Greenwood unveils design for reimagined Old City Park

Greenwood Mayor Mark Myers revealed a final design for downtown's reimagined Old City Park during his eighth annual State of the City address on Feb. 7. The park's recreational centerpiece will feature a 20-foot cube play tower designed by KOMPAN, an internationally renowned playground manufacturer. The tower will be the first of its kind in Indiana, and one of only three in the country. Other features include a custom climbing wall and net, porch swings and bocce ball courts.

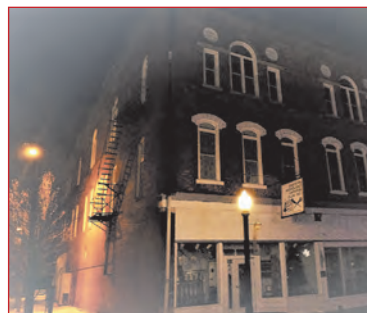

Southside community celebrates Chin National Day

The Chin Community of Indiana is hosting their 71st annual Chin National Day celebration this Saturday, Feb. 16. The event will feature traditional Chin traditions, including a fashion show, food, a variety of dances from different tribes, cultural music and honored political guests from Burma, in addition to local and state government representatives from Indiana.

Each year, the Chin communities throughout the world celebrate Chin National Day to recognize and commemorate the General Assembly of Chinland event, which was held in Falam on Feb. 20, 1948. At the assembly, 5,000 representatives voted to overturn their traditional system and elect local and state leaders as a democracy. The Chin Affairs Council decided to officially honor the day in 1951, yet the holiday was not recognized by Myanmar

governments until the 2010s.

The Chin community originates from Chinland, which is located on the northwestern portion of Myanmar (formerly Burma). The Chins have been widely discriminated and suppressed by the ruling Myanmar military government for decades. For the past 15 years, thousands of Chins have escaped from Chinland and Myanmar and entered host countries, including the U.S., as political refugees.

Approximately 60,000 Chin people live in the U.S.; nearly 19,000 are residing in the greater Indianapolis area. In Burma, celebrating the national day with a banner reading, "Chin National Day" is illegal. Chin National Day is celebrated in the U.S. on the weekend closest to Feb. 20.

Skirvin announces run for Beech Grove Mayor

Rick Skirvin has announced that he will run for mayor of Beech Grove.

Skirvin, a Republican, will be running against current Mayor Dennis Buckley, who is seeking a third term, in the primary election on May 7.

"I feel as a community we can do better; we have undeveloped properties, empty store fronts, a lack of parking on Main Street and an administration that lacks experience in business," Skirvin said. "I want to bring transparency and fairness to the citizens and re-establish Main Street as a destination."

Skirvin owns several small businesses, in-

cluding one in Beech Grove. He has served on the Beech Grove School Board and Beech Grove Parks Board for 12 years. In addition, he is a member of Moose International. He also volunteers annually with The Appalachian Service Project, a faith-based organization that assists families and attempts to eradicate substandard housing in central Appalachia.

"My family also volunteers at HRH (Homeless & ReEntry Helpers) downtown feeding the homes. In my spare time I also minister the sacrament of marriage to Beech Grove residents free of charge."

A lifetime resident of Beech Grove, Skirvin graduated from Beech Grove High School in 1987 and attended IUPUI for criminal justice. He has four kids who all attended Beech Grove City Schools: Alex Holsclaw, Aerial Skirvin, Nick Ward and Rickey Skirvin.

Greenwood Mayor Myers announces run for reelection

Greenwood Mayor Mark Myers has announced that he is seeking reelection for a third term.

Myers, a Republican, will be challenged by Dale Marmaduke, who has recently announced his run for mayor of Greenwood as a Republican as well.

"There are so many projects in the pipeline and going on that are exciting to me and I want to stick around and see them to fruition," Myers said. "I absolutely love my job."

One of the biggest projects underway is the renovation of Old Town Greenwood, which is being branded as a new livable, walkable Greenwood that will include condos, townhomes, retail shops and a variety of dining options. As well, Madison Avenue, which has finished with phase one of redevelopment in October of last year, has added a 12-foot wide trail for walkers and bicyclists, two crosswalks and new street lighting.

"We've had so many compliments on Madison Avenue," Myers said. "We're excited to go along with the next section of it."

Myers noted the current success of the

renovated Greenwood Community Center, which has already brought in well over 120,000 visitors in just last year alone. The center's attractions include an adult workout center, yoga classes and a two-story play center for children.

"It continues to bring more families and is a catalyst for families," he said. "It's a building built for both the young and old and everyone in between."

In addition to further developments on Main Street and Madison Avenue this coming year, the Greenwood Department of Public Works will be housing all of its equipment in a 50,000 square-foot building, to be located on southeast side of Craig Park. Construction is expected to begin in the spring.

As well, an interceptor sewer, which Myers referred to as "the largest city project ever" at \$24.7 million, is just starting its first phase on the west side of Greenwood and parts of Center Grove.

Myers was set to discuss these projects in further detail during the Greenwood State of the City address on Feb. 7.

A 50-year resident of Greenwood, Myers is married to Stacie and has six children: Mark, James, Johnathon, Grace, Matthew and Hope.

The primary election will be held on May 7. Election Day will be Nov. 5.

Marmaduke running for mayor of Greenwood

Dale Marmaduke has announced that he will be running against incumbent Mark Myers for mayor of Greenwood in the May 7 Republican primary election.

Marmaduke was born and raised in Greenwood and has spent the last 25 years living in his hometown. He said that he is running for mayor because of his love of the people and city and a desire for a new direction.

"We need change," he said. "I have not felt good about the city government's direction for many years. To many, the city is representing big warehouses and select businesses. I will work with traffic con-

gestions with proven solutions. We need tax breaks to bring in low pay jobs. To the citizens, we need to support public safety, schools, parks and traffic. I want to serve the citizens, listen to citizens and request input from the citizens. I'm successful and want to serve all citizens."

Marmaduke retired from Eli Lilly as a strategic knowledge technician. He served in the U.S. Army for two years in the 1970s and was awarded medals for National Defense and Army Commendation. He has a bachelor's degree and MBA in accounting from Indiana University and is a certified public accountant. He is also experienced in business, contract negotiations and human resources.

For the past 20 years, he has volunteered with children at Westwood Elementary, teaching hands-on science activities.

Marmaduke has two children and two grandchildren living on the Southside.

A 'new' Old City Park

Greenwood Mayor Mark Myers discusses economic success, project goals and a welcome surprise to the city

In his eighth annual State of the City address, hosted by the Greater Greenwood Chamber of Commerce, Greenwood Mayor Mark Myers highlighted the success of the previous year's completed projects and discussed his goals for continued growth in the areas of public safety, infrastructure, transportation and quality of life.

"After several years of conservative fiscal diligence, I'm proud to report that Greenwood now owns one of Indiana's strongest balance sheets," Myers said Feb. 7 at Valle Vista Golf Club and Conference Center. "Once again, in 2018, we presented the common council with a balanced budget; our seventh consecutive year. Our fiscal house is in order and we've been able to improve city services while also maintaining one of Indiana's lowest tax rate, currently the fourth lowest in the state."

"It's no coincidence that for the fifth year in a row, our finance department is receiving a certificate of achievement for excellence in financial reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association. Our city is one of only a handful of Hoosier municipalities to receive such a recognition."

Myers reviewed last year's completed projects that contributed toward the administration's goal for a walkable, connected, accessible and pedestrian-friendly city.

- The first phase of the redevelopment of Madison Avenue, which includes a multi-use, 12-foot-wide trail for pedestrians and bicyclists.
- Finalizing a second round of funding for the Granting Revitalization and Opportunity for Workplace Initiative.
- A Surina Way extension, which sets the stage for development of the 19-acre property for the former Greenwood Middle School and the reimagined Old City Park.
- A roundabout at Smith Valley Road and Madison Avenue.
- Phase one of improvements on Emerson Avenue, which included raised center medians, a new multiuse trail and more than 60 trees.

Myers continued the address by discussing what he called the four pillars – public safety, infrastructure, quality of

life and economic development – that "serve as a foundation for any city government."

"If invested property these pillars work together to build a thriving community," he said.

Public safety: This year, the Greenwood Police Department is preparing to launch crime mapping software, which will help with analyzing criminal activity patterns and geographic footprints. In addition, Greenwood Fire Station 93 will be relocated in Freedom Park, which will shorten response times and improve operations.

Infrastructure: Myers emphasized the need for continued progress with roadwork and completing efforts in increasing safety and modernization at school zone crossings later this year, which he stated to be "one of Greenwood's most important projects."

Construction on a 50,000 square-foot facility for the Department of Public Works will begin this spring; completion is targeted toward the end of the year. In addition, Greenwood's Sanitation Department will begin installation of a Western Regional Interceptor, which would alleviate the current sewer system. "This will provide much-needed relief for the Pleasant Run Interceptor, channeling as much as nine million gallons of waste water daily," Myers said.

Quality of life: A new event lawn in Craig Park should be completed by this summer, with new trails and a multi-use trail connecting to the Northwest Park Annex. Later this year, the parks department will open its first rental hall, converting the former Hampton House on Fry Road.

Economic development: Myers concluded the address by announcing a design for the reimagine of Old City Park, which includes a 20-foot cube tower, a custom climbing wall and custom climbing net for younger children, pipe slides, spinners, ping pong tables and an open space for non-structured play, porch swings for adults, bocce ball courts, a fitness circuit and a new pedestrian bridge.

"Old City Park will once again become a central cornerstone for old town, with connectivity to the Greenwood Amphitheater, Craig Park, the former middle school property, the Greenwood Public Library, the Madison Avenue Trail and even more," Myers said.

How to preserve your family history

At Perry Township/Southport History Society's meeting on Jan. 22, Tamara Hemmerlein, director of Local History Services at the Indiana Historical Society, made a presentation of preserving family history. Last year, she, and her team of four, logged in some 20,000 miles within the state of Indiana assisting local historical societies in their endeavors to present a slice of the pie of Indiana history. Your own personal collection and reflections are just as important.

"Everything comes with a story ... if you ask," Tamara stated. "With your own collection — get the story! That's what has lasting implications, as important as the object itself."

Whether it be documents, photographs, books, newspapers, clothing, or even furniture, Tamara offered advice of preserving these

for future generations to enjoy. The History Lab at the Indiana Historical Society can also be of help. Some of her advice is as follows:

- **Wash your hands!** Don't use lotion before working with photos or documents. Gloves — cotton or nitrile/latex — are the best bets. Use acid free boards to prevent any bleed-over. Store in a cool, dark place. Color photos will always discolor and fade in time. There's no getting around that. Black & white photos last the longest. It's the way it is.
- **Books—store in acid-free boxes if possible.** This will keep the edges, bindings and pages clean for years. Never use cardboard boxes! The acid in cardboard is not a good thing! No rubber bands or string. After a roll of years you will only be disappointed.
- **Newspapers—again, cool, dark place.** They are extremely sensitive to light. Over time, they will darken and become brittle. This light damage is cumulative and at the end of the day, irreversible. Light will yellow the paper. After all, it's not the high

quality of paper that we are used to from the past (an example of why many of our Southside publications from the 40s, 50s, 60s and 70s are still around, and legible). Paper quality has taken a turn downward! Unfortunately ... a sign of the times.

- **Photos ... we all have them — don't store sandwiched together!** Laying against one another, they can become abraded and over time become scratched and worn. The best way to preserve for the generations coming after you is in separate folders, envelopes or Mylar plastic sleeves.
- **Furniture and clothing? Always a challenge!** The History Lab at the Indiana Historical Society will assist you with information on that process. They are the experts. And ... they are more than glad to help!

History is the people that came before us, and the roots of where we are and where we are headed. It is a display that rightfully should be preserved for future generations to come.

They met when they were 16 and 18 at a mutual friend's party. Each of them was on a date with someone else.

"I, like most people at the age, was in the 'raging hormone stage,'" Karen said. "I was attracted to his thick, dark, wavy hair, bright blue eyes and 6-foot-2-inch frame. Then, it was the fact that he made me laugh. Some of his material was plagiarized, but I still laughed."

Anna and Tanner Bair still remember their first date as though it were yesterday. It was on April 29, 2008. They went to the movie theater to see *Get Smart* and picked seats in the very back row – while their parents sat in the front row.

Anna and Tanner had their first date in seventh grade.

“We were middle school sweethearts,” Anna explained. “Our parents would take us to movies, and we’d hang out at each other’s house.”

The Bairs knew of each other in fifth grade and became friends in sixth grade when Anna and her family moved into a farmhouse across the road from Tanner’s neighborhood.

“Every day when we rode the school bus, I’d tell him to give me his gum,” Anna recalled.

Peanut butter

'wholesome' comfort food that makes us sick

Do you spoon Skippy's out of the jar? Introduced to the world at the Universal Exposition in St. Louis in 1904, the peanut butter (PB) we spread on PBJ's, apples and ants on a log, holds lofty position in the pantheon of American classics.

Sacred to America's food culture, PB is a comfort food associated with happy childhood memories. Many of us grew up with a comic book in one hand and peanut butter with grape jelly on white bread in the other. Today, we live in an era of mounting truths revealing many "wholesome" foods we've grown to love aren't so wholesome. Making us sick, actually.

It's no coincidence Americans consume the most PB and have the world's highest rates of heart disease and stroke. PB contains healthy omega-6 oils, but is deficient in omega-3 the American Heart Association says benefits the heart of healthy

people, and those at high risk of — or who have — cardiovascular disease. Most people eat too many omega-6s, which peanut butter is loaded with, and too few omega-3s, which peanut butter completely lacks. That's the problem.

It's hard to overstate the negative effects of too much omega-6 fat. Excessive omega-6 in the American diet also promotes inflammation, IBS, Crohn's, colitis, thyroiditis, fibromyalgia, chronic fatigue syndrome, arthritis, cardiovascular disease, cancer, inflammatory and autoimmune diseases.

You see, omega-6 is only beneficial for our temple if the ratio of omega-6 and omega-3 is 3:1. In America, it's more like 20 to 1, and that's problematic. It's OK to eat clean PB for goodness sakes, but bridge this gap with an omega-3 supplement. Potato and corn chips, candy bars, bakery goods, salad dressings and fast foods are loaded with refined omega 6 oils: grape seed, sunflower, corn, soybean, cottonseed oils, shortening and margarine.

Freshly extruded PB from whole food grocery grinders can be healthy, but jar

brands add salt, sugar, cottonseed, canola and hydrogenated oils/trans fats that raise LDL and lower HDL. Eating trans fats increases the risk of heart disease or stroke. Scientists and health professionals consider trans fats so dangerous they should be banned from the food supply. Peanuts contain lectins, sticky proteins that strip mucous from the small intestine and contribute to autoimmune diseases.

I don't recommend pigging out on PB, especially jarred. It's OK to eat occasionally in small amounts, but boost your omega 3 foods like flax, chia and hemp seeds, walnuts, cold water fish or up your supplement intake significantly. It's about mindful balance.

How do you plead?

I'm sure pleats will eventually come back into style. I still remember the pleated khakis I wore to church in the mid-1990s. My Dockers brand double-pleated pants complemented my penny loafers to perfection in order to create that "nice-Baptist-guy-all-the-girls-just-want-to-be-friends-with" look I was going for. When pleats became passe, I traded my Dockers for blue jeans, much to my parents' chagrin.

Today I'm not talking about pleats. I'm talking about the words pleaded and pled. With high profile political court cases in the news (and perhaps more to come in the near future), I thought it would be a great time to brush up on the different ways people claim their innocence while under oath.

Back in December, former personal law-

yer to President Trump, Michael Cohen said, "I take full responsibility for each act that I pled guilty to — the personal ones to me and those involving the president of the United States of America." Yet at the end of January, a New York Times article led with this line: "President Trump's longtime adviser Roger J. Stone Jr. pleaded not guilty on Tuesday..."

Is it possible both usages are correct? If the past tense of "lead" is "led," and if "bleed" becomes "bled," shouldn't the past tense of "plead" be "pled?" Not so fast! What about "bleat" and "bleated" or "knead" and "kneaded?" There's no pattern to this word construction, so let's seek an expert opinion. According to both the AP Stylebook and the Chicago Manual of Style, "pleaded" is always the acceptable past tense form of "plead." They assert that "pled" is considered a colloquialism, which is a really nice way of saying "bless your heart, you don't know any better."

When it comes down to it, "pled" isn't incorrect, but it's certainly losing in the popularity polls. According to Google Books' Ngram Viewer, pled has gained considerable popularity in recent years when it comes to appearances in books, but pleaded still outpaces pled by a steep margin. So, while AP and Chicago Manual of Style would like you to believe that "pled" = "dead," people like Michael Cohen use "pled" perhaps more often than we think. And, if the federal investigators keep handing out subpoenas, we'll all be paying attention to how each individual pleads (and also if his/her pants have pleats).

Cold War Love separated by country, politics and class

MOVIE REVIEW

Cold War was Poland's official selection for entry into the 91st Academy Award's Best Foreign Film award, for which it was subsequently nominated, in addition to picking up nominations for Best Director for Pawel Pawlikowski and Best Cinematography for Łukasz Żal. Set in post-war Europe in the 1950s, a Polish theater director falls for a singer in his theater troupe. Their tumultuous, yet passionate, relationship is put to the test when he tries to convince her to flee communist Poland for an artistically liberated life in Paris.

Cold War is one of the most technically impressive films of the year, without a doubt. Gorgeous frame composition and intricately lit shots litter the film, making every frame one to remember. These stylistic choices are not just for looks, but rather are refreshingly intentional in the storytelling as well. The shots of communist Poland are static and rigid, carefully blocked and framed to emphasize the structure they are forced into. In contrast, Paris is shot with free moving and kinetic camera work that feels liberated from the oppressive order enforced in Poland.

In addition to the cinematography separating the two cultural and economic systems, so too does the music. The goal of the theater company in Poland is to bring to a wider audience the beauty of traditional Polish music and dances. In contrast, the music in Paris is a selection of cutting-edge jazz compositions and improvisation. All of this contrast created by the stylistic elements of the film are in service to illustrate the divide be-

tween the relationship of the two main characters.

Wiktor is a classy theater director born into a place of distinction in wealthy Warsaw, while his love interest Zula is a Polish peasant plucked from obscurity to perform in his theater troupe. Being from such different backgrounds, their political ideologies and artistic integrity become the main form of tension in their relationship. Wiktor sees the opportunity to escape to a capitalist state as artistic liberation from a system designed not to recognize great music, but use it as a tool to propagate a message of support for communist invaders. Zula sees the Paris artistic scene as a form of profiteering art to appeal to the wealthy bourgeoisie, who don't appreciate art for its intrinsic value.

Pawlikowski never takes a side in this debate, putting both members of this relationship on equal footing and allowing the audience to make up their own minds. However, in what remains the most important aspect of the film, their relationship, he clearly has a message he is attempting to convey. Love does not care about ideology, national borders, language, or ethnicity, and that love is intrinsically beautiful.

Cold War is a technical marvel that demands to be contemplated and discussed as one of the year's best films.

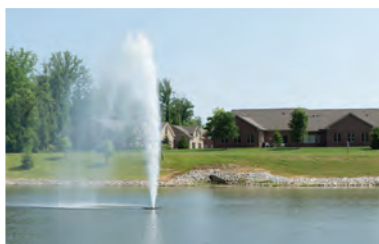

24 Faithful is he that calleth you, who also will do it.

25 Brethren, pray for us.

26 Greet all the brethren with an holy kiss.

27 I charge you by the Lord that this epistle be read unto all the holy brethren.

I THESSALONIANS 5:24-27

Four things jump out at us as we read these closing words of I Thessalonians. The first is, be faithful to He who called and continues to call you. The second is, pray for "us", meaning for the team who came to this community and who first taught the gospel of Jesus Christ to them. The third is, greet all of the brethren with a holy kiss. And finally, read to all of the congregation of the holy brethren

the epistle these things are written in.

Faithfulness unto the Lord is still a pre-requisite to a holy life: Staying on course at a time when it would be so easy to veer off course just a little bit in order to go along to get along with others who have done this. It is difficult to oppose the "modernism" that is creeping into the church. There are those who want to dispose of all of the standards of the past in order to establish new standards in the present. These new standards so diminish what those in the past gave their lives to establish beginning with Christ and then His apostles and then those who loved the truth so much they would rather die than compromise one iota of it. I would rather offend the whole world than to offend Christ

even in the least way. How far we have come.

I do covet the prayers of the faithful. They know how to pray for me and to pray for the advancement of the church around the world. While we sit here and concern ourselves with attendance numbers and finances, so many are lingering in dark and dank prisons and are suffering in so many other ways because of their faith in Christ and refusal to deny Him in the even the least of ways. I know we all feel that our congregations must "grow" but my question is, how? If all we are looking for is numerical and financial success, we have failed Christ. We must seek growth in the same manner Christ sought it, by actually growing the kingdom of God by new birth.

In our culture, men greeting other men with a "holy kiss" is not the same as it was in Paul's time. There are places around the world where this can and does happen, yet today but it could be easily misunderstood in our culture. That was then and this is now but we should greet one another with a hearty handshake and a sincere hug if the occasion calls for it. The intent here is that we be friendly to the redeemed. That we should be. We should not only be friendly, but we should be helpful to one another.
