Life lessons from those who regret the lack of a life well lived

Is the regret of a life less lived enough motivation to remain behind after physical death? Does this explain one aspect of the paranormal? It very well may. We will all face the inevitable conclusion of physical death with our lives, like a clock ticking off the years, begins to wind down and eventually stops. Until the prospect of dying – or actual death – affects you personally, it's one of those topics we keep on the shelf. It's not a comfortable subject, and not something we like to think about.

A hospice nurse working with patients in their last days made some observations. These folks had returned home to die in a comfortable and familiar environment. She found a common thread existing with each one during this period and was not afraid to ask questions. It was as good an experience for her as the sense of closure was for them. As the patient's time drew to a close, they were quite aware of that fact. There seemed to have been a sense of urgency in speaking what they felt needed to be said. Acceptance of their upcoming transition often brought out regrets of a life not lived to its full potential. Repetitive themes were the result of this nurse's questioning. The most common five she found were:

I wish I'd had the courage to live a life true to myself, not the life others expected of me.

"This was the most common regret of all. When people realize that their life is almost over and looking back clearly upon it, it was easy to see how many dreams have gone unfulfilled. Most people had not honored even a half of them and had to die knowing that it was due to choices they'd made – or not made. From the moment you lose your

health, it is too late. Health brings a freedom very few realize until they no longer have it."

I wish I hadn't worked so hard.

"This came from a lot of male patients I nursed. They missed their children's youth and their partner's companionship. All of these men deeply regretted spending so much of their lives on the treadmill of a work existence."

I wish I'd had the courage to express my feelings.

"Many people suppressed their feelings in order to keep peace with others. As a result, they settled for a mediocre existence and never became who they were truly capable of becoming. Many developed illnesses relating to the bitterness and resentment."

I wish I had stayed in touch with my friends.

"Often they would not realize the benefits of old friends until their dying weeks. Many had become so caught up in their own lives they had let golden friendships slip by over the years. There were many deep regrets about not giving friendships the time and effort that they deserved. Everyone misses their friends when they are dying. It all comes down to love and relationships in the end."


I wish I had let myself be happier.

"Many did not realize, until the end, that happiness is a choice. They had stayed stuck in old patterns and habits. Fear of change had them pretending to others, and themselves, that they were content.

It's food for thought.

Girl of Year

Center Grove student honored as advocate for The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society Indiana Chapter

When a beaming 12-year-old Center Grove girl named Audrey Wampler rang a bell at Riley Hospital for Children at IU Health last July to celebrate the end of grueling chemotherapy treatments two-and-a-half years earlier, naturally, she felt optimistic.

Yet, this upbeat attitude rarely left her side. Not even after the diagnosis of acute B cell lymphoblastic leukemia, frequent hospitalizations, physical pain, fatigue and losing her hair.

"There were many times she didn't feel well as a result of her very intensive lifesaving chemotherapy, but I never heard her complain nor was she ever grumpy with her caregivers," said Ann Haddix, nurse practitioner at Riley Hospital. "She was always pleasant and a joy to be around. I always looked forward to seeing her!"

Haddix met Audrey, a sixth-grade student at Center Grove Middle School, and her family a few days after Audrey received the leukemia diagnosis. "She was still in-patient and as I was going to be the nurse practitioner following her, went to meet them," Haddix recalled. "They were overwhelmed with information and blindsided by this new diagnosis – in addition, her dog was dying, and we allowed her to go to the front door of the hospital to say 'goodbye.' It was the saddest thing I have ever seen."

Determination for a 'Normal Life'

However, "she kept going to school and continued most of her activities during her treatment," Haddix continued. "She didn't let it stop her from having a normal life."

Audrey's aunt invited the family, which includes Audrey's mother, Kristen; father, Ryan; and brother, Mark, to attend the annual Light the Night fundraising walk that fall to benefit The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. Participating in the event "helped Audrey see initially that others have leukemia (as well)," said Kristen. "It made her not feel alone."

In addition, Audrey's teacher, who survived leukemia as a young girl herself, attended. "She kind of knew what I was going through and it was special for her too because she had never (attended)." Audrey said. "That was really special for me."

The following year, Audrey was asked to be the honored hero due to her inspiration as a supporter for the region by LLS at Light the Night in Indianapolis.

A Young Ambassador

This year, Audrey was asked to be the 2020 Girl of the Year for the LLS Indiana Chapter. Each year, four ambassadors are chosen to represent their state: the Women of the Year, Man of the Year, Girl of the Year and Boy of the Year. As Girl of the Year, she is an advocate for fundraising efforts, including designing T-shirts, speaking at luncheons and dinners and participating in videos.

Jeff Johnson, campaign director for Man and Woman of the Year, noted the silver lining in Audrey's experience with leukemia has been the opportunity to share her experience with others. "She's very passionate about sharing her story," he said. "For someone her age to come out of this with such positivity is inspiring."

"I am so very pleased for her but not surprised that she is receiving this honor," added Haddix. "She will be an excellent representative and role model."

Pack Away Hunger, ProAct Indy partner to donate meals to neighbors in need

Two local nonprofits recently teamed up to provide thousands of meals to neighborhoods affected by the COV-ID-19 crisis.

Pack Away Hunger gave 16,000 meals to ProAct Indy to distribute to three high-need neighborhoods in Indianapolis and to No Questions Asked Food Pantry on the city's Southside on April 21.

"The only way we are going to get through this unprecedented time is by leaning on each other," said Derrin Slack, ProAct Indy founder and chief program officer. "I have seen inspiring grassroots efforts from many community members, nonprofit organizations, churches and communities step up for our neighbors who have been adversely affected by CO-VID-19, so partnering with an organization like Pack Away Hunger, who is being intentional about sustainably meeting our community's needs is a no-brainer for us. It is not the act of service that is going to get us through these times, but for our relationships, our people."

"Our meal distributions went very well, and our community partners were so grateful to receive them," said Allison Avin, director of communications for Pack Away Hunger. On May 5, Pack Away Hunger will hold a socially distanced staff pack-athon called #GivingTuesdayNow.

"Essentially #GivingTuesdayNow is a worldwide call to action to support nonprofits and communities," Avin said. "Traditionally there is just one #GivingTuesday, which takes place the second Tuesday in December each year. With this crisis, the organizers of the movement recognized that nonprofits and communities need help now.

"Under normal circumstances we hold meal packing events with businesses, churches, etc. Obviously under current conditions we can't hold those events which has diminished our ability to pack meals for local families. The six members of our team will be packing meals for six hours and we will use the opportunity to raise donations for the meals. The meals will then be distributed into the community in the following weeks."

The goal for #GivingTuesdayNow is to raise \$5,000. "Meeting that goal will help ensure we can continue providing meals to our local partners," Alvin said. "Let's come together to create a wave of generosity, citizen engagement, action from business and philanthropy and support for communities and nonprofits around the world."



Center Grove student starts free grocery service delivery

A Center Grove senior is helping homebound people in his community by providing a grocery delivering service for free.

Dylan Godsave, who has operated online businesses since he was a freshman, created South Side Delivers about three weeks ago in response to concerns about COVID-19.

"I have a team of people working with me and I was in a meeting and someone asked, 'What are we doing about this pandemic?' That's when we started pondering and I came up with an idea. We thought about the resources we have and how we could use them for the greater good," he said.

Godsave quickly built a website for the business and added locally owned businesses with products available for delivery as well. Customers may order face masks from Drop Shop; hats, T-shirts, hoodies and blankets from Coffey Connection Graphics & Apparel and bath bombs from Casual Cosmetics.

Godsave, along with about 30 high school and college students from Center Grove, deliver ordered items within one to two days. Drivers adhere to CDC guidelines by wearing gloves when picking up items from local stores, applying hand sanitizer every 10 minutes and sending an SMS message via text after dropping off deliveries to customers' front porches.

"There's a big need for what we're doing," Godsave said. "That's what drives us to do our best. We've received exceptional feedback through the community. A lot of people ask how they can help. I try to push local businesses. They are needing help."

South Side Delivers accommodates one order per household per week; there are no deliveries on weekends. A delivery map can be found on the website: southsidedelivers.com.

The business will continue to operate as long as there's a need during stay-at-home orders through the government and health officials, according to Godsave.

Southside food pantries in need of donated items

Several Southside food pantries are in desperate need of donated items due to economic challenges from the COVID-19 pandemic and are asking their communities for help.

"We have seen an influx of people and families since the virus hit," said Christina Nelson-Canfield, who operates Michelle's Little Pantry in Greenwood. Michelle Waugh Dahl runs the pantry's Franklin location. "We are both 24-hour community based. However, we have had to shop with monetary donations when we can to fill the void."

When schools closed in March, the pantries gave away 50 spring break bags.

"Over these past four Wednesdays, our Hornet Pantry has passed out over 1,300 meals and groceries to over 400 families," said Angel Calvert McKenna, facility manager for Hornet Park Community Center. "We've also made food deliveries and have provided boxes of food to families in need as those calls come in. Many in our community understand the need and have been generous with their support and donations, but we are in need of that help once again. If you have some of the items at home to spare or would like to donate a grocery store gift card, we could really use your help."

Most of the pantry's needs include the following: rice, pasta, pasta sauce, peanut butter, jam or jelly, macaroni and cheese (a lot), cereal, granola bars, fresh or dried fruit, ramen noodles, pudding, boxed or bagged bread products, such as pizza crust, cornbread or pancake mixes and canned items, including tuna, chicken, ravioli, beans, tomatoes and soup.

Nelson-Canfield said the Little Free Pantry locations need personal care items, such as soap, shampoo, laundry detergent, diapers and wipes. "Anything you can do would help," she said. For more information, visit Michelle's Little Pantry on Facebook.

With their kids always at home these days, a number of parents have been thrust into the role of teacher, which for many comes as a responsibility they never imagined for themselves.



- Akira (1987): Another gorgeously animated movie, this one though decidedly not for younger audiences, Akira is a feast for the eyes with a lot of thematic meat to chew on. A young biker works as hard as he can to try and rescue his friend from the

clutches of a government conspiracy.

- The Big Short (2015): The true story of the people who saw the 2008 economic crash coming and profited from it. Made in the style of a dark comedy, you won't believe your eyes and ears.
- Donnie Darko (2001): Famous for its endless complexities and obtuse story, it remains one of the greatest cinematic mysteries ever. A high school student begins to have visions of the end of the world and only he can figure out exactly what these visions mean and why he is seeing them.
- Fist of Fury (1972): Bruce Lee at his best. While this film is slightly less popular than his later work like Enter the Dragon, make no mistake Lee is at the top of his game as he fights to defend the Chinese honor in the face of foreign oppression.

- Short Term 12 (2012): A prestige drama that has been lost to time, Short Term 12 is an emotionally raw and intense film. It follows the residents and staff of a care unit for at-risk teens, as they struggle with their own personal traumas, both the staff and residents. This one will rip your heart to bits and then put it right back together again.
- The Conjuring (2013): The peak of modern horror referencing classics of the genre. James Wan makes one of the scariest haunted house films imaginable, all the while holding the audience perpetually at the edge of their seats.
