Digging up Dillinger: An addendum

When the construction of 1-70 wiped out John Dillinger's inner-city boyhood home at 2052 Cooper Ave. it also wiped out any possibility of a future shrine to the Indianapolis-born criminal. When his body was transferred from the McCready Funeral Home in Chicago back to his teenage years' town of Moorseville, IN, the E.F. Harvey Funeral Home was awaiting his arrival. The rumors had already begun — was it really Dillinger? Relatives — and the History Channel — are looking for answers.

Dillinger's nephew, Mike Thompson, made the request for exhumation on June 24. Niece Carol Thompson also filed an affidavit. The permit was approved July 3, with the exhumation scheduled for mid-September. Forensic testing was to determine a "positive identification." The proceedings were to be filmed and photographed, and the body reinterred the same day.

Thompson claims he was presented with evidence that the man shot and killed may not have been his uncle John. Presented with evidence? By whom ... the History Channel? There's nothing new here; these stories have been around for years. "It's my belief and opinion that it is critical to learn whether he lived beyond his reported date of death of July 22, 1934," he said. However, not all relatives agree.

Nephew Jeff Scalf lives in the Dillinger home in Moorseville. He believes that it is indeed Dillinger residing in Crown Hill Cemetery. He has denied requests in the past to exhume the body. He sees no benefit and finds the whole affair "disrespectful and shameful." "Unless somebody was successful in robbing the grave, that's John!" he claimed. For these cousins, I expect no

Thanksgiving meals together anytime soon or a Christmas card exchange.

All along there have been rumblings that the exhumation might not occur in or around Sept. 16. That has currently become a fact. Crown Hill is now speaking, stating:

Crown Hill objects to the exhumation of John Dillinger. We have a duty to the families we serve to ensure the safety and integrity of the Cemetery which is threatened by the proposed exhumation. We also have concerns that the complex and commercial nature of this exhumation could cause disruption to the peaceful tranquility of the Cemetery and those who are visiting to remember their loved ones. Additionally, we received notice that not all of Mr. Dillinger's next of kin agree with the exhumation. We honor the trust placed in us to protect all individuals in our care, and to protect the interests of those who cannot speak for themselves.

Mike and Carol Thompson have filed a lawsuit asking a court for the exhumation to proceed, feeling the cemetery changed its mind after the permit was approved. The exhumation, however, is not affiliated with a criminal investigation, so I imagine Crown Hill can take whatever stand it wants. Maybe they took a good hard listen to Jeff Scalf? Maybe they don't want the media circus? And of the History Channel? How long before they lose interest and move on?

Lawsuits can take some time to resolve. We'll see how it all plays out.

Visitors planning to attend German-American Klub's annual three-day Oktoberfest next week will not be disappointed in the variety of German traditions, including authentic food, drinks, attire, music and dancing.

"I think first-time attendees will be surprised at the variety of food offerings and the variety of beers that will be available in the park as well as the Edelweiss Restaurant," said Patty Johns, chairman of Oktoberfest. "It's like entering another world. You can't help but get wrapped up in the German tradition that is Oktoberfest."


ties. There is something for everyone and we don't sacrifice the culture in order to provide it.

We'll still have the Warsteiner biers available too, as we have in past years. Not a beer fan? Oktoberfest has added a weingarten this year, featuring Buck Winery selections, including Road House Red, Road House White, Cabernet Sauvignon and Der Champion Riesling. "For the true connoisseurs, they should try Buck Creek's Single Barrel Reserve: a unique vintage blend of reds, especially selected for a bold and complex favor," Jerde added. Guests can also try a Sahm Slipper, invented by Paul Sahm.



A teacher of teachers

Superintendent of Catholic Schools Gina Kuntz-Fleming named Catholic Person of the Year

Gina Kuntz-Fleming grew up on the Southside. She attended Holy Name Catholic School, graduated from Roncalli High School and got her degree from what was then Marian College (now Marian University). She spent time as a principal and an assistant superintendent before finally becoming Superintendent of Catholic Schools, her current position, seven years ago.

"My primary responsibility is to provide support to pastors and school leaders to help them in serving students and families as well," she said. "I also serve as a delegate of the archbishop as we strive to ensure that all schools are providing quality Catholic education and formation of young people."

This year, she has been named Catholic Person of the Year by Catholic Business Network.

"I'm incredibly humbled," she said. "I've grown up knowing that I stand on the shoulders of giants, and it's because of who God is and who he has placed in my life that I have been able to accomplish anything. I really feel like I'm being honored more as a representative of so many individuals who have made an amazing impact on the lives of others, and I've just had the pleasure and blessing of being a very small part of that."

Living by example

Ben Brown, chairperson of the Catholic Business Network's Inspirational Insights, said that Kuntz-Fleming's tireless involvement and dedication to education, as well as her unwavering embodiment of faith, were all taken into consideration for the award.

"There is usually a list of several worthy candidates; we take so many factors into consideration," he said. "A few traits that must be present are, but not limited to, how one lives out their faith, in word and in deed, and one's commitment and contribution to the education of our youth. When putting all of these things together, Gina rose to the top. She embodies everything this award is about and what the Catholic Business Network encourages its members to be, keepers of the faith in all aspects of our lives and being Christian, being Catholic, which does not stop at our parish footsteps."

Kuntz-Fleming, 48, is the youngest of nine children. She is married with two children of her own. Her parents have passed, but she credits them with providing the example that she lives by today.

"First of all, they are most certainly my first teachers, and they were amazing parents and amazing examples of our faith in action," she said. "Anything I've learned about love, God's grace and charity all

really stem from their incredible example."

Kuntz-Fleming's father was executive director of Catholic Youth Organization and prior to that had been a teacher and a coach.

"So, he certainly was a great example," she said. "My mom was what we could call today a domestic engineer. She too really taught me the importance of discipline and prioritizing the values of faith, family and education above all else."

"I've had great examples of teachers in my life," Kuntz-Fleming said. "My sister Susie was a teacher as well – she's six years older than I and has been a great example for me."

Kuntz-Fleming also said she feels she's a teacher of teachers.

"I'm very grateful for the opportunity to teach teachers and leaders what it means to be an effective Catholic school leader and minister of the faith," she said.

Faith, family and education

"I think the most important role my husband and I play in raising our children is really striving to get them to heaven," she said.
"So kind of passing on that same model of valuing faith, family and education is something I hope my

education is something I hope my boys will always take with them and as part of that faith, knowing that God loves us completely and gives us everything we need to be able to use our gifts well and our job is to figure out how to best use those gifts to honor and glorify him. I pray that my boys have used the examples in their lives to treat everyone with dignity and respect, valuing different perspectives and feeling confident and comfortable in their own skin to be able to share their faith journey and their gifts willingly."

Kuntz-Fleming also said that her boys have also been positive examples for her as well.

"I have to say that our sons have taught me so much about what it means to be a good Christian person. They love and care so deeply, and the way that they just approach life with enthusiasm and joy is a daily reminder to me of how blessed I am."

Another great example in her life is her husband.

"So, interestingly, my husband is not Catholic, and he's one of the best examples of Christ's love, certainly Christ's forgiveness, and just generosity, kindness, compassion, charity – he's been such a great example for me in that regard," Kuntz-Fleming said. "I think our marriage has taught me the power of being unified in values in a way that help us stand strong against sort of cultural norms that may make it easy to kind of not prioritize the way that we've been taught."

Above all, Kuntz-Fleming is honored to be Catholic Person of the Year.

"I'm incredibly grateful to CBN for this honor," she said. "I would say, too, that I thank God daily for the opportunity to live in a country where religious freedom is upheld and to be a part of the Catholic church who takes broken lives and makes them whole and who makes Christ present in the world."


St. Jude students look forward to using their hands to help one another throughout the community, but students



September is National Suicide Prevention Month

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), suicide rates in the U.S. are at their highest level since World War II due to numerous factors, including

the opioid crisis, widespread social media use and high rates of stress.

A recent analysis by the CDC's National Center for Health Statistics in 2017 declared that 14 out of every 100,000 Americans died by suicide, and that's a 33 percent increase since 1999, and the highest age-adjusted suicide rate recorded in the U.S. since 1942.

With September designated as National Suicide Prevention Month, this is a logical time to review some of the more common warning signs of suicide and what to do when you recognize them in yourself or someone else.

Whenever symptoms of depression include strong thoughts of despair and hopelessness, a child, adolescent or adult is possibly at greater risk for suicide. Be watchful for behaviors, comments or social media posts that indicate an individual is feeling overwhelmed by sadness or pessimistic views of their future.

Sometimes noticeable risk-taking behaviors can include acts of aggression, gunplay and alcohol/substance abuse that could be signs of an eventual suicide attempt. While an individual may not act depressed, their behavior can suggest that they don't care about their own safety.

Parents, teachers and friends are often the best observers of sudden changes in suicidal individuals. Changes can include withdrawing from friends and family, skipping work or school, becoming less involved in activities that were once important, avoiding others, inability to sleep or sleeping all the time, sudden weight gain or loss and disinterest in appearance or hygiene.

Sudden unexplained happiness taking place after a prolonged period of sadness may also be a suicide warning sign.

Also be on the lookout for self-injury behaviors that may be indicators for young children as well as teenagers. Common self-destructive behaviors include running into traffic, jumping from heights and scratching/cutting/marking the body.

There are also a number of statements someone can make that point toward an eventual suicide attempt. Comments like "I want to die," or indirect comments such as "The world would be better without me," or "Nobody will miss me anyway," should be considered warning signs of suicidal tendencies. Teenagers might make indirect threats noticeable in school assignments, particularly creative writing or artwork, or online through social media.

If you spot the warning signs of suicide in someone you care about, you may wonder if it's a good idea to say something. The answer is always yes, and the sooner the better.

Initiate a conversation and listen to their feelings. Giving a suicidal person the opportunity to express his or her feelings can provide relief from loneliness and pent-up negative feelings and may prevent a suicide attempt. Allow the individual the opportunity to express despair and anger. No matter how negative they are in expressing themselves, the fact that the conversation is taking place is a positive.

Make sure they know how important they are to you, but don't believe you can keep them from hurting themselves on your own. Tell the individual that his or her life is important to you and many others and reassure them that help is available.

IndyGo's Red Line makes its premier during Labor Day weekend

The countdown is upon us as IndyGo's Red Line quickly approaches as the first week of September looms upon the horizon. After 15 months of construction residents will now realize transit alternatives as a viable option, providing improved travel times while decreasing wait times.

Traveling from Broad Ripple to the University of Indianapolis, the 13-mile, 28-stop Red Line was a \$96.5 million project, yet only Stage One of several rollouts will occur over the next few years. A new fleet of 60-foot-long electric buses – quiet, environmentally friendly and with doors opening on both sides of the bus – have a range of 275 miles between charging. Complete with bicycle racks, Wi-Fi and USB chargers, the buses offer 50 seats and additional standing capacity of 40. Seven days a week, 20 hours each day, your chariot will arrive at each designated station – generally ¼ to ½ mile apart – every 10-20 minutes.

Each of the 28 rapid-transit stations are placed within the street median with ticket-vending machines, digital marquee, covered seating, lighting and step-free access to and from the platforms. As drivers navigate changed lane configurations and adjusted traffic behavior, a troop of volunteers will

be on hand opening week to explain the system and show riders how to use the ticket sales kiosks. Related changes will be improvements, adjustments, or elimination to existing local routes. The Red Line will be free through September. All IndyGo buses will also be free the first two weeks of September.

The Red Line will in the future be joined by the 14.8-mile Purple Line (downtown Indianapolis to Fort Benjamin Harrison in Lawrence) beginning construction in 2021 and the 20-mile Blue Line (Cumberland to the Indianapolis International Airport) beginning construction in 2023. The complete Red Line corridor will eventually extend north to Westfield and south to Greenwood when officials in Hamilton and Johnson counties approve local funding.

Service begins Sunday, Sept. 1, followed by a celebration of community leaders, Indy Go representatives, Red Line contractors and the public Tuesday, Sept. 3. Festivities will include live music, free coffee and donuts.

"I hope our citizens use the service and that it proves worthy of the significant investment," said Jefferson Shreve, City Councilor for District 16 (Center, Perry and Wayne Townships). "Most of the funding came from Federal sources, but it's consumed a lot of tax dollars. We've built it. Will they come?"

Infrastructure modifications (and the headaches from such) aside, Indianapolis is entering a new era in its transit history ... taking our city into the future!

Old Southside neighborhood beginning construction on single-family homes

Construction is now beginning on six inexpensive single-family homes in the Old Southside neighborhood.


The homes are being built as part of a \$4 million Lift Indy community development grant, administered by Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett last year. Hogsett met with the Indianapolis Neighborhood Housing Partnership° (INHP), Davis Homes and the Old Southside Lift Indy steering committee on Tuesday to start construction on six of a total of 13 homes.

INHP is managing development of the homes, now listed for sale, which will be located at 20 Iowa St., 1814 Delaware St., 1725 S. Meridian St., 1226 Talbott St., 1437 Talbott St. and 1909 S. Talbott St. The homes, designed with input from the neighborhood, will be constructed by Davis Homes. Each two-story home will include three bedrooms and two baths, totaling about \$1,500 square feet.

INHP and the city of Indianapolis are using federal HOME Investment Program funding to build the homes. Buyers who qualify are given a market value price reduction, discounting the home's purchase price without impacting its appraised value. The price reduction is available for buyers earning up to 80 percent area market income (AMI). For example, a household of four with a combined income of \$63,900 would qualify for the discount.

Judith Essex, community and economic development lead for the Old Southside Neighborhood Association, referred to the plans as "an exciting time for the Old Southside," and described the grant as a turning point for the community.

Ready or Not A killer game of hide-and-seek

Ready or Not is a film that revolves around a very simple concept; a game of hide-andseek becomes a struggle to survive for a newlywed bride and newest member of an ultra-rich family. Its plot can be summed up in just a sentence, so what becomes interesting about Ready or Not is its ability to build upon its simple and fun premise. From some of the directors of horror cult hit V/H/S, Radio Silence, they had thoroughly established they could make fun and scary genre flicks, but they aim for much higher ambitions with Ready or Not. Despite its admittedly silly concept, Radio Silence aims not only to deliver over-the-top blood and gore, but also delivers a meaningful story with complex characters and themes. Unfortunately, these attempts feel on the nose at best, and totally forced at its worst.

The most pervasive idea presented in the film is the disparity between classes in modern America. Grace is our main character; she is marrying into the extremely wealthy LeDomas family. From the beginning of the film we are subjected to Grace's limited point of view. We experience this strange world of extravagance through the eyes of someone grounded in the reality of a world that most audiences are familiar with, creating an instantly likable character. Grace is by far the best part of Ready or Not, not only in her writing, but especially by her performance by Samantha Weaving.

Looking past her excellent character, the film drops significantly in quality. The other members of the LeDomas family are portrayed as unlikable, unempathetic and incompetent caricatures of villains. I have no problems with this representation, but they dominate a lot of the runtime. Having characters this unlikable usually lends itself to comedy at their expense, but Ready or Not's comedic attempts didn't get so much as a chuckle throughout the film.

The other major issue I had with the film has to do with the main premise. It never really builds on the idea of a game of hide-andseek past the idea of when she gets caught, she'll die. There is an explanation to why they must play this game of hide-and-seek, but I found it frustrating in the sense it seems to shift responsibility for the family's actions to an unnecessarily introduced third party. I am sure this twist will sit well with some viewers, but it read to me as an excuse not to develop the LeDomas characters with the same depth that they committed to Grace.

Ready or Not has a great premise and uses it to develop serious tension in a couple spots, but other than those select scenes, it fails to build on that idea, leaving me feeling like it could have been so much more than what it was when I left the theater.



Correct grammar, Yoda's speech is?

I'll have to admit – I don't know much about *Star Wars*. Somehow, I missed the window to watch them during my formative years. Although I have glasses, write about grammar and prefer staying inside, my lack of *Star Wars* appreciation makes others seriously second-guess my nerd street cred.

Here's what I do know about *Star Wars*: Luke and Leia were brother and sister, which made things awkward, especially after they kissed. Darth Vader was Luke's dad. We pretend Episode I never happened (especially Jar Jar). Han shot first. What shot second. And I don't know is on third. Also, Yoda is an awesome green Muppet (voiced by Frank Oz, who also who voiced Miss Piggy, Fozzie Bear, Cookie Monster, Bert and Animal, to name a few) who could go toe-to-toe with Chuck Norris in a head-

to-head matchup.

But is Yoda's grammar correct? His sentence structure is certainly odd. He says things like, "When 900 years old you reach, look as good you will not."

Odd, that sounds. Talking like this, I don't know why I am.

For the most part, English syntax (how we arrange our words) follows the same pattern. In order for a sentence to be complete, it needs a subject and a predicate. The predicate always includes a verb and often includes an object.

Most English sentences follow the subject-verb-object order. In one of these popular laser sword space movies, according to Google, Darth Vader says, "I find your lack of faith disturbing." In this sentence, "I" is the subject, "find" is the verb and "lack of faith" is the object. Many other *Star Wars* quotes follow this subject-verb-object pattern. "I am your father." "I think I just blasted it." "Women always figure out the truth. Always."

Yoda's syntax follows a distinctly different pattern. For the most part, his sentences follow the object-subject-verb pattern. This pattern is only found in 0.3 percent of the world's languages. Let's take this quote from Yoda: "Truly wonderful the mind of a child is." In this sentence, "wonderful" appears first, serving as the object. This is followed by "mind," the sentence's subject. Finally, we get the verb, "is." Object-subject-verb. Here's a double: "Powerful (object) you (subject) have (verb) become; the dark side (object) I (subject) sense (verb) in you." All of these sentences contain a subject and a predicate.

Therefore, the answer to the question is: yes, Yoda's speech pattern is grammatically correct; strange to our ears, it just sounds.




