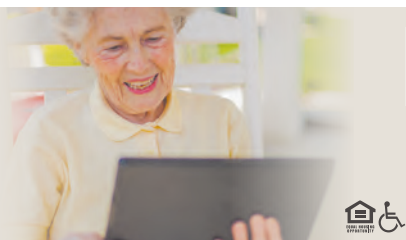

## Greenwood woman dies after alleged shooter arrested and taken into custody

A 55-year-old Greenwood woman allegedly shot by Randy A. Sutt Monday morning passed away that night after succumbing to her injuries.

Cecelia Cooper Laverne Babcock was taken by ambulance to Methodist Hospital, where she was placed on life support and listed in critical condition with a gunshot wound to the head. An autopsy is pending with the Marion County Coroner's Office.

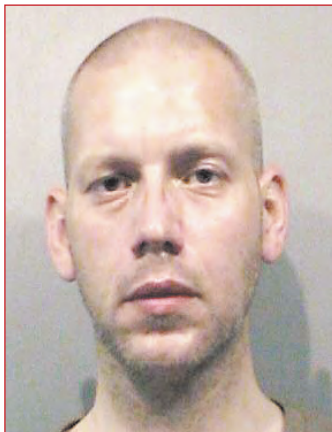
Greenwood PD Detectives are currently working closely with the Johnson County Prosecutor to charge the suspect, Randy A. Sutt, with murder in this case.

Greenwood police officers were called yesterday morning to the 400 block of Legacy Boulevard, the Homecoming subdivision, after a report that a person was shot.

Shortly after officers arrived, the suspect, later identified as 43-year-old Greenwood resident Randy A. Sutt, exited the residence and began firing at the officers. After a short gunfire exchange between the suspect and officers, the suspect retreated into his residence. Moments later, officers noticed the suspect pointing a firearm at them through a side window. Officers fired back at the suspect. No one was hit in either exchange.

After a brief standoff, a Greenwood PD negotiator contacted the suspect by phone and was able to convince the suspect to disarm and surrender. After entering the residence, officers located the victim, who was unconscious with a bullet wound to the head.

Sutt was arrested and booked on Attempted Murder (Level 1 Felony) and Criminal Recklessness (Level 6 Felony) at the Johnson County Jail.

## Southport High School graduate remembered for friendliness and a 'shining example' as an IMPD officer

Breann Leath's friends from Southport remember a beautiful girl, inside and out, with a big, bright smile and presence that could light up a room. She was helpful, kind and a prayer warrior for others.

Sadly, this young woman lost her life as she tried to help another woman escape an abusive situation.

The Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department officer was fatally shot while responding to a domestic disturbance call at an east side apartment complex near 21st Street and North Franklin Road shortly before 3 p.m. on April 9.

Leath, 24, a lifelong resident of Indianapolis, was taken to a hospital, where she died from her injuries.

Elliahs Dorsey, 27, faces preliminary charges of murder and attempted murder in connection with the shooting death.

Leath was a Southport High School graduate and a mother to a young son. She was also a graduate of IMPD's 16th recruit class and a member of the Indiana Army National Guard.

Southport High School alumna, Cheyenne Caldwell graduated with Leath in 2014, and said she had classes with her since the seventh grade. "Bre was friendly to everyone she met," Caldwell said. "She had the brightest smile, always laughing and having a good time. She truly lit up the room."

A former classmate named Nicole recalls Leath as a lifesaver and as a friend, when they were classmates in middle school and high school. "In sixth grade due to bullying and other outside problems, I tried to commit suicide. When Bre found out something was wrong, she talked me into talking to my parents. I got help and was hospitalized. She made sure to invite me to sleepovers, texted me when I missed school, invited me to events, and even just sat with me at lunch. She made sure that I never felt alone or an outcast. Because of her I survived sixth grade."

Jan Cooney of Southport was Leath's former Sunday school teacher at Glens Valley Church when she was a little girl. "I don't remember one time when this young lady wasn't smiling," Cooney said. "She would

light up the whole room. We had prayer time each Sunday, and I know God hears all prayer, but as we would go around the circle, her prayers were full of heart and soul."

A Facebook post from the IMPD East District stated: "Always the shining example of what an IMPD Officer should be ... Doing the right things for the right reason. Officer Leath ... we will miss you. (Especially your smile.) Rest Easy, sister. We've got the watch from here."

A funeral service will be held today at 11 a.m. at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Due to COVID-19 guidelines from the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention, the public will not be allowed for visitation or attending services in person.

At the request of her family, the Central Indiana Police Foundation has established a fund in Leath's honor to assist with burial arrangements and provide a trust for her child. To donate, go to [cipf.foundation/officer-leath-fund](http://cipf.foundation/officer-leath-fund).

Laura and I work at "essential" termed jobs. Everybody knows, or at the very least, has heard of someone familiar that has contracted COVID-19. So far two people from my work have tested positive. They closed down a few days for deep cleaning and disinfecting and we are currently back – until it happens again. It has, however, been a strange work environment for the both of us, where the normal has transitioned into the peculiar.

It is a strange and peculiar feel at home also. Always busy Southport Road is no longer busy. Ghostly activity courtesy of our house spook has subsided. The daily drive into Wanamaker is like a Sunday jaunt, traffic wise. Since I'm in the age demographic, I now

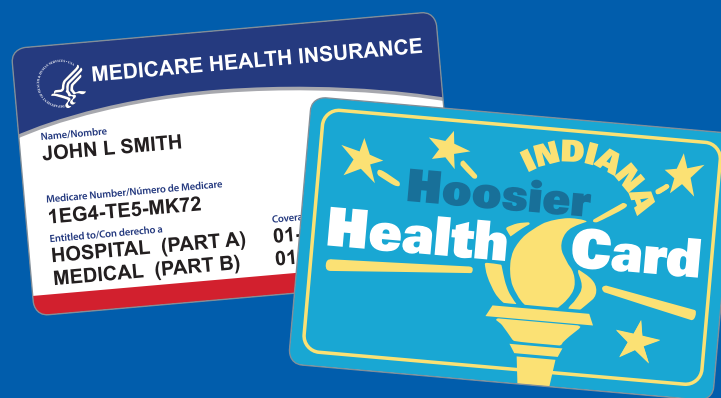
wear a mask and nitrile gloves when I visit Kroger and Menards. I watch and listen far too much to news concerning the virus. My thoughts often turn to, "When will disinfecting wipes be in stock again?" I have moments of depression when it hits me, I can't have a sit down at my favorite Mexican restaurant. My church's online services, along with texts and Messenger, have kept me in touch, yet there is no substitute for "real" contact. I pray a lot more. I have been blessed with a strong immune system and have not suffered so much as a sniffle, yet my wife struggles with headaches and fatigue as of late. We have an elderly mother-in-law and a teenage boy living under our roof and we have to be careful. We know this. Everything can change in the matter of a few hours.

As of this writing – Sunday, April 12 – Indiana has 7,435 positive cases of the virus, with 330 dead. Today's totals include 530 new cases since Friday and 30 deaths just since Saturday. Marion County takes the lead in the state; Lake County (where we were to travel) is rising with 676 cases and 25 reported deaths. The coronavirus may be starting to peak, but it's far from over. We can only pray that it doesn't return in the fall. And pray that we can return to a normal pace of life sooner rather than later. Yes ... prayer is what is needed in these strange days.

Easter Sunday at Elevation Church online ... Jesus has risen ... God is in control ... Triumph is reality! That's where my thoughts lie today!

## Allstate, American Family Insurance to return money back to customers

On April 6, auto insurance companies Allstate Corp. and American Family Insurance announced they were returning a portion of money to customers nationwide as COVID-19 has forced millions of Americans to work from home and cut back on driving.

Allstate is expected to give back a total of \$600 million; personal auto customers will receive 15 percent of their monthly premium. "The goal is to have the payback credit issued to the customer prior to April 30," said Scott Verbarg, agency owner of two Southside locations in Marion County. "If a customer pays monthly, the credit will be applied against the remaining balance due for the current policy term. If the customer paid in full at the beginning of the policy term, they will receive the credit in the same manner in which they paid – i.e. if they paid by

credit card, the refund is credited back to the card."

In addition, Allstate has offered all customers free identity protection for one year. "Also, a customer can elect to suspend the insurance payment, for any policy, for the months of April and May – without late fees, penalties or a lapse in coverage," Verbarg said.

American Family Insurance plans to return a total of about \$200 million to customers through a one-time payment of \$50 per covered vehicle. "There are about two million customer customers to be issued, and the company's aim is to get them all processed and mailed within 50 days," said Michael Coop, president of American Family in Greenwood.

As well, "American Family has extended coverage for food delivery to our personal auto customers during the pandemic," Coop added. "And for customers experiencing financial hardship because of the pandemic, arrangements have been made to extend the period of time to pay premiums."

## Local 'nonessential' businesses find creative ways to earn money, donate needed supplies to first responders

Greenwood hairstylist Don Allen is keeping busy – despite not having any clients in his store. “I’m taking calls from people who’ve tried to do their own hair,” he lamented. “It’s breaking my heart.”

Allen may be running a business considered nonessential, yet he’s proactive with other ways to earn money during this time. Allen is selling hand sanitizer and CBD oil. The hand sanitizer, at \$12.95 for an 8-ounce bottle, consists of 75 percent isopropanol alcohol, the recommended amount from the Centers for Disease Control. “We have two fragrances: lavender and citrus,” he said. “It also has papaya oil, shea butter and aloe vera oil. They feel amazing, they don’t crack or dry out (hands).”

In addition, the salon is selling its own brand of CBD oil, grown in Indiana. There are 5,000, 6,000 and 7,000 mg bottles and

are priced from \$75 to \$125. “Our brand is the full spectrum CBD oil. It’s very powerful,” Allen said. “It helps people boost their immune systems.”

Whispering WillowTree, also located in Greenwood, is an artist/vendor-filled shop with new and reused furniture, home décor and handmade gifts. “One of our vendors has been making masks,” said Stephanie Dixon, owner of Whispering WillowTree. “She’s been helping local stations and my customers around here. We’re up to 300 masks that we’re doing for healthcare workers and local people.”

Another vendor is making headbands with buttons to help prevent healthcare workers from getting open wounds from behind their ears from constant mask usage. Prices for masks and headbands range from \$3-5.

The store also sells cookie kits and succulent kits.

While buying or selling a house may not be a top priority with social distancing in place, those at Steve Lew Real Estate, LLC

have filled their time by teaming up with PepsiCo to deliver 40,000 bottles of Gatorade to all major hospitals in Indianapolis and surrounding counties, the Indianapolis Fire Department, Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department, Bargersville Fire Department, Johnson County Sheriff’s Department and several others.

“We are calling (the project) #Hydrate-OurHeroes!” Steve Lew said. “I have another 15,000 bottles in a warehouse that we will continue to deliver to some of the smaller healthcare facilities, nursing homes, police and fire departments and so on. Prior to his career in real estate, Lew was a critical care RN for Community Health Network. “I have a strong bond with my fellow healthcare workers and first responders,” he said. “I have also been moving medical supplies around the city and collecting personal protective equipment from companies and individuals. While I no longer work at the bedside, I still have a giving heart and want to do what I can.”

## Get tick-ed off: how to spot Lyme disease in your pet

Each summer, it seems like ticks are becoming more common on our pets. They are a pest that most people don't even want to see in a photo. They are a carrier of several diseases including Lyme disease. Lyme disease is best known for being from the east coast. But it is becoming more common in the Midwest and Indiana.

Signs of this disease can appear several months after the tick bite. Symptoms can include a moderate to high fever, enlarged lymph nodes, lameness, swollen joints

and lack of appetite.

Diagnosis can be made with a blood test performed by your vet. However, it can often be a bit tricky and require considering the history of exposure and symptoms along with the blood test results.

While Lyme disease can be treated with antibiotics, the best plan is to vaccinate and use a tick control product if your pet is at risk.

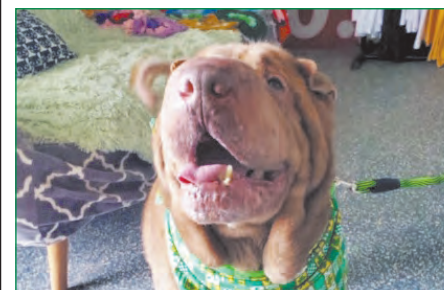

## How will COVID-19 impact the real estate market?

By now real estate signs would normally be popping up in yards and people would be looking to move into a new home around the time school lets out. Unfortunately, COVID-19 has forced everyone into a different and new reality that is going to have an impact on nearly every industry and aspect of our lives.

Inventory around central Indiana was already low before COVID-19, but now families that were ready to list their homes have changed their minds because they don't want to risk showings and allowing anyone possibly infected with the virus to enter their home. At the same time, open houses are cancelled until further notice, which means houses already on the market will have fewer showings and possibly less interest.

Title companies are seeing fewer closings because in some cases they're unable

to obtain all the documentation necessary online or virtually, and some buyers' jobs may be in jeopardy as furloughs and temporary closings take effect.

Inventory is a problem the industry has been coping with for more than a year, but now some buyers are asking to only see unoccupied homes because it limits their exposure to people and potentially harmful germs. With restaurants, bars, public events and schools closed, it's understandable why everyone is being cautious about entering another person's house. But, because of the limited inventory and even fewer houses that are unoccupied, buyers are more willing to stay in their current home until the COVID-19 crisis is over or fresh inventory enters the market. At this time the only people we're seeing interested in real estate are those who need to move in a few weeks or months.

If anyone is interested in listing their home in the coming weeks or months, we still believe prices will remain stable because of the limited inventory, but it could take a little longer for


a home to sell simply because of the uncertainty of going outside, entering other people's homes and being in the same room as strangers. Our team, and many others, are willing to provide virtual showings and video consultations to help families prepare their home for market when the time is right.

In central Indiana, our office doesn't believe COVID-19 will have a tremendous effect on the real estate market, but it will impact inventory, which is already low, and the limited inventory is what will allow homeowners to maintain their property's market value. For now, keep soap, water and hand sanitizer readily available for anyone entering your home and maintain healthy habits.

## CARES Act offers help for investors, small businesses

As we go through the coronavirus crisis, we are all, first and foremost, concerned about the health of our loved ones and communities. But the economic implications of the virus have also weighed heavily on our minds. However, if you're an investor or a business owner, you just got some help from Washington – and it could make a big difference, at least in the short term, for your financial future.

Specifically, the passage of the \$2 trillion Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act offers, among other provisions, the following:

- **EXPANDED UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS** – The CARES Act provides \$250 billion for extended unemployment insurance, expands eligibility and provides workers with an additional \$600 per week for four months, in addition to what state programs pay. The package will also cover the self-employed, independent contractors and "gig economy" workers. Obviously, if your employment has been affected, these benefits can be a lifeline. Furthermore, the benefits could help you avoid liquidating some long-term investments you've earmarked for retirement just to meet your daily cash flow needs.

- **DIRECT PAYMENTS** – Individuals will receive a one-time payment of up to \$1,200; this amount is reduced for incomes over \$75,000

and eliminated altogether at \$99,000. Joint filers will receive up to \$2,400, which will be reduced for incomes over \$150,000 and eliminated at \$198,000 for joint filers with no children. Plus, taxpayers with children will receive an extra \$500 for each dependent child under the age of 17. If you don't need this money for an immediate need, you might consider putting it into a low-risk, liquid account as part of an emergency fund.

- **NO PENALTY ON EARLY WITHDRAWALS** – Typically, you'd have to pay a 10 percent penalty on early withdrawals from IRAs, 401(k)s and similar retirement accounts. Under the CARES Act, this penalty will be waived for individuals who qualify for COVID-19 relief and/or in plans that allow COVID-19 distributions. Withdrawals will still be taxable, but the taxes can be spread out over three years. Still, you might want to avoid taking early withdrawals, as you'll want to keep your retirement accounts intact as long as possible.

- **SUSPENSION OF REQUIRED WITHDRAWALS** – Once you turn 72, you'll be required to take withdrawals from your traditional IRA and 401(k). The CARES Act waives these required minimum distributions for 2020. If you're in this age group, but you don't need the money, you can let your retirement accounts continue growing on a tax-deferred basis.

- **INCREASE OF RETIREMENT PLAN LOAN LIMIT** – Retirement plan investors who qualify for COVID-19 relief can now borrow up to \$100,000 from their accounts, up from \$50,000, provided their plan allows loans. We recommend that you explore other options, such

as the direct payments, to bridge the gap on current expenses and if you choose to take a plan loan work with your financial adviser to develop strategies to pay back these funds over time to reduce any long-term impact to your retirement goals.

- **SMALL-BUSINESS LOANS** – The CARES Act provides \$349 billion to help small businesses – those with fewer than 500 employees – retain workers and avoid closing up shop. A significant part of this small business relief is the Paycheck Protection Program. This initiative provides federally guaranteed loans to small businesses who maintain payroll during this emergency. Significantly, these loans may be forgiven if borrowers use the loans for payroll and other essential business expenses (such as mortgage interest, rent and utilities) and maintain their payroll during the crisis.

We'll be in a challenging economic environment for some time, but the CARES Act should give us a positive jolt – and brighten our outlook.

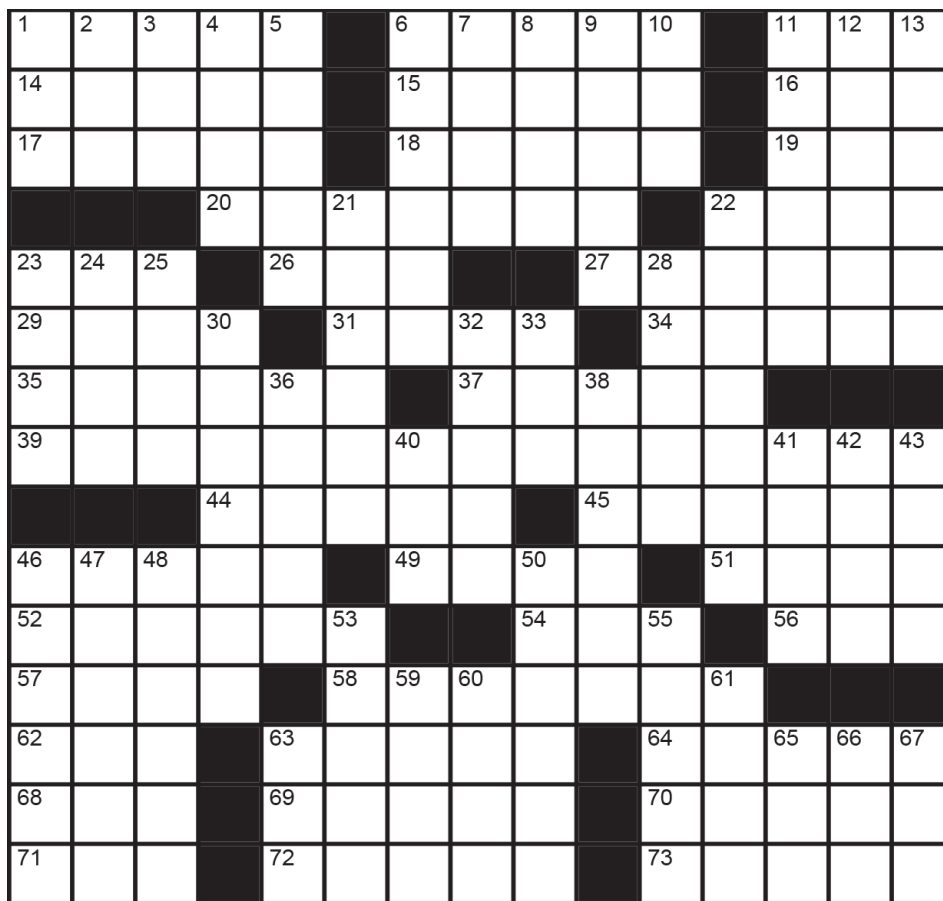

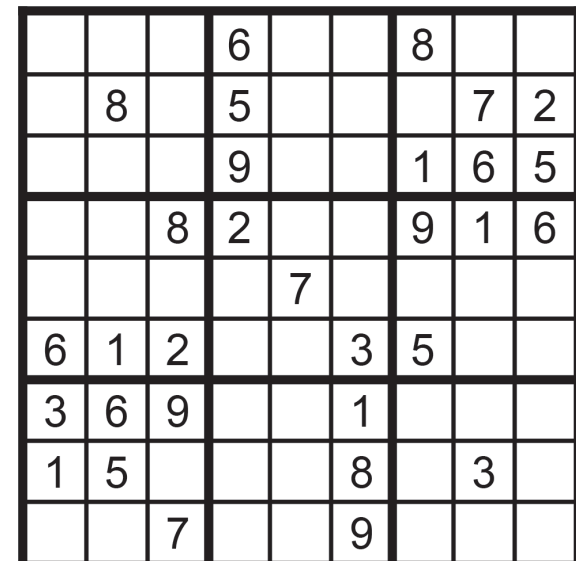

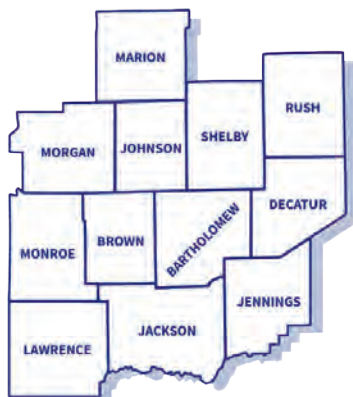
