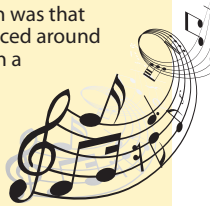

### Franciscan Health debuts Twiage App

Franciscan Health's Emergency Department and local EMS agencies have developed a smartphone application to enable EMTs and paramedics to send crucial information about a patient's status and symptoms in near-real time to the hospital. Twiage, a hybrid of Twitter and the term used to assign degrees of medical urgency, is currently being used by just two hospitals in Indiana: Franciscan and Lutheran Health Network in Fort Wayne. The app, which operates on smartphones and tablets, takes about 10 minutes to learn.

### Central Nine instructors named semifinalists for teaching prize

Steven Owen and Andrice Tucker, automotive teachers at Central Nine Career Center in Greenwood, are among 52 teachers and teacher teams from the U.S. who were named as semifinalists for the Harbor Freight Tools for Schools 2018 Prize for Teaching Excellence. 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## Hundreds of musicians entertain at Greenwood band festival

Local music lovers flocked to the Greenwood Amphitheater last Saturday to hear hundreds of musicians from seven community bands around the state during the fourth annual Greater Greenwood Community Band Festival.

Greenwood Mayor Mark Meyers delivered a welcome message at opening ceremonies for the festival, which began at noon with the Bloomington Community Band, followed by back-to-back Indiana bands: Lake Area Community Band, Crossroads Brass Band, GMH Jazz Orchestra, Zionsville Concert Band, Hamilton County Community Band and ending with the Greater Greenwood Community Band. The Hancock Country Community Band made its debut at the festival after its founding three months ago.

The festival was the first to be conducted by Greater Greenwood Community Band's new Director, Randy Greenwell.

This year marks the 25th anniversary of the GGCB. In 1993, the band began as a small group of a dozen local band directors. Since then, the band has increased to 90 musicians, according to PR Committee Chairman, Andrew Angle.

"As the band's membership has grown, so has its reputation," Angle said. "Greenwood has been capturing the attention of directors across Indiana."

In addition to dues paid by band members, the group's supporters include patrons and the city of Greenwood, Endress+Hauser, Music Travel Consultants, Pattar & Co. CPA, Inc. & Heartland Golf Cars and Equipment, Inc. and APP Engineering.

The GGCB has four more upcoming concerts this year: a performance at the St. Francis & Clare Festival on Sept. 28; an outdoor fall concert at the Amphitheater on Sept. 30; an annual Halloween concert on Oct. 28 with band members in costume and the festive Christmas Concert on Dec. 16. ## The House of Blue Lights: Part II

### HAUNTS & JAUNTS

In the early 1970s, myself and a few friends parked at the end of the driveway at 6700 Fall Creek Road that led up into a wooded hill. Back then, there wasn't a lot of traffic and you could get away with parking on the narrow shoulder. We made our way up through the darkness, feeling the driveway under our feet and nervously chatted about what we might find. We'd heard the stories: a house of glass block and white tile; a large swimming pool containing underwater lights; and a glass coffin where Skiles Test's wife lay for all to see next to a picture window. Never mind that Skiles had died in the mid-1960s and everything sold in an estate auction. That didn't register in our young minds. We expected to see "something." We approached the dark outline of the house – there were no blue lights – and suddenly heard dogs barking. It was enough! We turned, making our way quickly back down to the car. The evening was over!

After 20 years of marriage Skiles and wife Josephine divorced. Springing forward a few years brought about a short marriage to a socialite, Elsa Pantzer, soon followed by a union with Ellen Louise Saxon, producing a daughter, Louellen. It was a strange marriage. Ellen and their child lived apart from Skiles in California. It's claimed that Louellen was 12 years old before she even saw her father's house. Seemingly this distant marriage, for whatever reason, was a comfortable arrangement for both parties. Life moved forward into the mid-1950s when stories about the house at the top of the hill on Fall Creek began. Lore dictates it could have been even earlier.

Myth states that Skiles' wife died under mysterious circumstances, possibly involving

the pool, with her body never leaving, instead being placed in a glass coffin in the living room by large windows overlooking the grounds. Dressed in a blue formal gown, she was surrounded by blue lights about her coffin and the living room. One should have scratched their heads and asked, "Which wife exactly?" Rumor is that it was his first wife, Josephine. Well... OK. This question, however, was not asked and the blue lights gradually expanded about the property, encompassing floodlights, trees and the pool, making the hilltop home glow eerily in the night and seen from the road. Blue, it's said, was Skiles and his deceased wife's favorite color. Then came the stories...

A constant deluge of folks, through the years, journeyed up the drive and to the house. Urban myths were embellished, expanding upon original stories: Skiles sitting beside the coffin, talking with her, eating dinner and dancing about with a glass of wine in hand and jazz music playing; folks approaching the house hearing music and encountering hell-hounds, barking with red eyes; an old man with a gun sending trespassers back down the driveway rather quickly; and small graves stumbled upon. (This part of the legend is more fact than fiction.)

Skiles Test entertained this intrusion for a while but ultimately, it became too late for any sense of sanity for himself and the house he called home. An urban legend had developed some deep roots by this point and reality had been long lost...

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## A Promise Kept

Local Catholic school worker honored for service in Promise to Keep Program

A lifelong Southsider, Margaret Hendricks has worked and raised a family in the St. Jude parish for more than 35 years. This year, she is the recipient of the Catholic Person of the Year Award.

Director of the Promise to Keep Program for 25 years, she and her husband Bryan have a daughter and 11 grandchildren.

"Being a grandparent is my everything," Hendricks said. "I never thought I would have only one child but I think God blessed me with the best daughter. And then the best son-in-law. So, I am just able to have fun, host grand sleepovers, plan vacations or just simply be present and enjoy. With grandchildren, while I treasure the time to plan special vacations or events, I also love getting a phone call from a grandchild who just wants to know if they can come over. And they want to know if I have chocolate milk or where am I or say they haven't seen Grandpa or I for a few days. My life is blessed in large and small ways and I never take that for granted."

Hendricks is a graduate of Roncalli and over the years she has been active in the Christ Renew His Parish Program along with other youth programs and hospitality ministries.

"It has been a long time since I walked the halls of Roncalli High School as a student!" she said. "But there are some constants. Mr. Tully was there and even as a young teacher, exuded a love of faith and a zest for life that he still shares with the students and community. Friends were important and in hindsight I think I treasure the lifelong relationships and friendships that flowed from my high school years. A number of my friends today are friends from high school!"

Hendricks met her husband at work but Bryan has been very involved with Roncalli over the years.

"He was the girls' golf coach for 23 years at

RHS and in this role, he built many relationships and friendships inside the RHS community," she said. "But he also grew to respect programs, coaches, teachers and administrators at our other Catholic Schools as well."

First awarded by the Indiana Archdiocese in 2011, the Catholic Person of the Year Award committee begins anew each spring in finding a recipient for this prestigious honor.

"The good news is we have lots of people to choose from and the bad news is that sometimes it gets hard to choose one over the other," Catholic Business Network board member Ben Brown said. "We typically put out the names from everybody as we go through the discernment process."

Brown said one of the biggest reasons this award was created was to honor someone who has had a significant positive impact on youth.

"I've had the privilege to work directly with Margaret Hendricks through the Promise to Keep Program for the last three years," RHS Religious Studies instructor Katie Hoendorf said. "Margaret is a dedicated professional who lives out her Catholic beliefs in all areas of her life. Her patience and desire to walk with others on their faith journey is an outstanding example of how to be the face of Christ to others in our community. Margaret Hendricks is most definitely deserving of this award and I'm blessed to call her a colleague and mentor."

The Office of Catholic Schools developed the Promise to Keep Program as a pro-active, preventive sexual health model in partnership with St. Vincent Health in 1994. High school teens who serve as mentors are positive role models for peers and younger adolescents. To date, more than 11,000 high school teens have served as mentors in the program. The average age of these mentors and former mentors is now about 31 years old.

"They are living out their faith on college

campuses, in the military and workplace," Hendricks said. "They are coming to the Church to receive the sacrament of matrimony. Many are now parents with children in our schools. These mentors and former mentors have taught the curriculum to more than 115,000 adolescents throughout the archdiocese. The Promise to Keep Program provides a public venue for our teens and young adults to model the Church's teaching on chastity and sexuality."

Hendricks was nominated for the award by Terese Carson of Roncalli High School.

"Because of what Margaret does with the Promise to Keep Program she works very closely with the high schools and so that was why Terese recommended her, because she literally has trained a number of kids to be peers moving forward," Brown said. "Just her impact within that program has been very profound for us in the Catholic faith on chastity. We really looked at her body of work and what she has done over many years and decided she was the perfect candidate we typically look for."

Hendricks said she was delighted and surprised when she was informed that she would be the next recipient.

"But as I accept this award, I really truly feel I am accepting it on behalf of all our mentors and former mentors who strive to live out God's call in their life," she said. "Edgar Dale said we remember about 10 percent of what we read and 20 percent of what we hear but 80 percent of what we personally experience and 95 percent of what we teach others. When I look back over the past years, I think that many of our mentors have grown in holiness because they had the chance to teach and witness to younger adolescents about positive choices and God's desire for our good."

Hendricks will receive the Catholic Person of the Year Award tonight.

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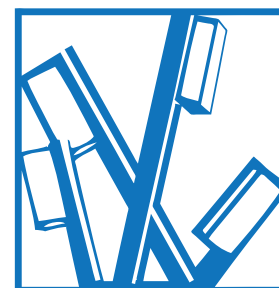
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# Welcome back to school!

We are so excited to announce the addition of a STEM - Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics - lab to Nativity this year! This lab was the result of extreme generosity from an anonymous donor in the Nativity family and will serve students in grades K-5. With the donated funds, the library has been transformed into a part-time STEM lab, with new collaborative-learning desks and stools that are designed to make our learning space interactive and innovative beyond the feel of the traditional classroom setting. Additionally, Ryan Eldridge and the Solvonex company have generously donated a Yamaha based sound system and Sony Blu-ray player to enhance the lab.

Mrs. Marissa Garza, who has been a teacher at Nativity since 2012, has taken on the role of piloting the STEM program for our school. In 2012, she co-founded the "Nativity Tech Trek" with 5th grade teacher Mrs. Katie Jones, knowing that there was a need for more technology resources within the school. Mrs. Garza and Mrs. Jones also initiated a 21st Century Skills Pledge that all teachers signed, signifying that each teacher understood the importance of using teaching tools and techniques that most adequately match the students' evolving literacies in our technological society. Outdated methods of teaching and projects were replaced with techniques that incorporated more forms of technology. Now, Mrs. Garza, who is passionate about creat-

ing hands-on lessons and incorporating technology, is so excited to have a designated space within the school to focus on such 21st century learning skills.

The students in grades K-5 will have an opportunity to be engineers as they brainstorm blueprints and build things from scratch using various materials. After reading a story, students may be presented with a problem to collectively solve by making a plan and sharing ideas. Students will work with iPads and computer programs to build upon their coding scheme already established in the technology lab and will even have a chance to work with programming and generating robot activity! Through researching, observing, experimenting, calculating, measuring and exploring, these future scientists will tap into countless skills with endless possibilities!

The Indianapolis Star recently published an article on the importance of STEM in education, saying, "STEM skills are the same 21st century skills we seek to nurture in all of our students. They help students cultivate curiosity while improving problem-solving skills and critical thinking skills." The article also stated, "If we're going to keep pace with the economy of the future, however, we must prepare more of our students for careers in STEM - Science, Technology, Engineering & Math." At Nativity, we are continually striving to best prepare our next generation and feel that this STEM lab will help us to accomplish that goal!

## New Greenwood distribution facility plans to open next year

Plans for a new distribution center in Greenwood could bring up to 1,250 jobs to the area by 2022.

Scanelli Properties LLC is working with the city of Greenwood to create a 615,000 square foot facility located on Allen Road between Graham and Collins Roads. Construction may begin in October and the hub may be operational by summer 2019.

The company's name, yet to be released, does business nationwide. The proposal, according to tax abatement request filings, is being called "Project Brutus."

The type of jobs being created will include fulfillment, parcel management and administrative, while equipment will include scanning and picking, material handling, parcel sorters and conveyers.

The news comes six months after FedEx canceled plans to build a \$259 million, 608,000-square-foot distribution center along East Worthsville Road in Greenwood.

## Origins of Labor Day

To most Americans, Labor Day is an extra day to celebrate a long weekend during summer's end. Many of us take a drive to the lake, go camping or shop at the local outlet mall to get bigger discounts on merchandise.

But what does the holiday really mean? Why was it started in the first place?

During the late 1800s, the average American worked a 12 hours a day, seven days a week (no overtime pay; most people were just trying to survive).

Although the first Labor Day holiday was actually celebrated on a Tuesday (Sept. 5, 1882 in New York City through the Central Labor Union), it wasn't until June 28, 1894 that Congress passed an act to make the first Monday in September of each year a legal holiday.

According to the United States Department of Labor, the first proposal of the holiday included a street parade to exhibit to the public "the strength and spirit de corps of the trade and labor organizations" of the community, followed by a festival for the recreation and amusement of the workers and their families, which set the pattern for future Labor Day celebrations.

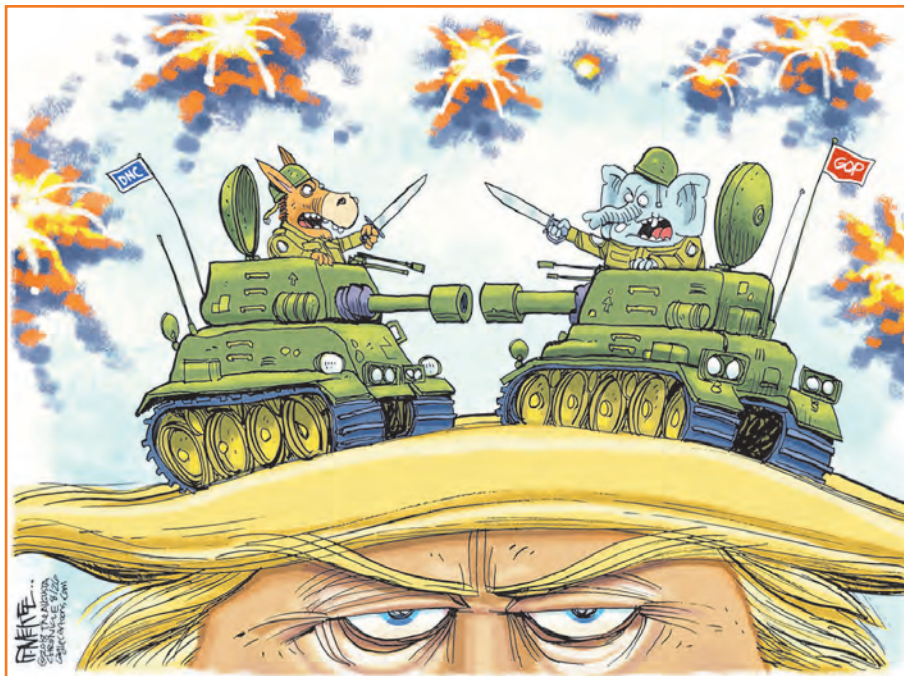
In 1909 the Sunday before Labor Day was adopted as Labor Sunday and was "dedicated to the spiritual and educational aspects of the labor movement."

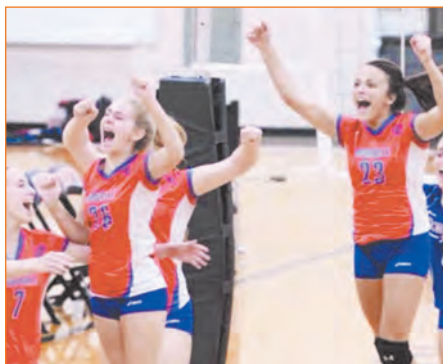

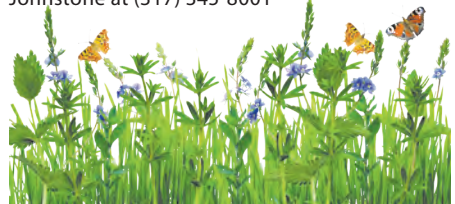

One of the year’s best

MOVIE REVIEW

Technology affects our daily lives in a variety of ways. As such, screens, in one form or another, are also an extremely pervasive part of world. There’s our computer screen at both work and home, our television screen and finally, our smartphone screen, which has essentially become an extension of most people’s hand at this point. While it can be argued technology has made our lives easier and it has, but it has also had adverse affects on our relationships with one another. One new film looks at this idea of our connected and ironically, disconnected world.

*Searching* is the story of a family, who learn that one of their immediate family members has been diagnosed with cancer. Despite early signs of recovery and remission, the deadly disease reappears. David, the father and the young daughter, Margot, both put up brave faces but are forced to watch their mother and wife wither away as the cancer wreaks havoc and her condition slowly deteriorates. Flash forward a couple years and that’s where the film picks back up.

Margot is now a freshman in high school and as with most high school students, her major concerns are succeeding in her classes and spending time with friends. And as like most high school students and their parents, a distance has developed and the amount of quality time they spend together has dropped considerably. However, one night

things dramatically change and not for the better. Despite repeated calls and texts from David, Margot never responds. It quickly becomes hours since David has heard from his daughter and the authorities are soon brought into assist with the missing person search. What David finds is worse than he could’ve possibly imagined.

*Searching* is sure to be unlike most films you’ll see. It’s shot in such a unique and inventive way. Instead of the conventional way, everything in the film is seen through a device with a screen, whether it is a computer screen, face-time conversations on the iPhone or surveillance cameras. Admittedly, for the first 30 minutes it works and works well, keeping the audience guessing as to what other screens or devices the filmmakers will employ. However, the novelty of the idea wears off pretty fast. Luckily, the story is more than enough to keep you entertained.

*Searching* is an extremely simple story, similar to something on an episode of *SVU*. But the writing is 10 times better, with much better twists and turns than are expected.

*Searching* is a fresh, inventive thriller with outstanding writing and creative cinematography. One of this year’s best.

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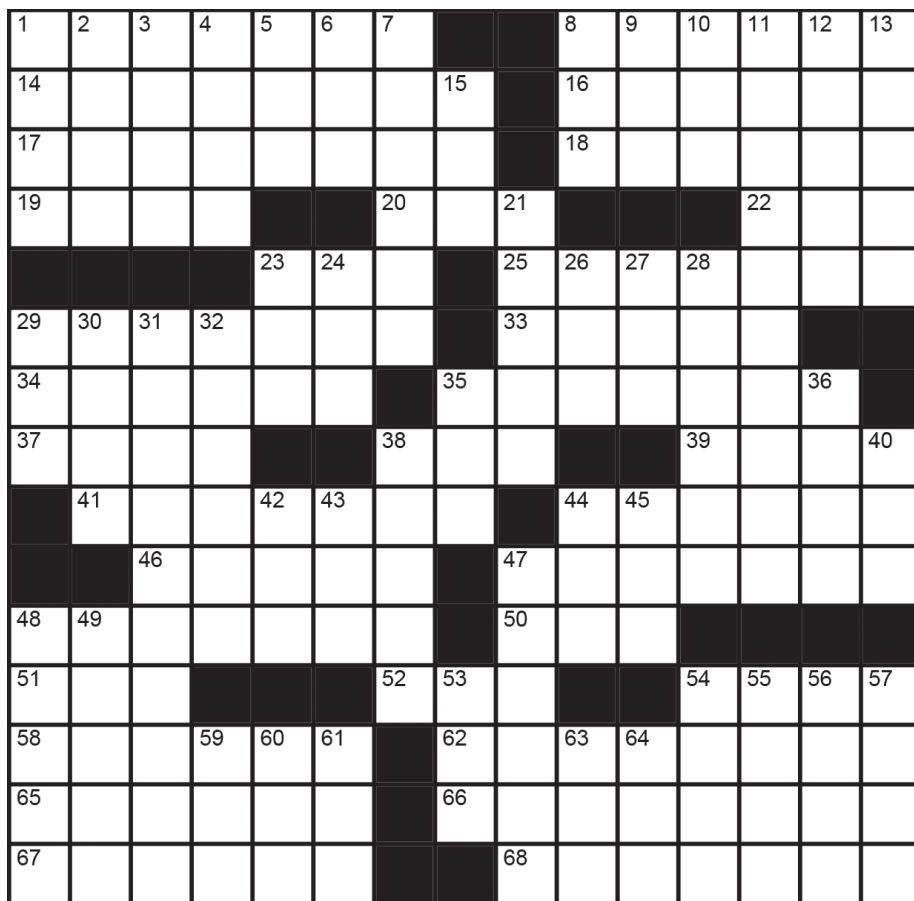

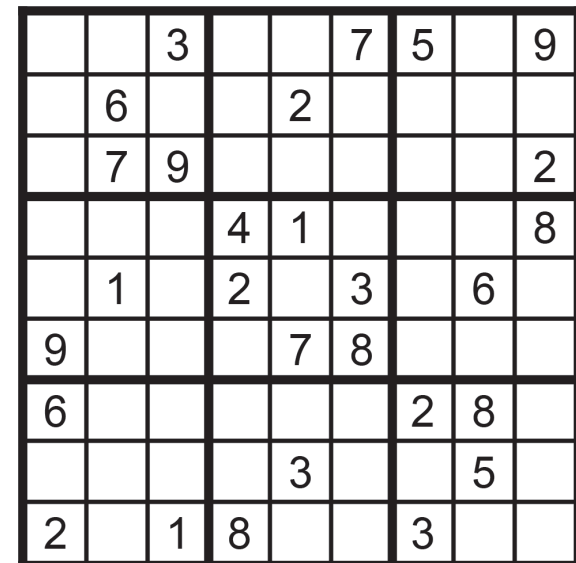

## Doctor stresses importance of knowing vital bleeding control techniques

Most people are aware of the importance of knowing CPR and simple first aid. Learning these skills can save a life.



However, there is another important medical skill that everyone should learn. This skill is basic bleeding control, which includes application of direct pressure, wound packing and tourniquet usage. Similar to CPR, learning these techniques can greatly assist in helping someone in distress.

I recently had the opportunity to visit the Rotary Club at the Central Nine Vocational Center in Greenwood to teach members of the public the bleeding control techniques that are a part of a campaign called "Stop the Bleed". This highly interactive session trains participants in what to do before medical help arrives. It is estimated that 20 percent of people who die from a traumatic injury die from uncontrolled bleeding.

Stop the Bleed is a national awareness campaign announced by the White House in 2015. The idea of the campaign is to pro-

mote a grassroots effort that encourages bystanders to become trained, equipped and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency before professional help arrives.

Uncontrolled bleeding is a major cause of preventable deaths. Approximately 40 percent of trauma-related deaths worldwide are due to bleeding and the consequences, establishing hemorrhage control as the most common cause of preventable death in trauma.

The Stop the Bleeding Coalition is focused on raising awareness of how, with the proper training and materials, death from bleeding can be prevented. Simple measures can save many lives.

Through the Smith Level I Shock Trauma Center, we are offering free training for the public.

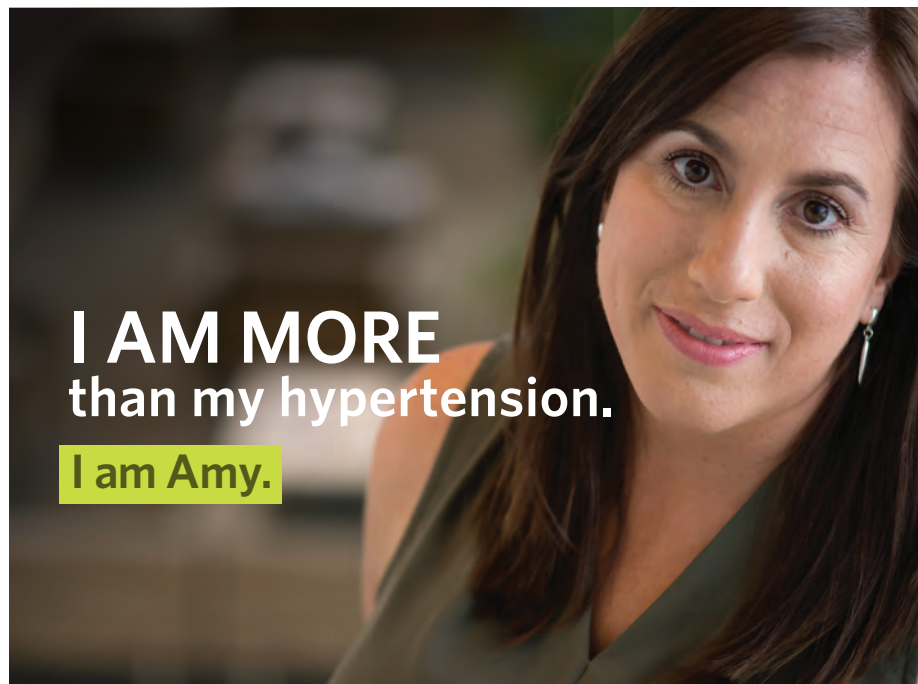

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## Raising good vibes

Everything you see vibrates at a frequency... and so do you. The table, car, food, rocks, colors, thoughts and feelings are all governed by The Law of Vibration: nothing rests.

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
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
