



Greater Southport/Perry Township Active Living Workshop sparks conversation

What makes an area a safe, healthy and thriving place to live? More than 40 residents, business leaders and stakeholders joined the Greater Southport/Perry Township Active Living Workshop on June 6 and spent the day discussing the importance of a healthy neighborhood and what can be done on the Southside of Indianapolis.

"It was so rewarding to welcome the 40+ workshop participants into the conversation on ways to make our community more vibrant for the future," stated Linda Adams, Purdue Extension as Community Wellness Coordinator and workshop organizer. "I am so glad that Southport Mayor Russell McClure saw the value of this workshop when it was just an idea on paper and suggested that we take the bold step of applying for the grant that would fund the workshop. The workshop certainly exceeded our expectations."

Speakers discussed the physical and mental benefits of being physically active and how having a walkable neighborhood can help make that happen.

There is one number may determine how healthy you are and how long you live," said Active Living Program Manager Kate Riordan during her presentation. "It isn't your weight, cholesterol or any of those numbers that doctors look at. It's your address... We're here today to talk about how to create healthy communities. In order to create healthy people they need to get more physical activity. In order to do that they need to have sidewalks, trails to walk or bike on. In order to create that healthy environment, we need to have healthy policies. We need to create the conditions for active living. We need to make it easy to be active."

After the presentations, participants took a 1/2 mile walk around Southport intersections and discussed the good and the bad for pedestrians. They then returned to Southport United Methodist Church to review maps and identify areas which are pedestrian-friendly and those which need work.

"The directed workshop presentation was very informative and really sparked a lot of conversation and excitement over what is really possible," Adams stated. "This workshop was a great example of cross-governmental cooperation with officials from both the City of Indianapolis and the City of Southport participating. One of the bonus benefits of the day was seeing the workshop participants having side conversations on ways that they can work with each other in their own realms of influence."

Those interested can help Share the Love with their fellow Southside residents by donating water, napkins, snacks, hotdogs, hamburger meat, juices, door prizes, candy and prizes for kids and more. Drop these items off at any of the three area Humble Impressions locations including 8236 S. Madison Ave., 3530 S. Keystone, 1609 East St.

"The Sharing the Love Day is gathering the churches, businesses and residential people to come together to show God's love. We will be giving food, feeding people, and then we will be doing door prizes and games," Pardue said.

Area churches, ministries and not-for-prof-

it organizations have contributed items and volunteers to the event. These include Apostolic Gospel Lighthouse, Garfield Park Baptist Church, Good Shepherd Church, New Life Baptist Church, House of Victory Church, and South Keystone Church of Christ. Some of the ministries involved are Servants Heart of Indy, Heart of Glory, Let Your Life Shine, Power of God Ministries, One Body Ministry, and others. Many businesses have also contributed.

"With all the churches with different denominations coming together, it is not about the religion. John 14:6 says Seek Jesus, not religion," said Pardue.

It will take place in the parking lot around Humble Impressions store on Keystone and the nearby Church of Christ is donating parking space for the event. Any donations given that day will go to church food pantries.

Pardue opened the first Humble Impressions location at 8236 S. Madison Ave., Indianapolis on June 19, 2012. Donations began pouring in and she continued to expand until she outgrew that space. She since expanded to 3530 S. Keystone Ave. in 2014, and 1609 East St. in 2016. She plans to open another in Taylorsville before the end of the year.

"It is amazing how it is growing, how people are learning what we are about." Pardue said. "They have a place to come to if they need food and clothing.

FAIR-ING WELL

Marion Counsty Fair Treasurer Don Glowinski, of Perry Township, shares how annual event has adapted and grown

A fair is unlike many other events. It changes every day, like a "living, breathing thing," said Marion County Fair Treasurer Don Glowinski.

"I like the challenge that it brings," he said. "Fair gets in your blood. Some people are racing people. Some people play tennis. Fair people are fair people. It's the smell of fair food. It's walking through the livestock building. It's hearing a rooster's crow when you're there at 6 o'clock pulling trash. It's the people, that are just genuine, good people. That's what draws me to it and why I'm still in it."

This year's fair is June 16 to 25, with free parking and a \$5 admission.

Glowinski, a St. Jude grade school and a 1979 Southport High School grad, would go to the fair as a kid. When his own children got involved in 4-H, showing rabbits, poultry and small animals, he began to volunteer his time. His wife, Cheryl Devol-Glowinski got it started and each of their five children went through the 4-H program.

"We don't do anything part way," Don said. "We jumped in with both feet. Next thing (my wife) knows, she has a backyard full of chickens and barn full of rabbits."

Glowinski, who owns DP Mechanical Services, LLC, has been on the board of directors for 12 years. He said although board members are only supposed to serve nine years, he has stayed on as an ex officio member.

"The fair is on a very good, financial base," he said. "We have a good future ahead of us."

That, in part, he said is due to the fair's all-volunteer board and the changes that they've made in recent years.

"The dedication and the imagination of our board of directors, they have a passion for this and they're willing to invest the time," he said. "Our board is our greatest asset to our success. Next is the people that come to our fair, the guests. It's neat when you see third and fourth generations. Then we have a lot of new people as well. There are a lot of people that didn't know what the fair was. We're reaching out to a more diverse crowd and that has helped us grow."

Glowinski said the fair is healthy, vibrant, growing, adapting and changing as Marion County changes. What used to be a mostly agricultural county is now an urban county.

"So, as 4-H and open class animal

shows have dwindled, what do we do, how do we keep going, how do we keep ourselves fresh?" he said, "We partner with North America Rides, the same rides the state fair uses so it's top-notch, safe, clean, friendly and family-oriented. People want to come into the fair to see animals so we have a company that brings in farm-type animals: the cattle, the sheep and the goats. The one thing that is growing in Marion County and has taken off at the fair is poultry. In Marion County, people are allowed to raise chickens now so people are getting into that.

Entertainment has become a main driver of attendance.

"This year at the fair, we have some really good entertainment coming," Glowinski said. "We've got racing at the backtrack, demolition derby, monster truck, motorcycle racing. We have some good acts on the main state. We have a great gospel night with lots of gospel groups. We have the typical, off-the-wall fair stuff, too like Twiggy the water skiing squirrel and pig races. We have pulled off all the stops this year."

The fair is growing, and Glowinski said they are happy to find themselves in the financial shape to continue that growth.

"One thing the fair did which was

paramount to getting as successful as we did was change the dates," he said. "We used to be the week before the state fair. We were right in the middle of some huge events. There's only so many people and so many dollars to be spent in Marion County. With the year-round, balanced calendar we have now, they're starting school in July. So we moved the dates to thee end of June. We're one of the first things that happen in Marion County. It's been very positive."

On average, the fair had 50 to 60,000 coming through in the 10-day period last year. Glowinski said they've seen a steady incline since 2014.

Another key to that growth has been the 501c3, nonprofit status that the Marion County Fair earned two years ago, which has allowed for tax-deductible donations.

"We did a lot of capital improvements over the past nine years - updated our water system, sewage system, electrical system, restroom upgrades, buildings upgrades, roads," Glowinski said. "We were able to restructure our debt in such a way to position us stronger going into the future. We have some great financial partners. We've put us back on a more secure footing."

Diverse entertainment line-up beckons visitors to 87th annual Marion County Fair June 16-25

Those who work and shop at Marsh in Greenwood may be breathing a sigh of relief this week. Topvalco, a subsidiary of Kroger, agreed to purchase 11 March locations, including the one at 2904 S. State Rd. 135, Greenwood.

For those who shop at the Beech Grove location, we are still anxiously awaiting a buyer.

It's always sad to see businesses go, and losing a company that has existed in Indiana for so many decades, since 1931, has been a bit upsetting. Many of us got our start in the workforce at this company. Others have made it their lifelong career. The Indiana-based chain that once had hundreds of stores under its operation, including Village Pantry and O'Malia Food Markets, is now down to 44. It has filed for bankruptcy and stated that it would close the remaining stores if it could not find a buyer. O'Malia's in Indianapolis on State Rd. 135, Marsh on Madison Avenue and other Marsh stores already shut its doors this year. This has residents concerned for the "food deserts" the closures have left or will leave in their neighborhoods.

In total, 26 Marsh stores have now been purchased by two companies. Good news!

While there is no information of what Topvalco intends to do with the Greenwood Marsh location, there is now hope.

The Mummy it should've stayed under wraps

Movies, due to the large amount of resources they require in order to complete, are expensive undertakings. An inordinate amount of time, copious money and a large and well-trained cast and crew are all necessary ingredients. However, with as many films as Hollywood produces, a lot of movies won't bring in the money it took to make them. Films that do perform that poorly at the box office are then lovingly referred to as "flops." They happen multiple times a year and this weekend saw the release of a film that could be one of the biggest flops of 2017.

The Mummy is the story of two U.S. soldiers/archaeologists, Nick Morton (Tom Cruise) and Chris Vail, battling insurgents in Iraq. They are in search of, you guessed it, a vast undiscovered fortune. Fortunately, for our two protagonists they literally fall into the Egyptian tomb of Ahmanet. Nick, refusing to listen to orders, unearths the ancient tomb and with it, an evil curse. After simply looking at the tomb, Nick is under the evil curse and begins seeing things he cannot explain. This is where things start to get really bad for everyone involved.

After losing out on being the queen of Egypt, Ahmanet decides to exact revenge on her entire family, killing her father and her infant brother. As punishment for her abhorrent deeds, Ahmanent is encased in the tomb, alive. However, before is essentially buried alive, she makes a deal with the God of Death. Now, alive, out of the tomb and still a bit perturbed, Ahmanent is looking to unleash evil upon the entire

world with the help of Nick.

To put it bluntly, the writing on display in *The Mummy* is awful. The story as a whole is not bad, but the execution is pathetic. Plot holes abound in the film. Characters suddenly bizarrely know things they didn't just one scene before and without explanation. The film jumps from character to character and from place to place without any reason and the timeline doesn't make any more sense. For instance, the characters take off in a plane in Iraq and seemingly seconds later, crash in England.

There are also a number of attempts at dark humor throughout the film. Much like the rest of the film, it does not work. Instead, it's cringe worthy and embarrassing. Additionally, the characters are either boring, unlikable, not fully fleshed out or all three.

There are not many bright spots in *The Mummy*. It's poorly written, directed and one of the worst films of the year. *The Mummy* should've stayed under wraps.





Kirchhofer's bills improving Hoosier health signed into law

Treatment - Gov. Eric Holcomb ceremonially signed into law two bills authored by State Rep. Cindy Kirchhofer (R-Beech Grove) broadening health care access and addiction treatment options in Indiana. House Enrolled Act 1006 includes neonatal abstinence syndrome as a factor for determining if a child is in need of addiction services. Kirchhofer said under this law children and mothers could receive medication-assisted treatment. which uses a combination of medicine and behavioral therapy to treat addiction. Kirchhofer said this measure also urges the study of extending mental health and addiction treatment services to individuals in the criminal justice system.
