



When darkness falls: a time when ghosts, spooks, spirits, goblins, Bigfoot and UFOs play

A paranormal investigator's journey, thus far, into a world of darkness:

The southernmost region of Kentucky introduced an inquisitive youth to a realm of possibilities. The ghost stories of family members only added fuel to the fire. And, there was the darkness at night, thick and heavy, without the benefit of any city lights; there was no city, just a small, unassuming town. What is it about a rural country town still locked in the history of past decades, and also locked firmly in the hold of summer nights where crickets sung out across rolling fields of tobacco joined with armies of fireflies appearing as late evening surrendered into the grasp of the night? What stirred my imagination and guided me along this path I pursue today? Was it the story from my mother about her seeing the apparition of her deceased sister on the gravel road across from her childhood home? Was it my grandmother's reluctance to talk about it? Or ... was it the lone, dimly lit, streetlight's feeble illumination across my grandparent's front lawn that created a defined boundary between darkness and light; the unknown and security?

The Grand Canyon in Arizona, where a curious lad in his early 20s discovered the West only imagined in his youth; and a healthy dose of John Wayne movies. There was most definitely darkness in that canyon! We learned very quickly to sojourn during the hot daylight hours and then do most our hiking at night – in the dark – when it was cooler. On most occasions I would take the lead, sometimes by a mile or so, leaving my fellow backpackers far behind. I was alone, picking out the trail by the

light of the moon. The darkness and white-wash of moonlight brought out an eerie quiet, only interrupted by the rustle of my backpack and my labored breathing. It gave me solitary time to ponder this foreign landscape of shadows and mystery. I moved through a world of desert, pink rattlesnakes, cactus, wild mules and tall dark shadows that seemed to follow me in my peripheral vision. I thought often of author Carlos Casteneda and his books. This also became my introduction to UFOs as I watched them ping-pong across the horizon above the canyon walls.

During my years in Portland, Ore., I had the opportunity to spend a lot of time in the mountains, particularly Mt. Hood. It was quite the contrast from the relatively flat Indiana landscape. It was during those nighttime explorations that I realized (and embraced) a different world after sunset. It was amazing how childhood emotions - including insecurities - reemerged as a result of the flickering flame of a campfire illuminating a narrow expanse of the surrounding tree line; and not being able to see what lies just behind it. Along with the fire came the sounds of trampled brush, falling branches, grunts and snorts, with multiple pairs of glowing eyes just out of reach in the blackness.

Ghosts, spooks, spirits, goblins, Bigfoot and UFOs all seem to coexist in a world of darkness. Night is their time to come out to play. Perhaps, it's our time to observe.



Local families decorate their lawns and homes to help others enjoy an exciting, yet socially distanced Halloween

COVID may have altered plans for many children used to celebrating Halloween by visiting haunted houses, attending community activities or trick-or-treating. Yet, some local families are helping to bring back the holiday spirit in a thrilling, yet socially distanced way.

They entertain their neighbors and other Southsiders driving past their homes to check out the decorations on the outside of their homes and yards — 12-foot skeletons, menacing ghosts, floating witches, coffins and even Jason from *Friday the 13th* leering from an upstairs window.

"We originally started with a small graveyard around the tree," said Vicky Richards, who lives at 5336 Choctaw Ridge Way in Franklin Township. "Every year it seems to progress with a little more. We were kind of known for our spiderweb for 15 years. And then every year we add something different."

Vicky and her husband, T.J. Richards, have four skeletons that look like they're climbing the side of the house, a graveyard with headstones and dismembered body parts, dressed-up skeletons carrying a coffin, two towering 12-foot skeletons, a giant spiderweb, large spiders perched on the home, in webs and all around a corpse, ghosts peering from every window and the illusion of a giant lit pumpkin.

The family typically starts decorating about a week before Halloween, however, this year, their son encouraged them to start at the end of September. Each day the family adds something new to their display until it's complete. "The anticipation of what's next keeps people on edge," Vicky said.

She added that families will sometimes ask if they can take pictures of themselves next to the skeletons. "It's fun to peek out the window and watch people get out of their car and take pictures," she said.

"We've had some families say, 'this is our third time out to your house (for the day)," T.J. said.

Teri Beth Combass of 904 Main Street in Beech Grove has been decorating for Halloween since she's owned her own home. She and her husband, Wes Combass, have a graveyard in their lawn with skeletons; floating witches, hats and candles; blow-up ghouls, an organ player, a hanging soulless girl, a medusa, dragon on the roof, crows, spider webs and witches.

Her daughter-in-law Kristen Hutchison helped out this year. It's a family affair. Teri Beth continues the tradition for Halloween decorating that her mother started. "The witches, the ghosts and trick-or-treater are the ones my mother made for me about 35 years ago and the first ones I started with," she said.

The Beech Grove community certainly seems to appreciate the family's efforts. "I get everything from horns blowing, people clapping and plenty of compliments and I love it all and I enjoy seeing the children's faces," Teri Beth said.

Paul and Amey Young of 7905 Ithaca Way in Franklin Township enjoy creating their own decorations. Amey makes wreaths or pumpkin sculptures, while Paul creates set pieces. He made the fence for the graveyard displayed in their yard. Last year, he created a long tunnel out of a series of gothic arches.

Every year the Youngs include something different in their display. "This year we have a haunted graveyard," Paul said. "Next year I plan to go with a full haunted house. Amey has tubs of decorations and we get a few new ones every year."

"We are most proud of the decorations that we craft ourselves," Paul said. "It's more fun to give it your all and have a display that turns heads."

Sometimes, different skill sets lead some people to stay involved with two occupations that seem very diverse. This is the case with author/chef and Franklin Township resident Clint Smith, who writes successful horror books and is an equally talented chef.

"This year marks my 17th year as a culinary arts instructor with a local careertechnical high school in Johnson County," said Smith. He is also an instructor for Mass Ave-based bed and breakfast Nestle Inn in downtown Indianapolis.

His most recent book, *The Skeleton Melodies* is garnering a lot of positive press and feedback. Smith is thrilled to have received a very good review from highly-regarded Publishers Weekly. "I'm ecstatic that a starred review of The Skeleton Melodies has been posted," he said.

Early voting begins this weekend at Perry Township Government Center

Southside residents may begin early voting this Saturday, Oct. 24 and Sunday, Oct. 25 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Perry Township Government Center, 4925 Shelby St., Indianapolis, IN 46227. Voting will be held in the lower level of the facility.

"Voters will be going down the ramp, which is not covered, and into the building," said Jackie Hudman, chief deputy trustee at the Perry Township Trustee Office.

Those with a handicap or disability may want to consider using a walker with a seat if waiting in line.

As well, those who want to avoid waiting indefinitely may consider averting weekdays during lunchtime, after kids are released from school and after voters leave work for the day.

From Monday, Oct. 26 through Friday, Oct. 30, Perry Township Government Center will be open from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. As well, it will remain open Saturday, Oct. 31 and Sunday, Nov. 1 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

What you need to bring to the polls on Election Day:

• A PHOTO ID that displays your name, an expiration date (can be current or ex-

pired sometime after Nov. 6, 2018) and be issued by the State of Indiana or the U.S. government. Acceptable forms include: an Indiana driver's license or Indiana-issued photo ID card, military ID or U.S. Passport. A student ID from an Indiana State school may be used if it meets the above requirements. A student ID from a private institution may not be used for voting purposes.

- IF YOU'RE A FIRST-TIME VOTER WHO REGISTERED BY MAIL, you will also need to provide proof of residence to vote. Acceptable forms include (must show current name and current address): Indiana driver's license or Indiana-issued ID card; any current and valid photo ID; or a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document.
- VOTERS WITHOUT ID: If you are unable or unwilling to present ID meeting these requirements, you may cast a provisional ballot. If you cast a provisional ballot, you have until noon 10 days after the election to follow up with the county election board and either provide the necessary documentation or affirm that one of the law's exemptions applies to you.

Polls will be open on **Election Day, Nov.** 3, from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Residents may go to **vote.indy.gov** to view a list of polling locations.

gust she had some abdominal pain. She went to the hospital and stayed there for 12 days. She went home for two weeks and the doctors put her back in the hospital from Sept. 15 until Oct. 11 She had diverticulitis with a perforation. "I've never known anyone who has had this, so it was a surprise to me," Reinert said.

It's difficult to run a campaign when you're stuck in a hospital bed, however, Reinert said she will finish it. She praises her crew: Kyle, Skylar, Kathy, Terry, Jo and Rich. "They just picked up the ball when I couldn't," Reinert said. "Kyle would bring me lists of undecided voters and I would sit in the bed and call voters. This campaign has been totally different than 2018 in the sense that you're not out meeting voters all the time. I kind of miss that but calling voters on the phone is the next best thing to understand what people want to know, particularly the undecided voters. Most of them are in shock that I would actually call and ask them ... what questions they want answered ... that's what a representative does. They represent their district. I don't know how much better a representative can be than actually talking to them."

Is Reinert healthy enough to hold the office? "Absolutely," she answered without hesitation. "Now that I understand (the disease), it's easier for me to keep on track."

City officials celebrate construction of new West Perry Library Branch

A six-year plan for a \$9.5 million, 25,000-square-foot library on a 6-acre site in West Perry Township has become another step closer to reality.

Representatives from the Southside community, Indy Library, HBM Architects/Interior Designers, Schmidt Associates and Powers & Sons Construction Company recently joined together to celebrate the start of the building's construction and tour the facility at 6650 S. Harding St., which is expected to be open for patrons next summer.

"People are excited to have a branch in their area and cannot wait until the branch is completed and open in 2021," said Peggy Wehr, future manager of West Perry Branch.

"The need for a library in this location has been longstanding," added Deputy Mayor of Community Development, Jeff Bennett. "Not only was this a longstanding need; this is a thriving, growing, diverse part of town and this library will become a landmark that signifies that the Southside is here and is growing and is a desirable place to be."

"When this place is done, you'll be able to look around and walk around and see things like quiet reading rooms, study rooms, community meeting rooms, a fireplace area, a marketplace, a wall of glass that sees all that beautiful wooded area, a world-language materials area," said Judge Jose D. Salinas, president of the Indianapolis Public Library Board. "Because the Southside of Indy, must like the rest of our county, is growing and changing, and a library at a minimum must recognize the demographics and meet the needs of the community it serves."

Lisa Gomperts, project manager for Schmidt Associates, added that the community meeting room will hold about 100 people. In addition, there will be 30 computer stations, a family-friendly space with a children's zone, including a small tunnel entry, and a colorful section for teenagers.

Large windows will allow natural daylight into the facility, which will be equipped with solar panels.

"The outdoor patio space will allow patrons to enjoy the library and the outdoors at the same time," she added. "We wanted to create an open, inviting and healthy facility, both inside and out."

The West Perry Branch and other planned IndyPL capital projects are funded from individual bonds approved by the Indianapolis City-County Council totaling over \$58 million that are assessed with no increase in the library's current debt service tax rate.

Funny Games An exercise in transgressive filmmaking

Michael Haneke is a provocateur. I mean this statement not as a pejorative, but rather as a neutral descriptor of his work as a writer and director. His mission is not to entertain an audience so much as it is to introduce questions and ideas to them in order to make them think critically. I say this because when I first encountered his directorial style, I reviled it. It was not until I read essays and interviews from him that I came to enjoy his work and realized it was not Haneke that was to blame for my lack of enjoyment, but rather my own expectations. With this framework in mind, Haneke's breakout film, 1997's Funny Games is such a confrontational piece of filmmaking that it qualifies it as essential horror viewing for any movie lover.

Haneke sets up the story as a conventional horror film, with George and Anna driving to their summer home to spend a weekend away with their young son and dog. This ideal weekend quickly gets interrupted when a pair of polite yet imposing young men, Peter and Paul, show up to borrow some eggs from the couple. However, it isn't too long before the duo makes their true intentions known to the family as they restrain them and inform the couple that by the end of the night both George and Anna will be dead.

While this might seem like a straightforward home invasion film, Haneke merely uses this subgenre of horror as a base to explore more complex ideas. In the film's first of many telling moments, Paul turns to the audience and gives a sinister wink to the audience after forcing Anna to find the corpse of the family dog, in a twisted game of hot or cold. Haneke films these moments of horrific violence with a cold dry point of view that is entirely antithetical to the stylized violence found in American action and horror cinema. In doing so, he undresses the audiences' preconceived notions of what purpose violence serves in the stories and films we consume.

Chief among Haneke's goals in creating Funny Games is to force viewers to consider their role in the viewing and enjoyment of violence on screen. His route to explore that idea, which makes the film both so captivating and reviling, is to involve the audience in the violence of the film. By violently confronting both the characters and the audience Haneke pleads with us to be critical of violence on screen. It forces us to ask; who is showing us this violence, and more importantly, why do we so often react positively to violence in movies?

By making the audience as complicit as the characters in the violence of the film, Michael Haneke created one of the most thought-provoking films of all time in Funny Games.

Funny Games was not released in the U.S. in 1997 so it is not rated but is intended only for mature audiences. Funny Games is available to stream on HBO Max.



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
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
