presentation grounds the world in a dark, moody atmosphere that creates an uncomfortable and unnerving tone. Giving context for Phoenix's transformative performance as a man disconnected from the society, he finds himself within.

The material of the story, however, never

comes to any satisfying conclusions about why Fleck becomes the killer he does. It tries to balance so many ideas in its two-hour runtime, none of them develop into more than passing mentions of societal ills. Certainly, there are promising ideas proposed, but nothing that warrants the sense of grandeur the film has with itself. It is as if Phillips tried to remake *Taxi Driver* but missed the larger points the ascetics of the film serve.

Joker is a gorgeously presented film that too often mistakes aesthetics for content but is certainly a fun ride. Despite all of its ills Phoenix still manages to take the audience on a wild, but rapid ride into madness.

One very overused word to avoid: what you should use instead

Substitute “damn” every time you’re inclined to write “very”; your editor will delete it and the writing will be just as it should be.

—MARK TWAIN

Here’s the scene: you offer to drive to lunch, and, just before everyone gets in, you make a mad sweep around your car, grabbing old to-go cups and discarded wrappers and putting them in an old Wendy’s bag. Maybe that’s not you; perhaps your car is somewhat tidier. Regardless, just as everyone gets into your car, you commence with the obligatory statement that goes something like this: “Sorry, my car is such a mess. It’s very dirty. I’ve been meaning to vacuum it out for the past six years.”

Whether our car interiors are clean or not, we all repeat a version of the obligatory apology when we give someone else a ride. Guess what? It’s unnecessary. You have permission to quit apologizing.

Here’s a word we don’t need to say anymore: very. “The book was very funny.” “The Olympian jumped very high.” “The president was very upset.” Boring.

If “very” is overused as I suggest, what alternatives do we have? Let me propose two options. First, simply omit the word and proceed with your sentence as usual. As Mr. Twain suggests, you should simply

search your entire document (when writing) or somehow audit your brain for words it knows (when speaking), then merely delete the word from your entire lexicon. You don’t need to say or write very if you’re using it as a “filler” or “padding” word. The same thing goes for the word “really.” Really.

You may still wish to convey the same kind of emphasis you think “very” injects. After all, “very” is an intensifier, which is an example of an adverb or adverbial phrase that shows emphasis, thereby making a phrase or sentence stronger. Very well; you can substitute scores of more interesting words for “very,” depending on the level of severity you’d like to communicate.

Rather than saying something is “very fast,” say it was “quick.” If you want to convey that something is “very good,” instead say that it is “superb.” Don’t say “very hungry;” “ravenous” is much more interesting.

It may take more creativity but substituting the word “very” will infuse your speech with the exact intensity or tone you want. So, either stop saying “very” or find a better word. Just like with the obligatory car apology, “very” is overused and often superfluous.

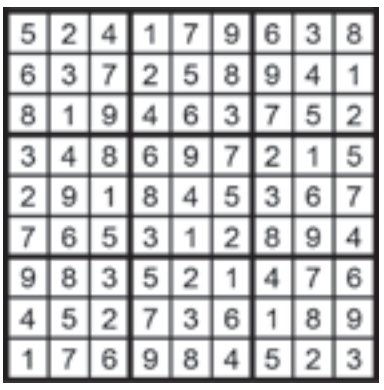
