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

Wishin' & Hopin' & paranormal beginnings

There are those songs that bring back memories of a time long ago, when life was an experience of discovery with a sense of mystery attached. Back then one could never imagine growing old. Nor, imagine the people surrounding them not being there for all time. Days of summer were endless... time crept at a snail's pace. Unfortunately, as we grow older time accelerates as months and years become a blur in the rear-view mirror. And, a small town in southern Kentucky where my interest in the paranormal began...

Jamestown, sitting upon Lake Cumberland, was my entry of discovery. It's remained timeless to this day, changing little since the days of my youth. It's a large and a beckoning playground for the tourists, yet seasonally they go home, with Jamestown returning as it's always been – locked into the past.

Grandmother Lucille worked as a cook at a restaurant in Russell Springs in those summers of my youth. She was a southern chef on a level all her own! Many of those summers I would spend a couple of weeks going to work with her at the restaurant. She would plant me at a table with an endless supply of Mountain Dew (the original, with pure cane sugar) as she cooked for the noontime lunch crowd. And there was the jukebox: tall and lighted, sitting by the front door. The door was always opened from the heat of the kitchen and no air conditioning. In 1964, the music would feed out onto the sidewalk and the town's street. Dusty Springfield's "Wishin' and Hopin" and the Drifter's "Under the Boardwalk." It made an imprint, never failing in later years to associate those memories with the smell of cheeseburgers and French fries.

We'd return home at the end of her shift. Grandfather Arnold would eventually arrive from his job at the Jamestown Dock, lighting a cigarette and watching the TV news from his

recliner as my grandmother prepared dinner. Her cooking never ended! Afterward, I'd sit on the porch, contemplating the day, music, and the paranormal. It got awfully dark there!

Small towns are rather mum on the subject of ghosts. If asked, you get not only that far-away look, but also a slight smile upon the lips revealing nothing, yet, speaking volumes! The small house on Sunset Drive in Jamestown raised six children. It still stands. Although no longer in the family since my uncle's death in 2015, it's where it all began for me. There were stories from my mother about seeing an apparition of her sister, Mary Lou, who died in 1941. She never wavered from her experience. Grandma Lucille always gave a tight-lipped smile when asked about it. Grandpa Arnold would light another cigarette and not comment.

A solitary streetlight cast a dim expanse of light over my grandparent's house at night. As kids it was a limited oasis in a world of surrounding darkness, as crickets chirped, lightning bugs flashed and nighttime shrouded the property into shadows. Darkness became my and other grandkids (Indiana and Kentucky) refuge, as we put lightning bugs into mason iars and explored the darkness; vet, within limits. We would terrorize Arnold's tobacco field, but never venture into the field beyond the backyard. It was too dark and beyond the streetlight's grasp. And safety! There was just too much unknown back there!

As for now, the music continues...

"Wishin' and hopin' and thinkin' and prayin'... plannin' and dreamin'... each night of his charms, that won't get you into his arms."

THE CHAINSTONER OF SUMMER

CHAMP Camp provides a special group of campers a memorable summer experience

There is something magical about Indiana summers. Just the mere mention of the word summer sparks countless childhood memories for many Hoosiers. It is likely several of these vivid recollections involve the outdoors: playing by the water, spending time at a park and barbeques with family. Then, there is the long-lost gift that is summer camp. How could anyone forget the opportunity to spend time away from home out in the wilderness creating friendships, building a respect for nature and making memories that will last a lifetime?

Henry David Thoreau once stated, "I took a walk in the woods and came out taller than the trees." Unfortunately, fewer children are getting the opportunity to experience this "walk in the woods" each summer. However, thanks to the work of Greenwood resident, Jennifer Kobylarz and her organization, CHAMP Camp, a very special group gets to experience camp and take "a walk" each summer.

A vision is born

In early 1991, David Carter, a hospital administrator with a background in respiratory therapy and Nancy McCurdy, a child life specialist, came together to form a shared vision. The duo wanted to provide a summer overnight camping experience for children with tracheostomies or requiring technological or ventilator assistance.

While working in a pediatric rehabilitation, Carter and McCurdy saw many children diagnosed with quadriplegia, a spinal condition that usually results in a paraly-

sis of all four limbs, benefit from the advances in technology and medical science. Even though these patients were receiving a chance at life, they required around the clock attention and support, making them unable to participate in many childhood activities such as camping. That realization drove the pair to make it their mission to make the outdoors accessible to these children. By August 1991, CHAMP Camp was born, receiving incorporated status from the state of Indiana and becoming an established 501c3 nonprofit.

The summer camp experience

In its earlier years, CHAMP Camp was hosted at Recreation Unlimited in Ashley, Ohio. As the program continued to grow, it was relocated to Bradford Woods in Martinsville. Owned by Indiana University and nationally-recognized for its outdoor education and therapeutic recreation, Bradford Woods became the perfect location for CHAMP Camp.

The Indiana location allowed the organization to build on their mission of providing an outdoor summer camp experience for young patients with tracheostomies or require respiratory assistance. Participants are given the opportunity to engage in activities such as swimming, canoeing and climbing while building independence, confidence and self-esteem.

CHAMP Campers spend an entire week at Bradford Woods with a group of nurses, therapists, speech pathologists, specialists, teachers, physicians and recreational professionals, who volunteer their time to be "counselors" and help establish a feeling of community for participants. Jennifer Kobylarz, executive director of CHAMP Camp, shared, "Our volunteers are truly awesome. They really take a week away from their jobs to be friends and mentors."

Soaring to new heights

As the popularity of CHAMP Camp grew, the organization continued to look for ways to offer more to campers each summer. During the fall of 2012, the nonprofit's founders dreamt of building an accessible zip-line for CHAMP Campers to experience. A few years later, CHAMP Camp was able to turn this dream into a reality. "We always let our imaginations run wild when trying to find ways to create new experiences and memories for our campers. We are proud to say that in partnership with the Finish Line Youth Foundation in 2014, we constructed a 375-foot accessible zip-line for our campers to enjoy. Since many of our campers have wheelchairs and ventilators, getting the chance to zip line through the trees was an amazing new reality and experience," Kobylarz stated.

The dream does not end there. The Greenwood resident went on to include that the nonprofit's next vision includes a wheelchair accessible ramp (that is currently being completed) and treehouse for participants. The best part? The executive director explains, "It's about so much more than just CHAMP Camp. Nearly 900 kids with chronic illnesses and disabilities from

camps like Camp Riley, Little Red Door, Muscular Dystrophy Association and Easter Seals will have the opportunity to enjoy an amazing new experience they simply can't anywhere else."

A shared vision

While CHAMP Camp have provided countless memories for their special campers for the past several years, maybe their biggest impact can be seen in how they bring support together for their vision. Being a nonprofit organization, one can imagine the financial cost associated with providing an opportunity of this scale and never turning away a family due to expenses. CHAMP Camp has created a shared vision with the Indianapolis community and drawn its support through two annual fundraisers: the Silver Sneaker Benefit Ball and a golf outing.

Hosted at the Conrad in Indianapolis, the Silver Sneaker Ball includes a cocktail hour, Bourbon pull, a live and silent auction, as well as dancing throughout the evening. For the past two years, this popular fundraiser has seen the Indianapolis Colts serve as the Presenting Sponsor and Colts offensive lineman Anthony Castonzo has attended in his support of this amazing cause, making it the organization's largest fundraising event of the year.

This year's golf outing will take place on Aug. 29 at the Hickory Stick Golf Club in Greenwood.

The value of the 'walk'

Remembering the words of Thoreau, one cannot help but be moved by CHAMP Camp's vision of using nature to build individuals up against insurmountable challenges. The famed naturalist used his "walk" in nature to represent the personal growth that nature can provide. As CHAMP Camp prepares for its 28th year of camp from June 17 – 21, thanks to the work of Kobylarz and the organization, everyone involved, from the campers to the volunteers to the donors, can walk a little taller this summer.

Three questions with CHAMP Camp Executive Director Jennifer Kobylarz:

What is CHAMP Camp's greatest moment?

I would say that CHAMP Camp does not have just one greatest moment. Every summer we celebrate magical moments each and every time one of our campers experiences a new accomplishment or develops a new friendship.

What is next for CHAMP Camp?

Our next goal is to build a wheelchair accessible treehouse at Bradford Woods. In the past five years, we have funded and built two accessible zip lines and a wheelchair accessible ramp leading up into the staging area for the zip lines. The treehouse will be the final phase of this project.

Can you share one of the best comments you've heard at CHAMP Camp?

Our favorite comment is from one of our campers. After coming down the zip line, they said they finally felt free from their wheelchair and that they felt like they were flying.

Water skiing squirrel splashes into Indianapolis for county fair

Standing in a heated, inflatable pool, Lou Ann Best stoops toward the water as she's done for nearly 40 years.

She holds a handle and skis in place behind a remote-controlled boat with one hand and releases Twiggy the water skiing squirrel into the water with the other. The squirrel, wearing a cape that doubles as a floatation device, shoots toward the skis. A moment later, Twiggy's standing on her hind legs, holding the handles and skimming the wake.

Best and Twiggy have done the act hundreds of times – at county fairs and expos, on film and screen, even at the X Games. They'll bring the show to Indianapolis for the last time from June 15 - 19 with a string of performances at the Marion County Fair before their retirement.

Twiggy first took to the water 40 years ago. Lou Ann's husband, Chuck, bought their daughter a remote-control boat, but played with it himself most of the time and his family wouldn't let him forget it. Finally, he had enough and joked that he had to drive it, if he was going to teach the squirrel they'd rescued from a storm to water ski.

People thought he was nuts but he managed to do it the same way he'd taught a chimpanzee to roller skate and a French poodle to surf.

"You bet my husband he can't do anything, you bet your bottom dollar he's going to do it," Lou Ann said.

Soon after, a newspaper reporter visited the Bests' roller skating rink to do a story. He learned about Twiggy while he was there and another story followed. The coverage cascaded as bigger and bigger outlets called.

"Out of the country, even, people were sending us clippings of Twiggy in the newspaper," she said.

The first newspaper story hit May 21, 1979. By August, Twiggy was performing in front of America on the TV show, *Real People*.

The show's changed over the years.

In 1997, Chuck died trying to save a drowning person after a boating accident. In his haste to save them, he didn't put on a life jacket, Lou Ann says.

She wanted to quit the show after her husband and Twiggy III died, but people kept calling.

"I'm like, 'I have one little squirrel, she's

my grandbaby," Lou Ann recalled. "She was born in my closet from another rescued squirrel. Let me see if I can train her and I'll call you back."

Now she and Twiggy VII – who always wears her life jacket – focus on water safety education with the hope of making a difference. They teach people how to float and why life jackets are important.

They listen, though not necessarily to Lou Ann.

"I just wanted to let you know I learned to float just like Twiggy said," she remembers a boy telling her after a Texas show. "A light bulb went off. They hear Twiggy, not me."

That, she says, makes the difference.

Day's public service extends to Marion County Fair Board

Susie Day's connection to the Marion County Fair dates to her 4-H days.

"I'm a lifelong Perry Township resident, so I grew up in 4-H (cooking and sewing) as a youngster, which is pretty common for everybody in my generation. It was like the Scouts," said Day, a 1968 Southport

High School graduate. "I've always gone to the Fair since I live in Beech Grove."

She has worked at various booths at the Fair over the years. When Day was a member of the Indianapolis City-County Council, she served on the administration and finance committee, which oversees the Marion County Fair's budget.

"I got to know different board members then," Day said. "My husband (Harold) passed away in 2015 and in 2016, one of the board members asked me if I would be interested and I said 'yes.' That's how I got on and I was elected secretary at the beginning of this year. I have a few duties overseeing the office staff and maintenance man, basically over-

seeing the human resources portion."

It is Day's second year on the Marion County Agricultural Fair Association Board after being elected at the end of 2016. The 88th annual Marion County Fair runs from June 15 – 24 at the Marion County Fairgrounds.

During the Fair, Day oversees the four admission gates. Day said different community groups handle the gates, such Franklin Township Lions Club and Southport High School athletic groups.

"It's a good little fundraiser for a group for 10 days," said Day, who has been the Perry Township Trustee since 2014 and is seeking re-election in the fall

Day said she loves the time at the Fair.

"It keeps me out and going," Day said. "I do it for something to fill my life. I thought, 'This is a good thing, it's for the kids.' It's just a new chapter of my life for me. I've probably enjoyed it more than I honestly thought I would."

Even though Day doesn't have much time to relax.

"I'm pretty busy, checking the gates," Day said. "I have to direct traffic and traffic gets backed up. It's pretty much a full-time job. I'm hopping from the time I get

there until it closes down."

Fair Board President John Gardner appreciates the long hours Day puts in.

"She will be very busy making sure that everyone can get into the fairgrounds smoothly," Gardner said.

People are excited about the return of a roller coaster ride called the Mouse-trap, Day said. In addition, Day said there is buzz about Twiggy, the water-skiing squirrel, making one last time at the Fair from June 15-19. The animal act operator, Lou Ann Best, is retiring the popular act after 40 years. Twiggy has been performed by several gray squirrels trained in succession over the years.

"We had record crowds last year and, hopefully the weather will cool down a bit because it gets warm out there," Day said. "We just repaved our Midway and we're excited about that. Before it partially paved. It's looking good out there."

Day served on the Beech Grove City Council from 1990 – 96 and Perry Township Advisory Board from 1997 – 2003. She served two terms for Indianapolis City Councilor, starting in 2004. Fair fun continued from page 8.

Seek help for mental illness

Last week, designer Kate Spade and travel documentation/television personality Anthony Bourdain both lost their lives to suicide. Both were successful, popular and had young daughters; why would they choose to end their lives?

Mental illness is a widespread condition that does not discriminate. Celebrities, war veterans, old or young, rich or poor can all suffer from depression, anxiety and other mental disorders. Since 1999, U.S. suicides have increased by 25 to 30 percent. Only half the people who died were diagnosed with a mental health condition, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Relationship problems, substance abuse and financial troubles contribute toward rising trends. And despite prevalent bullying among teenagers, middle-aged adults have been the most vulnerable population.


Lack of immediate access to mental health centers may be another reason for the upward trend. Waiting to get appointments for psychiatric care and then waiting for medications to take effect only prolong an individual's suffering.



Relay for Life holds annual glow run

Having cancer is never fun. Yet this year's Relay for Life of Southeast Indy promises that raising money to help those with the disease can be.

The Fourth Annual Midnight 5K Glow Run, benefitting the American Cancer Society, will start at 6 p.m. on June 15 at Beech Grove High School's football field. The event, which concludes at 6 p.m. on June 16, invites participants to run, walk and party in a glow tent.

"Relay for Life to me is a big party to help those who have heard those words, 'You have cancer' and to let them know that they are not in this battle alone," said Andrea Brooks, event leadership team member. "We have all kinds of entertainment going on during the 24 hours that we are there."

Festivities include live music, a silent auction, contests (including a Halloween costume, amateur pie and frozen tee), Zumba, lap scrabble, card games and an ice cream sundae bar.

Featured bands include Bluescreamers (blues and rock), Vinnie and the Moochers (classic rock 'n roll), Howard & the Perfect Alibi (rock 'n roll), Pure Gold (classic rock, new country and alternative) and more.

Silent auction items include sporting/concert tickets, food/drink baskets, artwork, legal planning sessions, small furniture and more.

Last year's glow run raised about \$38,000. This year, the goal is \$46,000.

Participants may register online at getmeregistered.com (type Southeast Indy under "search"). Online registration, due by June 14 at 4:30 p.m. is \$15 (which includes a T-shirt) or \$20 for the deluxe package, which includes three "glow gear" in addition to a Tshirt). Registering on the day of the event is \$25 and includes a T-shirt and glow gear, while supplies last. Those under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

Brooks encourages those affected by cancer, including friends and family members, to come for support.

"If I can offer someone battling cancer some support by either lending them my shoulder to lean on or get them to the American Cancer Society for the help and guidance that they need or even introduce them to one of our Relay family members that has been in their shoes to help answer some questions, then it was all worth it," she said. "The caregivers of the cancer patient also need our support since they are the ones who have to be strong for their loved ones and family. No one needs to fight this battle alone."

Growing up a preacher's grandkid, incongruous to The Word, the flock's social life centered around gluttony; lacey buffet tables moaning under the mass of "carbolicious" mashed and au gratin potatoes, mac and cheese, potato salad, white rice, bread, sugary cakes, cookies, fried chicken and gravy. Burp!

According to WebMD, processed and refined foods like sugar and baked goods made with white flour have been indicted as the felon in America's "Diabesity" epidemic. Carbs, your temple's preferred form of fuel, are essential for health. We can't live without them — but we'd be infinitely healthier if we got our carbs from fruits, vegetables, sweet potatoes, raw hay, nuts and seeds, legumes, low-fat dairy, and whole grains. Drop the salt shaker. Salt overload increases risk of high blood pressure, stroke, heart failure, kidney disease, diabetes, cataracts, brittle bones, asthma,

dementia and early death. Choose pink Himalayan salt.

So, for the sake of your family's health and wellbeing, say buh-bye to salty French fries, lard or shortening, marshmallows, instant hot cereals, full-fat ice cream, fru-fru creamers, microwave popcorn, ranch and mayo salad dressings, white rice, white potatoes, white beans, and any product made with refined sugar, hydrogenated fats, and white flour bread or pasta that cause blood sugar to zoom and crash, causing overeating and weight gain. Exceptions are cauliflower, egg whites, parsnips, low-fat dairy or nut milk, white fish and white pork (not pork chops or fried tenderloin) and white meat poultry.

Say hello to smart carbs. According to Harvard School of Public Health: "Healthy, smart carbohydrates are found in whole, plant-based foods like fruits and vegetables, minimally processed whole-grain products like steelecut oatmeal, brown rice, quinoa and whole-wheat bread as well as beans, lentils, nuts and seeds. White potatoes are

one vegetable exception because their rich starch content can cause spikes in blood sugar despite their fiber content; sweet potatoes and beans are better options." Add reduced-fat dairy products, probiotic beverages, fortified nut milks, white beans, white-fleshed fish, skinless chicken, turkey breast, and more raw fruits and vegetables.

Instituting a white out will improve holy temple health. Do your best. You're only human but you'll make God smile by focusing on a plant-based diet of unaltered, colorful healing and sustaining edibles from the Earth's generous apothecary. Gluttony becomes far closer to home than we'd like to admit. At its simplest, gluttony is the soul's addiction to excess... without seeing our sin.

Life in the past lane

I'm nostalgic for the past. I collect vinyl records and listen to them on my vintage turntable. I live in a house that was built in 1890. I write a newspaper column, which is something at this point I'll have to explain to my grandkids from our colony on Mars. I'm a thirty-something with the soul of an octogenarian. I have a hard time admitting the past has passed.

The words "past" and "passed" are easier to get mixed up than a set of identical twins on school picture day. Their meanings are related, and we don't want to look dumb by confusing the two.

Past can be an adjective, noun, adverb and a preposition. Its meaning almost always refers to something that happened before the present time. For example: In the past, MTV played actual music videos. Over the past 12 months, an entire year has gone by. The time is a quarter past four. These uses of past all point to a time that happened prior to the present.

Passed is a verb that is the past participle of the word "pass." It means to move ahead or proceed. For example: In his career, Peyton Manning passed for 539 touchdowns, an NFL record. Congress passed no legislation last week. You get the idea.

Here's where things get confusing. You could correctly write "I somehow passed the elephant without seeing him." You could also correctly write "I somehow walked past the elephant without seeing him." The only difference in these two sentences is the word "walked." As a rule of thumb, use "past" whenever your sentence already includes an active verb like "walked."

Sometimes "passed" trips us up when it's not used as an active verb. For instance: Time has passed since we last met. He passed away. The local taco restaurant has finally passed its health inspection. Passed doesn't always indicate literal movement.

Past almost always deals with time. Passed almost always deals with movement. The easiest way to remember this is that past is a shorter word than passed and time is a shorter word than movement. I just need to make sure I don't get completely left in the past.





Weekly Devotion



15 At the end of every seven years you shall make a release.

2 And this is the manner of the release: Every creditor that lend ought unto his neighbor shall release it; he shall not exact it of his neighbor, or of his brother; because it is called the Lord's release.

3 Of a foreigner you may exact it again: but that which is yours with your brother your hand shall release.

4 Save when there shall be no poor among you; for the Lord shall greatly bless you in the land which the Lord your God gives you for an inheritance to possess it.

5 Only if you carefully hearken unto

the voice of the Lord your God, to observe to do all these commandments which I command you this day.

DEUTERONOMY 15:1-5

As I read this Law from the Lord to His people, there are several things that pop out at me. Mainly, it is a law of forgiveness. Every seven years there is to be this "release" from debt. A person would either be on the forgiving side or on the side of the forgiven or both. It is to be called "the Lord's release". It is to be for the Jews among the Jews and not for the foreigner who, hearing of the law, would attempt to take advantage of it to acquire money for a Jew which they would never have to pay back in full measure according to the Law.

Jesus taught His disciples to pray. In the prayer that Christ taught His disciples to pray is this: "Father forgive me my debts to You as I am willing to forgive those who are in debt to me." I had never made this connection before but I believe that I stand on solid ground making it now. God had forgiven the Jews and even claimed them as His own very special and people. For Him to do this, He had to forgive them their debt to Him. Thus, He tells them that they should forgive each other and make as special attempt to

do so every seven years. And, by the way, every 50th year was to be a year of "Jubilee" in which those in bondage to another was to be set free as well.

Isn't it a wonderful thing that God built into the wall types of our salvation and deliverance from our sindebt? This He did before He sent Christ, not to be a "debt-collector", but to be the One Who would settle our sin-debt.
