Phantom odors – another piece of the puzzle in the paranormal world

Have you ever woken up to the smell of breakfast cooking, yet no one's in the kitchen? Or, smelled a strong whiff of cologne or perfume in the air when being the only one in the house? Had the odor of flowers, and you have no plants in the home? Or perhaps the smell of wet animal fur, much like after a bath, when there are no longer any animals in the residence? If so, you may very well have had a paranormal encounter; and not even cognizant it has happened!

Phantom odors are a very familiar component in the realm of paranormal investigations, and as evidence, equally as important with audio recordings, camera footage, shadow movement and apparitions. While still a personal experience, when it happens to more than one person at the same time, it's something to consider. These odors sometimes tell a story, putting a time stamp upon a life once lived. Yet, for whatever reason after death – do not depart.

Unexplained smells from reported experiences have included food cooking, bread baking, tobacco (cigarettes, cigars and pipe); former fire damage, cologne, perfume, deodorant, hair spray, body odors and occasionally the smell of rotted meat. It is thought a house (or building) can literally absorb these past odors and replay them in short bursts at times. Skeptics will reason there's nothing paranormal about it, and all coincidence. Maybe ... but these odors seem to always tie in with a former resident and their stroll through life. They may have become a calling card of sorts.

My wife, Laura was awakened once in the

wee hours of the early morning by an over-whelming odor of what she describes as "grandmotherly" perfume. I slept through it oblivious as I most often do. The smell emitted from her side of the bed (the location of most of the occurrences in our home) and was so thick she almost got sick from it. And then, just as quickly, it disappeared. It was not the smell of any perfume she uses. She woke me up. Afterward, from our neighbor, we learned the first owner of our house had been an elderly woman. Coincidence? The skeptical side of me would like to think so, but I have my doubts.

My father died in 1987, passing away on a couch in front of the fireplace of our longtime weekend house on Prince's Lake, just outside of Nineveh. The house was his labor of love for years and it was only poetic he would go there. Putting this as delicately as I can — my father retained large amounts of gas. It had a very distinct odor. He passed it a lot. Silent but deadly was my dad, but I loved him still. After his death — for many months — this odor would suddenly surface, and then just as suddenly disappear. Coincidence?

Had our weekend home – with so much of his soul invested into – become a place he chose not to leave? Did he even have a choice in the matter? I don't know. There's a reason for everything, yet, will paranormal investigators ever understand these gray areas? Some will say they have the answers; they don't! It's still a work in progress, and I expect to be for many years to come. Paranormal odors are another piece of the puzzle.

Franklin Central High School teacher uses a passion for history to inspire students and colleagues

Susan Tomlinson's passion for U.S. history started while listening to her third-grade teacher read the *Little House on the Prairie* series by Laura Ingalls Wilder. "The stories of these pioneer settlers fascinated me and gave me an appreciation for the history of the westward movement," Tomlinson said.

In addition, both sets of her grandparents travelled, bringing back gifts and stories of international culture, which sparked her interest in sociology. "I have traveled to 26 countries in Europe and Asia including China, Japan and Saudi Arabia and lived in Germany for five years during the time of the fall of the Berlin Wall and reunification," she said. "I use those experiences to enhance my teaching."

Tomlinson, a U.S. History and Sociology teacher for Franklin Central High School, has been named *The Southside Times*' Educator of the Year.

A Teaching Legend

"Mrs. Susan Tomlinson is a teaching legend," said Lisa Laker, English teacher for Franklin Central High School. "Recognized as our district's first Teacher of the Year many years ago, Susan continues to develop professionally and serves on the Indiana Council for the Social Studies executive board, the Indianapolis Sister Cities International executive teacher outreach board and she consults for Gilder Lehrman United States History organization. In this capacity, Mrs. Tomlinson was chosen to advise on award-winning Ken Burns' documentary, Vietnam. She has been awarded Indiana Social Studies Teacher of the Year by Gilder Lehrman, and she has been honored with a plethora of awards, including a Lilly Teacher Creativity Fellowship that took her on teaching adventures to Slovenia, Italy and Croatia. Susan is highly accomplished. She is my educational hero!"

"Susan is also a wealth of information acquired from her many travels, workshops

and work within the field of social studies," added Cacinda Walters, Government, U.S. and World History teacher for FCHS. "Her dedication and contributions to our field is beyond description."

Tomlinson grew up in Mooresville and graduated from Mooresville High School. She received her bachelor's degree in Social Studies Education and her master's in Secondary Education and U.S. and World History from Ball State University. She studied post-graduate at I.U. Bloomington, Purdue and IUPUI. Tomlinson began her career by teaching in Muncie, Ind., including the Burris Laboratory School's Center for Gifted and Tal-

ented at Ball State University. She spent an additional five years teaching in Manheim, Germany. Tomlinson taught World Geography at Franklin Township Middle School for 10 years and has been with Franklin Central High School for the past 18 years. She was a founding member of the Freshman Academy and, with Laker, founded World Cultures Club 15 years ago.

Celebrating Diversity

"Our township was growing and with this growth came an increase in the rich diversity of our population," explained Tomlinson. "We saw World Cultures Club as a way to recognize and celebrate the cultures represented in our school. The response to the club was enthusiastic and within a few years it was the biggest club at the school. The highlight of the year was the Flashes Around the World International Festival which continues to be a showcase of exhibits and performances celebrating Franklin Township's multi-cultural community."

Tomlinson also created an annual "Eva Education Day" for students and the community to celebrate the life of the late Auschwitz survivor and Hoosier, Eva Mozes Kor. Kor founded the CANDLES Museum in Terre Haute,

Ind. "When Governor Holcomb declared Eva Education Day in Indiana, the History Club decided to create an after-school event to recognize this event and to promote Eva's message of forgiveness," Tomlinson said.

Using History to Make a Difference

"History is made up of fascinating stories of people of different backgrounds, abilities and areas of talent," Tomlinson continued. "I want students to realize that they can make history in some way. Even as high school students they have a voice and ideas that they can use to make a difference in their lives and the lives of others."

Although Tomlinson has more than 40 years of teaching under her belt, she continues to learn every day ... from her students. "I continue to grow in my love and appreciation for these human beings who are my students," she said. "I learn from them, and I grow and explore with them. Teenagers are amazing creatures who can be kind, compassionate, caring, innovative, creative, funny and challenging. They keep me growing and learning ... and they keep me young!"

Tomlinson has been married to her husband, Chuck for 43 years. They have three dogs, a horse and one pony and live on eight acres of land in rural Morgan County.

Scholarships - Butler University has awarded full scholarships to two Perry Meridian High seniors, Victor Barona and Amy Dilley. Barona is the recipient of the Dr. John Morton-Finney Leadership Scholarship, whose namesake was an alumnus of Butler and earned 11 degrees and practiced law for 53 years. He retired two years before his death at the age of 108, making him the oldest practicing attorney in Indiana. Dr. Morton-Finney believed in education and served the Indianapolis Public School system for 47 years as a teacher and administrator. While academic performance is considered, the scholarship is awarded to students who demonstrate an active leadership role to promote diversity and inclusion through high school and community activities. How seniors can stay active in mind and body while social distancing

The outbreak of COVID-19 may have added an extra layer of isolation and anxiety for some seniors. However, these challenges can be overcome, according to some Southside experts.

"We focus so much on the physical nature of any kind of virus and how it's going to affect us physically, but we forget that there's a psychological component that is huge and plays a large part into impairing our ability to function on a day-to-day basis," said Franciscan Health psychologist Dr. Deann Harvey in Franciscan Health's blog. "What we strongly encourage is to stop, to take a step back, to take a deep breath and to look at the statistics. ...We need to be patient, take deep breaths and get in control of our thoughts."

Michelle Dial, a certified health coach for her business Michelle Dial Wellness in Perry Township offers several recommendations.

ESTABLISH LIMITS ON WATCHING OR READING

NEWS. Control the amount of negative news you consume. "Stay informed," Dial said. "If you feel it's too much, find something else to distract you. ... Get outside. Open a window. Look at nature's beauty."

CONNECT WITH NATURE. Take a walk, garden or sit outside. Spending some time outside or looking at landscapes through a window or even a picture can help, she said.

KEEP A GRATITUDE JOURNAL. Write down what you are grateful for every day. "Write three to five things that you are grateful for," Dial suggested. "It puts you in a place of being thankful."

RESTART AN OLD HOBBY. "Take up the old hobby in your closet," Dial said. "Focusing on a hobby promotes staying in the present." Woodworking, knitting, painting, or photography are activities that can keep you occupied for hours.

CONNECT WITH FRIENDS, FAMILY AND PRO- GRAMS ONLINE. Access information, including music, classes, worship services, clubs and even those closest to you through the internet. Zoom and Skype can offer a way for you to see friends and family virtually.

MEDITATE. Close your eyes, Dial suggested. "Think about a challenging situation you encountered in your life. Take a few deep breaths." Then, think about a happy memory in your life. Breathe. "Trust that what is happening is temporary," she said. "Feel what you feel; it's okay to feel. ... Move on to the best feeling and the next."

EXERCISE. Walking, yoga and strengthening muscles are great ways to stay fit. Carole Pefley, owner, group instructor and personal trainer of Carole's Fitness near Edgewood, recommends working on your core. "If you have exercised for any length of time at all, and then even miss a couple of classes, you realize how quickly your body forgets to respond." She suggested tapping into what you've learned in class.

For chair exercise, she recommended finding a sturdy chair. "Lean back to touch the back of the chair and relax your core. Hold on to the back-chair legs, interlock your fingers behind chair," Pefley said. "Then, begin lifting your legs and knees together. "Do as many as possible without stopping or too fast, four to six for one minute."

Creative Franklin Township sisters produce and donate masks to local hospitals

Community members are coming together during the COVID-19 crisis to provide handmade masks for the public. Some have been sewing a long time; others have just started to learn because they want to help. They are using household materials such as T-shirts, bandanas and elastic out of pants. DIY face masks help to protect the wearer while also helping prevent them from unknowingly spreading the virus to others, useful when some people who have COVID-19 may show no symptoms, according to the CDC.

Alena Van Arendonk, a competitive costumer and Franklin Township resi-

dent, said, "In normal years, I would be traveling to conventions around the United States (and occasionally to other countries) to exhibit my costumes and teach costuming workshops. Because of the pandemic, nearly all the events I normally attend have been canceled, so my costuming work has ground to a halt." As soon as Arendonk heard about the supply shortages at hospitals, she looked up mask guidelines, began to sort through fabric she had and found enough cotton material to make at least 300 masks without ever leaving the house for supplies.

Alena's sister, Laura Van Arendonk Baugh is also a Franklin Township native and costume artist (cosplayer) and joined in to help. Their first batch of 62 masks went to Eskenazi Hospital.

"On the one hand, it's surreal to

be making homemade equipment for frontline and support staff," Van Arendonk Baugh said. "On the other, I keep thinking this is what World War II must have felt like, in the WVS (Women's Voluntary Service) or the American Red Cross."

The sisters are both still in the process of making more masks. "You don't have to be experienced or really skilled to be able to help with this," Van Arendonk Baugh said. "Or you can support a mask-making friend by cutting cotton strips from old cotton T-shirts to make mask ties, or from cotton bedsheets."

"While sitting at home sewing is not a frontline job like working in a hospital or delivering groceries, it's one of the few ways that I can help," Van Arendonk added. "I'll keep making masks until I run out of materials."

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



Beech Grove's new 'prairie of poetry' to honor Sarah T. Bolton

Sarah T. Bolton Park in Beech Grove will soon welcome a new "prairie of poetry" just inside the park entrance. The new park project will showcase native Indiana prairie grasses and wildflowers that support native pollinator life and give Beech Grove residents a new opportunity to connect with the natural world while celebrating the legacy of Sarah T. Bolton, Indiana's unofficial poet laureate and a women's rights activist who resided in Indianapolis most of her life.

Coinciding with the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage, the new Sarah T. Bolton Pollinator Prairie will create a space where visitors can enjoy the heritage poetry, nature and activism of Indiana. This prairie will reside on land formerly owned by Sarah T. Bolton and will be an enhanced natural space to honor her life and talents through her poetry and stories of her background.

"I hope that people will walk the garden and enjoy its beauty," said Angel Calvert McKenna, facility manager for Hornet Park Community Center. "It's a culmination of ideas and desire to honor Ms. Bolton through her poetry and to provide a native habitat for our pollinators. It will give our community a peaceful place to enjoy natural beauty native to this area, learn about local history, and experience art created now and long ago."

The garden will include a walking path with Indiana native plantings attractive to bees, butterflies and birds. An educational signage honoring Bolton and the history of the park will be added along with gathering nodes with seating and small exhibits and a council ring for larger gatherings. Visitors will see artistic pieces and habitats placed

throughout the garden.

The Beech Grove Greenscape Commission was awarded the 2020 IPL Project GreenSpace grant through Keep Indianapolis Beautiful, Inc., to be used for project installation and program implementation.

The project is created in collaboration with the city of Beech Grove, the Beech Grove Greenscape Commission, Mader Design, Beech Grove Artist Collective, KIB, the Indiana Historical Society, Samuel Bryan Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution and several local residents.

The Indiana Historical Society will generate content and designs for the exhibits show-casing Sarah T. Bolton's life and poetry, and will work with the Beech Grove Greenscape Commission, the Samuel Bryan Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution and local residents to gather additional stories and information that reflect the values of the community. The Beech Grove Artist Collective will coordinate community volunteer collaborations to create colorful, sculptural pieces that will accent the path. These sculptural elements will also hold bird and bat houses provided by KIB.

This community-based project will use many volunteers, both from the community and from local corporate groups wishing to give back to the people that they serve. Tree, prairie and ornamental plantings will all be completed with volunteers, as will the removal of any invasive plants. The park project will start in late spring and continue through the end of the year. Volunteer workdays will be planned soon. - The Art of Self Defense (2019): Fight Club meets Wes Anderson in this karate, crime comedy. Witty and full of smart writing, this movie was my favorite independent production of last year. (Available on Hulu)
- Bad Lieutenant: Port of Call New Orleans (2009): Nic Cage, while holding serious dramatic chops, has become known for over-the-top performances. It is film-length satirization of the crime genre, it is over the top and weird, but that's what makes it fun. (Available for free on Tubi)
- Blazing Saddles (1974): One of the alltime greats of comedy, Blazing Saddles pulls no punches. It was so effective in its satire it basically ended a genre. Its impact is still felt in the way the western genre is presented today. (Available on Hulu)
- The Graduate (1967): After graduating college, Ben Braddock is avoiding the only question anyone can ask him, "so what are you going to do now?" This film is a tem-

plate for what modern comedy gets wrong. It uses every aspect of filmmaking to deliver its jokes, and never shies away from serious emotions either. (Available on Amazon Prime)

- The Irishman (2019): The culmination of a life's work, Martin Scorsese has spent his entire life enamored by and contributing to cinema. The Irishman is not a high intensity gangster flick like Goodfellas or Casino, it is a meditative and thoughtful film. The kind of thoughtfulness that only reveals itself after an entire life has been lived. I, for one, am thankful that that thoughtfulness can be shared through film so eloquently. - The Killing of a Sacred Deer (2017): A psychological horror spoken in a quick, almost comical prose that has become idiosyncratic with its director, Yorgos Lanthimos. The story concerns a mysterious young man luring a family into unimaginable horror. (Available on Netflix)
- Last Flag Flying (2017): A touching tale about patriotism, the truth, aging, and loss. Directed with a tender touch by (my favorite working director) Richard Linklater,

this movie works by itself but is an unofficial sequel to the 1973 film, The Last Detail. (Available on Amazon Prime)

- The Lighthouse (2019): Shot in stark black-and-white photography, two lighthouse keepers fight to maintain their sanity as the extended time they spend secluded from the outside world begins to take a toll on them. This film features dialogue written and performed in the style of late 19th century seamen so I would recommend captions for this one, to make it easier to understand. (Available on Amazon Prime)
- The Princess and The Frog (2009): A retelling of the classic fairytale, this Disney adaptation shines most through its excellent music. It is also the last hand-drawn animated film Disney has released. (Available on Netflix)

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
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
