Former Beech Grove Mayor and Chief of the Beech Grove Police Department J. Warner Wiley, 83, died Sunday, July 12 at St. Paul Hermitage. A lifetime citizen of Beech Grove, he became the city's first graduate from the FBI National Academy, known as the "West Point" of law enforcement, and in 1985, he served as president of the academy. 2019, the Beech Grove Police Department was renamed the J. 'A PART OF THE COMMUNITY'

Indianapolis Rotary Club forms liaison with Chin Community of Indiana

In the past 20 years, 70,000 refugees from the Chin state of Mynmar (Burma) have flocked to the United States to escape religious persecution and forced labor. Around 20,000 of those immigrants live in Perry Township, Southport and Greenwood.

"The (Burmese) government is the reason I came here," said ZaBik Bualteng, executive director for the Chin Community of Indiana (CCI). "Even my brother-in-law, he was arrested twice; he did nothing wrong as a (Christian) pastor and leader. They targeted pastors, they punished too many pastors. The religious persecution is huge."

Ten years ago, the Chin Community of Indiana (CCI) opened in Perry Township to serve as a community liaison to help refugees find employment, offer ESL classes and locate community services and resources. In the past five years, the center has needed additional funding for resources as the Chin population's growth has spiked.

A GROWING **POPULATION**

"Our Chin population is growing very fast," said Bualteng. "People know this is a good place to live. The money they make, and the expenses is very good, and housing is very cheap compared to the cities of Dallas, Washington, D.C. area, Denver. Housing there is very expensive. Those people get, like, \$10 an hour right now, even

in Dallas, but here, many people are starting at \$16 an hour because of Amazon and all the other warehouses."

In 2015, Jeff Lake, past president of the Rotary Club of Indianapolis and current assistant governor, was discussing potential grants with the club's foundation board when a member recommended the Chin

Center. "I was chosen as the liaison with the Chin Community of Indiana, so I've been working with them since 2016 when the first grant was given," said Lake. "We provided a \$250,000 grant; \$50,000 a year for five years."

The club's funding has provided salaries for staff, utilities and other operating costs. "Primarily it's for them to be able to operate at the highest possible level, because without that money they wouldn't be able to have the staff and other things they currently have," he added. "We also have a Chin support committee that's going to meet quarterly, with ZaBik, and our whole intention there is to find out, 'What are your needs? What is the current status of the Chin community and what are their needs?' Now we have other human resources that maybe we can help with, that they have a need for real estate or banking or whatever the case may be. And they tell us, and we try to find someone who can help. And in a large club like ours, we have a lot of people, we do things to help them."

The Chin Center also relies on donations from its 40 local Chin churches (there are 40) in addition to its members, though often members can afford very little due to supporting their families locally and in Burma. As well, locating employment the past four months has been even more difficult for the Chins due to COVID-19.

The Indianapolis Rotary Club has given a three-year extension to continue to support the Chin Center.

"Za's only been here since March but he's already started a youth council, a business club," said Lake. "So things are happening at an accelerated pace, so that helped our foundation board realize it's a good idea to extend the grant three more years. They have a fairly small location here. It's kind of a small

place to handle all they do. At some point they may want to have their own separate freestanding facility somewhere else."

Bualteng referred to the Rotary's extension and his friendship with Lake and other club leaders as "exceptional" and also extended his appreciation for those in his local community, including donations from the Marion County Health Department and the time schoolteachers give to help Chin

students. "They are just like missionaries for us," he said.

Lake said a goal of the Indianapolis Rotary Club is to help the Chins assimilate into their local community. "We don't want them to be just a separate entity, a bubble," he said. "They want to be a part of the community. We want them to be a part of the community."

Marion County schools permitted to start classes as scheduled for the 2020-21 school year

The Marion County Public Health Department has given permission for schools in Marion County to reopen with their original opening dates, with recommended guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and other professional organizations. Individual schools may choose to implement more rigorous protocols. Guidelines are as follows:

- Increased access to cleaning supplies and hand sanitizer for staff and students
- · Cloth face coverings or masks for teachers, ancillary staff and students in sixth grade or higher
- Students should be seated 3-6 feet apart; arrange for teachers to be 6 feet apart from students when possible
- · Cohort students as much as possible using a team approach (the same students stick together and rotate as a team)
- Require all students who are sick to be fever free for at least 72 hours before returning to school; designate an area where symptomatic students can wait for pick-up separate from clinic area; limit items to be shared between students
- · Transportation by personal vehicle encouraged; bus drivers should wear face coverings; students expected to wear a face mask during transportation
- For COVID positive symptomatic, at least 72 hours must have passed since recovery (resolution of fever without the use of medications and improvement in respiratory symptoms) and 10 days have passed since symptoms first appeared
- · For COVID positive asymptomatic, students must be excluded from school; a return to school 10 days from the positive test assuring no symptoms developed
- For no COVID test symptomatic, exclude from school; return to school if at least 72 hours have since recovery (defined as resolution of fever without the use of medications and improvement of respiratory symptoms) and 10 days have passed since symptoms first appeared
- For reporting cases, designate a contact person or team within each school, preferably a school nurse

Why microchipping is the best option for identifying your lost pet

It used to be that a tag was the best way to identify a lost pet. This worked well enough assuming it was not lost or damaged while your pet was on the run. As times have changed so has your option of identifying your lost pet. Microchips are now the best option when it comes to reuniting a lost pet to his or her owner.

Microchips are small, about the size and shape of a grain of rice. It is implanted over the shoulders with a needle which is usually very quick and easy to do. It contains a small chip that can be read with a handheld scanner.

When a chip is implanted it is very important to be sure to have it registered in the national database. You can link all kinds of information to your chip. The registry includes your name, address, phone numbers, emergency contacts, pet's name, breed, health info, photos and more.

Some chip makers also offer other services to help you reunite with your lost pet. Examples of these services include medical help lines, insurance to cover travel costs for distant lost pets and help contacting vets and shelters with lost pet notices.

It is always such a happy moment when someone brings a lost pet into the clinic and we scan and find a microchip. We can call the owner right then and get the pet back home as soon as possible. Everyone loves a happy ending.

We also assure that we will ALWAYS take our animals back no matter how long they have been gone.

Indiana implements T-21 law

Indiana's Tobacco 21 law went into effect July 1. - Long-term decrease in health care costs and significant reduction in preventable deaths
- Decreased second and third-hand smoke exposure
- Improved perinatal outcomes and reduce premature births.

Palm Springs A tired trope gets a trendy, comedic refresh

Popularized in the 1993 Bill Murray classic Groundhog Day, the idea of a time loop

has captivated international audiences since its introduction. From arthouse critical darlings like Primer and Run Lola Run to blockbuster genre films like Edge of Tomorrow and Happy Death Day, the allure of a story structure so simple it just repeats itself over and over is simply irresistible to screenwriters. So then, with a proliferation of these films in the current market the only reason to produce one is if you can figure how to differentiate your take on the idea from the trove of pre-

existent material. This is exactly where Hulu's newest exclusive, Palm Springs begins to show signs it might fall short of creating its own identity. Despite this, the film is consistently entertaining, but does little to distinguish itself from the tired trope, ultimately making it feel disposable.

Starring internet darling Andy Samberg and the criminally underworked Cristin Milioti as Nyles and Sarah, Palm Springs takes place in the titular town as the characters are

gathered to celebrate Sarah's sister's wedding. Upon their meeting at the reception they hit it off and in the process of getting to know one another, Sarah is accidentally entered to the time loop Nyles was, unbeknownst to her, already stuck in. What follows is a predictable, if not entertaining, film about love, familial relationships and the nature of the universe.

The concept of two people trying to make it through eternity with one another is rife with potential for facilitating all kinds of philosoph-

ical messages about modern life, relationships, or just about any existential ideology. This is precisely why it is so frustrating then, that Palm Springs essentially boils down to an extremely by the number's romantic comedy. Proved as the far-out time travel narrative device is quickly dismissed as mere window dressing for sickly-sweet romanticism.

It isn't all bad though; the story maintains a quick pace so that I never found myself bored during the film. In fact, throughout the film I was consistently entertained by the genuine intimacy between Samberg and Milioti's characters. Their evolution from broken and jaded to open and emotionally venerable is admittedly well written. However, its fatal flaw is that whatever message the filmmakers set out to communicate is drowned in romantic platitudes and comes up feeling short on actual substance.

Palm Springs is by no means a bad film, just a disappointing one. It is absolutely a good time while it's on, but the film's lack of ability to find its own voice might leave you struggling to remember much of anything about it just a couple days after viewing. Palm Springs is available to stream on Hulu.

6 Seeing therefore it remains that some must enter therein, and they to whom it was first preached entered not in because of unbelief:

7 Again, He limits a certain day, saying in David, To day, after so long a time; as it is said, To day if ye will hear His voice, harden not your hearts.

8 For if Jesus (Joshua) had given them rest, then would he not afterward have spoken of another day.

9 There remains therefore a rest to the people of God.

HEBREWS 4:6-9

This is such an important subject that I dare not be remiss in the discussion of it. Those who lived in the past missed the point. In the time of Moses there were only two men who got it right (three, if you in-

clude Moses). These two men were given the blessing of going into the land that God had preserved and promised to His people. His people then were those who believed and trusted in God to deliver on what He promised.

Joshua and Caleb were the only two survivors of the original group that left Egypt to go to this land and to inherit it from the Lord God. The rest that were numbered in the millions did not believe and died as wanderers in the wilderness, which was just in sight of the promised land. Thus, the question, "How shall we escape if we neglect so great a salvation?" becomes more relevant than ever. We shall not escape if we neglect the "great salvation" that the writer of Hebrews is speaking of because this salvation is promised by a greater than Moses. It is promised by our Savior, Jesus Christ.

There is a rest that we receive when we are forgiven and sanctified in this lifetime. There is an even greater rest for the saints that endure to the end of their lifetime on this earth knowing that they are only sojourners here and that this world is not their intended promised land. Heaven is that eternal resting place for all of the saints of God who endure the false accusations and misunderstandings and who patiently run the race to the end of the race. Praise the Lord, I want to be counted among the numbers of those who did endure to the end and who have entered into a rest that we can only imagine.
