



Greenwood girl waits for liver transplant

Family and friends to host various local fundraisers this winter

Five-year-old Natalie Hodgson of Greenwood, like many girls her age, enjoys coloring, playing with her dolls and attending preschool. She also likes to ride her bike, visit the beach, play with her little brothers and sing in the choir at church.

The difference is that she has a disease that requires a liver transplant.

After experiencing a normal pregnancy and delivery, Christy Hodgson, Natalie's mother, brought Natalie home from the hospital. The new mother noticed that Natalie's skin was turning yellow. After the baby's first checkup, the pediatrician administered a series of tests and determined that Natalie had biliary atresia, a rare condition found in newborns. The bile ducts inside and outside the liver are scarred or blocked. Bile is unable to flow into the intestine, so it builds up in the liver, leading to scarring, loss of liver tissue and function, and cirrhosis.

A month later, Natalie had a Kasai operation, which allows the bile to drain. Yet, for the following two-anda-half years, she was still often admitted to the hospital for cholangitis, an inflammation of the bile ducts.

During a routine clinic appointment after Natalie's fourth birthday, doctors ordered an echocardiogram and additional labs, which confirmed she had developed hepatopulmonary syndrome, which affects the lungs of those with advanced liver disease. The only cure for the disease is a liver transplant.

Despite the diagnosis, "she's doing pretty well," Christy said of Natalie. "We've been really fortunate. She loves to be outside. She loves camping, loves riding bikes with her cousins. We took the kids to the beach last summer and she talks about it all the time. She doesn't like to miss anything. She's very motherly (to her two little brothers). She's all girl, she loves dolls. She has three services to sing in the

constantly," Christy noted. "Some days she'll take four naps a day." In addition, those with liver disease have a generalized itch across the body, known as pruritus. "She scratches so much (her body) bleeds." As well, due to gastrointestinal issues, Natalie uses the bathroom more often than her peers. As a result, "she's very self-conscious (of that)," Christy said.

The family is now waiting on a call from Riley Hospital for Chil-

for an available able liver. The donor, ideally a small child or very petite adult, must have the same blood type as Natalie, though the hospital will not accept a liver from a live donor.

To help cover the cost of a liver, friends and family, including Mary Richardson, have hosted various fundraisers at businesses in the Greater Indianapolis area, including TopGolf Fishers, Tried & True Alehouse and Ella's Frozen Yogurt & Candy Shop. The goal is to raise \$50,000. Currently, about \$16,200 has been raised.

"We have a couple restaurant nights in the works, and we are in the beginning stages of planning a book club event that we will launch in January," Richardson said. "We are also working on a yoga event for the spring and a scrabble tournament for late winter or early spring. We would love for people to get involved!"

"It is our hope that individuals will help share and support COTA (Children's Organ Transplant Association) for events on Facebook and via Natalie's website as well as talk about upcoming events and share Natalie's story," she added. "Lastly, it is also helpful to educate yourself and your family on transplant and organ donation."

Another was a door slamming in his face as he made his way from surgery to a newer section of the building. Again, he ran!

And once while waiting on an elevator Ken windmilled his arms, testing the cold spots surrounding him. A longtime nurse came upon him and simply commented

tion, declaring, "Just let it be."



Whatever lingered at the former hospital in Beech Grove appeared willing to interact; possibly it was a mixture of playbacks from the past ... of those who have come and gone over the years. Life began for many at St. Francis Hospital, and many took their last journey there. To this day I keep a watchful eye when visiting a hospital. You never know what you may see ... especially at night!



Casual – turkey and the fixins. We've had ham in the past, but my doctor wants me to stay away from pork.


All I want for Christmas is ...?



Marriage Story The subtle pain and pleasures of vulnerability

Intimacy with another person is one of the most human experiences one can be a part of, and it is intimacy that is at the center of writer-director Noah Baumbach's *Marriage Story*. However, the film focuses not on two people falling in love with one another, rather the story is all about their divorce after a few years of tumultuous marriage. At the heart of the narrative is the idea that vulnerability and openness are required to sustain a relationship, but those same traits can so easily be weaponized to hurt the other person. Through exploration of these ideas Marriage Story serves as a poetic reaffirmation of the value of intimacy in relationships, while exploring, and even accentuating, the pain and danger associated with fully opening yourself up to another person.

The film follows Charlie (Adam Driver) and Nicole (Scarlett Johansson) as they navigate an often tricky and ill-communicated divorce that tears their family between two sides of the country, New York and L.A. Nicole is under the impression that

their son Henry's best environment would be amongst her family in L.A. where he would have the support of a stable household surrounded by his cousins and a loving aunt and grandmother. Conversely, Charlie runs a theater company in New York where the family had been living together and sees Henry's best option to uphold the status quo in New York. The film becomes a sometimes funny, often devastating, and ultimately reassuring tug-of-war between the two parties as they struggle to adjust to the complexities of maintaining a separated family.

Marriage Story begins with, first Charlie, then Nicole listing off what it is about the other person they fell in love with during their relationship and parenting of their son Henry. After learning about the characters from the perspective of one another we are ingeniously introduced to the characters' flaws, strengths and insecurities of the two that perfectly set the stage for the film's events. Only made more impactful by Driver's, and especially Johansson's, career defining performances.

Despite centering on a divorce Baumbach's film is assuredly hopeful when it comes to relationships. His script never feels like it sides with either Charlie or Nicole; rather, it shifts focus on to their motivations for their actions and how those actions affect the other person. This approach never feels lopsided; rather throughout the narrative we deeply relate to both characters so that once we arrive at the emotional finale of the film, the audience is forced to reconcile with the fact that despite a long and ugly divorce, these characters still must depend on one another. This dependency requires a level of vulnerability with one another they will never be able to hide from.

Marriage Story is a beautiful look into one of the most difficult experiences two people could ever have to go through together and is one of the year's most thoughtful and tender films.



Is it jargon or slang when describing Dr. McDreamy as 'the bee's knees?'

Let's face it — the trajectory of our language is trending slangular (a word I'm confident I just invented). With the proliferation and pervasiveness of internet culture, slang is everywhere. You know this is true when your grandma comments that your new shoes are "on fleek." What is slang, and how should we properly utilize it in our communication?

It's time to load up our slangshots to attempt to define slang. Slang is informal language spoken by a specific group of people. These words and phrases incubate among particular groups — whether they be teenagers, minority groups or certain geographical regions. Slang starts conversationally, whether or not it ever translates into written language. Using slang is a way for individuals to communicate with their own set of words that help them to identify as part of a group.

Slang isn't jargon. Jargon is language that applies to a particular professional group. So, for instance, you'll hear tons of medical jargon in a TV hospital drama: "The patient has a localized, sub-therapeutic, idiopathic, epidermal pathogen that needs to be stabilized, stat!" To be honest, I have no idea what any of that means; however, since these seemingly foreign terms are specific to the medical community, they count as jargon, not slang.

Let's walk through an incomplete recent history of slang with examples. In the '20s, if you called your sandwich the "bee's knees" or cat's pajamas," you'd be saying that it was a particularly good sandwich. In the 1950s, if you had a shiner (black eye), you might want to cover it up with a pair of shades (sunglasses). In the 1960s, you'd be bummed out (depressed) if a choice babe (pretty girl) rejected your advances. If you're still telling people to "talk to the hand," the 1990s called from their gigan-

tic cell phone; they want their slang term for a scornful rejection of what someone has said back.

Use slang in informal situations: in conversations, at parties, online and when communicating with people with whom you already have a well-developed rapport. Don't use slang on your resume, in a job interview, in a Nobel prize acceptance speech, or in any kind of formal writing – which includes business emails.

Although I'm a fan of slang, you need to exercise caution when using it, especially in writing; a misplaced use of "off the chain" in the wrong context will not only lose you style points, but it could also hurt your chances of getting ahead at work.
