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

Going to Gettysburg

This past weekend was a Boy Scout one. The Ritual is something I've participated in for 12 years now. 150 individual fires this weekend sequentially dotted the meadow, casting a curtain of blue fog smoke while wood cracked and popped. I sat in the center of the meadow taking it all in. As it always does, and has over the past years, my thoughts turned towards the Civil War and how troops from the North and South had made overnight camps such as these, constructing small cooking fires very much replayed in this scene. The Civil War makes me think of Gettysburg, and on this night, I was excited: I will be going there in a month!

The battle at Gettysburg, Pa. marked the turning point of the war effort, being the last Confederate invasion. The threeday campaign, July 1 - 3, 1863, left thousands dead—both North and South. Is the battlefield park haunted? Yes it is. Strong emotions, violence and sudden death have been known to generate a form of carry over. Maybe it's just a "playback" or something more significant. For years Gettysburg has been known for apparitions and the continuing sound of military battle; residual offerings emitting an event from the past, yet carrying over into the here and now. It's not only the battlefield, but also the town itself that retains these past ties.

I chaperoned my son's 5th grade school trip to Washington D.C./ Gettysburg years ago. On the way to Pennsylvania I contracted a case of food poisoning. My recollection of Gettysburg is lying in the fetal position on the bus, moaning. It was a blur. I look forward to going back!

So many sites within the park... so little time. There's Big and Little Round Top, with Devils' Den as a prelude; the Wheatfield, Peach Orchard, Plum Run Creek, and the Valley of Death; Seminary and Cemetery Ridge; and Pickett's Charge culminating in the end of the battle. Devil's Den is the one I struggle with. The same boulders are there as they were during the battle 154 years ago. One can hold a photograph of a dead soldier lying across the very boulder you are now standing upon. It's unnerving to say the least. And in the general scope of the battlefield, most likely wherever you walk is the chance that in 1863 a soldier dropped there. Also, unnerving!

Friend and writer Alan Hunter will be the tour guide on the journey. Gettysburg seems to be an obsession for him. Quite possibly, it will also become mine.

Thank you to every man, woman and child as well as members of the business community who sent cards, food, prayers and took the time to mourn with us the loss of this great Police Officer.

Thank you to the members of the media for the respect and courtesy that they displayed while covering this tragic event.

Most of all I want to thank Lt. Aaron Allan for his bravery, dedication and friendship. Officer Aaron Allan did not have to die in the line of duty to gain the title "hero." In our hearts Aaron was a "hero" every day of his life.

The last time the Center Grove area had a youth triathlon was more than a decade ago. Guy Ruble said that he is hoping to change that.

On Sunday, Aug. 27 starting at 7:30 a.m., Freedom Springs in Greenwood will host a kids triathlon that will be put on by the Greenwood kids swim club, The Greenwood Gators in partnership with Kids TRI for Kids and The Greenwood Parks and Recreation department. Ruble said he'd like to make this an annual event.

"Hopefully with this being our first event, it will go smoothly and raise a lot of interest," Ruble said.

The event, which is for kids from ages 7

to 14, will consist of a 100-yard swim, half-mile run and a half-mile bike ride for the 11 to 14 age range and the same events with shorter distances for the younger racers.

The swim will be done in the lazy river in Greenwood's Freedom Springs and the run and bike ride will take place in the paths around the grounds.

A coach for the Gators, Ruble has completed a few triathlons in his life and is heading up the local push for the event. He has been swimming his whole life and said he hopes the event will encourage all kids to get active.

"That's the big selling point, I think, is getting kids active." Ruble said, "I think that's why the parks department for Greenwood was so supportive of this and Kids TRI for Kids' goal is to promote health and also to introduce kids to the triathlons as a sport."

Ruble said Kids TRI for Kids has done four triathlons so far this year in the Central Indiana area, and have had about a hundred participants in each event. The goal for the Greenwood event is 100 participants as well.

Ruble said several of the Gators are

participating. Naomi Weaver who has been swimming with the Gators for approximately four years is participating in the triathlon and it's her first triathlon.

"I'm pretty excited," Weaver said. "My mom is gonna help me with some running."

Joe Sheets has also been a Gator for about three years and is participating in the event. He enjoys swimming and is training for the event by working on what he thinks is his weakest sport of the three.

"I have been biking more, because that's kind of the one part that I don't really do much," Sheets said.

Those who complete the triathlon will get medals and a t-shirt and a free pass to Freedom Springs for the day of the event.

The families of the participants are invited to participate in a family fun

run, after the last participant has finished the triathlon.

Community involvement and getting kids active isn't Ruble's only goal for the event. The Gators are using the event as a fundraiser to get money to put towards a new timing board. With the new timing board, installation will be an additional cost.

"We are hoping to raise about \$3,000," Ruble said.

Packet pick up for the race is Aug. 26, 1 to 4 p.m. at the Runners Forum at 1001 N. State Rd. 135. Race packets include the aforementioned T-shirt, each participants race number, a swim cap and sponsor information.

There is a mandatory race meeting for all participants and their parents at 9 a.m., with the race following immediately after the meeting.

Ellen Huddleston was the depiction of courage. Throughout her battle with diabetes and cancer, she still managed to put a smile on the face of everyone around her.

Ellen, 57, passed away April 13, 2017. To honor her memory and hopefully inspire other's to persevere through their own battles, Ellen's friend, N. Beth Line, designed and painted a mural titled Ellen's Courage on a traffic box at the intersection of Stop 11 and Bluff roads.

"It's for the family, but it's also for the community that she was so very closely tied to," Line said. "She affected so many. We're hoping to affect others as well."

The mural is bright and colorful, with a photograph of Ellen in the center, taken from the time she ran the Warrior Dash and jumped over a row of fire.

"The whole picture puts a lot of words into her character," said Ellen's son, Sam. "She loved to challenge herself. She loved people to be challenged with her. She never complained about anything. This is a reminder every day of how she impacts people around her, still. With her diabetes and cancer, she ran a mini marathon. Not a lot of people would consider doing that. That was the type of person she was. I'm glad that somebody like Beth did something so nice to honor her. We're thankful that we're able to be a part of it, too."

The smaller details in the image represent the elements of life, Line said, which include DNA, atoms, cancer cells plus flowers, leaves, hearts and bubbles.

"She's hurdling over it," Beth said. "It speaks about what her courage was. She really had a battle. But this woman never stepped down from any battle she ever had. Her spirit was incredible. People here in the community may or may not know what they're seeing when they drive by, but we at least hope that they see something that they're happy about."

Ellen and her husband Rick Huddleston had two children, Sam and Ben, and two grandsons. Ellen worked at Center Grove Middle School and was the announcer at football games.


"She made an effort to know the students not only on her side, but on the opposing side," said Diane Hein, coworker and friend. "She did a lot of good things but took it just a little further than what other people think to do. She called names out on both sides. When they got a touchdown, she hoorayed for them. She wanted our team to win, but she gave them credit where credit was due."

Ellen's family and friends drove by throughout the painting process late July, and gathered together near the end to discuss the tribute.

"I've never seen more of an outpouring of love from everybody, from the Center Grove football program from the bantam to varsity, the people from our church at Friedens, even her high school friends from Jeffersonville," Rick said. "Our pastor said he has never met anyone like Ellen Huddleston. He's never met anyone with more courage. She basically gave everything to everybody."

Ellen was able to see an image of the future mural before she passed away. The Southside traffic box took more than 45 hours to complete.

"There's a lot of great people that pass on every day," Ben said. "But it's rare to have someone that has such an effect on people that when a tragedy like this happens, they want to get up and do something to honor her, change something about their life or a tribute in this way. It's great to see. It shines a brighter light on what you think of your mother."

Coaching commendations

Roncalli High School swim coach Ed Merkling retires after 19-year career

On Aug. 7, Roncalli swimming and diving head coach Ed Merkling, was recognized at a dinner for his 19-year coaching career at Primo Banquet Hall.

Merkling had some time to think about the decision and wanted to walk away from coaching "gracefully." Merkling said it was a hard decision to make.

"Even after I made the decision, I still wasn't at peace with it," Merkling said. "Because I saw myself as a coach."

In his career, Merkling coached more than 500 boy and girl athletes. Of those athletes, according to Roncalli's biography about Merkling, 11 were individuals who qualified for IHSAA (Indiana High School Athletic Association) state, 12 were a part of three relays and one was a state champion.

The state champion was Ben Dexter. Dexter, who swam for Merkling since grade school, said Merkling was like a "father figure" to him.

"A lot of lessons were taught both outside of the pool and in it, they shaped me as a man," Dexter said.

Dexter was state champion in the 50-yard freestyle, winning with 20.47 seconds. Of the lessons he learned, the biggest one was about confidence.

"That lesson would be to trust in yourself and in all of the work you put in," Dexter said.

After going off to Northwestern, for college, and learning different coaching strategies, Dexter came back with his own flair of coaching.

"We (Ed and I) would sit down and actually talk about what he wants to see and how I can incorporate that," Dexter said. "With our combined knowledge of differ-

ent things, he let me coach."

At a packed Primo Banquet Hall, many former athletes, coaches, parents of swimmers, attended the recognition dinner. One of those coaches, Jeremy Tidd, who now coaches at Danville middle school, remembers Merkling as a mentor and great friend.

"When I started coaching at Decatur Central, I remember his team walking into our meets," Tidd said. "He commanded respect from his team and that is something that I have admired about him."

After his tenure at DC, Tidd was chosen by Merkling to be his assistant coach.

"I saw it as a great opportunity to learn from someone that has been around the sport a long time," Tidd said, "and was obviously very knowledgeable and successful."


After the recognition dinner, Tidd said he was amazed to see the amount of people that showed up. Tidd said Merkling was a great guy to work with.

"He doesn't ask for anything back, except your hard work and dedication and your commitment to the team," Tidd said.

Merkling will still be a part of the swimming world. He is the Director of the IUPUI Natatorium. A new coach of Roncalli swimming and diving was named. Curtis Cox, a former swimmer of Merkling's, will coach. Cox will continue the tradition of excellence as Merkling has started.

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
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Communication is key

Debbie Conway is awarded 2017 IMPD Southeast Crimefighter of the Year for her leadership in Bean Creek Neighborhood Association

Since joining the Bean Creek Neighborhood Association, Debbie Conway doesn't feel the same way about Indianapolis as she used to. It's starting to feel smaller, as she's gotten to know her neighbors and they work together to make the community a better place to live.

The Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department named Conway as the 2017 Southeast District Crimefighter of the Year for her efforts to clean up the neighborhood. She was nominated for the award by Bean Creek President Bernie Price and IMPD Sgt. David Gard. It was presented to her by Southeast District Commander Dawn Snyder at National Night Out on Aug. 1.

"Over the past year Debbie has worked closely with neighbors, officers and the City to ensure a better quality of life for her community," wrote Gard in the nomination essay. "I have worked alongside her and Keep Indianapolis Beautiful to beautify the area. We've worked together on ridding the neighborhood of a nuisance house and kept an eye on the corner market store to prevent it from becoming a location of unsavory activity. Debbie is the kind of neighbor everyone wants and needs."

Conway, who works as a graphic designer, grew up in Greenwood. Her two children were raised in Whiteland. When she married her husband, Keith, they moved to the Southside of Indianapolis 17 years ago.

"Greenwood is much different than

living in Center Township," she said. "It was very much a culture shock for me-the amount of rentals, unkept property, crime, neighbors not knowing each other."

When Price decided to revive the Bean Creek Neighborhood Association in 2016, Conway was interested in becoming part of the group.

"Our household has experienced crime," she said. "We had our windows in our vehicles shot out two times, windows broken, drug houses close to us, drug dealing on our street. We want to make a difference and change the neighborhood into what it used to be."

Since its revival, the neighborhood association has received a lot of support from IMPD Southeast District, particularly the community relations officers, Conway said.

"Ann Westropp and the other community relations officers have been great at directing us, getting us to recognize how to make changes and getting us to understand that nothing happens overnight," Conway said. "One thing I've learned, there are a lot of officers that really and truly care. Maybe you don't always see that. A lot of them are really willing to assist neighborhood associations when they truly know you're willing to work with them and wanting to make a difference."

Bean Creek has been led primarily by three women: Price, Conway and Amy St. John. Although they didn't know each other prior, Conway said they quickly became close friends. Their duties are divided: Price manages infrastructure, St. John does communication on social networks and Nextdoor and Conway is chair of the crime watch committee and handles communication with IMPD. She also created the neighborhood logo and

designed the meeting yard sign artwork.

"Each committee we've tried to draw in as many people as we could," she said. "We want to be a neighborhood association that accomplishes things. We don't meet every month and leave, not having accomplished something."

The association has had a few victories in its short time of existence, such as a drug and prostitution house along State Street that has since been boarded up.

In addition to volunteering with Bean Creek, she has also adopted Hoefgen Street through Keep Indianapolis Beautiful, so she spends time picking up trash and cleaning up the street. Her two grandchildren and even neighborhood kids will come out to help.

"I don't know how she does it — but she somehow manages to work full-time and volunteer untold hours to helping her neighbors, police officers, City and community," said Snyder as she presented the award. "She's as dedicated and hardworking as they come. Her tireless efforts have created a safer and more caring community. She truly embodies the spirit of partnership between police and community!"

The biggest challenge, Conway said, is getting more people involved in the association. The group is actively seeking neighbors who want to get involved and make a change.

"Sometimes it feels like you're pulling teeth," Conway said. "We're just not giving up. It takes time and patience. If you give up, nothing happens. It isn't easy. Everybody wants to wait for somebody else to solve the problem. It is a challenge, but if we want to make the neighborhood great, we're just going to have to keep going with it."

A solar sight to see

There's a solar eclipse coming and it seems to be drumming up excitement. After all, this is the first time the U.S. will have a total solar eclipse in 38 years. Although Indiana won't get to see the total eclipse, we can still view 91 percent of it - with proper safety precautions!

A solar eclipse occurs when the moon passes between the sun and the earth, which it will do on Aug. 21, spanning from Oregon to South Carolina. In certain states, the sky will turn dark in the middle of the day for nearly three minutes. While we won't experience quite that, it'll still be a sight to see. Do not look directly at the eclipse! Many local places are giving away solar eclipse eyeglasses - for those who haven't already bought them! Indiana Eye Clinic will provide a limited amount of special eyeglasses at its Greenwood office, 30 N. Emerson Ave. or call the business at (317) 881-3937 for more information.

The White River Branch of the Johnson County Public Library will host a Solar Eclipse Viewing Party on Aug. 21, 12:30 - 4 p.m. where participants can learn about this celestial event and observe it through the special eyeglasses. Bring a blanket and lawn chair. For more information, visit pageafterpage.org.

Take a trip to downtown Indianapolis on Aug. 20 and learn about the eclipse in a special 45-minute program at the Indiana State Fairgrounds at 11:30 a.m. in The Glass Barn.

For the Indianapolis area, the 2017 partial eclipse begins at 12:57 p.m., and the maximum eclipse will be at 2:25 p.m. when 91 percent of the Sun will be obscured. The eclipse ends at 3:48 p.m., according to butler.edu.

Good news - Indianapolis will have its first total solar eclipse in 819 years on April 8, 2024. Since we have seven more years to wait, we encourage you to check out this celestial phenomenon this year! *Enjoy and be safe!*

Never leave a pet in a car. This goes all year long, but when temps rise the time before your pet is in danger is cut dramatically. It can hit 110 - 120F in just a few short minutes.

Remember to have shade and water available for your pets. Since they do not sweat,

dealing with the heat is more difficult for them. Also, you should not leave any pet outside for very long when the days hit 90F.

Keep a lookout for any signs of heat stroke. Some examples are heavy panting or trouble breathing, lethargy, weakness, staggering and vomiting.

I hope you and your pets have a safe and enjoyable summer.

Dunkirk

Visually stunning, masterfully directed flick

The entire month of August is normally an extremely weak time for film. Most of the summer's blockbusters have usually come out by this time, and because of the generally warm weather, people opt for more outdoor activities. Sitting in a dark theater, when one could be outside enjoying the weather, doesn't appeal to most. And in typical August fashion, this past weekend's slate of new releases was noticeably weak, so I opted to go back and check out one that I missed the first time around.

Dunkirk is the story of British and French troops, during WWII, who are surrounded by German forces on the beaches of Dunkirk, France. With German soldiers all around them and the rough English Channel in front of them, the British and French soldiers are essentially trapped. To make matters worse, German planes constantly fly above and pick soldiers off from the air. Needless to say, the situation is rather bleak and hopeless.

Despite this extremely grim outlook and chances of surviving their current predicament slim to none, the soldiers press on, trying to find a way out and back home. To help lessen the number of casualties and increase their chances of survival, Allied planes fly overhead battling the German planes looking to kill the troops stuck on the beach below.

As far as story is concerned and in contrast to most WWII films, *Dunkirk* is not an action packed, shoot-em up flick with a ridiculously high body count. Instead, *Dunkirk* is more focused on retelling the story of the horrible situation itself and what can happen even when things look completely and utterly hopeless. While not the most uplifting film in the world, visually *Dunkirk* is stunning. The film is beautifully shot, incorporating and showcasing masterful work, both in the composition of the scene and what we're actually seeing on the screen itself.

Additionally, the sound mixing in the film is outstanding. The bullets striking shrapnel, planes flying overhead and everything in between have a freakishly authentic and real sound. However, the one major flaw in the film is that none of the characters are adequately developed, due to trying to fit so much in less than a two-hour time frame.

Dunkirk is the work of a director at the top of his game. Using a minimal amount of dialogue, the camera tells the visually stunning and bleak story. At this point, *Dunkirk* is the best film of the year. 4.5 out of 5.



Peanut butter

NUTRITION

Peanut butter is associated with happy childhood memories. Many of us grew up with a comic book in one hand and a peanut butter, grape jelly on sammie in the other. Nonetheless, the wholesome food we've grown to love, isn't so wholesome. Americans eat too many Omega-6's, which peanut butter is loaded with, and too few Omega-3's, which peanut butter lacks completely. Bottom line: consuming too many Omega 6's and not enough Omega 3's can cause disease.

It's no coincidence Americans consume the most peanut butter (PB) and have the world's highest rates of heart disease and stroke. PB and the entire American diet, is top heavy in refined oils that contain omega 6 oils, but deficient in Omega 3. The American Heart Association says Omega-3 fatty acids benefit the heart of healthy people, and those at high risk of — or who have — cardiovascular disease.

Excessive omega-6 promotes inflammation, cardiovascular disease, cancer, inflammatory and autoimmune diseases. Omega 6 is in potato and corn chips, candy bars, cookies, cakes, pastries and muffins, cookies, salad dressings, and fast foods are loaded with refined: grape seed, sunflower, corn, soybean oils, shortening, wheat germ, and margarine. Peanuts also contain lectins, sticky proteins that strip away mucous from the small intestine: a main cause of many autoimmune diseases.

Omega-6 is only beneficial for our temple if the ratio of Omega-6 and Omega-3 is 3:1. In America, it's 20 to 1. It's okay to eat PB, but bridge this gap. Foods with omega 3: wild salmon, sablefish, sardines, organic soybeans, walnuts and oil, chia, hemp, flax seeds and oil, and reputable supplements. Pharmaceutical grade fish oil in groceries is more hype than help. Consult with a vitamin specialist at your community vitamin and whole foods grocer.

Freshly ground peanuts can be healthy, but jar brands have added salt, sugar, cottonseed, canola, and Hydrogenated oils: Trans fats raise bad (LDL) cholesterol levels and lower good (HDL) cholesterol levels. Eating trans fats increases heart disease or stroke risk. Scientists and health professional believe trans fats are so dangerous they should be banned from the food supply. There should be two ingredients: peanuts and salt. It's fun grinding it fresh at the many community whole foods grocers.

Even though I wouldn't, in good conscience, recommend peanut butter as a leading food source in your diet, it's probably okay to eat every now and then in small amounts. Sorry. It's just that I care about you.




