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

# Vino Villa, Greenwood

I had driven by the home on 200 N. Madison Ave. many times, always on the way to somewhere else. The summer months found large groups of people on the outside patio, smiling and seemingly oblivious to the traffic rolling past. Finally my wife and I made a point to stop, park and go inside. I'm glad we did. The house has always intrigued me, but I couldn't put a finger on it. I soon found out why. This historic home, occupied by Vino Villa, had once been home to a member of the Polk family. I was intrigued—historically, and soon culinarily!

J.T. Polk started a canning business in 1872, beginning modestly with tomatoes. By 1887 his operation expanded to fruits and vegetables. Brick buildings were constructed to employ over 500 workers. Simple houses were constructed in the neighborhood for employees. These homes, and a few restored buildings, are still a fixture along Main Street in Greenwood. Claiming the honor as the largest cannery west of Baltimore, Polk became Greenwood's largest employer ... essentially putting Greenwood on the map! Yet, at the end of the work day, J.T. Polk had to go somewhere to rest his head. Rumor is that his home was located east of the cannery, where present day Valley Vista Golf Course sits. (Once the site of the Polk dairy barns) J.T.'s son Ralph and wife Grace built their

residence a little closer into town in 1904, naming it "Maples." It's now known, in a different incarnation, as Vino Villa.


Laura and I were wine ignorant, yet we wanted to learn. We couldn't find better teachers than the staff, especially our waitress, Amy. The three-story home, with intimate seating in multiple rooms, became an experience in artesian dining and uncorking a bottle. Outdoor seating on the patio is offered (with music) for warmer months. Vino offers a vast selection of wine, gourmet cheese, pizza and beer, an array of appetizers, sandwiches, salads, breads and deserts. Laura and I have yet to order from the entire menu, but we plan to in time. Other services offered are anniversary and birthday parties, bridal showers, small weddings and receptions, wine tastings and accessories. And a Wine Club! We joined on our first visit.

Paul and Laura Jacquin bought the property in 2010. They put in a lot of work to get their vision where it needed to be. *"It ultimately came down to the atmosphere we wanted,*" Paul stated. It began as a labor of love and continues to this day.

# Four Southside friends finish a decade-long jump-roping journey with Indy Air Bears

Over the course of 10 years, four Southside friends have formed an unbreakable bond over the sport of jump rope. Having graduated from high school this year, their jumping journey is coming to an end this summer.

Katie Tyson, Allison Taylor, Grace La-Vier and Elise McQueen were inspired to join the Indy Air Bears in second grade because the tricks and routines of the jump-roping team looked cool.

"When we were little, we thought it would be something fun," Taylor said. "Once we got older, we saw everything that came with it and that there were lots of opportunities to travel and compete. We are in love with that stuff."

Tyson attended Center Grove schools. Taylor, LaVier and McQueen went to Franklin Central schools. By middle school, it was just the four of them in their grade level. Soon, they began to practice at each other's houses. Practices became sleepovers, which became birthday celebrations, which evolved into them vacationing together.

"I like how we've pretty much grown up together," Tyson said. "We all started in elementary school, being not the best of friends, but when we were forced to be together one year, it's blossomed into the best friendships that I have."

The girls excel in Double Dutch, with Tyson and Taylor as "master turners" and McQueen and LaVier as jumpers.

"The four of them, I call them the siamese quadruplets sometimes," said coach, Niki Glover. "They all jump and turn ropes. To be good in Double Dutch, you can do flips but if there's no one to turn for you, you're no good. (Two) are extremely awesome turners. (Two) are extremely awesome jumpers. Grace levitates. She can jump on her back in double dutch. They just gelled as a Double Dutch group. From there, it's amazing the dedication of these four. They're sick, they're there. Katie had foot surgery but she's jumping on one foot for three weeks. They just have a fever."

Indy Air Bears practices out of Arlington Elementary in Franklin Township, and has competed and performed all over the world.

"When you're little, you like watching shows," Tyson said. "You see all the cool stuff. Then you start to do it and going to competitions. It changes from watching to trying to be that person that can do a lot of cool stuff."

Though the four best friends are all different, LaVier said their values are all similar. Outside of jump rope, they like staying active and doing things such as soccer, zip lining or frisbee. They enjoy watching jump-rope videos to learn new tricks, or their old videos to laugh at themselves.

"During the summer we practice a lot more," Tyson said. "We see each other 24/7 then. Outside of here, we probably spend one day together a week. We spent a whole week together on spring break."

They even went to junior prom together, taking some time to jump rope in their prom dresses. The four skipped their senior prom for an Indy Air Bears competition.

"It all culminates with us having our (graduation) open house together, spending the last few days of summer together," Tyson said.

The friends said it's been different this year, being a senior.

"This year, we're trying to appreciate the

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little things more," Taylor said. "Every show, we've made sure it's better than before."

The teammates won in their age group at the Pan American Championships last year. Coming off of that win, they were optimistic for 2017.

Their year finished with the World Jump Rope Federation's World Championships the first week of July. The five-day competition involved 800 jumpers from 31 countries. Indy Air Bears had 22 team members at the championship. Tyson and Taylor, along with teammates Morgan Golay and Taylor Nicholson (of the Avon Aerial Orioles) earned first place in team freestyle. LaVier, McQueen and teammates Dante Agresta and Eric Hinojosa earned second place in the team freestyle.

"We (were) watching a lot more videos and spending a lot more time practicing the hard tricks," Tyson said. "It being our last year, we focused on making friends with other teams. Now we have international friends."

LaVier and McQueen will attend Ball

State University in the fall. Taylor will attend University of Indianapolis. Tyson will attend IUPUI.

"I've learned a lot of lessons and lifeskills from jump rope," LaVier said. "When people graduate and leave the team, young people step up to take the lead. I've learned a lot about leadership and how it's most important to help the people around you. That will help you in the end."

Collegiate-level jump rope is just forming, Tyson said, but the teammates have plans to come back and help teach and mentor the younger group with Indy Air Bears. That next group of young leaders has already begun to demonstrate their capabilities.

"There's already a group of guys ready to kick us out," Tyson said.

All were unanimous in the sentiment that they will miss the friendships they have formed the most - not just between the four of them, but the entire team.

"We're all like family," Taylor said. "You can count on anybody here to do anything for you. We spend so much time together. We're all super close. I value these friendships so much."

The parks department tilled up the area of land on Thursday, then the fire department sprayed water to create the mud on Friday morning prior to the event.



Center Grove's Keith Fechtman shares his journey with dyslexia through newly-published children's book, Malina's Zoo Adventure

It's okay for children to struggle with reading, writing or math. With extra time and patience, they can achieve high school graduation, higher education or any of their dreams.

Center Grove area resident Keith Fechtman wrote the children's book, Malina's Zoo Adventure nine years ago to share his own struggles of mixing up words and numbers. It wasn't until a year ago that he realized that his difficulty reading was actually dyslexia. This year, he found the motivation and resources to finally get his book published and become an advocate for the cause.

Fechtman grew up in Franklin, where he ran track at Franklin Community High School. Upon graduation, he attended the University of Indianapolis.

"I struggled immensely through that," he said. "I didn't know why. High school wasn't easy but it wasn't super difficult." He left UIndy and went

into the military. After his four years active duty in the Army, he joined the Reserves and sought out something to bethimself. ter He re-enrolled at

"I struggled with the schooling aspect," he said. That's why I wrote this children's book. I wanted to share my struggles with schooling, reading, writing and really help kids. If they have a disability, difficulty, I want to help relate to them that it's okay to struggle. You can overcome it. I was able to finish the master's program in two-and-a-half vears versus three. But it was a lot of grind, working full time and going back to school. I had to take extra notes. I had to be thorough because I didn't understand them the first time. I rarely got it the second time. I had to reread a lot. It's a different challenge."

After earning his master's degree, he began working for Arby's as a district manager. Wanting a better work/life balance, he found an opportunity at Express Employment Professionals Indy South where he has worked the past year.

A year ago, when he realized that his struggles with reading and mixing up numbers was dyslexia, he began to research the disorder. He also began working on Malina's Zoo Adventure. He found an illustrator, Center Grove alumnus, Eric Erickson. The book was published by Author House in May, and can be found on amazon.com or authorhouse.com. Fechtman said he has read it to any child he can. He has lined up speaking engagements through the year, including a reading and book signing on July 15 at Toodleydoo Toys in Franklin; a painting of the book at Teal Canary in Greenwood on July 22; and a reading along with the illustrator on Oct. 6.

Fechtman wants to create a series of books, and has already written the sequel, Malina's Farm Adventure with a goal to get it released by Christmas. He said a portion of the books' proceeds will go to the Dyslexia Institute of Indiana for a scholarship fund.

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


The start of the school year marks a fresh

The Excel Center<sup>®</sup> is a free public charter high school where adults can earn a high school diploma and begin post-secondary education.

By earning a Core 40 diploma, college credits and job certifications, graduates are better positioned to secure employment. Some certifications offered include:

The Excel Center is tailored to the lives of busy adults to set them on a path and prepare them for success. Dedicated, licensed teachers lead direct-instruction classes. # **Breaking Barriers** Center Grove alum Mary Margaret Moffett earns scholarship to top Japanese university

**OPEN!** 

For most of her life, Mary Margaret Moffett has wanted to live in Japan. She and her husband, Chip, stayed in Tokyo for three months last year, which is the longest you're allowed to live there without a special visa. They loved it so much that they wanted to find a way to stay longer.

Moffett then discovered a bilingual program at Hokkaido University in Sapporo, Japan. Hokkaido is one of Japan's National Seven Universities, which are comparable to Ivy League schools in the U.S. Moffett has become one of only 20 students accepted into the program next year. She'll be getting a bachelor's degree in Modern Japanese Studies, which includes culture, history, society, and political economy.

"It's everything I'm interested in," Moffett said.

Her earliest experience with Japanese culture came in third grade at Center Grove Elementary School, where she and a girl named Tomoko Oshimoto were the only new students in class.

"She was my first meaningful exposure to Japanese culture and language," Moffett said. Though Oshimoto and her family moved back to Japan a few years later, she and Moffett have remained friends, and reunited in Shinjuku, Japan, in 2013.

Along with her friend Tomoko, Moffett credits her aspirations to learn about Japanese culture to Jane McMurrer, her Spanish teacher at Center Grove High School, where she graduated in 2003.

"Center Grove did have a Japanese program, but I was not able to take it," Moffett said. "She tried to encourage me to still pursue that interest. She's a really amazing woman."

McMurrer wrote the recommendation letter that Moffett submitted when applying to the Hokkaido University program.

Thanks in part to the encouragement of friends and mentors, Moffett now looks forward to the four and a half years that she and Chip will spend in Japan. On this particular trip, which will be their fourth, Moffett hopes to widen her understanding of Japan's vast and complex culture.

"I know that there's a lot that I'm missing," she said. "So to be able to have a better understanding of not only the language, but the culture, and the history behind everything, is going to be great."

However, Moffett knows that earning another bachelor's degree will be a challenge, especially since she's past typical undergraduate age. She worries that her perfectionism may become an obstacle once she begins her studies.

"Maybe these younger kids are going to be quicker at picking this up than I will be, but thankfully, I study really hard, and hopefully that'll be enough," she said.

No matter the academic hurdles, Moffett knows that her appreciation for Japan won't fade. She loves the great food, the friendly people, and the sights that you can't find in America.

Moffett encourages students of all ages to be themselves and to pursue whatever goal interests them the most. Though she spent most of her education shying away from bigger dreams and sticking with more "practical" ambitions, she now knows that Japan is what she's most passionate about.

"It sounds like kind of a cliché, but it's not too late to go for something that you're interested in," she said.

# City of Greenwood sees major boost in recycling

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**Environment** – The City of Greenwood has collected nearly 1,000 tons of recycling in 2017, a 31 percent increase over the first half of 2016. The number of resident households participating in recycling has risen dramatically as well, from approximately 5,700 to nearly 8,700 households and counting.

Greenwood Mayor Mark W. Myers attributes the success to program changes implemented at the beginning of 2017, including new wheeled bins and bi-weekly pickup schedules.


"We anticipated improvements in participation based on early positive feedback, but the immediate spike has been better than we could have imagined," said Myers. "This initiative obviously strikes a chord with residents."

Last fall, Greenwood announced several improvements to its recycling services designed to increase resident participation, decrease carbon emissions and lower the amount of solid waste sent to landfills. Major highlights of the new program, which took effect Jan. 1, 2017, include: New, 96-gallon, wheeled bins that have quickly become the industry standard for municipal waste management. Residents were previously using an 18-gallon bin; Bi-weekly pickup, cutting in half pollution emitted by trucks collecting recyclables along the 220 miles that make up the coverage area. Previous pickup was done weekly; No initial or additional fees for Greenwood residents.

# **The House** A big gamble, an even bigger loss

Las Vegas is a city built entirely from the generosity, over indulgence of losers. The opportunities to gamble in Sin City are seemingly endless. Hop off a plane at Mc-Carran International Airport in Las Vegas and likely one of the first things to greet you will be a slot machine. The odds of winning are stacked considerably against the players, but there must be something about bright, shiny lights that compels people to throw money away. Gambling and losing to the house is generally the only sure thing. One recently-released movie takes this idea of gambling and the odds being stacked in the house's favor and runs with it.

The House is the absurd story of two middle-aged parents Scott and Kate Johansen (Will Ferrell and Amy Poehler). Scott and Kate's pride and joy, their 18-year-old daughter Alex, is on the verge of graduating from high school and has begun applying to schools. After falling in love with Bucknell, Alex applies and is soon after admitted, filling Alex and her parents with overwhelming happiness. However, those feelings of joy dissipate rather quickly.

After their town discontinues providing one student each year with a college scholarship, Scott and Kate realize they don't have the funds necessary to cover Alex's tuition. Determined to come up with the money, Scott, Kate and a friend decide to open a casino. Their illegal enterprise is soon raking in the cash, but not everyone is pleased. Scott and Kate find themselves facing down a town councilor, the police and a dangerous mobster. As is to be expected from a comedy starring Will Ferrell, *The House* is paper thin when it comes to story. Instead, the film is simply a vehicle for Ferrell and Poehler to flex their comedic muscles. Now, while both are funny and talented performers, all of their antics and jokes are telegraphed from a mile away. Absolutely nothing new comedically is brought to the table. Nearly every joke, funny look or outrageous situation feels recycled from every other Ferrell or Poehler film.

The lone bright spot - if it can be referred to as one - is that the film is rather short. It's not even 90 minutes long. In a time when most films are two hours or longer, *The House* keeps it short and sweet. Two hours of this would've been unbearable.

*The House* is a lazy film in nearly every aspect. The premise is weak, the story is worse and the jokes are tired and uninspired. The filmmakers and the performers both phoned this one in. When it comes to *The House*, everyone loses. 2 out 5.

# Holy hot dog, grill man!

As American as apple pie, the bunwrapped, handheld bundle of smoky summer deliciousness is a sacred tradition. Nobody wants to hear this, but you at least need to know. Over the recent years, a lot of negative attention has been drawn to hot dogs. If you eat the more than one a week, here are some helpful facts.

Why should you be concerned about a historic tradition? Today's processed meats are consistently associated with adverse health effects. A study by the Cancer Research Center of Hawaii and the University of Southern California links eating processed meats with cancer. The seven-year study found that people who ate the most processed meats had a 67 percent higher risk of pancreatic cancer than those who ate the least amount. USC epidemiologist found that children who eat more than 12 hot dogs per month have nine times the normal risk of developing childhood leukemia. In another study, children who ate hot dogs one or more times per week were also at higher risk of brain cancer. The problem: they're processed, contain cancerous nitrates and negligible nutrition.

Yale University Prevention Research Center say diets say high in processed meats preserved with nitrosamines compounds (Nitrates) have also been linked to increased risk for diabetes, higher mortality, more cardiovascular disease.

Studies show the effects of processed meats more harmful in people who don't eat garden fresh produce. However, when you eat hot dogs along with an antioxidant-rich plant foods like tomatoes, broccoli, lime, cherries, kiwi, lemon, or orange juice, the Vitamin C keeps nitrites from changing into nitrosamines, which may help reduce the risk of cancer associated with these ungodly chemicals. Hot dog's high levels of sodium aggravate high blood pressure and water retention.

Clearly, purchasing a brand without nitrates is the wise solution. In response to consumer awareness and demand, Oscar Meyer has released a 'nitrate-free" hot dog. Hooray, a shed of conscience. This response clearly implies there is a problem.

There are nitrate-free dogs: Lightlife Smart Dogs, Applegate Uncured Hot dogs, to name a few. What bun?: Use a whole wheat bun or wrap, but slapping a grilled dog on traditional AP white flour hot dog bun like we have for decades, can or already has, deteriorates your health.

Go ahead and enjoy hot dogs, but seek nitrate-free or alternative brands and eat some fresh produce along with the wiener the world has long awaited.
