

Amazon's fulfillment center in Greenwood officially opened for business on Sept. 4. Hundreds of full-time associates are currently employed at the 600,000 square-foot building. # CELEBRATING 50 YEARS

Roncalli High School has provided a Christcentered education on the Southside since 1969

Roncalli High School may be celebrating its 50th anniversary, but the history of the institution goes back more than 90 years to the days of Sacred Heart High School, which was renamed John F. Kennedy Memorial High School in 1966.

A vigorous rivalry developed between Kennedy and Bishop Chartrand High School, which opened in 1962. Chartrand opened to serve a growing suburban south. Kennedy and Chartrand merged in 1969 to form one institution created to provide the very best in educational opportunities. The new school was named by students: Roncalli High School. The school was named in memory of Angelo Roncalli, more widely known as Saint John XXIII.

"To celebrate our rich heritage and now 50 years as Roncalli High School is so exciting," Terese Carson, vice president for Institutional Advancement, said. "We stand on the foundation laid by all of the generations of Sacred Heart, Kennedy and Chartrand alumni that made Roncalli High School possible. Even though we are celebrating 50 years of providing a Christ-centered education to the Southside of Indianapolis and Johnson County, at times we feel that we are just getting started. We have experienced much success in academics, athletics, the arts and faith formation. We look forward to another 50 years and beyond of growing and being a beacon of light to many."

### ALUMNI MAKING A DIFFERENCE AROUND THE WORLD

Roncalli is the largest Catholic high school in the state of Indiana.

"Our students experience much success while at Roncalli and after they

graduate," Carson said. "Roncalli has alumni all over the world who are making a daily impact on our society."

Creating an impact that can be felt around the world is something that Roncalli President Dr. Joseph Hol-

lowell has been working at for 41 years. Time has passed quickly for both Hollowell and the institution he's served for four decades. Just this week, he has announced his retirement in union with Ro

ment in unison with Roncalli's 50th anniversary celebration.

Hollowell has served as a chemistry teacher, football and baseball coach, principal, dean of students and president.

"The steadfast leadership of Dr. Hollowell has positively impacted tens of thousands of lives," Gina Kuntz Fleming, superintendent of Catholic Schools for the Archdiocese of Indianapolis, said. "His deep desire to serve God and His people is evident in all he does. We are most grateful for Dr. Hollowell's service and leadership and thank him for growing Roncalli High School into such a wonderful home where students are educated and formed in the Catholic faith."

During Hollowell's tenure, the campus has expanded from 14 to 45 acres to meet the school's growing enrollment. He also led a fundraising campaign to raise over \$35 million that went primarily for capital improvement additions to the school and campus such as a chapel, an administrative wing, a fine arts center, an auxiliary gym and 30 additional classrooms. In addition, a new 25,000-square-foot gymnasium will be opening in November.

"Dr. Hollowell's dedication and commitment towards the growth, success and long-term viability of Roncalli is unparalleled," Roncalli Board Chair Dr. Jeff Amodeo said. "On behalf of the board of directors, I would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to Dr. Hollowell for his lifetime commitment, not only to Roncalli, but also to furthering Catholic education. We offer prayers and best wishes as he prepares for the next phase in his life."

People like Hollowell can be heard on Roncalli's new podcast.

"We are releasing a weekly podcast (which started in April) to highlight those whom have made such a significant impact on our school community," Carson said. "We launched a 50-year website, 50.roncalli.org, to showcase highlights of the past 50 years. Our students have a special uniform shirt to signify our 50 years. Everything we do this year will focus on our 50th birthday. There is much to celebrate this year."

### CELEBRATING EXCELLENCE IN ACADEMICS

Not the least of which is the academic excellence for which Roncalli is known.

"I think we've taken huge leaps and bounds in our academic programming both in our offerings for students as well as in the extreme quality that's offered in all ranges," Roncalli Principal Chuck Weisenbach said. "We've really been able to broaden our curriculum to

meet the needs of all our students."


Weisenbach also said that the opportunities for girls in athletics was at one time very limited and has now exploded over the years at Roncalli.

"I think what it all reflects is an incredible sacrifice," he said. "It's two or three generations of people - maybe families on the Southside – who continue to make huge sacrifices to make a Catholic education available. It alas represents a commitment to Catholic churches on the Southside during that time period. When I think of that 50 years, I think of the sacrifices that so many have made to make this school possible."


"If somebody would've told me that we would be here 50 years from the time I came to work I would not have believed it," Bob Tully, vice president for Mission and Ministry, said. "As you know, the Catholic schools have been through ups and downs for years and years. For us to be here it took some great leadership. We have that from Dr. Hollowell and Mr. Weisenbach as principal. I should have known that God creates miracles when people work hard."

Roncalli will host a celebration dinner on Sept. 19.

"We are celebrating," Tully said. "Because we're a Catholic school and the Catholic identify of our school is second to none. As a Catholic school we try to teach our students that God is present and active in their lives. We do that very well. I think that's the reason that God continues to smile on us with a very substantial enrollment and great teachers and great leadership. Come visit Roncalli and you'll see what I'm talking about."







# Mary Bryan Chapter of the Daughters of the Revolution celebrates Constitution Week

The Mary Bryan Chapter of the Daughters of the Revolution in Greenwood is spreading

awareness of the anniversary of the signing of the United States Constitution.

Constitution Week is celebrated each year from Sept. 17-23.

Lou Ann Bennett, chairperson of the Constitution

committee for the Mary Bryan Chapter of the Daughters of the Revolution, said she thinks it's important for U.S. citizens to understand the Constitution because "the purpose of the Constitution was to establish our federal government."

"We provide handouts about the Constitution to local libraries and try to get articles in the paper," she said. "We have in the past had the mayor of Greenwood do a proclamation declaring Constitution Week for Greenwood." While Independence Day celebrates the signing of the Declaration of Independence, fewer people know about Constitution Week. The Daughters of the American Resolution (DAR) initiated the observance in 1955, when the organization petitioned U.S. Congress to dedicate the week of Sept. 17-23 as Constitution Week. Congress adopted the resolution. On Aug. 2, 1956, then President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed it into Public Law #915.

"The framers created a Constitution that translated into law the ideals upon which our nation was built," said DAR President General Denise Doring VanBuren. "Their vision was so forward thinking that their words still guide us today. No American history education can be complete without a thorough understanding of the impact the Constitution has had on the lives of American citizens, past and present."

### Fun facts about the Constitution of the United States

- Unlike the Declaration of Independence, Thomas Jefferson did not write or sign the Constitution. He was in France at the time.
- At 81, Benjamin Franklin was the oldest person to sign the Constitution. He was in such poor health that he had to have help to sign it.
- It took 100 days to "frame" (create) the Constitution.
- Constitution Day is celebrated Sept. 17, the date it was signed in 1787.







### It Chapter 2 An impactful film held back by technical quirks

Andy Muschietti's It (2017) is currently the highest grossing horror film of all time. Naturally then, adapting Stephen King's work became the hottest trend in Hollywood horror. Since the success of It there have been have feature films adapted from King's work and there are currently two set to release later this vear and three more in development. Unfortunately, these films have lacked the quality of It, more than likely due to rushed production to cash in on the current King craze. It Chapter 2 promises to be more than just another remake though, because it is written and directed by the team that started the trend, and not just another imitator.

Similar to the 1990 mini-series, the second half of the adaptation introduces the audience to the original cast of characters from the first half as adults. Most find themselves in similar, if not downright identical scenarios. Beverly is dealing with an abusive spouse rather than an abusive father, Eddie married an overly controlling woman eerily similar to

his own mother, Mike is struggling with an intense obsession with the supernatural in Derry, Richie turned his skill of handling trauma with comedy into a career, Ben became a successful and conventionally attractive architect but is deeply lonely in his successes and Bill became a celebrated author, despite the universal claim that his endings are awful. However, when Mike finally discovers proof that Pennywise is back in Derry, he calls the Losers club back to defeat him, once and for all.

The most striking aspect of *It Chapter 2* is just how well the cast represents the characters presented in the first film. Not only do the actors physically resemble the child actors they replaced, but they also present a logical progression of their characters. Twenty-seven years have passed since the events of the first film, and while some character elements and mannerisms have remained consistent, they have all grown in convincing ways since the first film. Throughout the film its most compelling element is how the characters deal with their own personal issues as they interact and collaborate with one another to stop Pennywise.

Unfortunately, while the character development shines in It Chapter 2, the technical aspects, and more specifically, the direction and special effects work often distracts from the most important elements of the story. The direction is almost uniformly uninspired in sections of the film designed to scare audiences. There is an overreliance on cheap and dull jump scares, Dutch angles (a technique that tilts the camera to denote psychological tension in the subject being filmed) and strobe lighting effects. The film is at its weakest when it neglects its more interesting character moments, to focus on the more crowd pleasing scary sequences. It gets so caught up in these horror signifiers that it loses focus on what makes It so special in the first place, its characters.

Despite these missteps, the film's finale is extremely cathartic and ultimately expresses a compelling message about overcoming trauma and the role friendship plays in that battle.



The town of Whiteland is grieving the loss of a beloved high school sophomore and football player.

Ryan David Latham, son of Stephen and Carol Latham, was only 15 years old when he passed away from Sudden Cardiac Death (SCD) unexpectedly in his sleep Aug. 24.

Ryan, nicknamed "RyGuy," and "Big Sugar," was all about life, according to his parents. They said his eyes were filled with wonder and joy, and his heart was full of love for his family; that may have been because somehow, he knew his life would

The Lathams held a memorial four days later. The Whiteland High School football field filled with nearly 1,000 of Ryan's friends and family. The colors orange and blue filled the seats in memory of his love for football and his team. Ryan was a lineman at Whiteland High School, and he could not wait to be on that field, according to Carol. "(During) his fourth-grade football season, his coaches Chris Emberton, Brent Denham and Jesse Denham penned him with the nickname, 'Big Sugar," she said. "They gave him so much confidence

in himself and turned him from a football player to a beast on the field."

Ryan's favorite thing to do besides sports was to play video games, mostly Overwatch and the Destiny series. He described himself as a gamer. His favorite cartoon movie was Finding Nemo, and like his father, Ryan had a great love for superheroes. And food.

"He loved all the food except mushrooms and blueberries. He was an equal opportunity diner. But he loved pistachios, beef jerky, for snacks." Carol said. "He loved all music and was unashamed of his love for Katy Perry songs.'

Stephen remembered that just nights before Ryan's passing, they sat together for almost two hours at Ryan's his little brother's (Renny) football practice, just talking. Some about football, some about life. "It's the last solid conversation I had with him," Stephen Latham said. "I'll always hold on to that."

Ryan was funny, kind, gentle and always happy, according to Carol. "One of my favorite things was when we went on vacation this year; he bought a snorkel mask. He was absolutely amazed by it and was so excited every time he went underwater." she said. "Ryan was always amazed and excited by the little things. I wish we could all stay that way, with that childlike mindset and light in our eyes."

Niki Garod, a close friend of the Lathams, organized a GoFundMe account, Ryan Latham Memorial Fund. The Latham family has started a scholarship fund in Ryan's name. Any money left after funeral expenses will go toward the scholarship fund. Ryan would want nothing more than to help another student reach their dreams, according to his parents.
