

#### Buy the ticket, take the ride!

There are strange oddities that can happen to a paranormal investigator that defy rational explanation; however, you don't have to be a ghost hunter to have strange things happen to you. When paranormal investigators buy a ticket to take the ride on the paranormal train, it's something they've signed up for; for others, not so much thrilled with the prospect of an otherworldly encounter, the experience is a shock! While it remains a paranormal occurrence — you don't have to be a ghost hunter to have one.

Stories have been reported from people not in the least interested in ghosts:

- Overhearing family members having conversations in various rooms of a home when they are not even present. One theory is this is a residual occurrence, like a tape-recording playback, regardless of the fact that the voices heard belong to people still very much alive. Another theory is it's "something" mimicking these folks.
- A husband or wife hearing the voice of their spouse while totally alone. Same theories as above and a lot more implications of a personal nature.
- One woman heard a very distinct voice ask her ... "Why don't you sleep in your room?" It was during a period when she was not sleeping in her own bedroom, and the voice was her own! Internal head dialogue? Maybe.
- One woman commented on an experience of hearing voices. "It was clear and sounded exactly like us. The first one was at 9 p.m. My 8-year-old son was yelling, "Mommy, I threw up." He was sound asleep! For-

- ward to 4 a.m. My husband, who fell asleep in his office, heard me yell, "Time to get up, honey! I was sound asleep upstairs with my son, and never wake my husband at 4 a.m. So far that's it, but it was real enough for us to seek answers..."
- One woman had a loud conversation with her brother, with them yelling throughout their house. Her brother's voice eventually trailed off into an unintelligible mumble. It turned out she was the only one at home! Her parents have since experienced hearing each other's voices, and that of the brother.
- Finally, a man heard his brother's voice call to him as he brushed his teeth in preparation for bed. The call seemed urgent. Thinking the brother needed help, the man responded and got no reply. The brother, as it turns out, was in another bathroom brushing his teeth and had not said a word. "At that point I felt really strange, and something told me that this wasn't my brother and that maybe answering his voice may have not been a good idea. I didn't sleep well that night."

Although these experiences were auditory in nature, they happened to those not pursuing any supernatural encounter. When you not only hear, but also start seeing stuff, then the party really begins! These types of experiences are what lead many to get involved with ghost hunting; they are curious and seek answers. The paranormal often finds you, whether you seek it or not.

## 2020 Outlook

Southside mayors discuss 2019 challenges and accomplishments and goals for **2020**

2019 was a good year for Beech Grove, Greenwood and Southport. New jobs moved to Beech Grove area with the addition of Amazon, and more will arrive with Milestone Contractors, LP, a subsidiary of The Heritage Group. Cummins will bring about 500 to the city of Greenwood with average salaries of about \$100,000. And Southport closed 2019 with a balanced budget. There were challenges, as well, when a tornado brought \$15 million in damages to Beech Grove. Yet citizens came together and helped those in need with food, clothing and shelter. Southside mayors are excited about an even better year with plans for 2020.

#### Beech Grove Mayor Dennis Buckley

## Q: What were the city's greatest accomplishments of 2019?



**BUCKLEY:** From an economic development standpoint, the Amazon company relocating to Beech Grove. They are up and running and doing quite well. One of the spinoffs of that is

we've become home to some local delivery companies so that's even more jobs. Besides Amazon, there was an announcement by Heritage Group that they've purchased the property next to Amtrack. And Milestone Contractors LP will be relocating to that site. They've moved 110 jobs to Beech Grove and will add 25 more jobs. The average wage is \$36.50 per hour. The Indianapolis Metropolitan Organization has awarded the city \$1.2 million for intersection improvements at 25th and Churchman avenues. The INDOT has awarded a bid by Rieth Riley for construction of a roundabout at the intersection of Arlington and Churchman avenues. Work will begin next spring. We have been reassessed in our property values and are up an additional \$40 million since the last assessment. That's good if you own your own home or your own business. Your property value just went up. I'm very happy about that. Last year was a good year for us and I anticipate even better next year.

## Q: What is the biggest challenge the city overcame in 2019?

**BUCKLEY:** An EF-1 tornado that came through the city. It displaced over 60 fam-

ilies and had a drastic effect on one of the businesses and Beech Grove High School. All of the affected commercial properties are still in business and work is continuing on Beech Meadow Apartments and the high school. There was at least \$15 million in damages. It was nice under the worst circumstances that the best of people came out and delivered food and clothing.

## Q: What do you feel is the greatest strength of your city, going into the new year?

**BUCKLEY:** It's always been our people. We provide the absolute best in city services. There's no comparison.

## Q: Is there anything else you would like to add, summarizing 2019 or looking forward to 2020?

BUCKLEY: Hopefully soon, we'll have more police officers in the school and that's important to develop relationships with students and police. The school will have a referendum in May. If that passes, we'll hire an additional three officers for a total of four. We will approach the Beech Grove City Council to get approval to build a new police station and fire station. It's desperately needed. I would like to replace Beech Grove Fire Station 56 on Albany Street. It's outdated and way too small. Also, the city should begin to see the construction of the Greenway this fall. It's a 2.2-mile path that winds through the park system and attaches to South Grove Intermediate School and Beech Grove High School. I think it could be the second most important project I've had as mayor. I think it's that relevant to the city; it changes the whole city.

## Southside real estate statistics

Real estate - Greenwood and Southside home buyers saw increased home sale prices in November 2019, with homes spending less time on the market. According to F.C. Tucker Company, the average sale price for Southport homes was \$164,374, an increase of 11.5 percent from this time last year. Homes in Greenwood sold for an average price of \$170,834, a 7.8 percent increase from Novem-ber 2018. Southport homes sold in 19 days, spending seven fewer days on the market. Greenwood homes spent five fewer days on the market, selling in an average of 22 days.

## Q: What were the city's greatest accomplishments of 2019?



MYERS: We made significant progress on several transformative quality of life projects, including the re-imagination of Old City Park, redevelopment of the former Greenwood Middle

School property and a new downtown fieldhouse. Freedom Springs Aquatic Center and the city's Summer Concert Series enjoyed record attendance yet again this year and the city is constantly pursuing opportunities for new trails and greenspace. Greenwood continued its substantial economic development momentum as well. The city announced several new commercial investments and welcomed Cummins as its newest corporate citizen. The company plans to invest more than \$35 million in a professional office building that will house 500 professional employees averaging a salary of \$100,000. Greenwood also celebrated the launch of its integration into the state's INBiz portal - the first municipality in Indiana to do so – making it easier for businesses to work with local government. Finally, the city remains focused on building its infrastructure to accommodate recent and future growth. Greenwood made considerable progress on construction for both the Western Regional Interceptor and expansion of Worthsville Road. Both projects will contin-

## Q: What is the biggest challenge the city overcame in 2019?

MYERS: For several years, staffing levels for both the Greenwood Police Department and Greenwood Fire Department have been well below recommended levels. In 2019, Greenwood addressed the issue by passing a 1 percent food and beverage tax. The additional revenue – a majority of which will be generated by visitors and nonresidents – will allow Greenwood to reallocate budget from the city's general fund and hire more police officers and firefighters.

## Q: What is the greatest strength of your city, going into the new?

MYERS: With a balanced budget, significant financial reserves and Indiana's fourth-lowest tax rate, Greenwood is well-positioned to continue leading the Southside's resurgence. The city offers dynamic public amenities and an ever-increasing quality of life. Potential businesses and residents are taking notice and Greenwood plans to continue building on this momentum in 2020 and beyond.

## Q: Is there anything else you would like to add, summarizing 2019 or looking forward to 2020?

**MYERS:** Greenwood is excited for another year of pride and progress. Stay tuned for updates and more great news!


**MCCLURE:** While Southport had a relatively quiet year, we were able to update our various plans which will allow us to apply for more grant opportunities in the coming year.

I haven't had a New Year's resolution in years. Yet, I felt convicted to adopt one this year after a death in the family just days before Christmas.

Kelley, my cousin, was a healthy 35-year-old teacher. She invited me to events, and never gave up, even after I turned her down due to deadlines, plans with my boyfriend or catching up on sleep. Finally, I asked if she'd like to have lunch or dinner on a Monday night. We eventually canceled due to snow and hazardous road conditions.

Tuesday morning, she learned that there was a two-hour delay due to the snow and went back to sleep. She never woke up.

The following Saturday, I attended her funeral. Friends spoke endlessly of her time, commitment and encouragement. This was a wake-up call. How often was I reaching out to friends? How many times had I assumed there would be a tomorrow to see or talk with them?

Several days later, I began to text those I'd been meaning to contact, asking when they were free for dinner or a movie. And this past Christmas, instead of waiting for the "Merry Christmas" texts, I was the first to send them.

This year, I want no regrets. No regrets of "if only" I would have spent more time with my 86-year-old dad, who has COPD. "If only" I would have reached out to my friends instead of assuming there would be a tomorrow.

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

## Brad's top 10 films of 2019

#### **MOVIE REVIEW**

#### 10. Midsommar (Ari Aster)

Shot in almost direct opposition to modern horror sensibilities, Ari Aster's second feature film is brightly lit and shot in a robust and beautiful color palette that is a feast for the eyes. The film's themes of grief, relationships and our starvation from community are communicated subtly but effectively.

#### 9. Booksmart (Olivia Wilde)

Unlike many actors-turned-directors, Wilde has a clear voice and tone she wanted to communicate and Booksmart is a testament to her talents. It is a heartfelt, empathetic and hilarious journey of discovery and support.

#### 8. A Hidden Life (Terrence Malick)

Malick uses natural light and handheld camerawork to paint beautiful scenery paired with wistful, almost poetic, inner dialogues that feel consistently profound. This tale of an Austrian farmer quietly standing up to Nazi oppression is both devastatingly sad, and immensely hopeful in the power of convictions.

#### 7. The Irishman (Martin Scorsese)

The power of The Irishman lies in pauses and silences. Scorsese uses the character of Frank Sheeran to explore not only the immediate consequences of violence, but the long-lasting scars it creates on even the relationships of the perpetrator. Joe Pesci, Robert De-Niro and Al Pacino are firing on all cylinders, demonstrated best by the way their performances change to reflect their aging bodies and minds.

#### 6. Under the Silver Lake (David Robert Mitchell)

A masterfully crafted suspense film revolving around a mysterious disappearance. The details in this film elevate the viewing experience into something otherworldly. Essential viewing for fans of David Lynch or Alfred Hitchcock.

#### 5. The Lighthouse (Robert Eggers)

A visual tribute to films of yesterday, The Lighthouse is incredibly forward-thinking in its storytelling techniques. It takes inspiration from Kubrick and Bergman without ever feeling derivative. It is a funny, but horrifying tale of sexuality, mermaids and madness.

#### 4. The Art of Self-Defense (Riley Sterns)

Jesse Eisenberg plays a shy, emasculated man seeking an outlet to reclaim his masculinity after being beaten up and robbed. Stern's observations about masculinity may seem surface level, but a closer look reveals a film full of profound assertions about manhood.

#### 3. Climax (Gaspar Noe)

A drug-fueled nightmare by cinema's most transgressive auteur. Climax in a singularly focused story that aims only to disrupt and disturb. Noe's skill is undeniable, and the technical proficiency displayed here is unparalleled.

#### 2. Marriage Story (Noah Baumbach)

A tender love story framed through a divorce might sound odd, even impossible, but Baumbach's script is written with pinpoint precision that makes it work perfectly. The shot composition, editing and script all work together harmoniously to communicate the importance and value of vulnerability.

#### 1. Parasite (Bong Joon-ho)

Simply put, Parasite is cinema. Funny, smart, tense, allegorical, beautiful, hurtful, sad, triumphant and hopeful. I think if everyone were to watch and think critically about Parasite, the world would be a better, more empathetic place.

## Singleton and Herr mortuary name returns to Madison Avenue

Wilson St.Pierre Funeral Service & Crematory has restored the name of a Southside funeral home to honor the late William "Bill" Singleton of Greenwood.

Singleton Community Mortuary and Memorial Center, 7602 Madison Ave., Indianapolis, was renamed Singleton and Herr Mortuary after the St.Pierre family purchased the Singleton Community Mortuary building from Bill Singleton's estate in October. Singleton passed away in 2017.

"We chose to name it Singleton and Herr in respect to Bill, primarily to ensure his name was on the building and keep the stability Bill would have wanted," said Paul St.Pierre, president of Wilson St.Pierre. "The Singleton and St.Pierre names have both been the most trusted and respected names for seven decades together on the Southside."

Singleton's first job with a funeral home was with J.C. Wilson & Company, managed at that time by fourth-generational funeral director Robert R. St.Pierre, around 1959. Robert purchased the business in 1964.

"Bill was quite a young man but gained my grandparents' trust quickly," said Paul. "He was on our board of directors in the 1960s. Quite confident, he ventured out on his own and opened Singleton and Herr Mortuary in 1974."

Hoping to retire in 1995, Singleton

sold the mortuary in 1990 to a family in Illinois, yet decided to compete against the firm he sold, building Singleton Community Mortuary and Memorial Center.

"With all that knew him, most of the families he had served decided to use Singleton Community Mortuary, not his founding firm of Singleton and Herr," said Paul. "Ironically, Wilson St.Pierre purchased Singleton and Herr from the Illinois owners in 2003. The St.Pierre's long desired to offer the lowest prices in Perry Township, so we changed the brand from Singleton and Herr to not compete so closely to Bill next door. Our Simplicity Funeral Care brand, after a few short years, is now the leading provider of funeral and cremation care in Perry Township."

Toney Edwards, Singleton's successor of the business, has moved Singleton Community Mortuary to the west side of Indianapolis, at 1202 S. Lynhurst Dr. Indiana State Law states that if a consumer purchased a prearrangement with Singleton Community, they can move it to any funeral home of their choice.

"All those prearranged with Singleton Community are now transferred to their west side location," Paul said. "If a family wants to remain on Madison Avenue in Bill's old funeral home, they will have to stop in or call to initiate documents to keep it on the Southside. The entire Singleton and Herr staff led by Paul and Kristin St.Pierre can assist with this simple process."

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#### How to achieve a higher level of consciousness

Are you wound up? Worked up? Burnt out? Are you tired of being tired? Do you have outrage fatigue from whatever political scandal is dominating today's headlines? Believe it or not, we weren't born with smartphones and social media connected to our wrists 24/7. We are growing increasingly anxious as a culture. It's time to disconnect from our unsustainable, frenzied existences for a minute to calm our overwrought brains.

Can I make a suggestion? Try a simple breathing exercise for five minutes. Get alone, close your eyes and take some deep breaths. Put your phone away. Pay attention to your breath and watch your anxiety meter drop down a few notches.

Only when we make an intentional effort to slow down can we achieve higher levels of consciousness – or is it conscience? Unconscious? Let's clear up the differences between

these confusing words.

Conscience is a noun that refers to someone's internal sense of right and wrong. When you steal paperclips from the office to make chainmail for your fashion-forward upcycled clothing line, your conscience is the thing that makes you feel a little guilty for pilfering \$27 worth of office products. The adjective version of conscience is "conscientious," which means that someone is guided by her sense of right and wrong, careful not to make mistakes.

Conscious is an adjective that means to be aware, alert, intentional or awake. Before your alarm goes off in the morning, you're unconscious (most people call this "sleeping"). If you make a "conscious effort" to make eye contact and be present with people, that means you're taking intentional steps to change your behavior for the better. If someone is self-conscious, that means he is more aware of how he perceives others view him.

Being self-conscious can mean being "self-aware"; in negative connota-

tions, however, being self-conscious can make someone hyper-aware of how others view himself to the point of paranoia. Be self-conscious in a good way.

The term "consciousness" is a noun that has to do with the state of being conscious. It is a deep level of thoughtfulness that helps people become more aware of themselves and others.

I'll offer one cautionary note before you begin your intentional breathing exercises: if your surroundings are too dark, you're likely to slip into unconsciousness before you can gain a sense of higher consciousness. 
