

## Digging up Dillinger: Part I

John Dillinger – a man who drew admiration despite his crimes – has become the thing of folklore. The native son of Indiana has drawn not only criticism, but also praise from many circles, in effect, becoming a mythological figure that draws upon the imagination of a time far removed of where we are today. You would think case closed, yet, 85 years later it has been reopened. Now there are plans to exhume his body – digging up Dillinger! Crown Hill Cemetery is not commenting about it.

John Dillinger was born in 1903 in Indianapolis. His mother died when he was very young. It's said that he lived on the inner east side of the city and then the family relocated to the inner Southside. Then came the final move as a teenager when his father moved to a small farm in Mooresville, south of the city. His father remarried and thus began the period of time for John encompassing a strict father, new stepmother and several additions to the family. However, Dillinger wasn't one to hang around for long under those conditions. In 1923 he joined the Navy, but after discovering that it was not going to solve all of life's problems, he deserted that plan. A two-year marriage at the age of 21 capped off the end of his young adult years. It was time to move onto something else.

A stolen car driven from Mooreseville to Indianapolis is what initially earned Dillinger his Navy tour. It was also what began a life of crime. His first heist, with Ed Singleton, was a botched grocery store holdup for which he was made the scapegoat – receiving a 10-year prison sentence of which he served 8 ½. He was released on parole

in 1933, four years into the Great Depression. He had learned a lot in prison. It was an education worth exploring. He formed a gang. Check out the history for yourself, yet in summary:

- A string of bank robberies – Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa and South Dakota – racking up some \$300,000 overall.
- Prison years in Pendleton and Michigan City (the sad fact is he spent most of his adult life in prison).
- Raiding police stations for guns and bullet-proof vests.
- Various jail encounters, some being busted out by his gang, some busting them out, and an elaborate escape from Crown Point using a carved wooden gun colored with shoe polish.

This list is by no means all inclusive. The Great Depression produced hard times for folks just to survive and put food on their table. And keeping their homes! Banks were portrayed as the villain for foreclosing on property. Was Dillinger the “Robin Hood” of folklore – taking from the rich and giving back to the poor? Hardly. While generous to his friends and family and a hefty tipper, he was fond of cars, clothing and ladies of ill repute. However, it was one of these ladies who ultimately did him in. The FBI was on the trail, quickly gaining ground on Public Enemy No. 1.

### Greater Greenwood Chamber and Johnson County Development Corp. announce economic development

**Economic Development** – The Greater Greenwood Chamber of Commerce and Johnson County Development Corporation (JCDC) have announced plans to merge the two organizations. Greater Greenwood Chamber and JCDC boards voted in favor of the merger plan July 17. The plan now moves to the memberships of both organizations for a final vote. “In 2017, the Greater Greenwood Chamber began researching how we could further advance the success of our members,” said Rick Myers, current board chair and publisher of The Southside Times. “We approached this merger in a deliberate and measured way to ensure our members and investors receive access to expanded networking opportunities, best practice sharing, trainings and business coaching – all with a stronger voice to advocate for business interests.” Members of both organizations will soon receive packets in the mail detailing the merger and voting processes. In the next two weeks, the Greater Greenwood Chamber will host two open houses for members to learn more about this proposed union. They will take place from 4 - 6 p.m. Aug. 14 and 20 at the Greater Greenwood Chamber office. Members from both organizations will vote on the merger Aug. 21. If members vote in favor of the merger, the new organization will be named Aspire Johnson County and will do business as Aspire Economic Development + Chamber Alliance. Greater Greenwood Chamber President & CEO Christian Maslowski will serve as president of the new organization, and JCDC Executive Director & CEO Dana Monson will be vice president of economic development. Prior to the election of an official board of directors, the organization plans to appoint an interim committee featuring an equal number of members from both the JCDC and Greater Greenwood Chamber boards. The committee will review and approve financial and operational decisions. If approved, the new organization will formally launch Jan. 1, 2020.

### Southside man starts local nonprofit for daughter-in-law and others suffering from neurodegenerative disease

According to the National Organization for Rare Disorders, Friedreich's ataxia (FRDA) is a genetic, progressive, neurodegenerative movement disorder. The typical age onset is between 10 and 15 years, but some who are afflicted may not show signs of the disease until their 30s.

Initial symptoms may include unsteady posture, frequent falling and increasing difficulty in walking. Those affected may also struggle with slurred speech, foot deformities and an irregular curvature of the spine. In addition, FRDA is often associated with cardiomyopathy, and about a third of the people with FRDA develop diabetes mellitus. It affects one in 50,000.

In Greenwood, that one is Tori Schlageter. Schlageter, 40, wasn't diagnosed until she was 34 even though she'd already been dealing with symptoms for a few years.

"I started having symptoms in my mid to late 20s and it took a few years for them to diagnose me correctly," she said. "I was misdiagnosed a couple of times before finally being diagnosed with Friedreich's ataxia."

To raise awareness of the disease and raise money for Schlageter's health ex-

penses, her father-in-law began FA Indy.

Bob Schlageter, 65, lives just outside of Southport and is preparing for the fourth annual FA Indy run/walk at 9 a.m. Aug. 17 at Freedom Springs Park in Greenwood.

"Last year we had about 250 people for the run/walk," he said. "I'm hoping we have around that many this year."

#### Who is at risk for FRDA

Bob went into greater detail about who might be affected by FRDA and why they might be afflicted.

"It's a genetic condition, so you have to have a defective gene from the mother and the father," he said. "The interesting thing about it is just because they have a defective gene doesn't mean that every child they have will develop this condition. We know families with multiple siblings and only one has it. Our daughter-in-law is one of three, but she is the only one of the three who has this. Now, another fellow who has this developed the disease in his mid-30s. His brother, though, had it all his life."

Bob said he started FA Indy because he was seeing the limitations to the kind of

help that people affected by FRDA can get.

"There is help out there but there are limits," he said. "For example, our friend Tyler had his mobility van stolen. They did find the van, and insurance totaled the vehicle, but they wouldn't cover the mobility equipment. Money had to be raised separately to outfit the van with new equipment."

Bob also said that once a patient is in a wheelchair and they're trying to navigate around a home, things like narrower doorways are a problem. He also mentioned lack of ramps for wheelchairs and lifts for stairways.

"There is nothing out there that helps people widen doorways and create ramps," he said. "A lot of this has to come out of someone's family monies. It's not the fault of these people that they have this condition."

While fundraising efforts have helped people locally, like Tori and Tyler, Schlageter said that he also sends funds to national Friedreich's ataxia research organization, the Friedreich's Ataxia Research Alliance (FARA).

“The Friedreich’s Ataxia Research Alliance is out of Pennsylvania,” he said. “We send a portion of our proceeds to FARA so that they can hopefully find a cure of some sort for this.”

Until then, Tori is plugging along, still moving around without the aid of a wheelchair.

A progressive disease

“It’s a progressive disease,” she said. “I’m still mobile and able to walk, but I’m using assistance now. I have a rollator (rolling walker). I call it my ‘meemaw cart.’ I use that now because my disease has progressed quite a bit over the last year, and I’m struggling with coordination and motor skills.”

Aside from the work her father-in-law is doing with FA Indy, Tori is thankful to be getting a lot of help from her family, especially from her three boys: Jaron (20), Wyatt (13) and Owen (10).

“They’re amazing,” she said. “They always help me clean up. My youngest one just asked if he could learn how to do laundry, so he’s been helping me by doing that. They’re good about helping me cook or clean up after dinner. And whenever we go somewhere, they’re always helping and getting my rollator in or out of the car for me.”

Tori’s family is also ready to help for the

upcoming run/walk at Freedom Park.

“For the walk, my husband, Bobby, and my boys and I will go over to my in-laws’ house, and we’ll get everything ready – the shirts and everything,” she said. “We help set up, but my boys and my husband always go and help out wherever needed. That’s really our biggest event. We did a bake sale last year that one of my friends organized. I made some homemade apple butter.”

Tori also mentioned another big fundraiser that FA Indy is planning for next April.

“Then we’re going to have an event April 25 called FA Indy Hoe Down,” she said. “We’re going to have square dancing

and food and a silent auction. My parents are actually going to put that on. So, I’ve been helping my mom talk to some organizations about donating to that event.”



**Beech Grove should pass a smoke-free ordinance for all local businesses**

Secondhand smoke is the third leading cause of death and disease in the United States, with 41,000 deaths each year coming as a result of exposure to it. Secondhand smoke can enter through doors and windows and even through vents and cracks in walls. The only way to keep secondhand smoke out of businesses is to make the whole facility smoke-free. A comprehensive law requiring all businesses to be smoke free is the best evidence-based practice to improve the health of everyone, including patrons and employees.

Beech Grove does not include bars or membership clubs in their current city-wide policy. Brenda Bishop-Kyle, owner of 1949 Tavern, says that taking all Beech Grove establishments smoke free will increase business on Main Street. "There has always been an issue with smoking in public. We have such a wonderful historic area in Beech Grove, and

we should do everything we can to attract people who want to come and spend time here," she said. "Having all smoke-free businesses on Main Street will help us keep the air clean for our workers and visitors."

The growth in smoke-free laws nationwide has led to an increase in the false claims that smoke-free laws hurt local economies and businesses. Nothing could be further from the truth. Numerous studies show that smoke-free laws do not hurt restaurant or bar patronage, employment, sales or profits. With customer expectations for smoke-free indoor air becoming the norm for businesses across the country, it is time for Beech Grove to follow suit and pass a comprehensive smoke-free ordinance to include all businesses, including bars and membership clubs.

**New robotic surgery at Franciscan Health advances lung cancer diagnosis and treatment**

**Medical** – New robotic technology holds great promise in fighting lung cancer and is being used to treat patients at Franciscan Health Cancer Center in Indianapolis. The innovation, Auris Health Monarch™ Platform, is used to view the inside of lungs and obtain a tissue sample for biopsy. The system integrates the latest advancements in technology, data science, software and endoscopy (the use of small cameras and tools to enter the body through its natural openings). Franciscan Health Cancer

Center is the only hospital in the state to deploy the robotic platform. About 81 percent of people diagnosed with lung cancer do not survive because in most cases the disease is not detected until advanced stages. The Monarch uses a familiar controller-like interface – appearing much like a hand-held game device – and combines views inside the lung with computer-assisted navigation based on 3-D models of a patient's own lung anatomy. ## Healing with fitness and faith

148 Wellness offers hope to those with addictions or who have been physically or sexually abused

Have you ever wondered what goes on in the mind and world of a person who has been physically or sexually abused? Have you ever found yourself wondering how an addict can get out of that place of desperation to thrive? David Storvick and his wife, Amber are giving these people new hope and a clean future.

148 Wellness in Greenwood was created from 148 Ministries, a nonprofit mission to help abused and addicted men and women. "The 148 in our name comes from 1 Timothy 4:8, which says, For physical training is of some value but Godliness has value in all things, holding promise for both the present life and the life to come," said David, pastor and director of 148 Ministries. The underlying mission of 148 Ministries is to share the love of Christ with people.

The couple started their ministry after Amber took a mission trip to Cambodia. Amber had been a personal trainer and participated in a program helping women that were pulled out of sex trafficking. She knew she wanted and needed to do something for the

people that are in need locally. The Storvicks prayed and decided that using fitness and faith to help those in need were what God wanted them to do.

### An all-in-one wellness ministry

148 Wellness was created to allow people to have a place where they can create

change all in one place. It is an "all-in-one" wellness center. Part of the profits from 148 Wellness goes toward helping the nonprofit organization and supporting its mission at 148 Ministries.

148 Wellness brings together physical, spiritual and behavioral wellness in its approach to heal sexual and physical abuse, addiction and other mental health issues. Clients can take advantage of a fully equipped gym with an exercise center, changing rooms and lockers 24 hours a day. Gym memberships and services

are open to the public 24 hours a day, and they will gain access whenever they want to work out with a key fob entry system. Clients can participate in services such as semi-private training, group fitness classes, rehabilitation exercise and movement-centered therapy.

Clients are offered faith-based counseling for behavioral health issues such as addiction, and they may attend small Bible study groups. They may also spend time with a trainer, a physical therapist and even a pastor if needed.

148 Wellness includes a full-service gym with rowing machines, free weights

and equipment focused on functional fitness. An area is also set aside for counseling, with its own separate entrance to ensure privacy. A conference room is available for small groups, workshops and activities. At the entrance of the facility is a lounge and coffee room where people can meet, take advantage of free Wi-Fi to work, or just relax. "Brickhouse Coffee is partnering with us at 148 Wellness to provide its locally roasted coffee for us to enjoy," David said.

### A welcoming environment for everyone

Above the coffee bar hangs a handmade prayer board made by David for people to hang their prayers. "We wanted to create an environment where people feel welcome, where they're not just walking into a bunch of exercise equipment," he added.

There are different membership levels available, ranging from basic gym memberships to packages that include group classes, semi-private training and an app that provides workouts and helps people stay accountable to their exercise routine. Family and corporate memberships are also available.

In addition to membership fees to use the gym and receive other services, 148 Wellness is also starting a sponsorship program. "People can help sponsor the men and women who go through their residential programs for addiction or other issues. In doing so, they then have access to the different services available at 148 Wellness," David said.

## Perry Senior Services hosts ninth annual golf outing

*Do you enjoy playing golf, networking and giving back to your community?*

Perry Senior Services has a perfect fit. On Sept. 25, the 501(c) (3) charitable organization is hosting its ninth annual Perry Seniors & Friends Golf Outing at Winding River Golf Course in Indianapolis. According to Perry Senior Citizens Services Director Diane Buchanan, the event is an opportunity “to give back and support Perry Seniors’ nonprofit, allowing seniors to live independently in their own homes longer and (provides) social interaction opportunities.”

As well, the fundraiser is “affordable and the competition (offers) sharing of abilities and experience as a foursome, free meals and prizes,” Buchanan said.

Funds raised “helps in off-setting our cost in paying for the mileage reimbursement to our volunteers who are our medical transport drivers,” she added. “We pay .345 cents per mile and although many donate that money back to us, we pay out quite a bit to those se-

nior drivers who are also on a limited income. So, this money greatly helps their lives also.”

Perry Senior Services also partners with the Central Indiana Aging & Disability Resources (CICOA) to ensure that seniors are provided with nutritious meals in the Southport Community Room four days a week for a suggested contribution of \$3. In addition, Perry Services has information about resources and providers for seniors and their families.

“I would also like to start offering trips to the grocery store or picking up (seniors) who cannot drive up to come play bingo/games or have lunch with us Monday through Thursday weekly for socialization and then taking them back home,” Buchanan said. She also has a need for volunteers to help drive seniors for these purposes or for medical transportation. In addition, volunteers are needed to work in the office. “We are flexible with what they can do regarding days/time worked,” she added.

For those interested in donating, the nonprofit needs supplies, including paper towels, toilet paper, copy paper, towels, sheets, blankets and clothes for children (many seniors are raising grandchildren and great-grandchildren). As well, ice cream is needed

for lunch offered by CICOA.

Reservation fees for the event include 18 holes, cart, driving range prior to the short-gun start, lunch, dinner and unlimited soft drinks on the course. Fees are \$55 for golfers under the age of 65 who register by Aug. 31 and \$45 for seniors age 65 and older.

Registration for the event begins at 10:30 a.m. Sponsors take their place at 11:30 a.m. and golf begins at noon. Lunch is sponsored by Forest Creek Village and a buffet dinner provided by Rosegate Village. Prizes include gift cards, theater tickets, novelty items and more.

### More than just a gym

The Storvicks partnered with Chris Walker, who formed 148 LLC to handle rehabilitation and is the owner of 148 Wellness. Walker, a certified personal trainer, provides physical rehabilitation to clients and those in need. Walker approached the Storvicks in 2018 with the idea to have a place that promoted physical fitness but was more than just a gym.

“I wanted a space where people could improve their health but not focus on weight loss or make it about looks,” Walker said. “That’s what 148 Ministries is about. I loved what they were doing. Their mission and our goal was the same.”

The Greenwood-based organization joins Volunteers of America Friday nights at VOA’s headquarters in downtown Indianapolis, offering exercise classes, biblical counseling and works with women who have been trapped in addiction or sex trafficking as they hope to get their lives back on the right track. The workouts help with easing the women’s tension and nervousness.

The Storvicks have seen the transformative power of their ministry in Johnson County.

“It’s a missing piece here,” Amber said. “The opioid epidemic in this city in particular demands that you have to break ties with old friends, and a lot of times, family. That’s difficult to impossible to do. We wanted to create a space where they can come, talk to us, work out, in a place that’s safe. They can work on healing their body and healing their mind.”

The ministry provides programming for several residential centers for people struggling with addiction, abuse and other issues. In addition to working with Volunteers of America, they’ve done programs at the Hope Center, which focuses on helping sex-trafficked victims, and Teen Challenge in Lebanon, working with teen girls dealing with addiction and other problems.

For the Storvicks and Walker, the opportunity to work in the Greenwood community, providing a service that is desperately needed, is overwhelming.

“It’s something that is missing. You have your big gyms, your small studios, physical therapy and counseling. But there’s not a place where you can get everything at once in one place,” Walker said. “We each had our own talents, and we brought them all together.”

## Losing oneself in Revery

Since 1863, a brick building has set on the southeast corner of Main Street and Madison Avenue in Greenwood. It has changed hands countless times, housed a myriad of different businesses and watched history happen on its doorstep.

Today, it is Revery, a restaurant owned by Mark Henrichs, who is also head chef. Last week I had the pleasure of enjoying a meal and a conversation with the chef/owner, who sang the praises of Greenwood and being able to live and work in a small town.

"I moved down here from Chicago in 2014," Henrichs said. "I grew up in a small farming community in Illinois. I attended culinary school in Chicago in 2000."

Henrichs has cooked in New Orleans, Sonoma, Chicago and New York City's East Village. He opened a restaurant in the Caribbean before heading back to the U.S. and

Charlottesville, VA, ultimately finding himself back to Chicago.

"Indy is the longest stint I've ever had," the Greenwood transplant said. "I really don't see myself ever leaving. I like it down here. People here are so nice."

Revery's menu could be described as progressive American.

"We use French techniques with American ingredients," Henrichs said.

"These are dishes you can recognize from your own kitchen, but we take it up a notch," general manager J.R. Carter said.

Carter has managed the business side of things for the last three years, allowing Henrichs to do what he loves: cook.

"We have something here to suit anyone's taste," Henrichs said.

To that end, I had the privilege of trying the breast of duck with mushroom risotto and cherries. The duck was cooked well and perfectly seasoned while the risotto, made from farro, was al dente without a hint of being under- or overcooked and very flavorful.

"The short rib is probably our lead seller,"

Henrichs said.

"My favorite is the salmon," Carter added. "It's sushi grade salmon cooked to temperature over sushi rice with some vegetable noodles and a little sweet soy on top. I'd eat it every night of the week if I could. It's really made with love."

There is love and not a little whimsy about Revery. Instead of bread, each table is offered fresh popcorn at the beginning of the meal, along with cotton candy at the end. The popcorn is seasoned differently each evening, and the cotton candy is spun in-house.





## Fast & Furious Presents: Hobbs and Shaw

### Muscles, guns, cars and not much else

The *Fast & Furious* series is at the peak of its popularity after nearly two decades of film entries into the series. The original *Fast & Furious* released in 2001 and told a simple but effective story; an undercover cop infiltrates an underground racing community to try and catch a gang of thieves. It's a relatively low-stakes story that makes sense for the type of over-the-top street racing action they wanted to highlight. However, the *Fast & Furious* series has had to raise the stakes again and again to keep the series fresh for modern audiences. This has led the most recent installments to revolve around that same gang of motorists saving the world from total destruction. Quite a leap, but audiences seem to love the new direction, with the last two entries into the series having the best box office performances in the franchise's history.

Now that we're all up to speed on the history of the franchise, we can talk about the newest film, *Fast & Furious Presents: Hobbs and Shaw*. Picking up directly after the events of the eighth film, the "plot" gets set into motion by the attempted robbery of an apocalyptic virus that threatens to wipe out nearly all life on Earth. To track down the virus, the CIA enlist the help of Luke Hobbs, played by Dwayne Johnson, and Ethan Shaw, played by Jason Statham. Having spent the past *Fast and Furious* films hating each other's guts it sets up an odd couple, buddy cop style film, taken to the extreme.

If there is one thing that *Hobbs and Shaw* offers its audience, it's action. The paper-thin plot only exists to further the banter between the two leads and provide plenty of explosions, car chases and fist fights. If that's what you want out of a film, stop reading. I promise, this movie is made for you. However, I personally found *Hobbs and Shaw* to be a grudgingly long and dreadfully boring experience. The dialogue only ever serves one of two

purposes: to trade meaningless verbal jabs between the two leads, or to provide exposition for the impending action set piece. After the first act it gets old, after the second act it was grating, and for the entirety of the third act I could not wait for the film to end. As the characters kept repeating the same dull banter back and forth, I couldn't help but try and wonder why this film was made. It felt devoid of meaning, heart or purpose.

*Fast & Furious Presents: Hobbs and Shaw* is a film made to please audiences; if you like over-the-top action and don't mind the lack of a cohesive plot, you're in for a good time. If you prioritize storytelling and character in your films, stay far, far away from this one.



GALATIANS 6:9-10

We talked with her and assured her we would try to find her help and before we hung up, we prayed with her. That prayer seemed to give her a sense of relief for the moment. Much more needs to be done. We try to do good with what we have and even to and for absolute strangers.


