



Frizzell honors local officer for paying ultimate sacrifice

Lt. Allan – State Rep. Dave Frizzell (R-Indianapolis) honored the life and sacrifice of Southport Police Department Lt. Aaron Allan on Thursday with a resolution at the Statehouse. Allan, a six-year veteran of the department with more than 17 years of experience in law enforcement, was shot and killed while attempting to rescue individuals inside an overturned vehicle in July 2017. The driver of that crashed vehicle was charged with murder and is awaiting trial.

"Lt. Allan displayed courage and patriotism during his time as a police officer," Frizzell said. "He is a true role model in our community, dedicating his life to protect others. Law enforcement officers like Aaron put their lives on the line every day, and it's important we recognize that and show our appreciation. Thank you to the brave men and women who serve our community, and may God bless Aaron's family."



Not done CLIMBING MOUNTAINS

Center Grove's Sneha Dave overcomes health barriers to climb Mt. Kilimanjaro, with her sights set on reaching all Seven Summits

Sneha Dave had always been fascinated by magazine articles about mountaineering. Yet, there was a time, due to a chronic health condition, when walking up a couple flights of stairs was near impossible.

That didn't stop her dream of climbing the Seven Summits, the highest mountain in each of the seven continents. The end of 2017, she made that first step, reaching the peak of Mt. Kilimanjaro, at 19,341 feet, in Tanzania, Africa.

Dave, a sophomore at Indiana University, has spent her time advocating for youth with chronic illnesses since her time at Center Grove High School. She, herself, was diagnosed with the ulcerative colitis, a chronic inflammatory bowel disease, at age 6. The condition flared up in middle school, having her spend five years receiving partial schooling while she was treated at Riley Hospital for Children.

Her junior year of high school, she organized a Leadership Day for Teens with Chronic health conditions to help other students make the transition back to school. She created and still runs Crohn's & Colitis Teen Times, now Crohn's and Colitis Young Adults Network, a newsletter offering support and encouragement to other youth coping with the condition.

Once she made it to IU. Dave began advocating on a larger scale. She works with an advisory board for a pharmaceutical company, Pfizer, through which she's had opportunities to travel across the United States to speak, helping them bridge the patient-pharmaceutical gap. She's advocated with the United Nations in summits which she speaks about the third Sustainable Development Goal, which states "ensuring healthy lives and promoting the well-being for all at all ages is essential to sustainable development," according to un.org.

Personally, Dave enjoys hiking with her family and spending time outdoors. This past December, they took on the largest trip they'd done together, with a goal to climb Mt. Kilimaniaro.

"It's definitely the hardest climb we've done," she said. "Usually when we've done altitude, it's not 19,000 feet. Fifteen is the highest we'd done."

The family, consisting of Sneha, her

dad, mom and older sister, left America on Dec. 19 and began the climb on Dec. 21. All except for Dave's mother summitted on Dec. 25.

"It is definitely very mentally challenging," Dave said. "I had to train a lot more than my dad and the rest of my family. I had underwent a lot this past year, which made my bones a lot weaker. The whole process of being able to do constant uphill with little oxygen was new to me."

It wasn't easy, and Dave even passed out at one point while she was brushing her teeth due to dehydration, but she pushed her way to the peak. They took it a little easier that day.

"I feel great," she said. "The top was anti-climatic. You have such little oxygen you just want to get down. The wind is so hard that if you stay for too long you'll get a rash on your face. It was amazing when I got down and the next day was amazing, too. The actual summit was very uncomfortable."

Dave said she wouldn't have been able to accomplish this dream without the help and support of her family.

"My parents are into all that type of stuff and they really don't want me to (be held back)," she said. "They want me to do whatever I want to do. Having my parents think like that has helped be able to do cool things like climbing Mt. Kilimanjaro."

She's not done yet. She has her sights set on Mt. Elbrus in Russia next. Then Mt. Aconcagua in Argentina - working her way through until she's pursued all seven.

"The biggest thing I've taken away is I definitely want to climb more mountains," Dave said. "I just really enjoyed it. The biggest thing I gained after doing this, is a huge confidence boost because being able to do something that is difficult for someone with a chronic condition. (Although,) I really want to detach Kilimanjaro from me having ulcerative colitis because it's such a personal thing for me. I think anyone can do it."

Back to the original

Marc Brethauer wins award for his 1942 Oliver/Celtrac crawler after nearly five years of work in restoring the antique

It took four-and-a-half years of working when he had the free time, but Marc Brethauer put the finishing touches on his 1942 Oliver/Celtrac HG42 crawler, a construction vehicle that moves on tracks instead of wheels, in October.

He entered the crawler in its first show, World of Wheels, on Feb. 9 to 11 where he won first in his category.

"When I was up there, a lot of people would be drawn to it," he said. "It's not your everyday thing you'd expect to see at a car show. They'd ask a whole lot of questions - is this as original as it could be? It is as original as I could make it. The people there said it really draws a crowd. It was relieving to be able to win first of its class, because it shows all the work that was put into it, being recognized and having other people appreciate it and not just me."

Brethauer, a Southport graduate, is a lifelong resident of Perry Township. He works with Indianapolis Power & Light in the carpenter/ machine shop. Though he has never lived on a farm, farm and construction equipment was always of interest to him. He took up restoring farm equipment as a hobby about 15 years ago, starting with a 1935 Farmall tractor.

"We go around to all these tractor shows," Brethauer said. "We probably hit 10 a year, and you see all kinds of things. It's not the same old stuff at the shows. I've seen a couple of these little crawlers and they intrigued me. They're not huge and it's something manageable that you can maneuver fairly easily. You don't need a big semi or trailer to haul it around."

Five years ago, he saw an ad in Indy Auto and RV, with a picture of this 1942 Oliver/Centrac HG42 crawler. The machine was out of Flora, Ind. Brethauer traveled there to purchase it.

"I bought two of them - it was like buy one, get one free," he said. "One was strictly for parts. The Oliver was in such bad shape, that when I took the top off the engine, water was sitting on top of the pistons. The engine was totally locked up. I got it cleaned up and salvaged all the parts I could salvage."

He used a Quinlin Automotive on the Southside of Indianapolis to help get the engine work done, but otherwise did the machining and assembly himself, with some help from his father and uncle.

"Everything is just perfect," said Larry Hancock, Brethauer's uncle. "He kept it as original as he can. He takes everything off and starts from the ground up. It's immaculate. It's very unique. You can find a lot of restored tractors but you don't find a lot of these crawlers built in 1942 during WWII."

Brethauer has other restoration plans in mind - already owning a 1936 unstyled John Deer B. He does intend to take the crawler to the antique tractor show held at Camp Atterbury this year, as well as other upcoming shows.

"At these other shows, you have a big area you can drive it around in a field, you can plow and things like that," he said. "It'll be nice to take it out, use it and have fun with it."

Last year's Jasper Strong Shootout Cancer 3V3 Tournament went beyond event coordinator Olivia Wright's expectations. Starting with a goal of \$2,500, she quickly upped that to \$10,000 due to the immense amount of community support she received. It was a goal they exceeded, bringing in \$12,000.

This year, the Center Grove High School senior is upping the goal to \$20,000. She and her friend Emma Jones, also a senior, are co-coordingating the second annual Jasper Strong basketball tournament, taking place Feb. 23 and 24 at Emmanuel Church in the Fieldhouse.

"We're working together to make it even better than last year," Wright said.

The cost to play is \$50 per team, from first grade to adult leagues. Those interested were able to purchase a T-shirt, hoodie or long-sleeve shirt or even a customized team T-shirt.

"I am excited to see if we're going to get the same or bigger turnout," Wright said. "It's been really good so far. A lot of people are super excited and wanting to be part of it, even more so than last year."

The event started as a project for Wright's English composition class last year, where she was assigned to create a research project. Her brother's friend, then-sixth grader Jasper Lenglade, had been diagnosed with leukemia the year before. He is still undergoing treatment at Riley Hospital for Children. Proceeds of the event go to helping the family through this time.

Wright and Jones have been asking for sponsors for the event to reach this year's goal of \$20,000 and have received strong support from companies such as Chic-fil-A in Greenwood. New Greenwood VFW post to offer more to Indy Southside and Johnson County

A new building will be important to Greenwood Veterans of Foreign Wars

Post 5864 as it appeals to thousands of combat veterans who don't belong to the VFW, according to the post commander, Steve Milbourn. A need for more spacious quarters prompted the members' recent vote to sell its

facility and to build a new one, paid for in part by proceeds from the sale.

The city of Greenwood is going ahead with plans to buy the post's property on South Washington Street to expand city operations. The city's offer of \$500,000 has been approved by the Greenwood Common Council and the Board of Public Works and Safety.

Milbourn cited veterans' demographics from Perry, Franklin, and Decatur townships of Marion County, and from Johnson County. The VFW has estimated that if it recruits even one percent of local veterans, the membership would grow by about 200 from its current level of 481.

Another component of the outreach is a pending deal with the state office of the Disabled American Veterans, which plans to buy 2200 sq. feet as an addition to the new VFW lodge. A firewall will separate the

DAV office from the lodge, Milbourn said.

To appeal to younger veterans, the post must contend with a long-held perception that the VFW is full of old men drinking and telling war stories. "We don't tell war stories, because we've forgotten them," he said, laughing.

The post offers camaraderie to veterans seeking the company of those with similar experiences, and the chance to participate in public service projects, such as the Domiciliary Care Program run by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). Giving assistance to homeless veterans, the program is integrated with mental health and addictions treatment. Milbourn said the post sends members on a monthly visit to the Domiciliary on East 59th Street to deliver gently-used clothing and new supplies for personal grooming. The visitors also play an evening of bingo with the residents.

The Domiciliary is a "safe place" for people who have nothing. "I've been there," he said. In 1988 he spent four to six months at the old Domiciliary on North Pennsylvania Street. After personal problems and a divorce, he needed to "take a break." The assistance he received helped him to rebuild his self-confidence, he said.

In the last half of 2017, the Greenwood post reported donations to charity of \$100,503.02. The new lodge will have 15,000 sq. feet, more than double the current footage. The property on South Washington Street consists of 1.79 acres, not

enough for an expansion, Milbourn said. A proposed new site will be confirmed this week, and the timetable for completion of the move is roughly 12 months, he said.

The VFW declined business from numerous renters in the last year, because the lodge couldn't serve the estimated number of patrons, he said. With only chairs set up, and no tables, the banquet hall can hold a maximum of 142 people. However, plans for the new lodge call for an additional 2300 sq. feet for the banquet area.

Estimates given to members showed that with a larger building, the annual revenue from hall rentals could increase by almost \$15,000. Also, the availability of more space is expected to drive up income from bingo, bingo pull tab, and lounge pull tab games, along with kitchen and bar sales. All enhanced sales and rentals could bring an annual revenue increase of \$65,232.

Many members in the vocal minority who opposed the project have attended the lodge since its construction 34 years ago, and they had a "kinship," Milbourn said. But business considerations were paramount. "You have to make money to keep things afloat," he said.

At age 71, Milbourn is eager to recruit younger members and to find ways to accommodate their technological needs. Plans include installation of high-speed Wi-Fi, and the day room will provide comfortable space, large-screen TVs, and Xbox for gaming and tournaments.





Parkinson's disease was first described by Dr. James Parkinson in a report entitled "An essay on the Shaking Palsy," about 200 years ago in 1817. In more contemporary terms Parkinson's disease is a movement disorder caused by the loss of dopamine producing brain cells. The primary symptoms of Parkinson's disease included tremors, rigidity, bradykinesia (slowness of movement), and impaired coordination.

PAACI (Parkinson's Awareness Association of Central Indiana) was founded in 1981 by Marge and Edwin Schulz and about 25 other families as a group who could help provide most current information through education and support to those diagnosed with Parkinson's disease. We provide a Newsletter (quarterly) informing our readers of the advances in the disease management, an annual symposium featuring nationally recognized researchers and topics; weekly e-blasts, literature on the topic of Parkinson's as well as caregiving, have a convalescent aids closet, and schedules other educational meetings throughout the year. PAACI's website is paaci.org or you can find them on Facebook at

Parkinson's Awareness Association.

The Indiana Parkinson's Foundation (IPF) was founded in 2009, by Don Waterman and his family. Their mission is to improve the daily lives and well being of people with the disease. Their program "The Climb," provides a research-based exercise program and support system that is geared towards common symptoms and deficits caused by the disease. IPF provides support groups, caregiver support groups, resources for families living with the disease, as well as lunch-andlearn opportunities on various topics. The climb has several locations for their exercise programs around the city and state. IPF can be found at IndianaParkinsons.org or on Facebook at Indiana Parkinson Foundation. They also offer a monthly newsletter and weekly e-mail blasts.



The far reach of violence

The Washington Post recently released an analysis stating that more than 150,000 students attending at least 170 primary or secondary schools have experienced a shooting on campus since the Columbine High School massacre in 1999. This comes after a school shooting that killed 17 people on Feb. 14 in Parkland, Fla.

It's saddening that youth today may not feel safe getting on the school bus and heading to their place of education. These school shootings have an effect across the nation - not just the school, city or state where they take place. In the case of the recent Florida shooting, there was one student with a tie to our own Southside area. Nicholas Dworet was supposed to become a freshman at the University of Indianapolis this fall, awarded a full scholarship as an athlete on the swim team.

"Nick's death is a reminder that we are connected to the larger world, and when tragedy hits in places around the world, it oftentimes affects us at home," wrote UIndy President Dr. Robert L. Manuel in a statement after the shooting. "Today, and in the coming days, I hope you will hold Nick, his family, all of the victims, as well as the Parkland community and first responders in your prayers."

Our condolences go out to the grieving students and families in Florida.

Black PantherOne of Marvel's best yet

Films featuring beings with superhuman abilities saving the world are quite popular, if you haven't noticed. Marvel has had an impressive streak of box office success. Iron Man, Thor, Captain America and the like have dominated, raking in hundreds of millions of dollars. This sustained streak of financial success has spawned television series and Netflix programs; it's a veritable entertainment empire that D.C. Comics can only hope to emulate. Hoping to keep their box office success going Marvel unleashed yet another film, but this time featuring an entirely new character.

Black Panther is the origin story of the superhero known, as you probably guessed, as the Black Panther. The film begins with our main character, T'Challa (the Black Panther), assuming the throne of the mythical African nation of Wakanda following the recent death of his father. However, T'Challa's honeymoon period as king is rather short lived as he's soon forced to don his alter ego, the Black Panther.

A mysterious figure, known as Kilmonger, is on the warpath. He's killing anyone and everyone who gets in his way as he ultimately has his sights set on Wakanda and the Black Panther. Black Panther and his cohorts team up with a CIA agent, who has a vested interest in seeing Kilmonger's demise, in order to try and stop this crazed super villain. Kilmonger soon proves to be much more difficult than anyone could have ever anticipated as the future of Wakanda and the Black Panther hangs in the balance.

While *Black Panther* is a Marvel film, set in the Marvel Universe, it's unlike many of their other films. It's exponentially better, at least for the majority of the film. The story, direction, acting and writing are all significantly better than what is commonly seen in a Marvel film. Additionally, the film has a much more serious, grownup tone. While it does have its light moments, with a joke thrown in here and there, it's never to the ridiculous level of a *Thor* or *Guardians of the Galaxy* film.

For the majority of the film, *Black Panther* manages to be a story about actual characters and not just a film about superheroes battling superheroes, what nearly all Marvel films end up being. Unfortunately, the last 10-15 minutes of the film ends up essentially being a quintessential Marvel, with an ending as bland and unremarkable as any other Marvel film.

Black Panther, despite a commonplace and tacked-on ending, is without a doubt one of Marvel's best flicks.





The Four Seasons

This article is not about the singing quartet featuring Frankie Valli, nor is it about the international chain of hotels. Today I'd like to tackle when to capitalize seasons.

What can I say? I'm on a caps kick lately. It's probably because I've been reading a book about George Washington featuring several examples of his correspondence. Those Founding Fathers loved capitalizing anything they deemed important--solemn abstractions like Life, Liberty and Happiness--and pretty much anything else they wanted to emphasize. I like their epistolary style.

First let's look at when to not capitalize seasons. The basic rule is: do not capitalize seasons when you are using them generically. Here's an example: Indiana's humidity levels in the summer are off the charts. And another: In Narnia, it is always winter, never Christmas.

Now, when should you upgrade seasons to proper noun status? When seasons are part of a proper noun, capitalize them. For example: now that the Winter Olympics are over, I don't know what to do with myself. And another: During Fall Semester 2005 I had a mystery virus that stumped all the doctors on campus. Eventually my body fought it off and I survived.

With my remaining word count, let's examine fall and autumn--which is it? Do we need two words for the same thing? I like "fall" because it says what it is; not only do the leaves start to fall, but the temperatures do as well. In fact, spring and fall both appeared in English in the 16th century as "spring of the leaf" and "fall of the leaf." They were eventually shortened to "spring" and "fall."

Autumn came from the French word autumne. At this point, fall and autumn are interchangeable. I prefer "fall," but won't judge anyone who uses "autumn," although autumn is kind of like fall's snooty cousin. I do think it's silly that we have two words that mean literally the exact same thing.

All I have to say is that I can't wait for Spring 2018; this winter has felt like we're living in North Dakota (which totally exists) or Minnesota or something. There are only so many 15 degree days a person can handle.

Everybody loves burgers, burritos and pizza: the most common American fastfoods. While bulging burritos, burgers and cheesy pizza slices are temptingly delicious, cheap and easy, processed food probably isn't worth risking your health. Right?

Typical restaurant menus are loaded with empty fat calories. Pizza crust and burger buns are typically made with AP flour, sodium, unhealthy fats, and unholy preservatives. "The American Journal of Clinical Nutrition warns consuming American AP flour increases your risk for a riskier type of abdominal fat called visceral abdominal fat. Harvard Medical School warns visceral abdominal fat increases your risk for type 2 diabetes, heart disease and breast cancer. Fast food burrito wraps can contain enriched wheat flour, canola or soybean, salt, mouth-watering sodium acid pyrophosphate, potassium sorbate, sodium bicarbonate, sodium propionate, monoglycerides, sodium stearoyl-2-lactylate, fumaric acid, cellulose gum, carrageenan, and succulent maltodextrin. Your holy temple deserves a lot more compassion than that.

Unlike American wheat, European white flour will not give you the same allergic reactions as American wheat products that contain traces of delicious Round-up herbicide. That's right. According to the USDA, as of 2012, 99 percent of durum wheat, 97 percent of spring wheat, and 61 percent of winter wheat has been treated with herbicides- an increase from 88 percent for durum wheat, 91 percent for spring wheat and 47% for winter wheat since 1998.

If you are wedded to continually eating out in restaurants; letting an apathetic stranger cook your meals, then good luck with your overall health. You either one of many who don't know how to cook, or you're too "I love you" lazy. At the very least, show your dietary-beleaguered temple some compassion by choosing more fresh veggies for your pizza and burritos and cutting back on extra cheese, cancerous pepperoni and bacon. Then put on your big boy pants and try a whole wheat crust or wrap. Sprinkle ground flax or chia seed to on your pizza, burger or burrito to aid digestion. Try salsa, refried beans, guacamole, and Pico De Gallo, and of course, eat smaller portions.

Get thee to thy kitchen and cook at home, where you control the quality of the ingredients, therefore, creating perfect health. Eat closer to earth and become the unique beautiful soul that you are. I just lead you to the water. It is you who must take a drink.


