Small town Americana retains firm ties to the past, yet at the same time continues to open its door to the influences of a large bordering city. Welcome to Southport!

Southport was established in the early 1830s, becoming one of the first Marion County communities to incorporate into big brother Indianapolis in 1853. In 1969 the small town made the decision to be an excluded city within, the then, Uni-Gov proposal consolidating Indianapolis and Marion County governments. While now just lying on the southern edge of Indianapolis, Southport continues to retain a unique perspective and individuality.

May 13, the annual Spring Festival, was an exhibit of what small town in Indiana can offer in the way of food (carnival style), jewelry, apparel, crafts, music, children activities and various services. A troop of clowns wandered the closed Derbyshire Road as Southport Police officers and Explorers mingled and rubbed shoulders with the public. The weather was ideal. The slight chill of the morning was replaced quickly by the warmth of the sun. Sweaters and jackets came off. And the crowds arrived.

My wife Laura and I manned a shift at the CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) booth, giving out information on how to handle emergencies, and to hopefully recruit future team members. The Kettle Corn booth next to ours produced a constant cadence of popping corn while directly across from us was tempting baked offerings from the Southport United Methodist Women's Mission Projects. I settled for a deep fried Twinkie and smiled contently while watching folks stroll by. There were the squeals of children scampering about the playground and arcade games, plenty of dogs of all variety being led on leash and lots of smiles.

I visited with old friends from the Perry Township Historical Society and stood mesmerized watching the Southport High School Indoor Percussion "Time For Swing" perform. (I also play drums - probably to the chagrin of my neighbors). Laura shopped for jewelry and drank Lemon Shake-ups. Our shift ended. I went home to cut grass. Laura stayed a while longer.

The Southport Spring Festival started with humble origins in May of 2014. Each year it has grown larger in scope; an open air venue with an eye directed towards the future. Much like the town of Southport itself! And 2018 will be no different. If you missed it, there's always next year.

What happened:

Resolution 17-07 passes second reading, and Ordinance 17-28 was introduced to the Council and passed both first and second reading.

What it means:

Resolution 17-07 looks to establish an Economic Revitalization Area (ERA) in Southpoint Business Park at 600 Graham Road. Shear, the current land owner intends to construct a 143,000 square foot concrete building and a 260,400 square foot concrete building for use as a spec building.

Ordinance 17-28 will designate no parking on Broadway Street between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday.

What's next:

Ordinance 17-28 and Resolution 17-07 will go into effect.

VISIONS OF VIBRANCY

Purdue Extension Community Wellness Coordinator Linda Adams works with Southport and Indianapolis officials to create a plan for a healthier community

Healthy people and vibrant communities go hand-in-hand. When you make it easier for people to be healthier, the entire community benefits in multiple ways, says Perry Township resident Linda Adams.

Through her work with the Purdue Extension as Community Wellness Coordinator the the Southside of Indianapolis, Linda has spent her time working with residents and community leaders to find ways to make the Southside a healthier, more vibrant place for everyone.

"Together, we can accomplish great things," Linda said. "One person can do a lot, but when you have a team and it's across a community, you can be so much more effective."

What exactly does the Southside need to be healthier? Linda, with the help of Southport and Indianapolis city leaders, has organized a Greater Southport/Perry Township Active Living Workshop to brainstorm just that. The workshop will take place June 6, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Southport United Methodist Church, 1947 E. Southport Rd.

"I think this is extremely important as we look at the interests and desires of the people living in the cities, particularly the millennials and baby boomers, which are usually polar opposites," said Allie Kast, Southside Neighborhood Advocate for the Indianapolis Mayor's Office. "They are both drawn to cities and towns that are more walkable. The more we can make the area more walkable, the more it will benefit both generations. On the Southside, we have one of the most un-walkable areas. Once we create the plan, we'll have it drawn out with action steps. Hopefully we can present that to both Southport and Indianapolis. To have these plans drawn up and created, we're more likely to get the funding for it and actually make it happen."

Linda grew up in Chicago, in a town like she imagines the Southside could be - a walkable community where residents could easily get around. She went to Purdue University as a liberal arts major.

She and her husband, Jason, eventually moved to Ohio for his job. Linda became a stay-at-home mom to their five children for 14 years.

The family moved to Perry Township four years ago, when she went back to work as a nutrition assistant for Purdue Extension. There, she would teach senior citizens who were SNAP (food stamp) eligible how to read nutrition labels, how to be safe in their kitchen and how to stretch a budget.

"We found a lot of people in our class

were interested in nutrition," Linda said. "It wasn't easy. Access to food was limited. Some didn't drive and had to wait for people to take them. Sometimes you want to be healthy and physically active but that might not be your reality. You can't walk to the store because it's not safe or there are no grocery stores. The only thing you have to choose from is a convenience store that doesn't have a lot available... So the Purdue Nutrition program decided it would change its program."

Purdue Extension still has its nutrition education program, but has added community wellness coordinators with a goal to have representatives in each county in Indiana. There are three in Marion County.

"We're supposed to go into a community, assess what's going on there from a physical activity, nutrition standpoint," Linda said. "We gather together other community leaders, city officials, nonprofits. Here, I work with Franciscan Health, Community Hospital, Baxter Y, the public health department. We joined the Healthy Southside Initiative. The plan is to take those needs and develop action plans that will help make it easier for people to make the healthy choice."

One such project, Linda is working with Adult and Child Health on Madison Avenue in its project to start a community garden for Burmese residents. With 20 raised beds, half are assigned to residents who sign up and produce from the other half will go to food pantries which have Burmese clients.

Last year, Linda began working with the cities of Southport and Indianapolis to apply for a grant to host the active living workshop. Seven communities across Indiana were approved this year, including the Greater Southport/Perry Township area. A planning team has formed to organize the workshop, which will include presentations on the benefits of active living, a walking audit of nearby infrastructure after which participants will get together and identify active living goals for the community.

"This is my fifth project with Linda," Kast said. "She is by far the most organized and driven person that I have met in this job. She is one of the most important players on the Southside right now

when it comes to creating a stronger, more vibrant, healthier community. She's taking this idea (the workshop), something that's never been done in Marion County before, and making it happen and hopefully making it the most successful one they've ever had. She really cares a lot about it."

Linda said the Southside's greatest need is improved infrastructure to make it easier to walk and bike. While it's hard to create park-like environments in a city that's already fully-developed, the way to simulate that is through infrastructure. What exactly the Southside needs, will come about through ideas at the upcoming workshop.

Linda said they will spend the following nine months after the workshop to see which ways they can implement the ideas that come from it.

"For some communities, the workshop is a starting point," Linda said. "Here in Perry Township, it's not a starting point. It's a continuation and momentum builder of all of the work the Greater Southside Business Alliance, Madison Avenue Redevelopment Commission and Southport Redevelopment Commission has done over the last decade. They laid the ground work. Now it's time to capitalize in the groundwork

and continue

Greenwood school bus driver named CICOA Caregiver of the Year

Health - Maria Dampier of Greenwood received the CICOA Caregiver of the Year Award during the nonprofit's eighth annual Signature Breakfast recently. The award honors a personal caregiver in Central Indiana who models courage, sacrifice, strength and creativity while caring for another.

Maria Dampier, a bus driver of 48 years, cares for her husband Bill Dampier, 80, who was diagnosed with Alzheimer's about seven years ago. Things took a turn in December 2015, when he fell and broke his hip and femur. When he woke up from the surgery, he was a different person. He no longer could walk or talk. After 100 days in rehab, he showed no signs of improving. He no longer could care for himself, and Maria made the difficult decision to place her husband in a nursing home.

Nearly every day since, Maria, drives her morning bus route, then heads over to Forest Creek Village to care for Bill. He smiles when she walks into the room. Suburban Christian School juniors collect new and gently-used shoes for funds2orgs

The Junior Class of Suburban Christian School is seeking the help of the community to collect new and gently-used shoes.

Suburban Christian School's Junior Class are currently collecting shoes for impoverished people in developing nations with the help of the organization, funds2orgs.

"When planning the fundraiser," said Tammy Green, a teacher at Suburban, "I learned of the organization funds2orgs. We were excited about this idea, that by raising money, the kids are not just selling candy bars, but are actually helping people."

This fundraiser has two purposes; to raise money for the Junior Class' senior trip and provide for families in developing nations such as Haiti and Honduras, plus many other nations in Central America and Africa.

"This has double benefits, said junior, Natalie Crute. "It helps our class, but at the same time we are able to help out those in need in another country."

Funds2orgs takes the shoes that have been collected and sorted by the class, and pays per the pound. They send the shoes to developing countries and help people set up businesses in which they can sell the shoes and other items. The proceeds from the sales are used to feed, clothe and house the budding entrepreneur's family.

The shoe drive has taught the students a lesson in humility and has them thinking about how life would be if they lived in one of these developing nations.

"I've heard them talk about what it would be like for the people in these underdeveloped countries to get these shoes, and how some of them may have never had shoes before," Green said. "The conversations I am having with the kids, or that I am hearing them have with each other, show that they are really thinking about where these shoes are going."

Maggie Jones, a member of the junior class, said, "This fundraiser has given me and my class the ability to give to kids and people that do not have shoes readily available," said Jones. "We have the opportunity to help out and be a blessing to them by giving them the shoes we collected."

To donate to the Junior Class and support their desire to give back to those in need, bring new or gently-used shoes by May 31 to Suburban Christian School at 722 E. County Line Rd. The school sits directly behind the church. The class has set up a collection box just inside the front door. Any size and style of shoes welcomed.



Beech Grove infrastructure improvements continue

As you have probably seen, there is a lot of infrastructure work being conducted in the City of Beech Grove. After 5 years of paving, we are starting to catch up on fixing our local roads and streets, but we still have a ways to go.

As we pave local roads, we also identify bad sections of curbing and sidewalks and replace them as we go. We also are required to make sidewalks ADA compatible where they touch a roadway. Actually that is a really good rule.

We are set to begin some extensive storm water drainage projects throughout our city. These drainage projects are much needed and will make a huge improvement in local neighborhoods when they are complete. With the large amount of rain we received a couple weeks ago, I'm happy to report that where we have completed drainage projects, the storm water drained very quickly, especially on Main Street. But like our local roads, we have a ways to go to correct some of our worst drainage areas.

As you may have seen, work is set to begin on the addition of sidewalks on Churchman Avenue from Emerson to Arlington. The contractor may start to do some drainage work very soon, but has decided to hold off with the major construction project until school has concluded for the summer. This is a much needed project and will make it safer for those who walk along this area, especially those with disabilities and students walking to and from the high school. We are very fortunate to have received approximately one million dollars in funding through INDOT and the Indianapolis MPO for this project.

Infrastructure improvements are so critical for the future of our city and we look forward to continue to make improvements in this area without the issuance of any debt.

Indiana Blood Center needs donations


Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. is in need of blood, according to the Red Cross.

Is your criminal record holding you back?

Many individuals cringe at having to check yes when asked if they have been convicted of

a crime on their employment application. In many instances it has been years or even decades since you made a mistake and completed your sentence; however, the

conviction record continues to haunt you and hinder your chances at more gainful employment. Many individuals have simply given up hope of being able to overcome their past indiscretions. If this applies to you, then you need to seriously consider getting your convictions and arrests expunged.

You can now take action to remove your embarrassing criminal history. Indiana law allows for individuals to expunge their criminal records and be treated as if they were never convicted of the offense. This means that you no longer have to check yes on the employment application being left to wonder if my conviction immediately sent me to the bottom of the pile. Convictions have a wide array of consequences on one's life ranging from

limiting job opportunities to eliminating your civil rights, including the right to vote, serve as a juror, act as guardian, and possess a firearm.

Many individuals do not realize the lingering consequences of their convictions until it is too late. It is a common public misconception that convictions will fall off after so many vears; however, this is not the case. A conviction can only be changed by you taking action. A conviction for drunk driving not only raises your insurance rates, but also closes doors to more gainful employment and stays on your official driver's record. A felony conviction prevents you exercising your gun rights and greatly hinders your employment opportunities. Also felony convictions embarrass and prevent parents from chaperoning a child's field trip or other school functions. These are only a few examples, but undoubtedly the effect of a conviction is harsh and lingering. An expungement can alleviate these issues and restore your civil rights.

The law does require a waiting period. For individuals arrested for a crime that was subsequently dismissed, you must wait one year from the date of arrest to file. For those con-

victed of a misdemeanor offense you must wait five years from the date of conviction to file. Examples of misdemeanor convictions are operating while intoxicated, possession of marijuana, public intoxication, and shop-lifting. For those convicted of felony offenses, the waiting period is typically eight years from the date of conviction.


Recent changes in the law now allow for an expungement to restore one's firearm rights in many circumstances. The restorative language in the expungement law has been approved by the Federal Government as a restoration of an individual's 2nd Amendment rights. It is important to discuss your individual situation with an experienced attorney. There are some offenses, domestic battery for example, where an expungement alone is insufficient to restore one's gun rights. Further an individual could have other issues which bar them from being a proper per-



ing a business is: how do I protect myself from personal liability? The answer to this question largely depends on the type of busi-

ness entity the business owner desires to form. This choice will have a significant impact on the entrepreneur's personal liability.


A partnership is one choice of business entity and is an informal organization of multiple owners who share in profits. A partnership, however, does not provide the partners legal protection from personal liability. Partners can be personally liable for the partnership's debts and even for the actions of the other partners. Consider this: a customer is injured from a product purchased from your business. Under a partnership, the partners may be held personally liable for

the customer's injuries. This means the injured party may be able to come after your personal assets, bank accounts, cars, etc.

Corporations and Limited Liability Companies, on the other hand, provide greater liability protection to the business owners. These types of businesses, which must be recognized formally by the state, shield owners from being personally liable to creditors. LLC members, for example, are typically only liable for their financial contributions to the business. Thus, if the business in the above hypothetical was a corporation or LLC, and if the proper formalities were followed, it is unlikely that the injured party could attack the owner's personal assets.

King Arthur: Legend of the Sword A royal mess

For some inexplicable reason, people are interested in the lives of Prince William, Prince Harry and Kate Middleton. This idea that just because of no other reason than birth, entitles someone to a life of wealth, fame and literal royalty is so foreign in our country. That is unless, of course, your last name is either Clinton or Bush. Whatever the reason for the continual interest in royalty, one ancient tale of kings and queens continues to mystify and intrigue. And as such, a new film about this archaic tale opened this past weekend.

King Arthur: Legend of the Sword is the tale of the mythical king's journey to becoming the King of England. Despite being the son of the king and the heir to the throne, Arthur (Charlie Hunnam) is robbed of his birthright. In coup orchestrated by his uncle Vortigern (Jude Law), Arthur's father and mother are both killed as Vortigern seizes the throne.

However, prior to his father's murder and after catching wind of the planned overthrow, Arthur is sent away to live with the commoners. From that point forward, Arthur's life consists of running the streets, getting into fistfights and stealing everything needed in order to survive. It's not until an unexpected occurrence, when Arthur extracts Excalibur from the stone, that his true identity is revealed. Encouraged by his lowly band of brothers, Arthur soon hatches a plan that sends him on his way to claiming that which is rightfully his: the throne of England.

As far as story structure is concerned, *King Arthur: Legend of the Sword* is pretty much a mess. The pacing of the story is laughably bad as it sprints from one frenzied action sequence to another, never allowing

the audience to catch its breath. Additionally, except for Arthur and to a much lesser extent, Vortigern, the characters aren't developed at all. The story concentrates on the adversarial relationship between Arthur and Vortigern, not spending even so much as a scene depicting Arthur's relationship with any other character. The film also introduces aspects of mysticism and the occult, but never explains what's going on or who is actually pulling Vortigern's strings.

The film also heavily employs the use of computer generated imagining (CGI) for the many mystical beasts that appear on scene. However, the CGI is so poorly done that it actually takes you out of the film. In several instances, a long, drawn-out battle scene has you hooked, you're on the edge of your seat and then out of nowhere a giant snake pops into frame and gobbles up a character. It's totally unexpected, and wholly unnecessary.

While a mildly enjoyable film, *King Arthur: Legend of the Sword* is more style than substance, making for a mess of a film. 2.5 out 5.



Asparagus taste of spring

NUTRITION

As the brown-gray mood of winter gives way to warmer temperatures, asparagus pokes its purple tips through the soil.

The word asparagus first appeared in English print around 1000 AD. In 200 BC, Cato the elder documented detailed growing instructions. The Egyptians began to cultivate it and at that time any self-respecting Romans from Pliny to Julius Caesar coveted the wild spear. History shares Roman emperors were so terribly fond of asparagus that they kept a special fleet of ships solely to fetch it. Along with its seductive flavor, Ancient Romans horded a private stash since they believed asparagus spears cured all ailments, which is conclusive evidence of man's recognition of food as medicine. Hippocrates was right!

Asparagus is one of the most nutritional, well-balanced veggies. A five-ounce portion provides 60 percent of the RDA for folacin, necessary for blood cell formation growth. Folic acid helps prevent liver disease, cervical cancer, colon and rectal cancer, and heart disease. Asparagus contains potassium, which helps regulate the electrolyte balance within cells, and helps maintain normal heart function and blood pressure. The crisp spears contain fiber, thiamin, B6, and is one of the richest sources of Rutin, a phytochemical/drug that strengthens capillary walls. Asparagus is especially rich in antioxidant vitamins A, C, and vitamin E.

In the 19th Century France, bridegrooms were required to eat several courses of asparagus because of its alleged power to

Asparagus contains Glutathione that helps repair of damaged DNA. The root contains compounds called steroidal glycosides, which may have anti-inflammatory properties to ease the pain of arthritic related conditions. In 1991, an Italian researcher reported a compound found in asparagus which had shown some antiviral activity in test tube studies.

Between 20 to 40 percent of the population observe that their urine smells rotten eggs, cabbages after they eat asparagus which is partly caused by the sulfur compounds in the spring vegetable.

At home, we add them to our smoothies and salads. Raw is always best. Heat destroys digestive enzymes and some vitamins. Prepare the asparagus for cooking by washing them well. Then break off the bottom woody pulpy stem. It is not necessary to peel them.

I remember Mom warning us as my brothers and I ran through the family garden uprooting and using asparagus spears as swords in our imaginary swashbuckling fantasy, "Don't run while you have asparagus in your hands. You'll poke someone's eye out."


