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## Shadow figures: Myth or fact? A paranormal author explains

Wikipedia defines shadow people as: *“Supernatural shadow-like humanoid figures that, according to believers, are seen flickering on walls and ceilings in the viewer’s peripheral vision.”*

They are claimed to be viewed as unrecognizable fleeting shadows out of the corner of an observer’s eye for just a few seconds. I’ve heard stories where they weren’t human shaped at all ... more like a ball or a fluttering blanket. And occasionally some, as I have personally experienced, witness these masses straight on; no need for peripheral vision here. We’ve concluded these figures have been around for a very long time. And appear to share a consistent familiarity, they are the most reported type of ghost sighting. Yet, opinions about them vary among paranormal investigators.

Some report them as menacing, scary, creepy and harboring evil intent. Some feel they are the true form of a ghost. Some claim they are time travelers and/or inter-dimensional beings on a visit to our current time and place. Many have also arrived at a theory that these flickers of darkness amongst the shadows are on a personal mission to watch over and guide us along life’s path; a dark form of guardian angel? However, those who take a different slant feel shadow people are a result of physiological and psychological conditions: sleep deprivation or paralysis, illusions, hallucinations, the beginnings of dementia, drug or alcohol use, or the side effects of medication.

Jason Offutt, author of *Darkness Walks: The Shadow People Among Us*, commented: “Many shadow people encounters do seem to mirror ghost encounters, and are the most common type of shadow person encounters: a blacker-than-night, human-shaped shadow that people see walking through their bedroom, hallway, living room, etc. These shadow people are most benign, usually not taking notice of those who observe them.”

It’s 2 a.m. and you’re at that moment in an investigation – sitting in the dark with a body and mind tired from being in a constant state of intense observation. Your mind has kicked into a melancholy mode of autopilot. Nothing has happened for hours. You continue to ask questions to an empty room, trying to draw a response that will be captured on a digital audio recorder. Your camera purrs away on the tripod. You sit and watch. The silence is al-

most deafening ... and then it happens! Out of the corner of your eye you catch movement – darker than the already black of the room, solid and slinking off to your left. You quickly turn your head as your heart begins to race; you see nothing. You accelerate into a state of high alert, fighting to focus your eyes into a small section of the room. Then it happens again, only this time you are looking straight on as a dark mass moves out of the corner, slides along the wall and disappears into the opposite corner.

Your heart is really racing now. Adrenaline is surging like a runaway train!

The brain takes charge, trying to rationalize what you have just experienced. Was it the product of tired eyes; a hanging eyelash; floaters skimming across the surface of the cornea; a passing car’s headlights filtering into the room, creating an optical illusion? Or ... was it the real deal? Shadow people!

Paranormal investigations will continue its steady and sure path down the misty road of secrets to try to arrive at answers to these questions.

# GETTING A HEAD START — AS A — YOUNG ADULT

Leadership Johnson  
County's Youth Leadership  
Academy helps high school  
students learn life skills

Learning to budget personal finances, understanding how to work with different personality types and knowing how to network are skills most of us don't develop until we get our first jobs and live on our own.

Some local high school students and recent graduates already have a head start on these life lessons thanks to their participation in Leadership Johnson County's Youth Leadership Academy.

Leadership Johnson County is an adult community leadership training program at Franklin College designed to help citizens develop leadership skills and community awareness through educational workshops and seminars to assist individuals and their organizations thrive in a competitive business environment.

## FUTURE YOUTH LEADERS —

"Leadership Johnson County celebrated its 25th anniversary in 2019 and in response to this, the Youth Leadership Academy was established," said Amy Kelsay, a 2003 graduate of the Leadership Johnson County (LJC) program and current Youth Leadership Academy Coordinator. "LJC does a fantastic job of teaching leadership to adults so this provides a great opportunity to work with youth leaders."

The Youth Leadership Academy is a five-month program for select Johnson County residents and high school students (they must complete an application in advance). To participate, students must be sophomores or juniors (or are home-schooled at that level).

"The program is designed to help students learn about their community and how they can make a difference as a student leader," Kelsay said. "They gain knowledge and skills that will prepare them for their future in terms of communication, collaboration, financial management and networking. The skills gained through the Youth Leadership Academy are designed to help these students not only in their high school careers but also

later in life. It helps to build their network of people who care about our youth in Johnson County and encourages the students to step out of their comfort zones."

Participants attend an opening-day retreat in early August, appear at four scheduled class dates throughout the year, complete a community service project and present the project at the graduation celebration. Once students complete the program, they will earn one college credit at Franklin College.

## LEADERSHIP AND PERSONALITY —

Maecee Terhune, a recent Greenwood Community High School graduate, participated in the academy's first program class last year. "I learned the most from personality traits because I was able to learn about all the different traits that everyone possessed," she said. "These traits are the reason people act how they do and what part of their personality shows. I learned that I am an 'orange' personality trait, which means I am outgoing and I'm not afraid to voice my opinion. This shows in my leadership because I am a leader who is verbal and talks to people and will stand up for what I believe in to make a change."

"I think the parts I probably learned the most were from the finance and history days," added Bryce Rayner, a Center Grove senior. "The finance days taught me things that they don't really teach in school that is useful for life, like budgeting and shopping tips. The history day helped me feel more connected and engaged with my community."

During an all-day retreat, students from various Johnson County high schools learned names of those attending by playing an ice breaker. Participants had to state the name of the person they passed an object to in order to help them remember names while working together in a group project. "We proceeded with the day and chose our group project and spent more time getting to know others and learning the importance of involving everyone in your team," Terhune said.

## NEW FRIENDS —

"Going into this group I did not know anyone at all. The first meeting I was terrified to go because I was worried it would be uncomfortable and I wouldn't have any friends," she added. "I quickly made friends with many people there. I still talk to a lot of them and they have become people I really count on in my life."

Rayner said he would recommend the academy to others because he found the program to be a good learning experience, yet fun. "Youth Leadership Academy has changed me and prepared me for college by helping me learn about my own values and how I interact with people," he said. "This will help in the future with job positions and leading groups."

## Roncalli High School to remove 'Rebels' nickname

A special task force consisting of Roncalli High School students, staff, alumni, parents and board members will be assigned this summer to help choose a new nickname for the school, according to Roncalli Interim President Father Robert Roberson.

The announcement on June 22 followed a decision for high school officials to remove the "Rebels" nickname, which has negative connotations attached to it and "are also a source of concern as we move forward over the next 50 years," said Terese R. Carson, vice president for Institutional Advancement for Roncalli.

"We have had alumni and community members express concerns about how this nickname can be misunderstood, particularly as it relates to our deep commitment to honoring the dignity of every person, as Christ calls us to do," Carson said.

The school's nickname was inspired from Angelo Roncalli, St. John XXIII, "an amazing leader who called for the Second Vatican Council, despite objections from many church leaders who were satisfied with the status quo," Roberson said. "Roncalli knew that the world was changing, and that the

church, guided by the Holy Spirit, was called to adapt and to change as well."

"As we've learned more and more about St. John XXIII, it's clear that characterizing him as a rebel, in many ways, misses the mark," added Roncalli Principal Chuck Weisenbach. "He was a saint who was deeply rooted in his love for Jesus Christ, his devotion to the Catholic faith and his respect for the dignity of all people."

"Moving forward, for the next 50 years, we wish to embrace the spirit and the courage that St. John XXIII demonstrated when he called the Second Vatican Council by considering a new nickname for Roncalli High School," Weisenbach continued. "A nickname that better reflects the character of our namesake. A nickname that will better honor Angelo Roncalli's life and ministry by reflecting the Catholic faith and the commitment to Christ that characterized his life."

Roberson acknowledged that there may be some community members saddened by the name change. "But, as we look forward to the next 50 years, we believe that this change is essential in order to better serve our mission as a Catholic high school, where we seek to advance the Gospel message of Jesus Christ and form young people to live their faith," he said.

There are no details on when a new nickname is expected to be announced.

## Health Department announces changes to COVID-19 testing sites

**COVID-19 testing** – The Marion County Public Health Department announces changes to its COVID-19 testing sites and schedule. The moves are part of an effort to make free community testing accessible to residents across Marion County who live in areas most affected by COVID-19. Drive-through testing has ended at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway and Warren Central High School locations. Free community COVID-19 drive-through testing is available at the Marion County Public Health Department's South District Health Office, 7551 S. Shelby St., on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Current testing outside the health department's main building at 3838 N. Rural St. will continue, but with a change to Wednesday hours. Testing is available on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. Wednesday hours are being extended to 9 a.m.-6 p.m. The criteria for testing at these sites include those who are experiencing the following symptoms:

- Fever
- Cough
- Shortness of breath
- Chills
- Muscle pains
- Headache
- Sore throats
- New loss of taste/smell

With or without symptoms in any of the following groups:

- Seniors over 65 years of age
- Those with weakened immune systems
- Frontline essential workers

Residents with symptoms of COVID-19 or who meet the other testing criteria can register by visiting [MarionHealth.org/indycovid](http://MarionHealth.org/indycovid). ## Terri Bradley retires after 40 years serving Baxter YMCA

For the past 40 years, Terri Bradley has been a familiar face at the Baxter YMCA for people of all ages. She's taught swimming to children, worked with fitness needs for older adults and partnered with local organizations to start healthy programs, cultural events and fundraisers.

Earlier this month, Bradley announced that she will be retiring this year to spend more time with family, though she will miss her "work family": members, staff, volunteers and "partners of all ages."

"What a joy it is to see those who participated in programs continue the Y tradition of raising their kids through programs, getting Y jobs, volunteering as a coach, board member, etc.," Bradley said. "It is great to watch the young parents of yesteryear continue their memberships as grandparents. Seeing three generations of a family and hearing their stories lets you know the Y is doing a lot right in serving the neighborhoods. Opening after the COVID closures, I have heard so many say they didn't realize how much the Y is part of their lives and are so thankful we are open again."

Bradley began working at the Y as an

intern during her senior year of college. After graduating, she accepted a job as a youth and family program director and assisted the association office in starting the IPS Before and After School care program. She took a break from her duties to raise her children and came back, gradually adding more hours to work as an active older adult/volunteer coordinator. Bradley transitioned into a new role as member involvement director and, five years later, became the associate executive director.

Linda Adams, community wellness coordinator for Purdue Extension-Marion County, recalled partnering with Bradley in 2016 to start a program spearheaded with Baxter YMCA and Franciscan Health, called Healthy Southside Initiative. The program was designed to help encourage Perry Township and Greenwood residents to increase their physical activity and eat healthier.

"Terri was super helpful at evaluating the information we gathered and helping us choose initiatives on which to work," Adams said. "Terri has spent decades getting to know the members of the Baxter YMCA and other community members that working with her and getting things accomplished was easy."

Scott Splichal, co-president of Perry

Township Kiwanis, remembered Bradley's resourcefulness when she coordinated a project to help families at the Ronald McDonald House through Riley Children's Hospital. Bradley is the YMCA representative through Perry Kiwanis. "What a great liaison," Splichal said of Bradley. "She gets the date set, round up volunteers, orders all the items needed and is there to make sure everything goes OK."

Bradley, along with representatives from the University of Indianapolis and Perry Township Schools, helped to start the Perry Cultural Festival, which brings ethnic communities together on an annual basis for an evening of music, song, dance, crafts and food.

"She has such energy and love for the people in our community," said Peter Thawnghmung, president of the Chin Community of Indiana. "She is approachable and is committed to get everyone in the community involved in the Y activities. We thank her for being so open and inviting to our community members."

"Terri made a difference in so many ways," concluded Bobbi Finley, wellness director with Baxter YMCA. "She fought for inclusion and showed true passion in making sure everyone felt welcome at Baxter."

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## Chief Laut to retire from Greenwood Police Department

Greenwood Police Chief John Laut has announced he is retiring after serving the department for more than 30 years. His last working day will be Aug. 28.

“Eight years in executive police leadership comes with stresses and worries that take their toll,” Chief Laut explained. “We have made so many changes at the department, but a new chief can keep making progress in ways that I have not thought of. Police work evolved constantly, and I am ready to let someone else make all the decisions that need to be made daily.”

Laut decided to become a police officer when he was an Indianapolis Police Explorer. “I view a career in law enforcement more of a calling rather than a career,” he said. He was hired by the Greenwood Police Department on July 5, 1988. He was promoted as a detective and sergeant and in 2011 was assigned to the United States Marshal Service fugitive task force. In 2012, Laut was promoted to chief by Greenwood Mayor Mark Myers.

A lifelong Southside resident, Laut graduated from Southport High School in 1981. He graduated from the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy in 1988 and received a degree in criminal justice from IUPUI in 2008. In addition, he received training at the FBI National Academy in 2006 for executive police leadership.

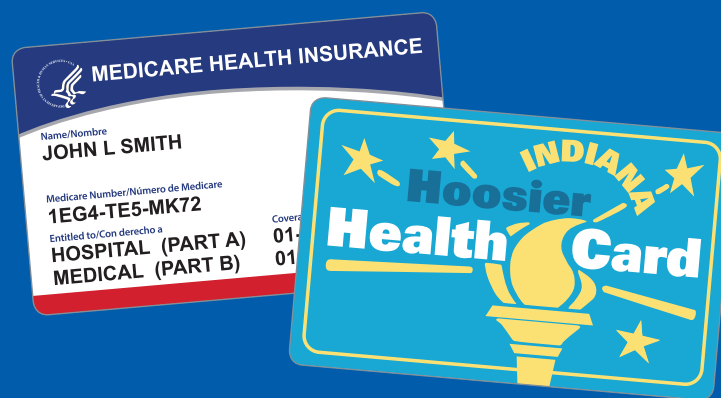
Laut recalled how law enforcement has changed in the past three decades. “In 1988 we carried 6-shot revolvers, a nightstick and shotguns,” he said. “We now carry semi-automatic pistols, patrol rifles, tasers, chemical OC spray. We are better trained in so many areas than we were in the 80s. Police officers today have to be computer savvy and are better educated.”

Under Laut’s leadership, the Greenwood Police Department has grown in the number of officers, was one of the first agencies to implement a body-worn camera program and created a crime analysis position.

A small celebration will be held at the Greenwood Amphitheater on Laut’s last day, where Greenwood Mayor Mark Myers will issue a proclamation.

## More Hoosiers unemployed during COVID-19 turning to alcohol to cope

More than one in five (21 percent) of Hoosiers recently unemployed are turning to alcohol, according to a study by American Addiction Centers.

The Department of Labor has reported that more than 40 million Americans lost their jobs in the nine weeks since the pandemic's start. In addition, the stress of being homebound limits support for those with new financial strains, as well as mental distress caused by lockdown.

As well, more than one in 10 (14 percent) of survey respondents admitted they would also turn to alcohol if they lost their job in order to cope with mental and financial stress. An additional 5 percent said they would turn to drugs to help with pressures associated with job loss.

The following is a guide for employees to notice symptoms associated with substance abuse. If more than one of these symptoms is noticeable, there is likely an issue that must be addressed:

- Tremors
- Bloodshot eyes and constricted or dilated pupils
- General drowsiness during the workday or falling asleep on the job
- Being late to work
- Drop in job performance and increased errors
- Mood swings and angry outbursts
- Isolation & withdrawal from the team
- Forgetfulness & impaired concentration
- Panic attacks
- Paranoia

If you notice a colleague exhibiting these symptoms, American Addiction Centers suggests taking the following steps:

- Document incidents where you notice your coworker's symptoms, recording the time and date of each.
- Go to your supervisor
- Consult the company's HR department for guidance and advice on how to proceed.

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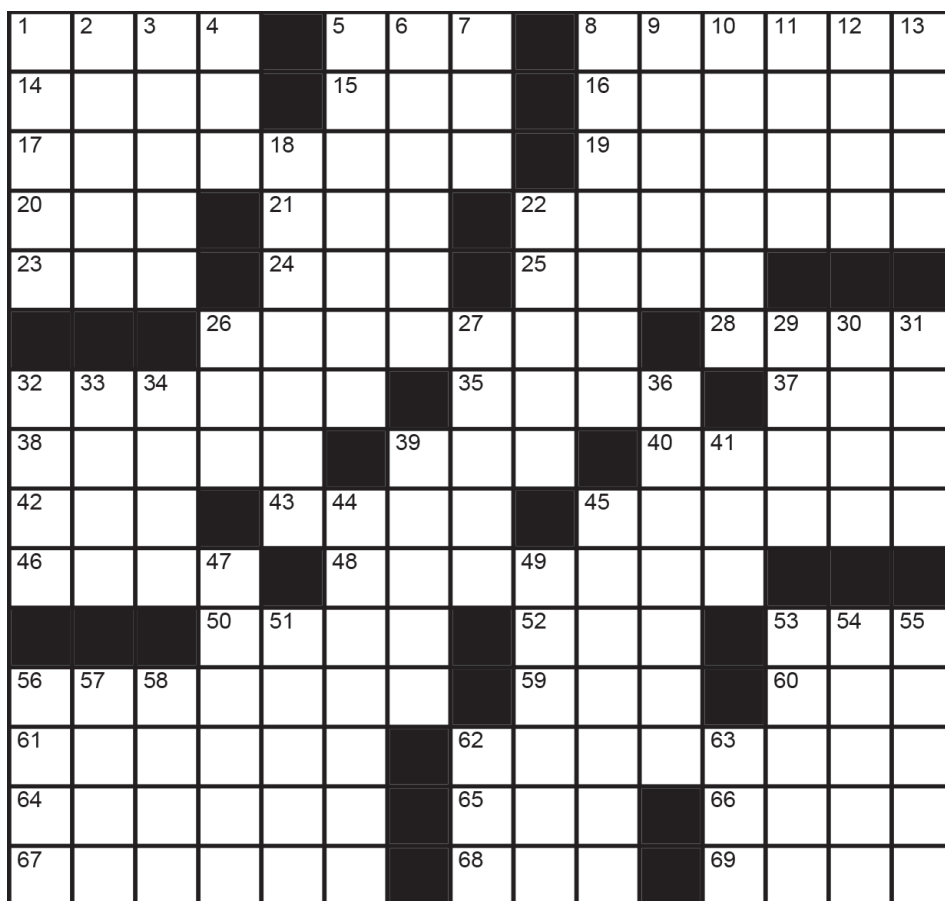

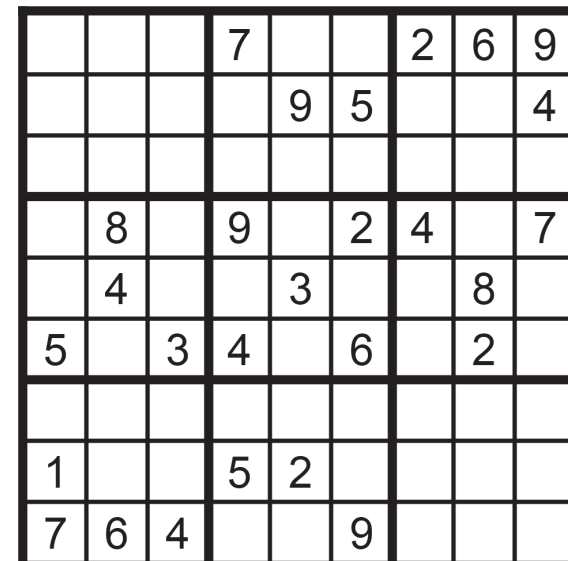

## Up to 84,118 Indiana K-12 students may lack internet access at home

**Online learning** – When K-12 classes start across Indiana, schoolteachers may have students whose educational achievement suffered due to the lack of internet access during the pandemic, says a new policy brief from Ball State University (go to [projects.cberdata.org/176/how-many-school-age-children-lack-internet-access-in-indiana](https://projects.cberdata.org/176/how-many-school-age-children-lack-internet-access-in-indiana)). The study found that about 68,649 to 84,118 Indiana school-age children do not have internet access at home and that the most urban areas of the state (including the city of Indianapolis and northwest Indiana near Chicago) and the most rural parts of the state have the highest percentages of households without internet access. Michael Hicks, director of Ball State's Center for Business and Economic Research (CBER) and the brief's lead author, pointed out that various studies over the last decade suggest that moderate and monitored home computer/internet use has positive impacts on children's social development, cognitive development and school performance. CBER's study found that among households with school-age children and without internet access, most are single parent households (57 percent), have parents not in labor force (18.9 percent), are low-income families (35.5 percent), have non-English speakers at home (22.4 percent) and are households living in rental property (49.3 percent). The study also found:

- About 42,413 households or about 6.5 percent with school-aged children do not have internet access at home.
- The absence of broadband access disproportionately affected students in families with characteristics that already challenge academic success.

Hicks said CBER's research points out that the interruption of school in March 2020 resulted in wide variation in delivering online education because there are large gaps in internet access across the state.

## How to stay productive while working from home during COVID-19

COVID-19 has forced a new way of life upon many of us where working from home full time has become the new reality that we never expected during our careers. This new arrangement has become a welcome and comfortable change from normal work routines for many individuals, but for others it's been a struggle in finding ways to remain productive when home life offers numerous distractions.

Working from home can be a lonely exercise in this era of social distancing and the temptation during work hours to catch up on chores, play with the kids or binge watch something on Netflix while occasionally checking work emails is ever present.

Successful careers are based on developing certain traits or habits that have proven to be beneficial, and here are some helpful tips that can help you stay attuned with those practices while working from home.

- **Keep your morning routine:** Set your alarm for the usual time and follow your usual routine as you always have.
- **Set specified start and end times:** If you normally get to the office and start working at 8:30 a.m., then make that your start time every day. You should also have a set stop time as well. Be mindful that the barrier between home and office blurs so you often end up working more hours than expected if you don't set a time to cease working each day.
- **Designate a separate workspace:** It's wise to set up a place where you will work every day and do all you can to keep it away from potential distractions, such as a televi-

sion. Even if you carve out a corner of your bedroom to work, make sure everyone in the house knows this is your workspace and request that you remain undisturbed as much as possible during each workday.

- **Always be available and responsive:** It's especially wise while working at home to be as responsive to the needs of your coworkers as possible during work hours. Not being instantly available can arouse suspicion as to what you're really doing at home while out of sight from your supervisors. Being instantly available during this time provides you a great opportunity to prove that you're trustworthy and focused on your job.
- **Keep regular meetings:** If your team has regular meetings through video these days, be sure you continue to attend those get-togethers. It's important to check in with colleagues regularly to make sure everyone's doing well and able to handle their workloads.
- **Work arrangement:** If you ordinarily work with multiple computer screens at the office, you may want to invest in a second or third screen at home as well. Some individuals have arranged to bring home their entire office setups, docking station and all, while others have invested in removable screens that hook to their laptops. You should try to replicate the setup that you have in the office.

## The 400 Blows The coming-of-age film, perfected

### MOVIE REVIEW

Increasingly in the age of streaming, the services providing films and television to consumers are shifting their focus from obtaining pre-existing content to developing wholly original works. This is not inherently a bad thing; in fact it gave way to a few of the best films of last year; *The Irishman*, *Marriage Story* and *El Camino*, just to mention a few. However, as a result, classic films, specifically those released before 1980, have been disappearing from services like Netflix, Hulu and Amazon Prime. This is why it is so refreshing that HBO's new streaming service, HBO Max, has partnered with Turner Classic Movies to provide what is unequivocally the best selection of classic movies on a major streaming platform currently available. And what better way to celebrate that, than to pay tribute to not only one of my favorites but to a hugely influential film, François Truffaut's *The 400 Blows*.

Truffaut's debut feature film after transitioning from a hot-headed and opinionated film critic to a director won him 1959's Cannes Film Festival's prestigious Palme

d'Or prize. The same Cannes Film Festival which had banned Truffaut a year earlier for decrying the festival as out of touch with modern cinema. *The 400 Blows* follows a stand in for Truffaut himself in the form of the neglected juvenile delinquent, Antoine Doinel, as he navigates the cold city streets of Paris, just as Truffaut did as a youth. Antoine's tale is told through a series of vignettes that interconnect very carefully while our protagonist must come to terms with a world that doesn't hate his existence so much that it is wholly indifferent to it.

As a critic, Truffaut was incredibly harsh on the tradition of quality films France was known for at the time and found much more value in genre pictures and B-movies coming out of the U.S. Undeniably, *The 400 Blows* intended no less than to entirely redefine the identity of French cinema. Truffaut's idea of the director as author manifested itself not only in the film's intensely personal subject matter, but in the technical aspects that made up the film. *The 400 Blows* made use of match cuts, freeze frames, long takes and jump cuts so innovatively that it almost doesn't even register as incredibly unique today because of just how apparent its influence is felt in modern cinema.

That is not to say *The 400 Blows* is just a

technical marvel; rather it uses these techniques to enhance the emotions of the story. Antoine acts out because of and despite negligent parents, overly aggressive instructors and apathetic law enforcement. These acts are all informed by a longing desire to get the love and attention required during adolescence to shape an identity and become a well-adjusted adult. It paints an honest depiction of adolescence that is as fun as it is awkward and as liberating as it is downright imprisoning. It is a confusing period in life and the film's frenetic visual style reflects the confusion of its main subject beautifully. Countless directors have attempted to draw meaning from transitory periods in young adulthood, but none are as successful as the first film from French New Wave pioneer François Truffaut. *The 400 Blows* and many other classic films well worth your time are currently streaming on HBO Max.

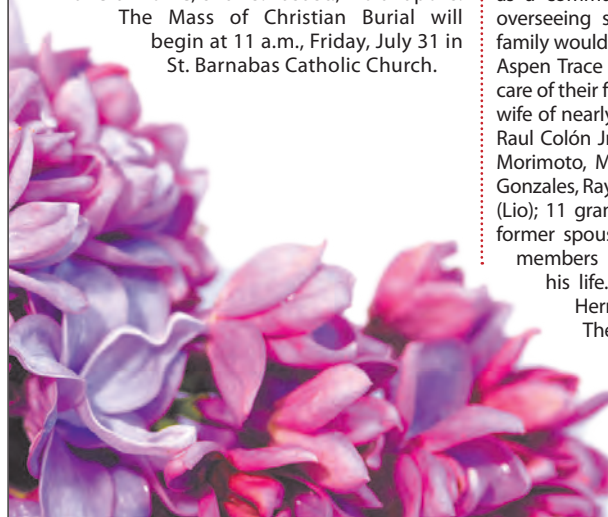

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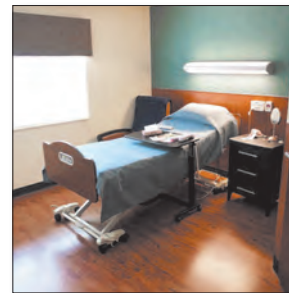
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
