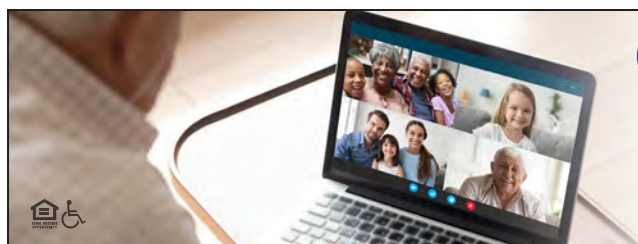

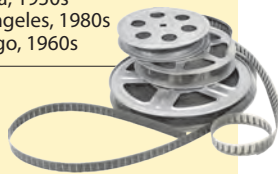

A degree in social work can lead to a variety of career paths, including case management, counseling, community outreach and social justice.

In Amy Matthews' case, the degree led her to urban farming.

Matthews, a native of Perry Township, worked with food banks and anti-hunger organizations after graduating college and learned about gardening as a community development tool. She worked as an apprentice at a small family farm in Montana and traveled to Cleveland and Chicago, where she discovered urban farming. She toured Thailand and Nepal, learning about gravity irrigation and using cow manure as a fuel source. "The holistic ways farmers work with the earth in their communities was really eye-opening," she said.

Holistic Partnership

Matthews realized that she enjoyed working outdoors, being her own boss and using the principles of holistic farm management. In 2011 she partnered with a nonprofit community that had recently purchased 1 ½ acres of land on South Meridian Street. "They wanted to use it for urban farming," she said. Matthews rented the land, calling it South Circle Farm. As she grew the business, she partnered with Matthew Jose, who farmed on the east side of Indy, and the two combined their markets. They found a third partner, rural farmer Leslie Gottschalk and created Mad Farmers Collective. Since then,

two more farmers have joined the business: Molly Bergen and Jonah Tabb.

Mad Farmers Collective uses only organic farming methods. "It's definitely a choice made intentionally," Matthews said. "Our crops and soil are really healthy. We're learning how to manage pests and diseases in an organic way. We have a whole toolbox of techniques to make sure the crops thrive and survive using organic methods."

A wide variety of vegetables are grown throughout the year, including spinach, swiss chard, peas, carrots, greens, scallions, peppers and onions. "We also grow and provide transplants for customers to start their own gardens," Matthews said.

Southside Presence

Mad Farmers Collective has a strong Southside presence. Produce is sold at Wildwood Markets in Fountain Square and Garfield Park Farmer's Market. The business also partners with local restaurants, including Amelia's, Milktooth and Turchetti's.

The pandemic created a challenge for the

farm this spring as local restaurants make up nearly half of its business. Yet, Matthews has online ordering for customers to pick up produce at the farm. "That's been a really good evolution for us, and we will continue to do that even when we get back to the farmer's markets," she said.

Mad Farmers Collective also educates the community on farming through tours, internships, dining events and partnerships.

Chin Gardening Project

"Amy and I began working more closely together as we began to discover the love of gardening that the Chin refugees have here on the Southside," said Linda Adams, community wellness coordinator with the Purdue University Extension Service. "I began to see that it would be wonderful to be able to bring the resources of Purdue Extension to the Chin community. Not being a gardener myself, I relied heavily on Amy Matthews to guide our planning with the Chin community for what type of educational workshops and projects might be most helpful.

Amy's knowledge of small-scale farming, farmer's market vending and local food distribution networks and needs have been key. Amy confidently laid out the best plan for us to start the Chin training garden, which is a demonstration garden project that we started at the Falam Christian Church."

Mad Farmers Collective has plans to add a production business on a couple of acres near Adrian Orchards next summer. "We have a lot of work to do to get it in production," Matthews said. "We're excited to have a home base and expand what we do. We'll have more plants for spring and fall gardens, we'll transplant vegetables and we're excited what that brings."

Garfield Park Confederate memorial removed following order from Indy mayor

A statue built in honor of Confederate prisoners of war who died at an Indianapolis camp during the Civil War is on its way out. This morning, crews dismantled the Garfield Park memorial, as local media and a handful of area residents watched.

The statue had been located in the park for more than 90 years. It was built in 1912 and previously housed in Greenlawn Cemetery. Indianapolis officials and members of the Ku Klux Klan wanted the memorial to be prominently displayed, so it was moved to Garfield Park in 1928.

Last week, Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett ordered that the statue be moved. The city had attempted to donate

the statue to a museum without success. "Our streets are filled with voices of anger and anguish, testament to centuries of racism directed at black Americans," said Mayor Hogsett in a statement. "We must name these instances of discrimination and never forget our past – but we should not honor them. Whatever original purpose this grave marker might once have had, for far too long it has served as nothing more than a painful reminder of our state's horrific embrace of the Ku Klux Klan a century ago. For some time, we have urged that this grave monument belongs in a museum, not in a park, but no organization has stepped forward to assume that responsibility. Time is up, and this grave marker will come down."

Following recent protests, Several American cities with confederate statues have also ordered their removal.

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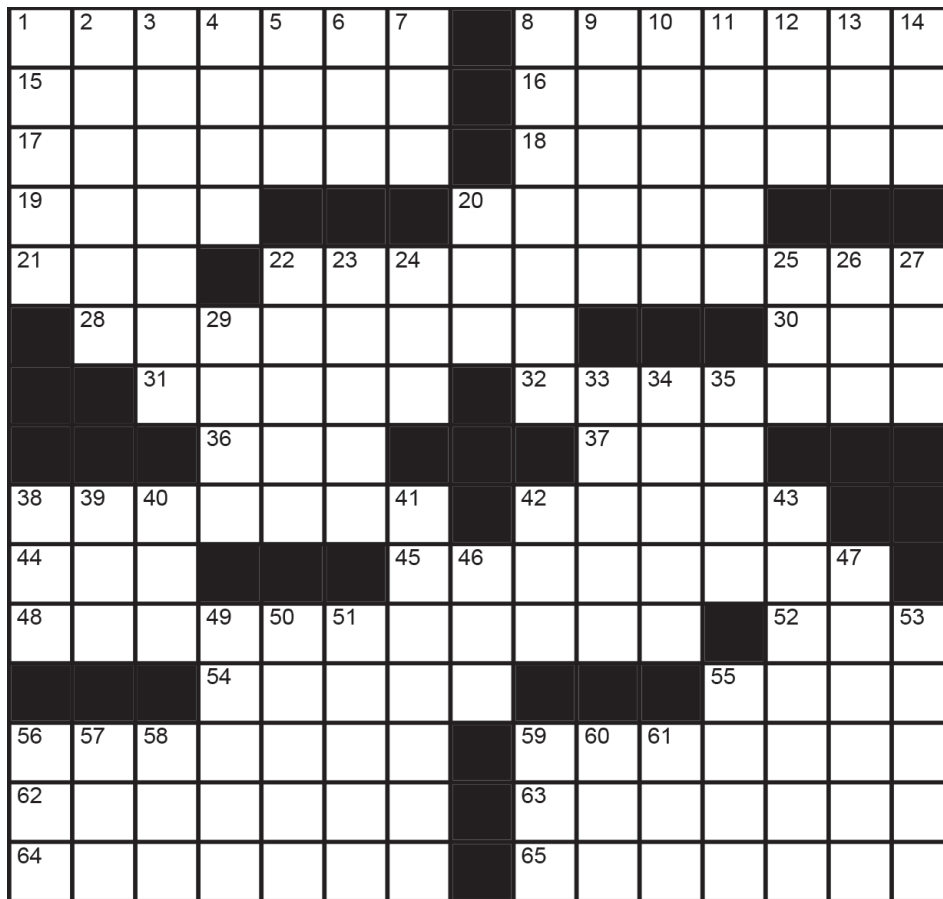

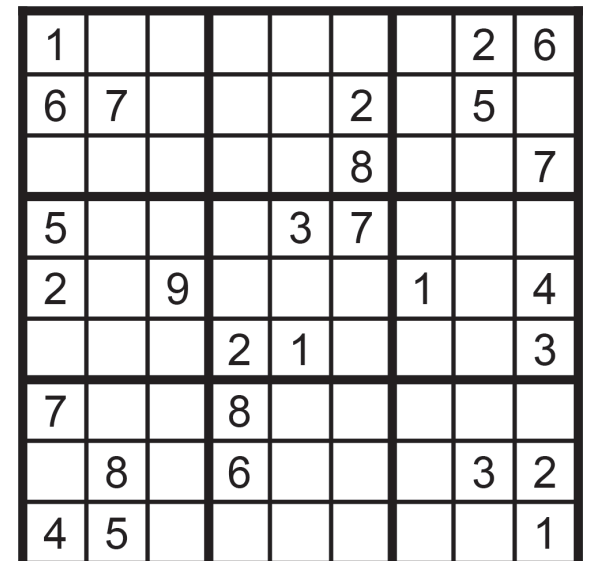

About 50 Southside residents showed their support of local artists and businesses when they attended First Friday on Main Street last week.

“The businesses that participated were very busy,” said Claire Dillehay, an artist with the Beech Grove Artist Collective. “New Dey Bakery eventually sold out of their pulled port sandwiches and Beech Bank Brewing had a lone line and wait at one point. As far as the artists, we were more than happy to be there and share out some positive and creative energy on Main Street. Quite a few of us were able to sell some artwork, too.”

A number of Beech Grove residents marched along Main Street to show their support of people of color, led by Brent Crouch of Beech Grove. “Basically, it’s something I talked to my daughter, Daysha about and how we could do something to show our support for our own people of color here in Beech Grove,” Crouch said. “I posted the event on Twitter and she spread the word to her friends. I organized it with the help of the Beech Grove Police Department.”

The Beech Grove Artist Collective plans to host next month’s First Friday on July 3. “We plan on keeping the majority of the activity outside and will continue to encourage other safe practices such as social distancing and wearing masks,” Dillehay said.

Little-known facts about Flag Day

Sunday, June 14 is National Flag Day, commemorating the adoption of the flag of the United States on June 14, 1777 by resolution of the Second Continental Congress.

Below are some facts you probably don't know about this national holiday, courtesy of noodle.com:

- **FLAG DAY WAS INVENTED BY A TEACHER.** Bernard J. CiGrand was a 19-year-old one-room schoolhouse teacher in Wisconsin in 1885. He struck a 10-inch flag in an inkwell, asking his students to write an essay on its meaning. CiGrand spent about 50 years writing in support to make Flag day a national holiday.
- **CIGRAND'S PARENTS WERE FROM LUXEMBOURG,** a tiny European country between France, Germany, and Belgium. The name "CiGrand" comes from a variation of the French for "so grand." He championed our "Grand Ol' Flag!"
- **ALTHOUGH CONGRESS FIRST RECOGNIZED THE UNITED STATES FLAG IN 1777,** the discussion was the fifth order of business that day. Apparently, not a big deal for U.S. history at the time.
- **JUNE 14 (IN 1775)** was the date Congress formally authorized the enlistment of soldiers into what was then called the Continental Army.
- **FLAG DAY IS NOT A FEDERAL HOLIDAY,** although Pennsylvania recognizes the date as a legal state holiday.
- **THE NATIONAL FLAG DAY FOUNDATION SPREADS FLAG DAY AWARENESS.** The foundation teams up with local groups like 4-H and VFW Scouts to spread the word about the holiday and to keep the tradition going and hopes to have a flag in every classroom, cultivate a respect of our country's symbol and teach the history behind the flag.

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If Beale Street Could Talk Hope in the face of impossible odds

Cinema is an extremely powerful medium for telling stories about humanity. Barry Jenkins' adaptation of James Baldwin's 1974 novel, *If Beale Street Could Talk*, is, if not anything else, a story about humanity. It tests the limits of love, faith and hope in a story so grounded it will leave you just as furious as inspired. Jenkins is dealing incredibly dense and complex subjects in this film and it would be easy for him to make a film that is brooding and angry, but instead he uses hope and love to drive his narrative to masterful results.

If Beale Street Could Talk follows lifelong friends turned romantic partners Tish and Fonny. Together they



struggle to get by in an unforgiving 1970s New York that is particularly discriminatory toward young black people like them. In a nasty twist of fate supplemented by racial prejudices, Fonny gets framed for rape. From this point the narrative pivots to Tish and her family's unrelenting effort to seek justice for Fonny, as Tish learns she is carrying Fonny's child.

Jenkin's adaptation of Baldwin's novel reads, in many points, like a stage play. Many sequences are meticulously blocked out and the dialogue ranges the gambit from heart-warming confessions all the way to razor-sharp wittiness. Additionally, he sets his camera in positions that highlight the space between actors and draws attention to how characters move within that space. Accentuating the unique style of the film, bright yellows, blues and reds saturate the frame with a color palette that evokes an old school technicolor feel. All of these

choices make *If Beale Street Could Talk* an extremely stylistic watch.

Do not get the wrong idea though, through all the style of the film, it remains a grounded story about two people desperately in love with one another. KiKi Layne playing Tish and Stephan James playing Fonny are so wholesome and sweet, their time on screen together is hard to look away from. Their relationship oozes sincerity and care for one another. It is their relationship that pushes the film forward and forces the audience to consider how you can keep pushing in the face of such impossible odds. The film is decidedly angry, and it has every right to be. It finds a quiet strength within the hope that in the future, with a lot of effort, from all of us, things can get better.

If Beale Street Could Talk is available to stream on Hulu.

When Beech Grove High School senior Sarah Ramsey heard that she had been awarded a scholarship from the Beech Grove Comprehensive Drug Free Coalition, she almost couldn't describe the joy she felt. She didn't think any scholarships were in the works for her.

"When I was notified about the award, it was such a surreal experience, it literally felt like time had stopped, and I was overcome with joy," she said. Ramsey's father had passed away, and she and her mother were grappling with finances. "It has been a struggle for me and my mom in deciding whether we could afford for me to go to college. My dream was to attend Purdue University; ever since my freshman year of high school, I was afraid that if I didn't get any scholarships I wouldn't be able to go," she said.

Diane Hendricks, executive director of BGCDFC, said she was very happy for Sarah and pleased to be able to recognize someone who so richly deserved the scholarship. "She just deserves this so much. We didn't know about everything she'd been dealing with until recently," Hendricks said. "Sarah was fifth in her class of about 250 students and has a dream to become a psychiatrist."

Ramsey said she feels her dreams are back on track after she received the scholarship.

"My mom and I spent a lot of time go-

ing over the numbers trying to see how we could make it work, but it didn't seem like it would be financially feasible up until I was awarded the scholarship," she said. "When I got the notification that I was awarded the scholarship, I cried and realized that I would be able to attend the school of my dreams."

Sarah's character is very impressive, according to Hendricks. "She really is just the kindest, sweetest person. So appreciative," she said.

"This opportunity means the world to me. I am so happy and grateful!" stated Ramsey. "This organization has changed my life for the better and I can't thank them enough."

In order to be a candidate for the scholarship, Ramsey was required to have a mental health-related goal for her education and meet additional prerequisites. "She met all requirements with flying colors," Hendricks said.

"Beech Grove alerted all seniors of the scholarship and the qualifications were that I had to have a GPA greater than or equal to a 2.7 and had to plan to attend a university to focus on the study of mental health conditions," Ramsey said. "I had to write an essay on what drew me to pursue a career in behavioral health and I just spoke truthfully from the heart. Because of the CDFC scholarship, I can now confirm that I will be attending Purdue University to study psychology at the Honors College! In the future, I want to continue working in behavioral health, advocating for more mental health awareness."

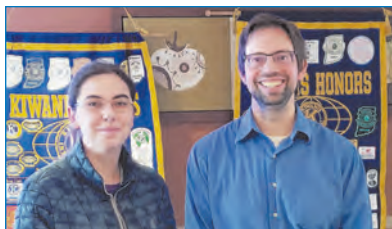
