

#### A tribute to a late, local journalist: Fred D. Cavinder reminds us of our roots

#### **HAUNTS & JAUNTS**

Reprint of a 2016 Southside Times article

The December 23, 2015, article about author and news writer, Fred D. Cavinder, featured in *The Southsider Voice*, brought a moment of pause, and even longer bout of reflesction about a man whose career has centered around writing about things that you and I, as Hoosiers, should never let slip by the wayside.

Every once in a great while we have these gurus of journalism that come along, shining like a beacon of light to remind us of our past and illuminating just how far we have come as the years have rolled forward. Once these voices are silenced, we tend to lose a piece of ourselves.

Cavinder was a former reporter and feature writer for The Indianapolis Star. He began his tenure with them in 1956 (the year I was born). I remember always seeking out the "Cavinder" articles in the newspaper during the 1970s. In 1969 he began a new stint - 16 years as the editor of The Indianapolis Star Magazine. Cavinder settled comfortably into the niche of purveyor of Indiana topics, based upon communities, places, people, trivia and obscure facts. It was where he wanted to be in his writing. Thus began a weekly history lesson to those paying attention; a reflection of little-known facts immersed within a state he'd called home for the majority of his life. He won many awards throughout the years for his feature writing and accompanying photographs. Yet, it was always about the message: remember where you came from. The past always influences the future.

Cavinder retired from *The Indianapolis Star* in 1993; however the pen and stories never left his hand. There were books – beginning in 1985 – dealing with little-known Indiana facts and trivia that continued publication into forthcoming years. Cavinder strongly be-

lieved slices of the past should never be lost to time and progress. He painted a canvas of who Hoosiers were and pointed toward who they would become in the future. He contributed articles for Southside newspapers, *The Spotlight* and *The Southsider Voice*, continuing his historical slant with the latter until 2014 when he turned 83 years of age. Perhaps it became time to place the pen in the cup holder and let someone else carry on. Life seems to have other plans often not foreseen.


Fred D. Cavinder lived in a health care facility in Greenwood during the latter years of his life. Unable to put a pen to paper, to comprehend what he was reading, or work on watercolor paintings, he became a prisoner to his body. When we are young, we never imagine such a thing happening. When we become older, it becomes a game of chance. Yet while our body ages, our minds never lose that sense of youth, or what we have accomplished. These very eyes always remain the eyes of our youth, dreams and expectations. Cavinder's eyes continued to sparkle with this sense of youth.

There's always a story to tell, and sometimes one with a twist. Fred Cavinder told them well, preserving a wealth of Indiana history that will carry down through the years as a new generation calls Indiana home. And for one man – and a career of a life lived – it all fell into place at the perfect point in time. One has to make a living, and Cavinder did just that, revolving around his passion – Hoosier history. It doesn't get much better than that!

Fred D. Cavinder passed away at the age of 86 on May 13, 2017.

### **BETTER EGGS FOR A BETTER TOMORROW**

HATCH for Hunger helps Southside residents facing food insecurity

#### **By Nancy Price**

When Linda Adams, a Southside community wellness coordinator for Purdue Extension – Marion County, learned that due to CO-VID-19, she would have to work from home immediately and indefinitely, she cleaned out her cubicle at work and went straight to the grocery store to stock up on needed supplies.

"Having been a Kroger co-manager earlier in my career, I had seen snow scares before, but it was immediately obvious to me that this was very different," Adams said. "These stores would soon be out of food. All while I was waiting in line to check out my groceries that day, I knew there would be a direct impact on the food pantries."

"In March there was such a panic among the people," added Bill Boone, founding director and CEO of Servant's Heart of Indy, a Beech Grove pantry. "They didn't know how to react to being told to stay in. Many were hoarding food because they thought they wouldn't be able to get out."

#### A Perfect Protein

Adams is part of the Nutrition Education Program funded through federal SNAP-Ed. She works to remove barriers that make it difficult for people with limited resources to access proper nutrition.

"When the shut-down orders were announced, the local food pantries mostly all switched to drive-through distribution with limited paperwork for clients," she said. "The number of clients food pantries were seeing went up immediately; likely due to job loss and due to the grocery stores being out of

food. But through it all, we consistently had a supply of eggs due to this distribution networked provided for HATCH for Hunger."

HATCH for Huger, a nonprofit organization, was created in Indianapolis in 2015 to provide high-quality protein to people facing food insecurity. The organization is a partnership between Elanco, a division of Eli Lilly & Co., food stores and farmers to provide eggs to undernourished people. HATCH works with Rose Acre Farms, based in Seymour, Ind. and MPS Egg

Farms in North Manchester, Ind.

"Currently HATCH is responsible for about 80,000 dozen eggs per month making their way into food banks and food pantries serving Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Missouri and Arizona," said Randy Reichmann, CEO for HATCH for Hunger. "Over 2,500 food pantries have access to eggs thanks to HATCH. Most food banks are dependent on food donations and can't always supply protein to the hungry. HATCH was created to be a dependable source of protein in markets we serve."

"Getting adequate protein is critical to living a healthy life," Reichmann continued. "Protein is important for healthy physical and mental development and eggs are an affordable source of high-quality protein. We know kids that are hungry aren't as healthy physically and experience slower cognitive development. Eggs are simply a great way to get needed protein into the bodies of those who need it most."

try summit hosted by the Indy Hunger Network (IHN) for Indianapolis-based food pantries. "As part of that one-day conference, they had breakout sessions that divided all the food pantry leaders by Indianapolis townships so they could meet and begin collaborating," she said. "The Southside

Last year, Adams attended a food pan-

group was definitely interested in working together when they could. The Indy Hunger Network began hosting quarterly Perry/Franklin Township food pantry meetings. We hosted HATCH for Hunger at one of those meetings to discuss what was needed to be able to establish an egg delivery.

tablish an egg delivery spot in our area. Our food pantries had limited refrigeration space, so it would be hard for any one pantry to hold a skid of eggs. I offered to recruit additional food pantries into our group and offered to be the order captain to get everything started."

#### **Double or Nothing**

In April last year, representatives of Southside pantries gathered at Servant's Heart of Indy, a Beech Grove pantry. The deliveries continued monthly with about 600 dozen eggs. By July, HATCH was delivering to Servant's Heart twice a month. "That was the secret to our success," Adams said. "Our monthly orders jumped up to an average of 1,100 dozen eggs; nearly doubling our orders. The twice a month delivery have made managing the refrigeration space so much easier."

Each participating food pantry is now able to give each family a dozen eggs, according to Adams. "Food pantries that never had eggs available before now have them available all the time," she said. "Food pantries that were buying eggs off the shelf at the local grocery stories do not have to do that anymore. So, this saves time, money and volunteer resources. One of our food pantries mentioned that as their stock of food diminished during COVID, they began giving each food pantry client family two dozen eggs. That is exactly why we do this and why this HATCH for Hunger egg distribution system is so important."

# Central Catholic teacher retires, remembered for making learning creative and fun

Students and staff at Central Catholic School are recognizing an educator who wore many hats during her 30-year tenure. Theresa Mendez, a recent retiree, served as an art and STEM instructor; as well, she was the school's librarian, taught computer classes, led fundraisers and became the school's unofficial event planner.

"Theresa is the spirit of teaching and learning," said Patty Wulf, a second-grade teacher with Central Catholic. "If there is a way to make learning fun, she has been the person for the job. She worked so hard to build our STEM program. Her eyes light up at the thought of new projects that will inspire her students. Her ability to organize large events and create community is a gift to the faculty as well as the students. She has a strong desire to instill a love for reading in our students. She orders books from the Indianapolis Public Library for our school library, so they have new books often.

"The fact that she has taught 20+ years without her own classroom is a testament to her dedication and flexibility. The children anticipate the sound of the 'art cart' rolling into the classroom. She does it all with a smile and a humble heart."

Mendez taught art to students from pre-K through eighth grade. Older students wove baskets, made Muslim angels, drew self-portraits, dioramas and learned the history of many famous artists, according to Barb Taylor, a former first-grade teacher at Central Catholic who now leads small groups for students in

Kindergarten through eighth grade. "Being the first to arrive at school at 6 a.m. every morning, Theresa has always prepared amazing art projects for the students," Taylor said. "She works tirelessly, and always with a smile!"

Margee McHugh, who teaches religion and science to eighth-grade students, said Mendez went above and beyond expectations when she started the STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) program. "Students who struggle academically have come alive during STEM," McHugh said.

"As an art teacher, STEM teacher and librarian, (Mendez) inspires our students to be creative, to be lifelong problem solvers and to read," added Taylor. In addition, "she has always gone above and beyond planning social and seasonal activities throughout the school year for both students, staff and their families."

Mendez began an organized an annual event at the end of the school year to celebrate reading, called the Mega Event, to recognize students who met their goals while participating in the Accelerated Reader program.

"Grades K-5 would come for the festive events; games, activities and a play put on by the teachers, and after having pizza, K-2 would leave and grades 3-5 would stay all night; watching a movie on the big wall and sleeping in the gym, then donuts in the morning before being picked up," McHugh said.

Mendez also started Technology Fun Night; older students participated in competitions and younger children enjoyed carnival games, according to Taylor. "Theresa was the morale booster and party planner," she said.

In 2003, Mendez received the Saint Theodora Guérin Excellence in Education Award given by the Office of Catholic Education for the Archdiocese of Indianapolis.

#### Indiana drivers will be penalized for holding and using a cell phone starting next month

This week wraps up Distracted Driving Awareness Month, but starting July 1, Hoosiers will be penalized for holding and using a cellphone while operating a motor vehicle. House Bill 1070, signed into law by Gov. Eric Holcomb, prohibits motorists from holding or using a cellphone while driving unless they use hands-free technology (for example, a Bluetooth or cradle). The only other exception is in an emergency situation when they need to call 911.

Drivers violating this law can be fined up to \$500; repeated offenses may result in the loss of a driver's license.



Last Saturday, Southside residents could officially say good riddance to spring and welcome the summer. "It isn't too late to plant. You will want to make sure you keep everything watered up and fertilized. If things get big and leggy on you, you can cut them back and that will help them look fuller. In two weeks they will look like you bought them in May," said Heidenreich.

Heidenreich said Heidenreich Greenhouses will be open until the day before the Fourth of July, Friday, July 3. They will reopen in August. Watch their Facebook page and *The Southside Times*.

# Family-owned Greenwood vacuum cleaner store sells thousands of personal protective items

Mark's Vacuum & Janitorial Supplies is one of the few Southside family-owned businesses that has not only remained opened for business throughout the pandemic but prospered tremendously as well.

While locals searched high and low for toilet paper, cleaning supplies and personal protective equipment (PPE), regular customers of the vacuum cleaner business stocked up. The past three months, the business has sold 9,000 boxes of gloves, 9,000 boxes of masks, 500 gallons of hand sanitizer and 3 million wipes.

"The (local) stores were out but we had a lot of things, especially gloves and masks and hand sanitizers and the wipes," said Mark Cleary, president of Mark's Vacuum & Janitorial Supplies. We sold out a couple of times. People didn't know we had toilet paper; we've been selling it for years. We tried to take care of our regular customers that have bought from us for years. Anything ex-

tra we have we let the public have it."

The business also donated PPE to local food banks, Franklin Heritage, Inc., Franklin Parks & Recreation, Berean Baptist Church in Greenwood and the Athenaeum Foundation in downtown Indianapolis.

Besides vacuums, steamers, disinfectants, carpet cleaners, gloves and paper products, Mark's Vacuum & Janitorial Supplies sells air cleaners, mist-it foggers, electrostatic sprayers, floor cleaning equipment, rental equipment and ozone generators. "We try to find American made when we can," Cleary said.

Cleary started Cleary Vacuum in a small house on Madison Avenue with his father, Paul "Bud" Cleary, in 1973. In 1978, their business moved to the corner of Troy Avenue and Meridian Street and in 1990, Cleary left to start Mark's Vacuum & Janitorial Supplies with his wife of 32 years, Marcia. The business is located at 959 Sayre Drive in Greenwood.

"It's been a great 30 years and we look forward to serving you in the years that come," Cleary said. "Thank you, central Indiana! We couldn't have done it without you. Thank you for your business and your friendship."



### Your health and safety is our top priority

The recent worldwide COVID-19 pandemic and other impactful news of late has



taken the attention of many of us away from one of our most important priorities, maintaining our good health.

Eskenazi Health encourages everyone to remain vigi-

lant by having regular checkups and staying current with vaccines and medications. To that end, the following measures are being taken at all Eskenazi Health facilities to protect you and our staff during the COV-ID-19 pandemic.

- · Many appointments with Eskenazi Health providers of late have been taking place via telephone or through telehealth visits. This will continue, but we are also carefully resuming some in-person appointments and procedures.
- · We are keeping the number of visits and procedures that we do each day much lower than usual to decrease the number of people in our buildings.
- · Everyone in Eskenazi Health facilities is required to wear a face mask. This includes all patients, visitors and staff members and we will provide masks for those who need them. Masks reduce the spread of the virus, especially from people just coming down with the infection who may not know they are getting sick. We wear masks to protect others, not just ourselves.
- We are screening people entering our buildings for illness. We do not allow our staff to come to work if they feel sick.
- · We have placed hand sanitizers at all entrances and where patients and staff travel in our buildings. Please use them when you are here.
- We are cleaning all surfaces that people touch, such as door handles, table tops and

the arms of chairs, frequently. The procedures we use to clean all of our patient care rooms are proven to kill the virus.

- · We have arranged waiting areas to keep people well separated to adhere to social distancing guidelines
- · We are limiting visitors to one adult visitor for patients undergoing procedures. No visitors, including children, may accompany patients to clinic appointments or procedures. Again, this is to reduce the number of people in our buildings. Please contact your treatment team in advance if you need someone to attend your appointment with you.
- Eskenazi Health also encourages you to wash your hands with soap and water five to 10 times a day
- · Don't touch your face if you haven't first washed your hands.
- · Wear a mask when you're outside of your home. A cloth mask that covers your nose and mouth, fits closely to your face and is washed every day greatly reduces the transmission of the virus.
- · Practice social distancing: try to stay at least 6 feet away from people, even when both of you are wearing masks.

People who believe they may have been exposed to COVID-19 should contact their health care provider immediately. If you are ill with flu-like symptoms such as fever, cough or shortness of breath, please call your health center or clinic before coming to your appointment. 
#### Beech Grove City Schools online registration begins July 1

School registration - If your child attended Beech Grove City Schools (BGCS) during the 2019-2020 school year, you may register online beginning July 1. An email with a link and directions will be sent to all current families before July 1. If your child attended our developmental pre-school and will be entering kindergarten at Hornet Park Elementary School, you will need to attend in-person registration. We would prefer kindergarten students register on July 7, but they are welcome to register any of the three days of registration. All incoming kindergarten students are considered "new to the district" and will need to register in person (preferably on July 7). If your child attended BGCS during the 2019-2020 school year, and they are just changing schools (for example, they attended Hornet Park Elementary as a first grader, but are now a second grader and will be attending Central Elementary School), they are considered a returning student and you may register them online. If you are new to the Beech Grove district, are a transfer student, or do not have internet access at home, you will need to register in person.

#### **Shirley** Director Josephine Decker bends reality to her whim

#### **MOVIE REVIEW**

Horror pioneer Shirley Jackson's writing is both idiosyncratic and highly influential. First shocking readers in June of 1948, her

short story, The Lottery, became an instant culture war. Critics heaped upon her praise while general audiences were turned off by the seemingly needless brutality of the conclusion that left them without a satisfying resolution. The New Yorker magazine claimed at the time they received more mail over this piece of fiction than any other piece they had published up to that point. Jackson herself has said the letters ranged from bewilderment to outright abuse. The air of tension and a strong sense of overwhelming dread be-

came a staple of Jackson's work and it is those key elements that Decker masterfully adapts to film that make Shirley so successful.

Set in the 1950s, the film is told through the perspective of a young newlywed couple Rose and Fred, played by Odessa Young and Logan Lerman, as they escape their small town in pursuit of Fred's career in academia. Shirley Jackson and her husband, Stanley, played by Elizabeth Moss and Michael Stuhlbarg, take in the newlyweds briefly as

Stanley promises to help Fred adjust to the university. However, what begins as a friendly gesture of hospitality slowly morphs into something more sinister, as the lines between reality and fiction begin to blur.

Decker's adaptation of Susan Scarf Merrell's novel of the same name is less faithful to the truth of Jackson's life so much as it is true to Jackson's writing. The film is constantly putting the audience in an uncomfortable middle ground between reality and some great unknow-

able force of evil. It's a confusing, often hazy film that I have no doubt will be as polarizing as Jackson's own work. Some will love it and others will sit in quiet bewilderment as the credits roll. One thing you cannot call this film is lazy or uninspired; Decker has a clear vision for her film and doesn't give an inch of it in the name of compromise.

Despite its reality bending cinematic trickery, the film is grounded in traditional means of quality, exemplified by the excellent script and impressive performances from each of the four main characters. The chemistry between the four of them is a joy to see on screen, but the star of the show is Elizabeth Moss. She adds a strong sense of inviting complexity to a character that in the hands of any other actress would have otherwise been instantly unlikable.

Shirley is a stylistic homage to Jackson's work and a deep dive into her psyche that I expect will leave audiences split down the middle. But if it's ambition you're looking for in films, make no mistake, this one is not to be missed. Shirley is available to stream on Hulu.
