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

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History in the making **Bluff Creek Christian Church celebrates 190 years** of history, change and positive outlook

Bluff Creek Christian Church was something Rachel Fish read about in her textbooks before she came from Cincinnati Christian University to become an intern there.

We were in awe, that we're sitting down in a historical building, things we read about in textbooks," she said. "At the same time, it doesn't feel like an old church. All of the staff here are striving to continue to move forward. We have such a rich history, but I like to think we're making history right now."

Bluff Creek will celebrate its 190th anniversary on Sept. 10 with a worship service at 10:30 a.m. and catered picnic luncheon at noon.

"To exist over 190 years, it means to continually change," said Lead Pastor Eric Allen. "We've continually done that. In the last decade this church is different than it was 10 years ago. We know 10 years from now, it needs to be totally different than it is today. We are willing to stand up to that and to make the change. It's amazing to see how much it standed the test of time."

The church opened its doors in 1827, eventually relocating to its current location at 6286 W. State Rd. 144, Greenwood. The building was burned down in 1945 and rebuilt in 1946. That structure still stands, although the main building used to worship today was added in 2012.

Bluff Creek today is less about it's building, and more about its people. Allen said the congregation, averaging 200 people, includes all ages with families who have attended the church for generations.

"While there are changes that need to be made, we hope that the one thing that holds true is the sincere, warm welcome," said Associate Pastor Jeremy Towne.

"We want that love and reception to go beyond the church community."

Bluff Creek is involved in many ministries, including its Shoes for Souls, essentially a shoe pantry available once a month for local families. They participate in outreach such as meal packing events, with KIC-IT and No Place to Call Home by United Way of Johnson County.

"We're trying to step outside our walls really be known in the community," Towne said.

With its Center Grove area community growing more diverse, Allen said they are making a push to embrace the entire community.

"We're developing that philosophy that to present Jesus as a gift to the community, we have to be a gift to the community," Allen said. "For the next 10 years, we want to target on how we can better engage the global community."

One such way they are doing that is through the International Impact intern program. Fish is from Myanmar. She served at the same time as Jonathan Tukala, from the United Kingdom.

"The welcome we got here is the best," Tukala said. "To this day, they treat us the same way as they did the first day. That's the advantage of a smaller church. It's about the relationships."

As the congregation prepares to celebrate its 190th anniversary, they are not just celebrating its history but its potential to thrive into the future.

"I'm humbled to be part of something that outlasts a human life," Towne said. "In the business world, there's this talk about how businesses are just like people - they have a life cycle. For a church to last 190 years, it means they've jumped that life cycle a few times. It's neat to be a part of that, and to be part of a team moving forward."

Historical memoirs

Lanny Duke's family has attended Bluff Creek for several generations. Here, the church elder shares his memories:

"Everybody remembers the fire, and the fair tent. The new church building in 1946 would cost \$75,000. To help raise money, the church sold lemon shake-ups and food at the Johnson County Fair. The children at the time remember it as joy, unity and fun. However, for the adults it was a time of struggle. The goal of the fair tent was to raise \$400

for the week, not much by today's



standards, but they did what they had to do.

It is always fun to reminisce, but church was also more than a social gathering spot - it was where we learned about Jesus. One thing I am grateful for is that Bluff Creek has always been focused on the Gospel. It has never wavered. There wasn't a separate worship service for children as we have now; we had Sunday School classes, VBS activities, youth choirs and sports activities. Sermons always were, are still are today, based on scripture. Singing praises and communion have always been a focal point of the service. And countless baptisms! The main purpose of the church was, and always will be, to bring others to Christ and each decade presents new challenges - the Civil War, WWI, WWII, Korean War, Vietnam War, Desert Storm and the ongoing fight against terrorism. But Bluff Creek has never forgotten that the biggest enemy of all is Satan. We continually fight that war! Each generation presents a whole new set of challenges as to how to reach them; but the message can never change. Methods must, but the message never!"

Marvin Baker's family has attended Bluff Creek for six generations. As a young boy, Marvin witnessed firsthand the fire that destroyed the red brick church. He lived down the street and was playing in an upstairs room with a friend when they heard the explosion and saw the fire explode through the roof. All these years later, he gets emotional when he tells the story.

"When the church burned it was so far out in the country that the Greenwood Fire Department got lost. Therefore the building was a total loss. Others that witnessed it said that the roof of the building appeared to take a large breath just before the fire broke through. Immediately after the fire, the congregation began to meet on Sundays in the Center Grove High School gymnasium, and

plans were made to rebuild.

One way money was raised was through a food stand at the Johnson County Fair. Everyone pitched in and gave of their time from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. for six days. Some farmers donated beef, others donated pies, eggs, etc. because full meals were served. While some worked in the fair tent, others helped harvest their crops. There is a

closeness that comes from sacrificing your time and labor, shoulder to shoulder, with other

members of the congregation."



Bluff Creek Timeline

• May 18, 1827: Bluff Creek was founded as a Baptist institution when residents began meeting in the home of Henry Brown in a village known as Bluff Creek.

• 1836: The church became nondenominational. A house of worship was built of hand-hewn logs near what is now Hwy. 37 and County Road 650 N.

• Oct. 12, 1844: The church was dedicated as Bluff Creek Church of Christ, also referred to as Bluff Creek Christian Church.

• 1854: Thelogchurchwastowndown, to the frame.

• Sept. 4 and 5, 1902: The church celebrated its 75th anniversary.

• Feb. 20, 1945: The building was destroyed by fire. Services continued in the gym of Center Grove High School and plans were made to immediately rebuild.

• May 1947: The congregation held services and Sunday school in the basement of the new building.

• April 17, 1949: The main auditorium of the new building was finished in time for Easter.

• 1962: Due to growth of the congregation, the stone building was expanded and wings were added to each side of the building for more classrooms and nursery.

• 2010: Plans were underway to expand.

• July 2012: The new 24,000 squarefoot facility opened with an official dedication.

Owning the Roads Hotel

When Gail Sanchez purchased the Roads Hotel in Atlanta, Ind. in February of 2011, she was perfectly aware of what she was getting into. It was a diamond in the rough. The history of the place was long and variedstemming from an original hotel, to a speakeasy, to a brothel, to years of apartments, and finally a personal residence. She knew the history. Years before it had been occupied by a lady trying her best to make it a home. It didn't work. She moved out... then moved back in. It didn't last long. Her kids became increasingly upset, witnessing nightly visitations of 'figures' standing at the end of their beds. The house went back up for sale. Gail was alerted of its availability. She bought it!

Gail knew the stories of the house, being involved with her own paranormal group, Sixth Sense Indy Paranormal. Spooks and things that go bump in the night were no stranger to a paranormal investigator. The building was in a serious dilapidated state, with much work needing to be done. Gail provided the finances, Sixth Sense Indy Paranormal provided the labor. And from what was once an inhabitable home came an amazing transformation, putting the former hotel back into its former glory days.

The Everett's were original family owners of the hotel. Four of the family members were laid in state in the home after their death, with 19-year-old John Everett's casket being displayed in the front bay window. Creepy? Yes, but not unusual due to the customs of the time. There might have been three more? It makes sense.

For Gail, it became years of orchestrating weekend paranormal investigations for groups interested in exploring the Roads. An investment in the history of a small town turned into a full time job. Gail-wife and mother-also had a life on the Southside of Indianapolis. Yet, her love for the Roads never wavered. She pressed on, until it no longer became possible to do so ...

She's in the process of selling the establishment to Mike Couch and The Lost Limbs Foundation, having hosted many events in the home. Lost Limb's mission statement is "To provide financial assistance to the families of amputee children in need of medical and prosthetic assistance." Mike, most likely, will end up living there. Why sell?

"I didn't want to be responsible any longer," Gail states. Time, being a wife and mother, the monetary aspects, travel, and being gone every weekend will eventually take a toll. And... not having the opportunity to be involved in her own paranormal group, or that of OPP (Original Paranormal Paparazzi), a sister group who's assisted in renovations of the hotel. Gail declares, "I would not have just sold it to anyone. I wanted someone to take care of it!" She knows Mike will, and the paranormal investigations will continue. She's still actively involved with the Roads — "just not Every weekend!"

Her favorite recollection is transforming the hotel from what it was, to what it is today. I can attest to that-it wasn't pretty! Her ghostly recollections? She has many: Some nights were quiet... some not so. Shadow figures, especially near the second floor stairway. And many times while downstairs, all hell would break loose with sounds on the second floor. Gail was told by a medium that being by railroad tracks, there's a constant stream of 'people' coming and going. Evil in the Roads? Some think so. Six investigative groups independently informed Gail they would not return due to evil in the building. She had it cleansed.

Laura and I have been there several times. Me, a few times before that. Was looking for the "creeper' mentioned by the guide in the 2nd floor hallway, but never experienced it. Instead, while we laid in a bed on the 2nd floor "Red Room," I watched a head peeking around the door frame, several times, while Laura took a 2:00 AM snooze.

Gail Sanchez had her share of local visitors over the years. One lady had lived there in the 1960s when the building was apartments. She had her stories. However, a couple of old timers-life long residents of Atlanta, Indiana-declared that the stories of Capone and Dillinger were true! And, that most of the town of Atlanta has always been haunted. I would think they would know!





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Employment-at-will What employers should consider.

In Indiana, if a contract is not for a fixed term, the employment relationship is con-SPONSORED sidered to be "at-will." When

sidered to be "at-will." When an employment is at-will, the employer is provided greater flexibility and security when deciding to terminate an employee. At-will employees

soulistic times ployee. At-will employees can generally be fired for any reason, at any time. This includes good reasons, like unsatisfactory performance. Bad reasons, like wearing a blue shirt. And even no reason at all. Many employers desire this flexibility because it allows the business to operate efficiently and does not typically need to be justified to any third-party, including a judge, arbitrator, or mediator, potentially saving employers from costly legal battles.

The employment-at-will doctrine does have noted exceptions that employers must carefully consider before deciding to terminate an employee. One exception is employment relationships with a fixed term. If an employee is contracted for a fixed term, (i.e. one year, one month, for life), than an at-will relationship no longer exists, and the termination likely needs to be for just cause. Before making the decision to discharge an employee, the employer should carefully analyze the language of the employee's contract, the employee handbook, and even spoken promises, to ensure the language specifically states the relationship is at-will. Another major exception is an employee-at-will cannot be fired for exercising statutory conferred rights. For example, an employee cannot be let go for filing a claim for Worker's Compensation, filing bankruptcy, whistleblowing, etc. Further, there are numerous federal and state laws which confer rights to the employee which must be analyzed before making a decision to terminate. For example, an employer cannot use the employment-at-will doctrine as a pretext for discharging an employee because of gender, race, disability, age, etc. While this list of exceptions is certainly not exhaustive, it does provide examples of the complexity surrounding employment-at-will. While, employment-at-will certainly has its advantages, employers must carefully consider the vast list of exceptions before ultimately making a decision to terminate an employee.



Garbanzo beans

NUTRITION

For many millennium, Garbanzo beans have been the most widely consumed legume in the world. Evidence suggests chickpeas were first cultivated in the Middle East around 7500 years BC. The popularity of chickpeas quickly spread all over the world, and the legume was soon grown and consumed in ancient Egypt, Greece and Rome. Americans generally associate them with Humus or salad bars.

A good source of dietary fiber and magnesium, eating garbanzos lowers bad cholesterol, decreasing risk for both coronary heart disease and cardiovascular disease. A high-fiber diet prevents blood sugar levels from rising too rapidly after a meal, making them helpful for diabetics. Especially high in insoluble fiber, garbanzos can prevent digestive disorders such as diverticulosis and irritable bowel syndrome (IBS). Mindfully track how much fiber you eat: adults need at least 25 grams daily for best health.

Low magnesium levels contribute *more* to heart disease than cholesterol or even saturated fat! The magnesium in garbanzo beans helps lower heart disease risk. Multiple studies reveal 80 percent of Americans are deficient in magnesium. Foods that contain lots of magnesium tend to be foods you dislike: dark leafy greens, plain nuts and seeds, lentils, whole grains and dark chocolate. Your motivation: about 610,000 people die of heart disease in the United States every year – that's 1 in every 4 deaths.

Garbanzo beans are an excellent source of molybdenum and manganese, also a very good source of copper, phosphorus, folate, iron and zinc. Folate (folic acid), prevents spina bifida in expectant mothers. Combined with whole grains or whole grain pasta, provides a source of a clean, *complete protein* comparable to meat or dairy: Protein without the fat.

Inexpensive chickpeas can be used for making much, much more than just good, old hummus. Fibrous chickpeas are a versatile ingredient used in soups and stews, curries, stir-fries, as crotons on salads, snacks and desserts. Eat them canned, dried or roasted, hot or cold.

We are learning how to eat all over again: to sustain our sacred holy temple properly, manage our energy, cultivate positive, loving habits and to allow food to nourish rather than punish ourselves. We should be grateful this info is coming forward. You can live disease free, my friends. You better believe me, when Beatle George Harrison and I sing, "that's the way God planned it, that's the way God wants it to be for you and me." Sing along.

2 For then would they not have ceased to be offered? because that the worshippers once purged should have had no more conscience of sins.

3 But in those sacrifices there is a remembrance again made of sins every year.

4 For it is not possible that the blood of bulls and of goats should take away sins. **HEBREWS 10:1-4**

"Oh, precious is the flow that makes

me white as snow, no other fount I know, nothing but the blood of Jesus." So goes the words of the song written by Robert Lowry. I believe it is a shame that most people who claim to be blood bought have never read how precious the blood of Christ was and is and always will be. It is a continuous offering on the altars of heaven as the price for my sin and the sins of all others.

Under the old covenant the blood of bulls and goats was offered annually for the sins of the people of Israel. That offering was acceptable on a temporary basis but never on a permanent basis and never did God see those offerings as a permanent solution to the sinfulness of that nation. God had an on-going issue with Israel over its continuous straying away from the standards that He set before them by the Law. They could not help themselves and He could not accept them fully as His people until they came to Him for the help they needed. The issue was will, His will for them and their will that existed in them that resisted His. Oh, what a mess. Who can bridge the gap between man and God? The blood of bulls and goats did nothing to change the nature of mankind so, what would or could? Again, "Nothing but the blood of Jesus." In the Blood of Christ is the Life of Christ and without the blood the life does not exist. This is a principle that God spoke to Noah after the flood and it is a principle that is for all time. "Life is in the blood."
