



The Indianapolis Catacombs

HAUNTS & JAUNTS

Visitors to the City Market in downtown Indianapolis tread along a historic corridor of the city's past. Originating in the 1880s, it's one of the oldest markets in the city, and as in the past, a hub of shopping, goods and most important—socializing. However, there was once another building of some significance occupying space adjoining the market. It met a tragic demise, yet leaving a remnant behind. How many realize today there is a large space just under their feet? Welcome to the Indianapolis Catacombs!

Tomlinson Hall formerly sat there. It was a large, four-story Roman Renaissance building, built in the 1880s of brick and Indiana limestone, and used for sporting events and public entertainment. It was the place to go in its heyday! In 1958 it burnt to the ground. Today, all that remains of the historic building is an east facing archway in the plaza. The rest of Tomlinson Hall lies just beneath...

Catacombs are usually underground systems traditionally used to bury the dead. They were popular overseas in the past. The Indianapolis Catacombs are no such animal (no bodies or skulls), yet are worth the look. It's essentially a 100-year-old basement that in its time was used for storage. Its entrance is hidden from public view; no outside entrance. A set of stairs descends down into a dirt floor. Barrel vaulted ceilings distributed among 140 arched columns become a backdrop to a winding labyrinth of corridors,

hallways and rooms. There is light for the tourists, yet it is damp and smells musty as you would expect a basement to.

After the 1958 fire the basement was never filled in, which I imagine was a cost factor at the time. This basement area was abandoned, lost to the ravages of time. Today, restoration of these 'catacombs' would extend into the millions. Who has that kind of money?

Are the catacombs haunted? Some think so. Paranormal investigators ache to investigate the catacombs, but as of yet no invitation's been extended. Many have had impressions during a public tour. And several workers and volunteers have creepy stories to tell. Others give the "deer in the headlights" look when questioned about paranormal activity. (Our guide did) Some don't like coming down into the catacombs alone. One story involves a horse drawn carriage, placed there for storage many eons ago, and found later in another location—with no tracks in the dirt. It's still there. I asked our guide about THAT story. He gave me the 'stare.'

A guided tour with lights and lots of people is one thing. Going down there in the dark, alone, in a maze of archways would be completely something else. Make your reservation on-line for a tour (May through October). For the moment, it's the only way.

BEECH GROVE CITY COUNCIL

Meeting, June 5

What happened:

Ordinance #4 was approved on third reading, Ordinance #5, 6 and 7 were approved on first reading.

What it means:

Ordinance #4 updates park rules and regulations. Ordinance #5 is additional appropriation for the Churchman Avenue sidewalk project in the amount of \$215,000.

Ordinance # 6 would allow open burning with some safety regulations. "If it's done in a safe manner, which most people will, I think there should be some rules around it," said Councilor Vito Mascari who sponsored the ordinance. Fire pits should be six inches in depth, surrounded by cement blocks or bricks with six inches in height.

Ordinance #7 alters the rule on poultry. Resident have expressed a desire to raise chickens. The current ordinance says no poultry. City County ordinance allows 12 chickens with one rooster. This ordinance says no roosters and maximum six hens.

What's next:

Ordinance 4 goes into effect. The remaining ordinances will undergo second reading at the July 10 council meeting.

In Brief ...

• The Beech Grove Fire Department presented its needs they will have in the coming year. The department is looking to replace its air packs, radios, turnout gear, cots for the ambulance and more. The air packs, breathing apparatus, are past the recommended replacement date. It will cost \$223,000 to outfit the department. The radios are also at the end of their life. Motorola will no longer produce parts or offer replacement. The personal radios alone cost \$5,200 a piece and the department will need 25. The automatic cots are designed to not flip and be easier on the paramedics to lift. The total requested amount is upwards of \$700,000. Clerk/Treasurer Dan McMillan said that it will not be possible to grant this entire amount. The fire dept. is looking into grant funding for the air packs.

GREENWOOD COMMON COUNCIL

Meeting, June 5

What happened:

7-29 was introduced to the council

What it means:

Ordinance 17-29 seeks to amend the Municipal Code regulating the parking of boats, boat trailers, campers, travel trailers, recreational vehicles, and commercial vehicles on residential property to clarify the waiver process. The Board of Public Works and Safety may consider (1) the physical characteristics of the property (2) property size and spacing between homes, (3) the amount of time specified, (4) whether the arrangement existed before the ordinance, (5) safety and visibility concerns, (6) the condition of the item in question, and (7) the surface on which the object will be parked when granting waivers to residents.

What's next:

Ordinance 17-29 will go before the council for its first reading at the June 19th meeting.

Roberta Jaggers grew up with a librarian who was supportive of whatever she chose to read. That free and open access to literature has been a theme throughout her life. As president of The Indianapolis Public Library Foundation, she leads fundraising efforts which benefit library programs. As a mother, she encourages her daughter to participate in the library's activities.

"I do compartmentalize, but there is a blending of that, too," she said. "I can see the connection of what I'm doing at the library makes me a better mom and what I'm doing with my daughter makes me better at what I do at the library foundation."

Roberta now resides in Franklin Township with her husband, Doug. She described herself as having been a "frequent flier"

to the Stanford Free Library where she grew up in a New York small town. As a child, she would go there to read. She began to volunteer as a teenager, keeping the card catalog up to date and labeling the books.

Roberta moved to Indianapolis in 2001 to attend graduate school at what is now the Lilly School of Philanthropy and School of Public Environmental Affairs at IUPUI. She had the opportunity to apply for an internship, and with help of a member of the school staff, be-

came the Indianapolis Public Library Foundation's first-ever intern in May 2002. Though she left to study abroad in the spring of 2003, when she returned, she was offered a full-time position at the foundation in April 2003.

"I started at the library foundation interested in grant writing," she said. "But I quickly realized that it's not just about writing. It's also about a building relationship with a donor."

She gives credit to her many mentors, especially past president Danny Dean for seeing potential in her as a leader before she saw it in herself.

"I had a lot of good mentors but above all I was fortunate to have a president who I served under who is still involved in the foundation," Roberta said, "for him to recognize there was a succession need at the library foundation and see the potential to develop me into a strong candidate for the position."

Roberta became the second president in the foundation's history on Jan. 1, 2016. The foundation started in 1969 as a volunteer organization, hiring Dean in the 90s. There

are now a total of nine staff members and 24 volunteers serving on the board of directors.

"I've worked hard to develop my own leadership capabilities, to be the awesome leader that they deserve," she said. "I think I have reached good. They're an awesome team and they deserve an awesome leader so I keep working. I'm proud of all of them and appreciative of their part. I'm keenly aware that I can't do it all myself... They've given me the peace of mind that if a challenge comes up, they have my back. They're so supportive and engaged."

Her first year as president was

about stabilization. She said while the organization was in great shape, there was a lot of change at one time.

In her first day as president, Roberta wrote a letter and attached a photo of herself at four years old, sitting in the very front as her

librarian read a book to the children. It demonstrates that love of reading that was instilled in her as a youngster, an example of the impact of the foundation's library funding. It also exemplifies something she is passing along to her daughter, Anna, age 6, who attends Acton Elementary School. Roberta maintains a notebook with each book she and Anna have read together for the Indianapolis Public Library's summer reading program. She tries to read with Anna for 20 minutes each night. She even went to Anna's Career Day to speak about the foundation and the Summer Reading Program which began June 5.

"It's a way to share with her my love of reading and she loves to read anyway," she said. "There are times she pushes me to the library. Plus, the concept of teaching responsibility. These books that we're getting from the library, we're borrowing these and sharing them with the community so we have to take care of them. We need to encourage children to be more civically minded and using your public library is a great way to do that."

This year at the foundation, Roberta's goals revolve around improvement.

"This year, it's about picking up your head, looking around and what can we do better," she said. "About 76 percent of our expenses are on

library programs. I think we're efficient but how can we be more efficient?"

Looking ahead, the foundation will reach its 50th anniversary in 2019. Roberta said they're beginning to plan what that celebration will look like. Her goals are to make sure they are constantly maximizing their impact and keep the four dation operations healthy.

"I think our anniversary will create a public opportunity for us to do those things," she said. "I'm excited about how we can help every person and every child enrich their lives through lifelong learning. We want to do additional outreach and programming. So stay tuned."

Take a look at the new Greenwood Community Middle School building as construction continues

Greenwood Middle School administration is moving into its new building this week.

The district is replacing the aging 140,000 square-foot building on Madison Avenue with a 160,000 square-foot building next to Freedom Park off Averitt Road.

Although construction continues, the building is expected to be completed by the end of June, with teachers and remaining staff to move in at the end of July.

The new middle school has 46 classrooms, compared to 43 at the old school, with space to grow as needed. The school currently has 910 students, and the new building can hold 1,100.

The new building is energy efficient, with LED lighting that is motion activated and large windows that let natural light flow into each classroom.

The three-story building is designed so that each grade level is on its own floor, with eighth grade on the first floor, sixth grade on the second floor and seventh grade on top. Each classroom has a whiteboard that spans from floor to ceiling, so stu-

dents have plenty of space to write or use the projector.

The two gyms are side-by-side with large doors that open, so one event can use both spaces. In the old building, the gyms were on opposite sides of the school. The band/choir will now have its own space. The old school had to transform its conference rooms into classrooms, so in the new building there are five designated conference rooms, as well as a community room for district training.

Outside, the design will allow student drop off and pick up to happen in the parking lot and not impede upon traffic on the road, making it more safe and efficient. The middle school will now have its own track around the football field, as well as a building for concession, athletic locker rooms and public restrooms.

"Efficiency was the whole goal on everything we've done," said Assistant Superintendent Todd Pritchett. "How can we make it more efficient from the layout, energy efficient, student and teacher aspects of it. It's efficient and functional at the same time."





Ronacli's Paige Saylor wins State title



Wonder Woman

The brightest star in DC's universe

While summer will not officially begin for another couple of weeks, as far as Hollywood is concerned, the hottest season of the year is in full swing. Some the year's most anticipated blockbusters have already opened in theaters like *Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 2, Alien: Covenant* and *Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Men Tell No Tales.* Additionally, the summer has already had its share of bombs like Snatched and King Arthur: Legend of the Sword. Regardless, the summer box office season still has a ways to go, but arguably the biggest film of the season hit theaters this past weekend.

Wonder Woman is the story of superhero Diana (Gal Gadot), princess of the Amazons and her quest to kill Ares, the Greek god of war. The film begins with our heroine as a child as she watches and mimics the moves of her all-female society's warriors. Diana yearns to be on the battlefield, to be a soldier and fight for the innocent and those unable to protect themselves. Despite Diana's many persistent and impassioned pleas to receive warrior training, her mother, the queen, remains

steadfast in her opposition to the idea. Unwilling to take no for an answer, Diana goes behind her mother's back and begins receiving instruction in the way of the warrior from her aunt. However, a plane crash changes her life forever, forcing her to put her training to the test.

After saving the life of British spy Steve Trenor (Chris Pine), the first man she's ever seen, Diana hears tales about "the war to end all wars," WWI. Almost instantly, Diana is convinced Ares is behind all the death and destruction. Soon after Diana is on the battlefield deflecting bullets and killing German soldiers with little effort. She's unstoppable; no one has answers for this mysterious woman. However, a force reveals itself that may prove to be too powerful even Wonder Woman.

Wonder Woman is yet another attempt from DC to right the ship after last year's disappointing Suicide Squad and the even worse Batman and Superman flick. Luckily, the third time appears to have been the charm. Gal Gadot as the iconic heroine is excellent. She's tough and brutal whenever necessary as she disposes of German soldiers, but is also able to handle the film's surprisingly large amount of humor with ease. Chris Pine as Wonder Woman's love interest and sidekick also provides a solid performance.

As far as the story goes, it's nearly as pleasant as the performances of its two leads. The film adequately tells Wonder Woman's origin and yet, still manages to tell a full story, showcasing the superhero in her first fight to save the world from annihilation. However, the film's biggest flaw is due to the writing. Late, late in the film, there is a twist that essentially comes out of left field, so much so that it almost feels tacked on.

Despite two previous very big swings and misses, DC has connected in a big way with Wonder Wom-

an. At this point, Wonder Woman looks to be the brightest star in the DC universe.



Strawberry Love

NUTRITION

Bright red, juicy and sweet strawberries are jam-packed with health-creating vitamins, minerals and antioxidants. The heart-shaped orbs are highly perishable and should be purchased only a few days prior to eating. Don't wash them till you're ready to eat. They are delightful additions to your smoothie, granola, salad or by the handful.

Did you know strawberries are the only plant with seeds on outside? Or that one cup of vine-ripened berries contains more vitamin C than an orange? The red orbs contain magnesium, copper that supports growth, hair and eyes and potassium for heart health, anti-cancer antioxidants that speed-bump aging and prevent oxygen damage to your temples' cells and organs. Seniors who eat the

most strawberries were three times less likely to develop cancer compared to those eating few or no strawberries. (beatcancer.org/blog-posts/can-strawberries-prevent-cancer) The *Journal of Agriculture and Food Chemistry* says anthocyanins which create their color are potent antioxidants that prevent oxygen damage to your temples cells and organs.

The fibrous berry assists digestion, promotes gut health, holds B-vitamins for overall health, and iodine for your temple's thyroid. Lastly, strawberries contain Omega 3 for brain and heart wholeness.

Chocolate Strawberry Pie

Inspired by: chocolatecoveredkatie.com

- 2 1/2 cups washed and stemmed strawberries, fresh or frozen
- 1/4 cup plus 2 tbsp. cocoa or cacao powder
- 1/2 cups raw cashews
- 1/2 tbsp. vanilla extract
- 1/3 cup virgin coconut oil (melted)
 1/8 tsp stevia powder-
- We use Sweet Leaf Brand.
- 1/8 tsp Himalayan salt
- 4 tbsp. water
- In a bowl, cover the cashews with water and let sit at least 4 hours. Then drain and pat dry.
- Combine all ingredients in a Vita-Mix or highpowered blender or food processor. Only if using stevia, add 4 tablespoons water.
- Blend until a super-smooth texture is achieved. Taste and add more sweetener until desired taste is reached.
- Pour into a prepared pie crust (see below the next photo for a crust recommendation), and freeze.

Chocolate Pie Crust

- 2 tbsp. cocoa powder or cacao powder
- 1/2 cup raw cashews (or almonds, walnuts, pecans,)
- 1/8 tsp. Himalayan salt
- 1/2 cup shredded unsweetened coconut
- 1/2 cup pitted dates or raisins
- 8-inch baking pie pan
- Combine all ingredients in a food processor and blend. Then transfer to an 8-in baking dish or pan.
- Using a piece of wax or parchment paper, smash into the pan and pour filling on top.
- Top with sliced berries and refrigerate until ready to use.
