LIFE ON PAPER

Greenwood author **Stephen Schmidt** publishes two books to fulfill his son's dream and honor his memory

Stephen Schmidt once heard that the only way to impact your world is by preaching and writing. Having been a preacher, he decided to take to writing. His autobiography, *I Count My Life By Sabbaths*, was published in late 2017, and *Sir, We Found Your Dog*, about the life and death of his youngest son, Trent, was released March 6.

Stephen is hoping to keep Trent's memory alive, not only by sharing his story, but by using the proceeds from both books to fulfill his son's dream. Both father and son at one time took a turn at pastoring Triumph Church in Greenwood. The church never had a paved parking lot. Through the years, the church purchased homes and rented them until they were able to be demolished. That land has been turned into a parking lot, fenced in with sidewalks and landscaping. It just lacks pavement.

"He wanted it fenced in, paved and landscaped," Stephen said. "That never happened. The city allowed us to build a fence around it. There's parking there now, there's sidewalks, but it lacks pavement. Hopefully I can generate that money. I want all the money to go to his dream."

Stephen was born in St. Paul, Minn., in 1949. His family came to Indianapolis in 1950, where his father was an assistant pastor for a large congregation. He eventually took over a small congregation in Greenwood, Calvary Apostolic Church, now Triumph Church, a daughter church of Calvary Tabernacle in Fountain Square. The family relocated to Greenwood when Stephen was 10. Although he actually graduated from Harry E. Wood High School in 1966, he said he is considered a graduate of Greenwood High School by virtue of the class.

Stephen desired to be a lawyer, but his father wanted him to be a preacher and intervened in his plans for a college education. Instead, Stephen enrolled in a seminary, transferring to one in St. Paul, Minn. after a year. He graduated there, from the same

school as his father and moved back home to Greenwood. He became assistant pastor at the church, youth director, choir director and custodian, while driving a school bus for Greenwood Community Schools. After a falling out with his father, Stephen decided to leave Indiana, eventually settling back in St. Paul, where he met his wife, Wendy.

"My salvation was to meet normal people and how they lived, since my family was so dysfunctional," Stephen said. "During this time, my dad had moved on to another church, and the Greenwood congregation called and asked if I'd be their pastor. I

refused. I said I'd pray that you get a good pastor... Finally, I (said yes). I began pastoring the church in 1971."

Stephen and Wendy had three children. In 2001, Stephen decided he would finally fulfill his own dream of becoming a lawyer. He resigned from the church in 2003 and still practices law today. His youngest son, Trent, took over the church as pastor for four years.

"He was a clone of me, but a much better model," Stephen said. "He was incredibly successful. A pastor becomes like a parent to many people. He was an introvert. He had a tendency to have migraine headaches. Every Monday, he'd retreat to his house, close the curtains and go to

bed. He'd stay there for days, he was depressed. There are people who have a dark side, who are incredibly gifted, and they leave behind these treasures. People deal with their demons and can still succeed."

After resigning from the church, Trent decided to pursue a career in the military, joining the army where he served a tour in Afghanistan. He came home on leave, when he was killed in a head-on car accident on State Road 37, south of Banta Road on Feb. 11, 2011.

"I wanted to write this book as soon as he died," Stephen said. "I wanted him to live on."

But he couldn't. Putting his son's story into words was too hard. After about four years, Stephen instead decided to begin writing his own life story.

"I stayed awake nonstop," he said. "I wrote for about four months, a 600-page narrative of my life. There's a lot of life lessons. I don't hold anything back. There are so many stories and threads; people can learn a lot about decision making, how to be successful even if you've had bad stuff happen to you in your life. I think it's full of practical knowledge. I think it's interesting and entertaining."

After his own story was finished, he was able to begin telling about Trent's life. The book on Trent, *Sir, We Found Your Dog*, includes Stephen's perspective, his wife Wendy's perspective and writings by Trent, in his own words. Comments from Trent's friends are included, as well as a collection of poems that fit into the storyline.


"Hopefully it's a memorial that's touching and moving," Stephen said. "People will see a tragedy that took place, someone who died at age 35 way before he was done."

The books are sold on Amazon under Stephen Andrew Schmidt.



Proud to be an American

Perry Township's Jerry Karwowski shares his experience at the 2018 Olympic Games

Perry Township resident Jerry Karwowski has been to a dozen Olympic Games, but his trip to PyeongChang County, South Korea, from Feb. 11 to 22 made him truly proud to be an American.

All of the trips, "are totally different because of the culture, the food," he said. "It's not really all about just going to see the event, it's everything surrounding it. All the entertainment: the parades, the celebration of the medals, the exhibits, the cultural displays, snow sculptures. This was quite prominent at many locations."

Karwowski enjoys getting a taste of the culture during his trips, taking the time to talk to other tourists and local residents and sometimes even taking photos with his new found friends.

"There's a picture of me with an older man with a dark complexion," he said. "He mentioned, 'It'd be an honor for me to have you take a picture because thanks to you and your American friends that were here to help us get democracy, I can't start to tell you how grateful our country, our family and friends are.'"

Karwowski attended five Olympic events: men's large hill ski jump, women's luge, men's aerial freestyle gold medal skiing, women's gold medal luge, men's super-G alpine skiing.

"I had dinner a couple hours before the ski jump event with a man from the Ukraine with his wife who was from Moscow and the child who spoke very good English," Karwowski said. "They were telling us about how one of their favorites was from the Ukraine, and sure enough he got the gold medal. So afterwards, at a party from the venue, we ran across them. They said, 'You brought us good luck.' They were all fired up."

When he wasn't at the events, Karwowski spent time sightseeing, at hospitality houses or experiencing the entertainment surrounding the Olympics.

"They had a big display area, taste the food of Korea," he said. "A lot of it was samples and if you liked it, you could buy the food. The food, I really felt good physically and mentally when I was there. Everything they eat is fresh. They don't have the added preservatives and chemicals. It's good food, period. ... One thing led to another, and I was asked if I'd like to be on this cooking show. I was sitting down and stir frying sticky rice. Next thing I know,


this lady said, 'Do you mind if you're on TV?' Someone took a picture and she said it would be on in the evening."

Traveling tends to prove how small the world truly is. Karwowski began speaking with a brewmaster at the Czech Republic House, who mentioned he had been in Arizona five years ago. After some time, Karwowski found out the brewmaster and his son, who is in the beverage business, had met one another in Arizona.

The 11-day trip gave Karwowski so many memories, but the biggest thing he takes from each trip come from his interaction with the people — the overall friendliness and excitement to share in this worldwide experience.

"Every two years, for 16 days, the Olympics turn into Camelot," he said. "It's a perfect world. People from different colors, creeds and races, they're all talking and learning from their differences. The rain only happens at night. It's clear in the morning. For the athletes, it's a dream of theirs come true, just being

there. It's gravy if they win a medal."

The last flight of Carole Lombard

In 1926, film actress Carole Lombard was seriously injured in an auto accident, and the left side of her face was scarred. She recovered and, with careful lighting, angles and makeup, most were not even aware. She wouldn't let those scars get in the way of her career or the things she believed in. Her last trek upon this earth was the War Bond Rally in Indianapolis, Jan. 15, 1942.

The rally was a success. Her day was a frenzy of nonstop activity fueled by her tireless drive, Coca-Colas and cigarettes. "As a Hoosier, I am proud that Indiana led the nation in buying Liberty Bonds in the last war," she proclaimed. "I want to believe that Indiana will lead every other state again this time — and we will! We won the last war, and with your help we will win this war!" She would not live to see it. Her last words before boarding the flight out of Indianapolis were, "Before I say goodbye to you all, come on, join me in a big cheer — 'V for victory!'" The plane lifted into the darkness of the evening, carrying Carole Lombard into eternity.

It had taken three days by train to travel from the West Coast. Lombard didn't have another three days returning. She needed to be back immediately. There were rumors of an affair between her husband, Clark Gable, and a young actress named Lana Turner on the set of the movie Somewhere I'll Find You. She chose flying. Back in the 1940s, flying was a different experience — the planes stopped every few hundred miles. Her flight ping ponged from Indianapolis to numerous cities along the route, eventually diverted to McCarren Airfield (now Nellis AFB) in Las Vegas where it was refueled, hitting the skies a little after 7 p.m. bound for Burbank, Calif. Fifteen minutes after takeoff and some 33 miles southwest of Las Vegas, TWA Flight 3, still climbing to

reach altitude, struck the cliffs 200 feet short of the crest of Mount Potosi at 185 miles an hour. All 22 people lost their lives.

There are rumors that Lombard was in Indianapolis the evening before the rally, having taken a plane from Chicago rather than a train. Those hours were spent at an Indianapolis national landmark, the Tuckaway House (a historic Meridian Park bungalow) on the near Northside. Palm reader Nellie Simmons Meier, who had read the palms of hundreds of actors, writers and politicians, warned Lombard of "imminent" danger. Photos of these folks dot the walls of Tuckaway, including a 1930s autographed portrait of Lombard hanging at the bottom of the stairs. I have touched it! However, there's no conclusive proof that Lombard ever visited, or received this premonition, other than word of mouth. Unfortunate! Supposedly Lombard's own mother expressed premonitions about flying that night. Clark Gable never really recovered!

The Claypool Hotel, where Lombard staved the night before her death, was demolished in 1969. The Indianapolis Propylaeum, a nonprofit civic site at 1410 N. Delaware St., acquired some of the furniture, including her bed, from her suite at an auction in 2000. You can see and touch it for yourself.

There were many tributes in the days after her death. One such: "Down deep in their hearts, those who had chatted with her over the back fence or across a garden row knew that Carole Lombard wanted more than anything else to be a model housewife and a good neighbor. GREENWOOD COMMON COUNCIL

Meeting, March 5

What happened:

• Ordinances 18-06 and 18-07 were brought before the council as intent to consider.

What it means:

- Ordinance 18-06 seeks to amend the official zoning map and rezone approximately 40.5 acres south of Stop 18 and east of County Road 75 East. The Fieldstone PUD wants to develop this area into housing with a portion of the acreage going toward a city park.
- Ordinance 18-07 wishes to amend the zoning map to rezone approximately 6.54 acres at 146 W. Stones Crossing Rd. This rezoning would make way for the construction of a hotel.

What's next:

• Ordinance 18-06 failed with a vote of 2-7, and ordinance 18-07 was postponed until the April 16 meeting.

Greenwood residents protest rezoning

It was standing room only at the March 5 Common Council meeting, as Greenwood residents gathered in protest of two separate rezoning ordinances: Ordinance 18-06 and Ordinance 8-07.

Ordinance 18-06 sought to rezone approximately 40.5 acres of farmland south of Stop 18 and County Road 75 East. The Fieldstone PUD sought to turn this farmland into a residential area, and provide the city a park.

Resident David Strange believes the proposal would impact the flow of traffic in the area, and overpopulate the Clark Pleasant School System, as well as not supply adequate amount of parking for the proposed residential area.

"I understand why Westport desires to build on that property," said resident Wendy Murphy. "Greenwood is a fantastic town. That's why I chose to live here. What they want to do with the property does not fit in at all with any other housing in Greenwood. This is probably a part of the appeal, but just because there is no housing like that in a town does not mean that that town needs that type of housing."

Ordinance 18-07, seeks to rezone a little over 6.5 acres located at 1464 W. Stones Crossing Road. These 6 acres will be used to construct a hotel.

A question on many resident's mind is "Why here?" Many, like Laura Young and Ray Gonzalez, believe many other locations would be more appropriate for this project.

A resident of Cobblestone subdivision, Jason Mysen, said, "Cobblestone subdivision is a 138-home neighborhood in close proximity to the proposed location. Changing the zoning on this would have an immediate negative impact on this community and property values would potentially plummet."

No matter the stance, Linda Meyer advises "to hear what [the proposal] is going to be." She urges the council to get both sides of the argument before making a decision.

BEECH GROVE CITY COUNCIL

Meeting, March 5

What happened:

• Ordinances 1, 2018 and two were approved on second reading. Ordinances 3 and 4 were introduced and approved on first reading.

What it means:

- Ordinance 1 relates to stormwater fees, capping the fees collected pursuant to stormwater utility.
- Ordinance 2 is pursuant to road and sidewalk improvements.
- Ordinance 3 would change the purchase limit to \$25,000 to allow the board of public works and safety to make purchases without additional approval from the council. In past years, the purchase amount was lowered from \$25,000 to \$10,000, which department heads state have hindered their ability to purchase necessary equipment and finish projects.
- Ordinance 4 corrects the salary ordinance for 2018 to include SRT and FTO pay for the Beech Grove Police Department, which was left out of the previous ordinance.

What's next:

• Ordinances 1 and two will undergo third and final reading at the April 2 meeting. Ordinances 3 and 4 will undergo second reading then.

In brief...

- Beech Grove City Schools Superintendent Dr. Paul Kaiser presented to the council about the strategic plan in process. Topics include goals such as building a sixth grade academy and creating an early childhood center and a community center near the downtown area. "We do not want to increase enrollment," Kaiser said. "Nothing in this plan is so we can bring in more kids. We have plenty of kids... We think these facilities will help bring people back to the community." He said that the most important thing in the plan is to create the early childhood center for the kids. More information about the plan can be found on the school's Website.
- The council is looking for another volunteer to appoint to the Greenscape committee.

too long, too slow, but still marginally entertaining

International espionage and all of its surrounding mystery and intrigue has proven to be a fertile subject for films. There are literally dozens of James Bond flicks, tons of Mission Impossibles, several Jason Bourne films and hundreds of others which I'm unable to recall at this time. As of late the women have been getting in on the act, showing off their skill in the world of action/espionage. Last year's *Atomic Blonde* was a welcomed surprise and *Wonder Woman* was one of the biggest films of 2017. Already in March, we get another with a female character trying her hand in the world of espionage.

Red Sparrow is the story of Dominika Egorova (Jennifer Lawrence), a celebrated Russian ballerina, whose career is cut short after a gruesome injury, which may or may not have been an accident. Dominika's future looks bleak, to say the least. Looking to provide for her mother's medical needs and with no other options available, Dominika is sent off to a secret Russian intelligence school to be trained in the world of espionage.

Despite several violent and bloody mishaps, Dominika is extracted from her training and thrust into international espionage. She's given a new identity, a new hair color and a mission to locate and eliminate a mole in the Russian government, who has been working with the CIA, helping to deliver vital intelligence information to the Americans. It's a mission where failure equals certain and painful death. The deadly mission is only made more difficult with a number of unexpected twists and turns where not everybody is exactly who they seem.

Easily the most infuriating aspect of *Red Sparrow* is the absurd amount of time it takes for film to get into its central story. *Red Sparrow* is a little under two-and-a-half-hours long and more than a hour of the film is spent developing characters, understanding their wants, needs and fears. The only problem is that we get a sense of everyone within the first 10 minutes or so. Everyone is cold, detached and willing to kill anyone and everyone if it means furthering their mission, basically every character in every spy thriller.

Despite the first hour, which is at times, difficult to watch given how long it takes to get to the actual story, it's still more than enjoyable with plenty of twists and turns. There's plenty of swift, hand-to-hand combat, which usually ends in a dead body or two and a bloody mess.

Red Sparrow isn't an awful film; it's a decent and entertaining one. It's just too long, moves a snail's pace and Lawrence's Russian accent is at



Moving Toward Grammar Enlightenment

Right now we're trying to teach our daughter to crawl. She's eight months old, and I can only imagine how ridiculous I look down on the floor attempting to show her how to push her body up off the floor and start moving toward me. Or is it towards me? Is it toward or towards?

The more I look at *toward* and *towards*, the more I'm convinced neither of them are real words. I think pretty much any word will do that to you. And shouldn't *toward* and *coward* rhyme? I'm too scared to look into it; I think that makes me a *toward* coward.

It really all depends on where you live. In British and Australian English, you'll find people give a polite preferential nod to *towards* over *toward*. However, in the U.S. and Canada, we independently and unabashedly use *toward* more often than *towards*. Technically, either are correct in any situation, however, my rule is use whichever word sounds right in each situation; it's up to you.

The AP Stylebook is no toward coward; AP states *toward* is always correct and *towards* is always a syntactical *faux pas*. While I appreciate the AP's all-or-nothing approach, I don't think it's necessary

to take a stand on every issue. Forgive me for my untowardness.

Is it weird that coward and towered rhyme? I think these words are messing with me. These two words could very well lead me to ward off either of these words from my writing for a year (at the very least).

In the same way American English prefers toward, the same rule works with other words related to direction, like forward, backward, downward, upward and afterward. Again - technically both are acceptable, but *downward* is preferable over downwards.

To remember this rule, think about how Americans like our words like we like our drive-thrus: shorter, faster, more convenient and more efficient. Taking an axe to the s to make a word one letter shorter is the American way. Does that make us seem *backward*, or are we moving *toward* an enlightened state of simplicity and brevity? Either way, it saves one letter on our Twitter character counts, so I'll take it.

1 But of the times and the seasons, brethren, you have no need that I write unto you.

2 For yourselves know perfectly that the day of the Lord so comes as a thief in the night.

3 For when they shall say, Peace and safety; then sudden destruction comes upon them, as travail upon a woman with child; and they shall not escape.

ITHESSALONIANS 5:1-3

In times like these, we need someone we can trust, someone we can put our faith in to always do the right thing. These words of Paul were written to comfort the church. Some had grown weary and discouraged and left. Wasn't Christ supposed to have returned by now? Didn't He promise them that He would? The problem is the same then as now; they misunderstood Him. Paul wants to assure them that Christ is coming again and, maybe not in their physical lifetime but, He is coming again.

In his second Epistle, Peter deals with the same issue. If God does not send Jesus back today this does not mean that He is not ever coming back, He is, but it will be at exactly the right moment in time that will result in the maximum numbers saved which is God's goal.

When Paul writes about times and seasons he is not suggesting that they know something we do not know, he is saying that we already know the words and the promises of Christ and should remain faithful in the meantime. He also reminds us that when Christ returns His return will be a total surprise to us all. We will not be surprised that He has returned but we will by surprised when. That is the issue.

My wife and I have three children. The exact moment of their birth was never revealed to us by the doctor she was seeing during the pregnancv. The moment of their birth was never known to anyone but God. It is the same with Christ's return. Only God knows. He is coming and of that I am certain. It will not be too late and it will not be too early, it will be right on time.
