

Buying a small Indiana town with ghostly benefits: part II

When Rick Hofstetter took over the Story Inn, and consequently the entire town of Story in 1999, he had heard the stories, yet remained a skeptic concerning ghosts and such. He is no longer.

Hofstetter, an attorney and law professor, is also a well-known preservationist, instrumental in calling attention to several distinguishing Indiana landmarks. He served as the first president of the Athenaeum Foundation, Inc. endeavor, which essentially saved the gothic German building in downtown Indianapolis.

Buying the 17-acre village some 20 years ago at a sheriff's tax sale became another preservation effort. The present town of three residents – Hofstetter, Jacob and Kate Ebel, and a few dogs – still remains locked in the past. There's been no new construction since the depression. The 1937 Standard Oil Crown gas pumps still stand in front of the building as the cycle of southern Indiana seasons continue their trek forward. What has been described as "perhaps the best surviving example of a 19th-century pioneer logging/farming community in the American Midwest" is up for sale, and it comes with a few ghosts!

After acquiring the inn, Hofstetter found guest books, left by the former owners, in each room. He read them. They were in place so guests could document their ghostly encounters. Once the journals were filled, they were placed in the attic. From the number of books found, apparently these sightings have been going on throughout most of the building's history.

The most well-known ghost is the "Blue Lady" that occupies the former Garden Room

above the Inn's restaurant. It has been renamed as such. She is thought to be Dr. George Story's wife. It is believed that if a blue light is turned on, it summons her. Past encounters seem to revolve around the color blue: her hypnotic blue eyes and leaving trinkets of blue behind, such as ribbons. Sometimes, as she moves about in flowing white robes, she'll acknowledge you. Sometimes she goes about her business as if you're not there. Some feel she must have been a smoker in life because of the occasional smell of cherry tobacco upstairs. Inn employees have had their own encounters. While the Blue Lady's reputation lies within the Inn, many feel the entire town is haunted.

"My role is over," Hofstetter told Kevin Rader of Eyewitness News. "I've had 20 years. I put my stamp on it. It's not every day someone gets to buy a town. I've had that experience. Now I want to live long enough to sell a town." However, while the town is for sale, the Story Inn is not. Hofstetter wants to separate the restaurant/bed & breakfast business from the town. He wants the spirit of Story to stay intact. "The business will have the same relationship with the town as Macy's does with the mall, "he explained. "It will be a tenant and we offer lease payments. Whoever buys this [Story] will take it with restrictions, but there will be cash flow."

In March, Story, Indiana was listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Maybe it's time for a weekend sojourn south.

Greenwood volunteers help 'Pack Away Hunger'

More than 1,800 volunteers packaged 400,000 meals to send to Cuba last Saturday as part of Mount Pleasant Christian Church's fifth annual Go Change the World week.

The event is made possible through a partnership with Pack Away Hunger, a Beech Grove-based organization that organizes meal packaging to help reduce hunger and malnutrition locally and around the world.

During three separate sessions, the volunteers were trained in Mount Pleasant's worship center, then sent next door to the Community Life Center, where stations for packaging were set up.

"Our first session starts at 8:30 a.m. and we are basically busy all day," said Johnette Cruz, communications director for Mount Pleasant Christian Church.

"The volunteers package and seal the Nutri-Plenty Meals, including rice, soy, dried vegetables, and other nutrients into 36 bags," Heidi Wright, service coordinator for Mount Pleasant Christian Church, said. "After that, the Nutri-Plenty Meals are packaged into boxes, which will total more than 65,000 pounds of food. The meals will then be sent overseas to our ministry partner in Cuba."

Volunteers ranged in ages from 4 through 70. Every time a box was filled, the volunteer rang a bell. One of Mount Pleasant's core four strategies is serving others, and they delivered well. For more information about Mount Pleasant Christian Church, please visit their website at mpcc.info.

Southside drug bust leads to 50 arrests

Local and federal law enforcement officials raided homes and served warrants to suspected drug dealers, which led to the arrest of 50 people from Johnson and Marion counties on April 18.

The drug sweep was part of "Operation Weakest Link," an undercover sting targeting suspected drug dealers. The suspects, ranging in age from 20 to 62, were selling methamphetamine, cocaine and other narcotics in the Franklin area. Investigators said this raid focused on the dealers, not the users.

Twelve of the suspects are from Indianapolis, 12 from Franklin and six are from Greenwood, including nine people who were arrested at one home on Yandes Street. The "Operation Weakest Link" investigation began last fall. It involved a combined effort from the John-

son County Prosecutor's Office, sheriff's office and local law enforcement.

According to Johnson County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Joseph Villaneuva, "Forty-nine of the people arrested in Operation Weakest Link 2019 face charges related to drug-dealing offenses. Thirty-four of them are charged with dealing methamphetamine."

Police say these people are "peddling the poison," and there is a sense of urgency to get them off the streets. "Citizens deserve to have safe communities throughout Johnson County," Chief Kirby Cochran of the Franklin Police Department said.

Last Thursday's undercover sting comes about six months after 120 drug warrants were served in the largest "drug round-up" in Johnson County history, which involved some of the same suspects.

Police and investigators say they are taking this very seriously and are going to fight this drug battle head on.

Mrs. Curl reopens after owner charged with child pornography possession

Mrs. Curl Ice Cream Shop and Outdoor Café in Greenwood has reopened days after owner John Cassin was charged with possession of child pornography at the ice cream shop.

According to court documents, police served a search warrant on Cassin's home in March and detectives seized his home computer. Court documents say Cassin used his computer to access images of underage children and babies engaging in explicit sex acts.

In a statement posted on Facebook that has since been deleted, the ice cream shop stated:

"We would like to address the public regarding the recent arrest of John Cassin. We sincerely apologize and acknowledge everyone's concerns. Our priority is the welfare of our employees and customers. Our employees have expressed that they would like to continue working. Mrs. Curl has transitioned to new ownership as of January 2019 due to John's age and pending retirement. Due to pending allegations, his partners wish to reopen the business as of Sunday April 14 and keep providing jobs to our employees and great ice cream and food that you've grown to love. Effective immediately, Mr. Cassin will be stepping aside from his role at Mrs. Curl.'

Cassin allegedly told investigators he feared his interest would escalate to actual contact, which is why he wanted to stop. The ice cream shop has been a beloved gathering place for families and children for years.

Cassin has owned and operated Mrs. Curl Ice Cream Shop and Outdoor Café since 1997. Cassin no longer owns Mrs. Curl, according to a statement released Saturday by the ice cream shop.

Progress moves forward for new West Perry Township Library

A public meeting for a new West Perry Township Library Branch was held April 11 – just a mile away from where the building will be erected at the corner of Southport Road and Harding Street. Attendance was down from the first meeting, however it was a small, enthusiastic crowd that gathered in the Meridian Woods Clubhouse that evening.

Schmidt Associates and HBM Architects have partnered to construct a brick-and-mortar building to serve residents on the expanding Southside. As with the initial meeting last month, they were after input. Lisa Gomperts, with Schmidt Associates, reviewed highlights from the previous gathering. A lot of information centered toward the physical building.

"We used this information to develop the aesthetics of the building," she said. "And we introduced different trends of a library. Most were in agreement. In terms of the entry experience, people really liked the carpet, the display shelving that created a pathway through the library, bright natural light windows, a 24-7 vestibule where you could pick up your books.

"The thing about libraries is there's something for everybody."

The last meeting covered suggestions for seating and cafes; a fireplace being a popular option; creating nooks for people to hang out; lower shelving creating visibility across the library; a dedicated children's area; study nook/teen area that would make them feel comfortable with that space; outdoor shading and courtyard space; and most popular, a drive-up book return.

"The point in designing your library is to have new spaces that relates to everyone, where everyone can find their space in it," said Kevin Kennedy of HBM Architects.

Then came the table exercises – The World Cafe – to get further input on services to be offered. In 10-minute in-

crements, participants moved to various tables, labeled 1 through 6, to answer a variety of inquiries, such as: "What should you see when you first walk into the library?" or "What have you seen in other places (not necessarily libraries) that would be nice to include in this library?" or the infamous question from Table 6 – "What new programs, services and technologies would you like to have at the new West Perry Branch?", among many other questions. "Number 6 may be the shortest question," Kennedy said with a smile. "But the hardest to answer."

Some concerns were voiced (the building not being accessible from Southport Road, and the incoming on/off ramps for nearby I-69 causing future traffic woes) however, they are sure to be addressed.

Construction will start in the spring of 2020 with the opening in 2021. The next meeting will be toward the end of the summer, with the presentation of the architectural design of the building. And I'm sure, services that have been taken into consideration.





Six small changes can make a big difference for mental and physical health

Seventy years ago, Mental Health America designated May as Mental Health Month.



During those 70 years of raising awareness, we have learned a great deal about the connection between mental and physical health.

A healthy lifestyle can help prevent mental health condi-

tions, as well as chronic health conditions such as heart disease, diabetes and obesity. A healthy lifestyle can also help people recover from these conditions.

Living a healthy lifestyle isn't always easy, but it can be achieved by making small changes and building on those successes.

These six suggestions can help you and your family members improve both mental and physical health:

- FIND A REASON TO LAUGH. Laughing decreases your levels of stress hormones. Your heart, lungs and muscles are stimulated; endorphins the body's natural pain blockers are released; and activity increases in parts of the brain's reward system.
- 2) **ENJOY PHYSICAL ACTIVITY.** Adolescents who participate in sports have lower odds of suffering from depression or thinking about suicide, particularly when the sports increase their self-esteem and social support systems. For adults, physical activity can be as simple as a walk, run or bike ride.
- 3) SPEND TIME ENJOYING NATURE.
 People who do things in
 nature have better perceptions of their own
 emotional well-being. Vacations, even
 short ones, help.
- 4) SPEND TIME WITH ANI-MALS. The company

of animals — whether as pets or service animals — can have a profound impact on a person's quality of life and ability to recover from illnesses. A pet can be a source of comfort and help us live mentally healthier lives.

- 5) SPEND TIME WITH PEOPLE. Being lonely can cause the same amount of damage to your lifespan as smoking 15 cigarettes a day. It's more dangerous to your health than obesity. Having a strong social support system improves your ability to bounce back from stress. If you don't have a network of friends, think about volunteering, taking a class or joining a recreation program.
- 6) MAINTAIN A HEALTHY WORK-LIFE BALANCE. Poor work-life balance increases your risk for mental health problems and sleep issues. This is especially true for people who work longer shifts or on nights or weekends. People who feel they have a good work-life balance are more satisfied with their job and their life, and they experience fewer symptoms of depression and anxiety.

If you are taking steps to care for your mind, body and soul, but you are still struggling with your own mental health, please seek help. Mental illnesses are common and real, but they are also treatable.

Homecroft receives \$777,885 for street improvements

Construction – The town of Homecroft was awarded a Community Crossings Matching Grant of \$635,476 from the state of Indiana, in addition to a grant of \$143,408 from the city of Indianapolis for street improvements. Engineers dug core samples and revealed the block running from Madison Avenue and Dresden Street had a pavement depth of 12 inches and the block between Orinoco and Shelby had six inches of pavement. Between Orinoco Avenue and Dresden Street, the pavement was only three inches over gravel. As a result, a full-depth reconstruction and base repair is planned for the middle block of Maynard, while the two outer sections will receive mill and overlay throughout, along with five sections requiring full-depth work. The project will include some curb replacement and curb ramps, which will be installed where needed. The total cost for the project is estimated to be \$921,294, of which Homecroft will pay \$143,408. Survey work is expected to begin immediately and the engineers will develop full drawings. Once those are completed, the project will be put out to bid. The project may be completed before

school starts, however, it is dependent upon when Homecroft receives the funding from the city and state. Residents will be kept up to date by newsletters and flyers as details become available.

High Life Remarkably ambitious, beautifully shot and a complete mess

MOVIE REVIEW

Claire Denis has already secured her legacy as one of modern films' most thoughtprovoking and unique directors. She began her career making disturbing, ultra-serious films that challenged audiences around the world, like Trouble Every Day and Bastards. Her most recent feature before High Life, titled Let the Sunshine In, was a complete change of pace as Denis took on a romantic comedy. All eyes were on Denis when she announced her next feature was a science fiction piece starring independent film darling, Robert Pattinson.

In High Life, Robert Pattinson stars as Monte, a criminal sent from Earth on a spaceship with other convicts to serve his sentence as a form of scientific discovery. While on board the ship, Monte and the other inhabitants become the subjects of morally questionable, confusing and sometimes horrific tests pertaining to fertility and sexuality. Eventually, these tests begin to affect Monte and the other convicts, so existential crises and uncomfortable introspection slowly but surely begin to take their toll as every character becomes emotionally unhinged.

Denis draws from strong influences, the most notable being Stanley Kubrick's 2001: A Space Odyssey and Andrei Tarkovsky's Stalker. These films deal with existentialism in a way only the genre of science fiction can. In all these films, High Life included, audience members are forced to reckon with existence in nuanced and delicate ways. What Denis' work lacks, in comparison to these titans of the genre, are meaningful links that holistically tie the work together.

There are so many moving parts and intricacies in Denis' work that it would be irresponsible for me to write off *High Life* as a film devoid of meaning. I believe that High Life can be read a variety of ways. However, my central issue is that the film never quite justifies its own content in a meaningful way. There are many small concepts it communicates well; however, it never comes together as a cohesive piece in my interpretation of the film.

While Pattinson is sublime as Monte, his relationships with those around him are so strange and other worldly that it takes the entire film to even begin to understand his character fully. Monte is set up as a criminal, but since his crime is never explicitly stated, the audience can never settle on how they feel about his character. It is a credit to both the writers of the film and Pattison's performance that his character is endowed with so

much ambiguity.

More than anything else I've written about Denis' work on High Life, know this: High Life is wickedly unique and is clearly thoughtful in its planning and execution. It failed to impact me in a serious way, however, I believe that everyone with an interest in being challenged by a film viewing experience should seek out High Life.

High Life struggles to deliver a satisfying film experience, however its dedication to its vision and material will have audiences talking about it for years to come.



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Why fermented foods and beverages are good for you

While explaining the health benefits of probiotic microbes at a lunch and learn, a lady walked out, repulsed by the certainty that our temple actually benefits greatly from eating or drinking bugs. Without this synergy, we'd die, because humans share a symbiotic interdependence with bacteria – many crucial to our very survival.

The Howard Hughes Medical Institute estimates your temple's colonized by trillions (two-and-a-half pounds) of live microorganisms, collectively known as the microbiome. Some are associated with disease; others are extremely important for your immune system, heart, weight and overall health. Your microbiome serves the temple from birth throughout life by controlling thousands of daily bodily processes.

The process of fermenting dairy and vegetables has been used for millennia for medicine and to preserve food. The earliest record of vegetable fermentation dates back to 6000 B.C. in the Fer-

tile Crescent — and nearly every civilization from the Ukrainian, Russian, Polish, Belarusian, Latvian, Estonian, Indian, Asian and African has included at least one fermented food in its culinary heritage.

PubMed.com says eating fermented foods is a convenient way to obtain a daily dose of the good probiotics bacteria that improve digestion, cognitive function, immunity, helps treat irritable disease, provides minerals that build bone density, help fight allergies and kill harmful yeast and microbes that cause issues like candida.

For most blindly-trusting Americans, it's a silly container of artificial, fruity "yogurt," (wink, wink); for Koreans it's kimchi, while Colombians drink a fermented corn beverage called chicha. Hawaiians eat fermented poi and Japanese add fermented soybeans on top of rice. Today, "sauerkraut" is still the German national dish. And kombucha, a fermented sweet black tea, has been adopted by world cultures for centuries. Kombucha is my favorite. Currently sweeping the country, the fermented beverage has been around for millennia.

In the 1960s, Swiss research confirmed kombucha was beneficial for the gut in a similar way to yogurt.

"Live and active cultures" hyped on yogurt doesn't guarantee probiotics are actually in it by the time you eat it – it only verifies they were there when it was "manufactured." Sigh! Plus, artificial sweeteners aspartame and sucralose have been shown to be antimicrobial, with the ability to kill beneficial bacteria in the gut. Crazy, huh? (Nature.com and NIH (National Institutes of Health.)

You're programmed, sweet, beautiful friends: brainwashed. Drop the yogurt and say "hello" to kombucha. "Refrigerated only" probiotics with prebiotics are good, too. May you be strong, healthy and enjoy well-being.

31 For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall be joined unto his wife, and they two shall be one flesh.

32 This is a great mystery: but I speak concerning Christ and the church.

EPHESIANS 5:30-32

Christ Jesus resurrected physically in His body of 33+ years or, not? I had this discussion with a couple of brother pastors several years ago and

their conclusion was that He was not physically and fleshly resurrected. He was only a spirit. How sad when one draws that or some other conclusion than what is real.

Jesus was resurrected physically in the flesh and of that there is not a shadow of doubt. His body was no longer there in that tomb but He was seen outside of the tomb by Mary (not His mother) and later in the day by 10 of the 11 disciples.

He said to them that they could handle His body. He invited them to put their fingers into the wound in His side and to touch the nail scars in His hands. This He did to verify and to leave no doubt that He is Jesus Christ the son of God. He had done what no other could possibly have done with the same results, He died for our sins and was resurrected to show us what our own resurrection would be like.

Now, Paul comes along later and tells that we are "members" of His body and His flesh and His bones. What does this mean to us? It means that we are not mere bystanders, but participants in His life and His ministry. We live, as the song says, because He lives. We were dead in our sins, but by the life and love of our Lord and Savior, we now have been

resurrected ourselves to a life identical to His, and we can all be a part of (but not the whole or entirety of) His body, called the church. This is fantastic news when it is correctly understood. It is a great privilege for all who have accepted His death as the way in which God has chosen to buy their lives. God did, Christ died, and is now alive forever more and I too live in Him.
