A tutorial for potential ghost hunters

HAUNTS & JAUNTS

Paranormal author Benjamin Radford concludes his thoughts on those of us desiring to venture into ghost hunting:

Failing to consider alternative explanations for anomalous or "unexplained" phenomena

"Ghost hunters often over-interpret evidence and fail to adequately consider alternative explanations, assuming that 'orbs' are ghosts, EVPs (electronic voice phenomena) are ghost voices and so on. The designation of 'unexplained' or paranormal must be accepted only when all other natural explanations have been ruled out. The scientific evidence of the validity of EVPs is as poor as it is for orbs. An investigator must be careful not to go beyond the established facts and assume his interpretation is the correct one without keeping an open mind about other interpretations. These types of reports (EVPs and orbs) are very common and cannot be accepted at face value."

Considering subjective feelings and emotions as evidence of ghostly encounters

"Ghost hunters often report descriptions of personal feelings. Subjective

experiences are essentially stories and anecdotes. There's nothing wrong with personal experiences but by themselves are not proof or evidence of anything. Most people reporting such experiences are sincere in their belief, but that belief doesn't necessarily make it true. The power of suggestion can be very strong and one can easily convince themselves that something weird is going on in a dark, creepy house."

Using improper and unscientific investigation methods

"Purposely conducting an investigation in the dark intentionally hobbles the investigation and is completely counterproductive. (Nearly every ghost-themed TV show have the investigators walk around in a darkened place) It also violates common sense and logic: If you're trying to identify an unknown object, is it better to look for it under bright lights or in a darkened room? Searching at night, in the dark, puts investigators at an immediate disadvantage in trying to identify and understand what's going on around them. Searching a dark room for a shadowy figure is an exercise in futility."

"Most ghost hunters consider themselves scientific if they use high-tech scientific equipment. Yet for any piece of equipment to be useful, it must have proven some connection to ghosts. The problem is that there's no body of research these devices measure anything to do with ghosts."

Focusing on the history of a haunted location

"Although a supposedly haunted location might have a fascinating history, this almost always has little or nothing to do with the current haunted claims. It must be investigated completely independent of this information."

Dismiss the stories, put away the baggage of these stories and move forward. You might just get something!

"I believe that if ghosts exist, they are important and deserve to be taken seriously. Most of the efforts to investigate ghosts so far have been badly flawed and unscientific and not surprisingly, fruitless. If an investigation is to be done, it should be done right!"

I'm currently reading Benjamin Radford's *Investigating Ghosts: The Scientific Search for Spirits.* I'm savoring it slowly, like a fine wine. I don't want to miss a thing!

Greenwood resident fulfills passion as racing writer

Bob Gates, a Greenwood resident, is an author and racing enthusiast. Gates has a passion for racing and has written for several publications over the years in addition to four books about racing legends.

Bob Gates found himself in the hospital in the early 1980s following back surgery with time on his hands.

"I was reading *Open Wheel Magazine* and I thought to myself, *I can write this well,*" Gates said. "I wrote an article and submitted it and went on from there."

That started a second job for the Greenwood resident, who has written for several publications over the years. He just finished writing his fourth book, updating Wilbur Shaw's autobiography. Shaw, who died in 1954, was an Indiana racecar driver and president of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway from 1945 until his death. The book was released May 24 at a book signing at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway Museum.

"When you grow up in this area, it's either racing or basketball," said Gates, a 1964 Center Grove High School graduate. "I was attracted to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway before I ever was to racing as a whole. Just all the buzz around the Indy 500. So I grew up like a lot of kids interested in racing. I thought maybe I could drive and did go-karts. I always had that vision in my brain of being a writer. That was my way of getting involved in racing."

After writing for *Open Wheel* until it ceased publication, he started writing for *Speed & Sport* and other magazines.

Gates was a manager of the machining department at Caterpillar in Indianapolis for 10 years, retiring in 2012.

Gates attended his first Indy 500 in 1961.

"I can't say I've been to all of them," Gates said. "I missed some when I was in the service. I can't think of any I've missed since the early '80s."

Prior to his Air Force service, Gates attended IUPUI for three semesters and took an English/journalism class.

"I had to write a short story, which I did about racing and the instructor said I should have it published," he said. "I never did but when I thought about getting something published, it motivated me."

His first book, *Hurtubise*, about late race car driver, Jim Hurtubise, was published in 1995. Hurtubise died in 1989.

"A publisher read some of my stuff in *Open Wheel Magazine* and asked me if I would do a book on Hurtubise,"

Gates said. "There had been a few attempts that had been unsuccessful but I was able to get with the family to do it."

His second book was Vukovich: An Inspiring Story of American Achievement in 2004.

"That was the book I wanted to do because (Bill Vukovich, Sr.) was a hero of mine when I was growing up," Gates said.

"He was always a man of mystery. I've taken a lot of pride in the fact that I was able to look at him - as an individual."

Vukovich, a twotime Indy 500 winner, died in a crash while leading the Indy 500 in 1955. His son, Bill Vukovich II and grandson, Bill Vukovich III competed in the Indy 500 as well. Vukovich III died in a 1990 sprint car accident.

The third book was California Gold: The Legendary Life of Troy Ruttman in 2012. Ruttman died in 1997.

"It's a niche market, so it's a labor of

love," said Gates, who said he made a little money in book sales.

The book he just released is called Gentlemen, Start Your Engines: The Rest of the Story. Shaw, a three-time Indy 500 winner, had written an autobiography prior to dying in a plane crash.

"I've added several chapters with the

help of Wilbur Shaw, Jr. (who goes by Bill)," Gates said. "Wilbur Shaw was president of the Speedway when he died. He was the one who convinced Tony Hulman to buy the Speedway (in 1945)."

Sports reporter Robin Miller said Gates gained the trust of the families to share

"Vukovich, Sr. was real private and so is Vuky, real private," said Miller, a Southport High School graduate. "So,

with his book, I was so impressed they were so open and cooperative with Bob. I think it's because he's such an honest guy. They knew they could trust him if he they said this is off-the-record or you can't use this. He's one of those guys that is instantly likable and everyone trusts him."

Gates is involved with the Indiana Racing Memorial Association, which is erecting historical markers pertaining to auto racing in Indiana.

"We've done it all over the state the last four years," he said.

Chris Jockish spends long hours at Jockish Flowers.

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
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



Sadly, the vast majority of alumni don't bother to vote, or aren't even aware that an election for trustee is taking place. Last year, out of over 650,000 living alumni, only about 10,000 votes were cast. That is a turnout of less than 2 percent!

The Board of Trustees sets the vision and the direction for IU and charges its administration with carrying out that mission. Most importantly, the board hires the president of the university to lead this charge. This critical function has a significant impact on the value of an IU degree.

As an alumnus and a candidate for trustee, I would urge all IU alumni to vote in this year's election. Fleecing Indiana taxpayers

I wish I had an extra day, with pay, to do the things I didn't get done yesterday. I'd also like the work I did that day not to be scrutinized, subjected to any rules and everyone would have to just take what I do and be happy about it.

This is what your current Indiana legislature has done, except YOU get to pay them for it. The Republican supermajority, in their bickering about language, could not pass four laws that were to be done by the completion of the session at midnight on March 14. They stayed until midnight, and still couldn't get the job done. The last time Indiana saw a special session when Republicans controlled the House, Senate and governor's office was 1987. That's over 30 years ago.

The GOP suspended the rules, the Constitution, and any discussion on the bills. Speaker of the Indiana House of Representatives, Brian Bosma, said they had already been debated. Some Democrats disagreed. But when there is a supermajority, the other party's hands are tied. It was an unnecessary expense for Hoosiers to bear and an unnecessary session for a supermajority.

Here's some of what they did "accomplish" in their one-day session:

Passed HB 1230, a school safety bill that has one section stating that students stay in their classrooms for three minutes in the event of an "unplanned fire alarm" going off. So, an "unplanned fire" would give the students three less minutes to escape a burning building.

The bill also provides for a litany of training for schools, including how to identify trafficking and reporting of bullying and cyber-bullying. All of these provisions require the schools to report, document and keep a record for the state. Weaponizing the inside of the schools instead of de-weaponizing those on the outside.

Passed HB 1315, a takeover of Muncie schools by Ball State University. Constituents were left out of the process and the specifics of the Bill were primarily designed by GOP lawmakers. Ball State does not have to comply with the rules other schools do, like not discriminating against teachers due to their marital status, providing leave for military service or pregnancy and following disability laws. Plus, it takes away collective bargaining for the teachers. One more exemption: Teachers will not be required to be trained in detecting neglect or abuse; there is also no mention of requiring suicide awareness and prevention. This exemption flies in the face of the "school safety bill".

Indiana taxpayers did not get what they were forced to pay for.

Deadpool 2

A funny, violent and entertaining time

While the calendar may not officially say it's summer yet, at the box office the summer season is in full swing. We've already seen the release of the third *Avengers* film, which continues to rake in the money at an astonishing rate. Disney is set to release their annual *Star Wars* film by the end of the month and the second Ant-Man flick will soon pop up on theater screens. However, in between all of those movies is another superhero film; one with a slightly different, more violent and profane take on the genre.

Deadpool 2, as you probably guessed, is the sequel to 2016's Deadpool. The second film picks up with our sarcastic and foul-mouthed anti-hero in a rather explosive situation. Things quickly go from bad to worse for the "merc with a mouth." Following the death of a central character, Deadpool is forced to make a decision that will change his life and the lives of those around him forever – sort of.

Knowing that he'll need reinforcements in order to survive his current predicament, Deadpool puts together a ragtag group of misfits. And in extremely Deadpool-like fashion, that goes violently and hilariously wrong. Continuing along from that mishap and the four or five others that follow, Deadpool calls

upon a few old friends to help him take out his biggest and deadliest foe yet – a child.

Deadpool 2 brings all of the elements that made the first film such a hit – the rapid-fire wit, the needless, over-the-top violence and the creative breaking of the fourth wall – and then some, including a much better story. Believe it or not, through all the dirty jokes and the blood splatter, the film even attempts to cobble together somewhat of a message. However, this is likely just another joke from the filmmakers.

While the story is immensely better than the first film, this one is not as funny as the first film. That's not to say that Ryan Reynolds as the film's antihero is any less sarcastic or funny than the first film, it's just that the story is the obvious concern here and rightfully so. The jokes are still present but they don't come as fast and furious and don't connect nearly as often.

Despite a few missteps here and there, it's hard not to like *Deadpool 2*. The film's wit, charm and its ability to not take itself seriously makes for an incredibly entertaining time.


