### Greenwood business plans \$4.2 million expansion

Poynter Sheet Metal, the state's largest full-service sheet metal and custom metal crafter, has announced plans for a new business unit and significant expansion. The \$4.2 million

## Buying a small Indiana town with ghostly benefits

Want to buy an abandoned 19th century village to call your own? Traveling 20 miles through the wilderness stretch of State Road 135, after leaving Nashville, Indiana, will bring you to Elkinsville Road and your destination – Story, Indiana. The unincorporated community still sits secluded and firmly entrenched in the past; and with ghostly remnants seemingly making a transition from days gone by to the present. For \$3.8 million it can be yours!

Dr. George P. Story received a land grant from President Millard Fillmore in 1851. Relocating from Ohio, Dr. Story set to work establishing the remote community with his medical practice, family farms, a school and a grist mill over a 20-year period. Formal creation of the village of Story occurred some 10 years later in 1882 when another doctor, Arnold S. Griffitt, took over the medical practice and continued the farming operations. He was instrumental in the birth of a general store housing the first post office. Soon the village's first church congregation found a home.

Alra Wheeler and his wife, Mary, entered Story's history in 1900, purchasing the store and grist mill. The store burned in 1915. It was rebuilt, only now with a second story and "Wheeler General Store" painted across the upper facade. Wheeler died six years later. The general store, sawmill, the Wheeler home and additional land was purchased by Albert and Susan Hedrick in 1924. The store was renamed "Hedrick & Son Grocery." Life was good for the Hedricks through the remainder of the 1920s and into the early 1930s. Businesses took root and the population grew (though it never topped 175 residents). Then ... the bottom dropped out!

Buying land for the creation of Brown County State Park in the 1920s enticed many farmers to sell off their hilly, rocky terrain (today,

the Hoosier National Forest region) and move on to greener pastures. Then came the Great Depression (1929-1933) when many families left their farms for work elsewhere. The aftermath lingered on. Brown County lost half of its population between 1930 and 1940. Farming had screeched to a halt. In Story, the loss of not only customers, but also Story residents themselves, began the decline of any realized future prosperity. And that was not all. ...

In 1960 the area west of Story was flooded with the creation of Lake Monroe, effectively cutting the route through the abandoned town of Elkinsville to Bloomington. Isolation continued Story's decline.

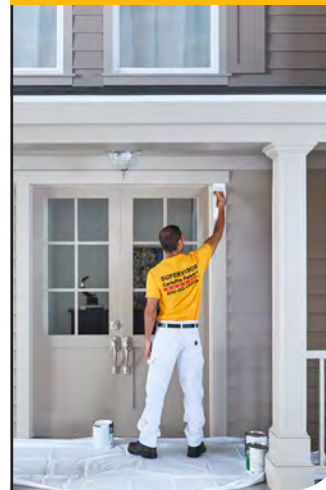
Fast forward into the 1970s. In 1978, Bloomington couple, Benjamin and Cynthia Schultz, purchased just under five acres that included the grocery store, grist mill, barn and a small rented house. They jointly shared a vision of creating a bed & breakfast in the store using their experiences in the restaurant business and as an architect and builder. The Story Inn was born! In the decade that followed, they converted the second story of the store into rooms, the surrounding cottages into guest homes and essentially re-established the nearly 24 acres that defines the town of Story. It all came to an end when they sold in 1992. Once again, Story slept.

In 1999, it all changed again to where we are today. Rick Hofstetter had heard the stories of purported ghostly activity involving "The Blue Lady." He took it with a grain of salt and bought the town anyway. ...

## SOUTH INDY YOUTH HOCKEY ASSOCIATION FLOURISHES

The South Indy Youth Hockey Association has a vision to create a youth organization that is recognized as the blueprint by which other youth organizations are built through a focus on family, experience and service.

The association's mission is to instill six principles into their players: integrity, honesty, teamwork, fairness, respect and commitment.

"We'd been around for a decade or so, and about two years ago we decided to join forces with Indy Junior Fuel," league president Jeff Fanter said. "At the time, there was talk of a possible rink in Greenwood that would be owned by the same folks that owned the pro team. We'd grown to over 200 kids playing hockey, and it made sense at that time to merge with the Fuel."

Fanter said that the organization was attracted to the proposed structure and support system that would have been in place as a part of the Junior Fuel, but the plans for the new Southside rink never came to fruition.

"We worked with them for two years, but it did put a demand on families," Fanter, 47, of Greenwood, said. "We were having to travel up to Indy or Fishers to practice during the week. It started to raise questions from families asking how we could bring it all back to Perry Park."

### BACK TO BEING SIYHA

Now SIYHA is back to being SIYHA, and they are housed out of Perry Park.

"This really cuts down on travel time for our families," Fanter said. "Plenty of research shows that hockey grows the more local you can keep it. That's how things have evolved over time."

At one time, Fanter was the commissioner of ECAC, the collegiate ice hockey conference, one of four NCAA Division 1 hockey conferences at that time.

"But I can't even skate," he said. "My son is far more skilled on the ice than I am."

Fanter said that, now, the plan is to remain focused on the development of the children who want to learn how to play the game.

"It's not about winning and losing," he said. "Everybody wants to be competitive, and certainly gets excited when they win a game. But our focus is how we're going to develop kids on the ice and how they're going to interact and engage with teammates."

Fanter said good behavior within the team is also indicative of good behavior in general.

"This isn't a development program to send kids off to play at a college level," he continued. "What we offer is an entry level to travel hockey to expose kids to the game. Certainly, we see kids go on to bigger and better things from there. We have one sheet of ice to work with and as long as people are realistic about what we can offer at Perry, I think it's a great environment for kids to

learn to develop and play. We've got some great coaches helping kids do that."

"Noah has been with SIYHA since 2014, and Liam's first year was 2016," Patrick Haggan said of his kids.

Noah is 9, and Liam is 7.

"They love it," Haggan said. "Social interaction is a big one when you're practicing and playing in a sport like that. You become very close. They tend to follow certain rules pretty closely because they know the importance of doing so and doing what you're told. They're very healthy. It gives them a lot of exercise."

Haggan said he enjoys the uniqueness of the game.

"Knowing they're physically active, they're interacting with other kids and doing something they enjoy makes me happy as a parent," he said.

Shannon Sizemore's son, Oscar, has been with the team since he was 8. He is now 12.

### PERSISTENCE AND HARD WORK

"I think with his coach he's learned to work hard and stay persistent," she said. "He's learned that nothing is given, and everything is earned."

Sizemore also said that it makes her feel good to see her son so active at a sport that he enjoys so much.

"We always say it's not necessarily the sport that's going to take you far but the

things you learn while being on a team, the friendships made and the family time spent together," she said. "It's almost forced family time when you're traveling away for the weekend. We have a 15-year-old daughter. She's met older sisters on the team that she's friends with. We wouldn't have these experiences otherwise."

Eli Clark's experience with the team has been long and exciting, as he's now 13 and has been with the team since he was 4.

"He loves it," his mom, Krisi, said. "He's officially addicted. Every year, I think he gets more excited. This will be his third year on the travel team, and I can't stop him from hitting the puck around the house every single day. His big sister, Zoe, is one of the loudest people on the rink."

Clark says Eli's time on the team has instilled in him a really good work ethic.

"He strives to always finish everything, work his hardest, get faster, quicker," she said. "He's really come a long way. I can't imagine not playing hockey. He loves it. He'll go as far as he can. We like it because the rink is very close and it's a really family atmosphere. Everyone is included."

"This will be our fourth year," Tyler Klasken said of his son, Benjamin, who is 9.

"He loves it," he continued. "We're glad we can play out of Perry again. It's much more of a community there. The friends that he's made are incredible. We now play lacrosse as well and at least a quarter of

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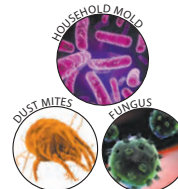
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## Bollywood Beats' Jashn 2019 enthralles spectators

## Shazam! A sincerely optimistic super-hero flick

*Shazam!* is a film made by people who love superheroes. In every scene, writer Henry Gayden and director David F. Sandberg display a love of justice, altruistic values and classic superhero stories. This film is also coming hot off the heels of DC's most successful movie to date, James Wan's *Aquaman*, which took a decidedly campier and fun tone when compared to the Zack Snyder directed *Superman* and *Justice League* films. With *Aquaman*'s soaring box office and moderate critical reception, *Shazam!* cements the fact that the new DC Extended Universe's tone is a marginally more fun and hopeful one.

*Shazam!* follows the story of Billy Batson, as he adapts to life with his new foster family, searches for his biological mother and gets super powers gifted to him from a 1,000-year-old wizard. These powers become activated whenever Billy says, "Shazam!" at which times he gets stuck by lightning and becomes a lightning wielding crime fighter with super strength, flight and super speed. However, it becomes clear that stopping

crime is more of a side gig for Billy as he begins to spend his time using his powers to do what a typical 15-year-old kid would like to do. Along with his best friend, Freddie, Billy has to learn what it truly means to be a hero.

David F. Sandberg has a great track record with his previous films releasing both *Lights Out* and *Annabelle: Creation* to positive critical and audience reception. However, those were horror films, so I felt some hesitation when I learned he would be directing *Shazam!* However, like another famous horror director I know, he had no issues when transitioning to a super-hero film. Clearly, he draws on a wide range of influences when establishing the tone for *Shazam!*: Richard Donner and Christopher Reeves' *Superman*, Sam Rami's *Spider-Man* trilogy and even another Donner film, like *The Goonies*.

It should be said that *Shazam!* is not exactly reinventing the wheel here, but rather drawing on eclectic inspirations to re-establish what a movie in the DCEU could feel like. The new tone is fun, campy and most importantly, sincere. Both *Aquaman* and *Shazam!* ooze genuine emotion and care with every frame. It is the idea that every life deserves protecting and no one is entirely without hope, and frankly, it is re-

freshing compared to the oftentimes more grounded and hard hitting approach new superhero movies like *Logan*, *Avengers: Infinity War* and even 2017's *Justice League*.

I like these films, but what Sandberg and his team deliver is so outside of trendy super-hero filmmaking that you cannot help but fall in love with it. Zachary Levi and Jack Dylan Grazer have a hilarious and heartfelt chemistry that becomes even more impressive when you realize how emotionally deep the script intends to delve. Aside from some so-so character motivations, an occasionally mediocre score and a slow start, *Shazam!* is a fun ride from front to back and leaves the audience not only with a good time, but a great message to boot.

*Shazam!* feels like superhero films of yesterday, which is a welcome sight in today's over-crowded super-hero market.

league will get together for occasional luncheons and take trips to golf courses in other cities and states such as English, Indiana and Perry Park, Ky., every October.

The senior tournament is held annually every September, as well as a golf tournament at Legends in Franklin, Indiana, which has over 100 contestants. The ladies enjoy participating in the event and seeing one another.

The league includes all handicaps and a traditional 18-hole course. They have no caddies to help, so the ladies rely only on each other to load the equipment into the golf carts to get ready for their game.

"It's like old friends coming together again," Wagner said. "I love seeing these ladies and spending time outside playing golf. I enjoy the social aspect, the conversation and the friendship the most."

The Tuesday Morning Ladies League is trying to make it easier for their older participants to play. The league has lost some members due to difficulty getting through the course and is determined to gain new members.

"It's hard losing a member. It's like losing a part of your family. It's a golf family," she said. "The ladies in the league strive to have fun outdoors and learn about golf. Everyone learns something from everyone, good or bad."

This May will be the 40th anniversary of the Tuesday Morning Ladies League.

#### Crossing arms coming to railroad crossing on Southport Road

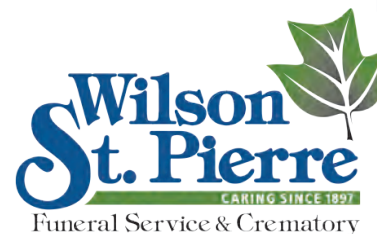

Ticks 101: symptoms and protecting your pet

PAWS for THOUGHT

Ticks spread disease to both animals and humans. The incidence of ticks transmitting disease to both animals and humans is increasing dramatically in many areas of the country, including Indiana.

The disease that we see most often in Indiana is Lyme disease. This is spread by the deer tick to both animals and humans.

Contrary to popular belief, ticks are not seen only in wooded areas. They are present in non-wooded areas, residential areas and even in downtown areas of cities.

HOW TICKS CARRY DISEASES

When you see a tick on your pet, that tick probably has already been on two or three other hosts. Ticks spend time on mice, rats, squirrels, rabbits and even birds. This is where they pick up diseases that they transmit.

STAGES OF TICKS

There are four stages of ticks: eggs, larvae, nymph and adult. The larvae, which are the size of a small poppy seed, transmit disease, as do the nymph and adult ticks. It is next to impossible to see a larvae on your pet, so they may be transmitting diseases without your knowledge.

HOW TICKS FIND THEIR HOSTS

Ticks are at ground level. They recognize movement, body heat and carbon dioxide and can even somewhat visualize hosts. Once they identify a host, they can move somewhat quickly to the host animal.

Once on the host, the female attaches and begins feeding. Once she is full, she actually regurgitates back into the host; this is when diseases are transmitted.

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO PROTECT YOUR PET

1. Make sure your pet is on a flea preventative that also kills ticks. Note, many "flea preventatives" do not prevent ticks.
2. There is a vaccine against Lyme disease. I highly recommend this vaccine to be used in conjunction with the flea and tick preventative.

LYME DISEASE SYMPTOMS

Lyme disease is a serious disease in both animals and humans. It is caused by a bacteria called *Borrelia burgdorferi*. The signs of Lyme disease are quite varied. This makes it a difficult to disease to diagnose. Symptoms many include fever, swollen joints, painful joints, kidney damage, neurological damage and much more.

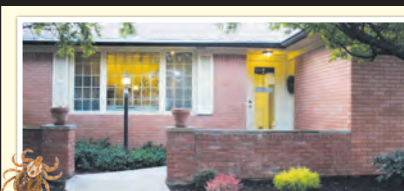
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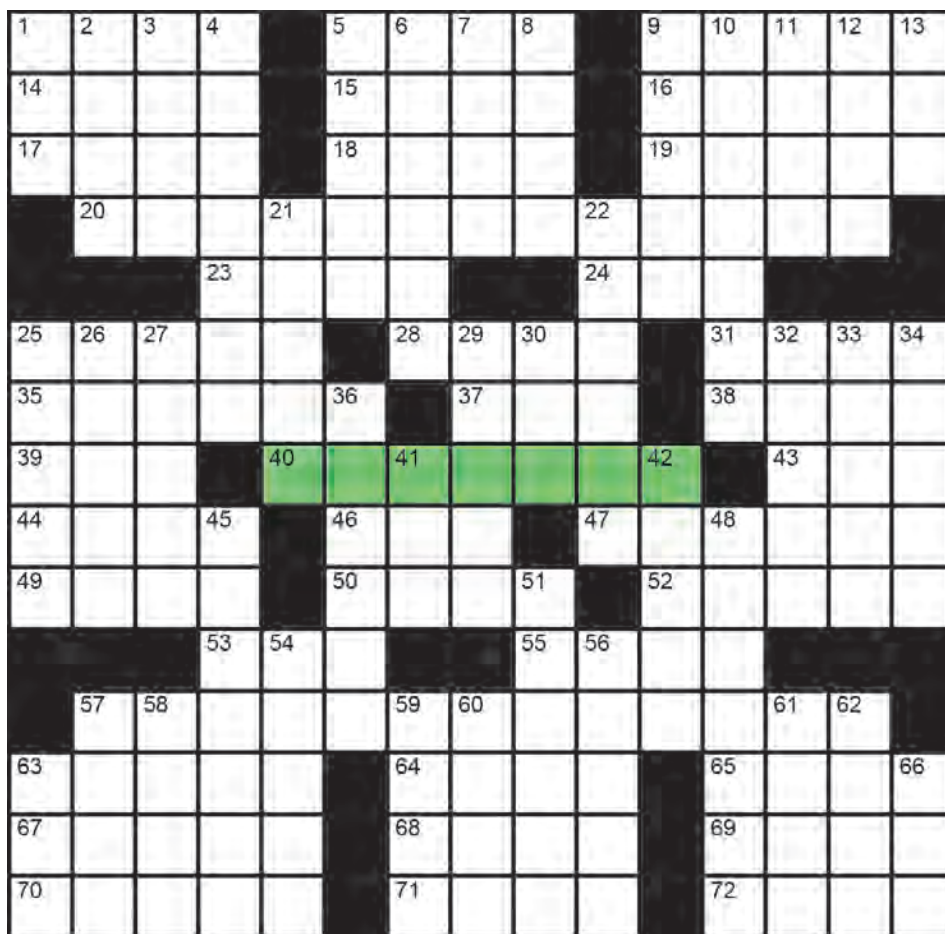

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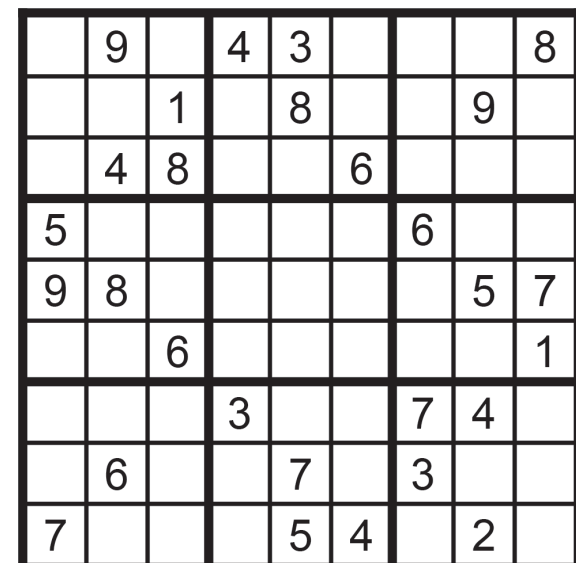

## Five tips for researching a neighborhood

In addition to a certain number of bedrooms and bathrooms, for many home buyers, a good neighborhood is near the top of the priority list. **1. TALK TO THE NEIGHBORS** – After work, or on the weekend, take a walk and talk to the neighbors. **3. CHECK SOCIAL MEDIA** – Many neighborhoods have Facebook groups or websites that give basic information. See if there's a similar group for the neighborhood and find out what others are saying. Another good source is Nextdoor.com or its app.

**4. TEST YOUR COMMUTE** – Even moving a few blocks away can have an impact on a daily commute. If possible, try driving to the potential new home after work to get an idea of the afternoon traffic, then schedule time to head into work using the same route necessary in the morning. You might discover it takes several minutes to turn left out of the neighborhood, or there's a stoplight that seems to take forever, or even a train that goes by the same time each morning.

**5. CHECK CRIME MAPPING SITES** – Two services that are good indicators about a neigh-

borhood are: CrimeReports.com and the National Sex Offender website, nsopw.gov. Simply enter the address to search, or a general area and a list of any reported crimes or registered sex offenders will appear. Families with children always find these types of sites useful when preparing to move.

There's already a lot of stress involved when moving; no one wants to regret a home purchase when learning the next door neighbor mows his lawn at midnight or there's repeated crimes a block away. Researching a neighborhood takes time, but pays off when the buyer feels more confident about their purchase.

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## Celebrate spring with the nutritious benefits of asparagus

Woohoo! Spring is here, so it's time to celebrate the season of re-birth with the edible, young, health-creating shoots of the noble asparagus plant.

I remember mom opening a can or defrosting frozen pre-cooked, slimly asparagus resembling swamp foam. No wonder why many folks are grossed out by its mere mention. Well, those days are in the past as beautiful souls gradually awaken from their programming (did you take the blue or red pill?) to the truth that plant foods in their freshest, most energetic, organic state, are earth's supreme pharmacist.

Fresh, not canned or pre-cooked and flash-frozen, asparagus owns a galaxy of brilliant health benefits. Mayo Clinic reports asparagus detoxifies our temple's internal ecosystem, speed-bumps aging, protects against cancer and heart disease, reduces pain and inflammation, prevents osteoporosis and osteoarthritis,



and with its folic acid, can prevent birth defects. The green spears are a rich source of folate, which speed-bumps aging and supports brain health.

The member of the lily family contains protein, antioxidants, fiber, potassium, vitamins A, K and C and glutathione, a plant amino acid compound medical scientists believe can prevent some kinds of cancers.

Planning and planting your summer garden? Asparagus is said to be a useful companion plant for tomatoes, as tomato plants repel the asparagus beetle.

Growing and harvesting asparagus requires patience. The nutritious crunch spears are usually not harvested until the third or fourth year to allow the crown to develop a strong root system. The plants will produce spears for about 15 years. Under good conditions, spears can grow 10 inches in 24 hours.

For 100 years, we've been encouraged to eat dead, zero energy processed food from a can or box, rather than God's colorful apothecary, and it's abundantly clear we've been detoured off the sensible

road of nutritional righteousness.

And for goodness' sake, evolve! Buy fresh at the local farmer's market, not frozen or canned, and please, don't cook it to oblivion. Heat kills the digestive enzymes and destroys asparagus' impressive vitamin profile. Take the "less you do to a food, the more the food does for you," approach. We either lightly steam or grill them al dente, leaving a little crunch inside. If it's goes limp, you've overcooked it. BTW: asphyxiating asparagus spears in Hollandaise isn't cool

With eyes closed, bite into and feel the toothy crunch of a freshly harvested spring asparagus and taste the flavor of health. May you be strong, healthy and enjoy well-being.

## There is no future ... in English tense

There is no future. Feel free to go back to bed now.

You probably think I'm referring to the fact that we recently took a picture of a black hole, or maybe that climate change is happening at such a rapid pace it seems as if our planet is a lost cause. Or, maybe you're concerned about who is (or isn't) in an elected office, pervasive hatred, ongoing inequality, the increased loneliness indirectly caused by technology, or that — in any movie about robots that takes place in the future — robots inevitably destroy humanity. It doesn't take a flux capacitor to realize the future depends on our present actions.

Whoa, that's tense.

Actually, I don't want to talk about the future today. I'd like to discuss the future tense, which, in English, technical-

ly doesn't exist. According to Bas Aarts (which I promise isn't a name I invented by throwing random Scrabble tiles on the ground), author of *Oxford Modern English Grammar*, "English has no future tense, because it has no future tense inflections, in the way that many other languages do, nor any other grammatical form or combination of forms that can exclusively be called a future tense."

When we learn Latin, Spanish, or French in high school, we learn all the first, second and third person verb conjugations in past, present and future tense inflections. English only has one way to express tense with inflections (word endings), and that's in the past tense. When we add -ed to a verb like "punt," it becomes a past tense verb. I punted the ball onto my neighbor's roof. We have no future inflections in English.

What about "will?" I knew you'd ask. In a sentence like "I will go to the gym tomorrow," "will" serves as a modal verb, which is an auxiliary verb that expresses neces-

sity or possibility. Other modal verbs are words like shall, can, may and could.

In grammar, there's an important distinction between tense and time. Tense is a grammatical term that is directly tied to a verb's inflection. Time is a human construct by which we base our reality. In that construct, we have three times — the past, present and future. When we use "will" with a verb, we are expressing future time, but we are not technically making something future tense.

If you ask me, it won't be the future until our flying cars are powered by trash. So, until then, I'm sending good grammar wishes to all my fellow word nerds.

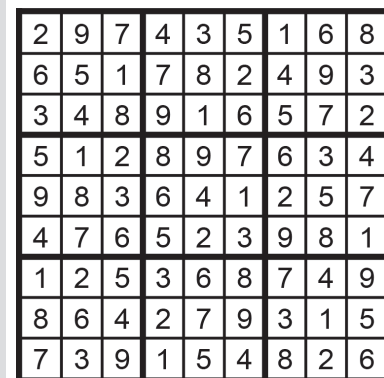

There are some who might say that these two passages of Scripture are not related or connected, but I say that they are related and connected. Israel needs
