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

HAUNTS & JAUNTS

I used to do paranormal investigations and go ghost hunting every weekend. Then, it became my wife Laura and I. She was interested in the paranormal. We did pretty much the same: gas, mileage, money, driving on the highway and back roads in the wee morning hours, and weekends with little sleep and a catatonic stare for two days afterward. It became a cycle of life, and a continuing learning experience that transcended and embellished the normal work week. Yet, as we discovered, there are other venues to also learn about and become involved in. Ones with a sense of urgency!

During my brief sojourn as a Marion County Sheriff candidate I developed a mindset on the importance of public safety, and all that involved. It's often not pretty or sanitized, yet a necessity. This lingered in the back of my mind for years afterward. Then came the opportunity for CERT and I jumped on it... also dragging my wife Laura into it. She is an equal opportunity wife!

CERT (Community Emergency Response Team), based through the Indianapolis Division of Homeland Security, is a program training volunteers preparation in response to emergency situations in the communities and neighborhoods we live in. We are the support to first responders (police, medical, fire), able and trained to assist victims at a disaster site. In the event of a major event (tornado, for example) it might be some time before first responders would arrive.

CERT secures the scene until they do. There are also other opportunities throughout the year for community events with CERT making a presence.

The Indianapolis PSCA (Public Safety Citizen's Academy), 5th class, was an obvious caveat to the next step in our journey. Over 12 weeks, Laura and I rubbed shoulders with IFD (Indianapolis Fire Dept.), IMPD (Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Dept.), the Public Safety Communications Center (911), Indiana Task Force One, IEMS (Indianapolis Emergency Medical Services) and even IACS (Indianapolis Animal Care Services). We met and intermingled with the folks involved within our city's public safety, discovering in the process—it's a big, sometimes, dark world out there in our city needing people in control. They are! And, we all have a role to play if we choose to do so. As with CERT, there are opportunities to continue further if you chose.

My wife and I continue to ghost hunt, but also have added other things to our tool kit. It all comes down to helping others in their time of need.

More laps than most drivers

Indianapolis 500 Gordon Pipers vice president Kent Evans enjoys the excitement of marching around the Indianapolis Motor Speedway

Kent Evans, vice president and senior pipe major for the Indianapolis 500 Gordon Pipers, jokes that he and other band members have completed more laps around the Indianapolis Motor Speedway than some of the drivers.

That could well be true, as the Franklin Township resident has marched in the band since 1990. After 27 years with the pipers, he's performed Colts games, traveled the nation to play at events such as the Daytona 500, and even performed for elementary school children. Yet, he still has a fondness for the Speedway.

"My favorite venue is the track," Evans said. "It feels like home, we're there so much and spend so much time out there. You get this feeling when you go to the track, all of this history, time and the people that have been there over the years. We say when it rains at the track, we shine. We're there for entertaining the crowds in between racing and qualifications."

Evans grew up in Speedway, so he was familiar with the track and knew of the Gordon Pipers, which will celebrate its 55th anniversary next year.

"The band has been around," Evans said. "Now we're a fixture at the track. One of our ex-members had a saying, 'world famous, internationally known.' People know us from the 500. People recognize us."

While he had always been attracted to the sound of the bagpipes, it wasn't until 1990 that he found the time to learn to play. He joined the Gordon Pipers that year.

"At first, I was scared and apprehensive," he said. "We have to memorize our music. We don't have sheet music in front of us. there are usually mistakes. You have to learn how to cover it up so it doesn't sound so bad."

It took him approximately five years to learn to play the instrument fluently. Since then, he's gone from being a novice piper to teaching others how to play. He estimates that he spends 30 to 40 percent of the time at practices teaching, and teaches outside of practices.

Evans works full time as a biology teacher for Franklin Central and will retire at the end of this month. He also teaches drivers ed. He and his wife, Debra, reside in Franklin Township and have three children.

The Gordon Pipers does 55 to 60 performances per year as a group, and even more individually. Most of its performances are on the Northside of Indianapolis, where they participate in things such as the upcoming Carmel July 4th Parade. For St. Patrick's Day, the band had 18 performances in just the one day. Evans said he's had opportunities to participate in so many memorable events and for many famous people, including then-governor Mike Pence and Olivia Newton John. The group plays for the Indy Honor Flight. They perform before the Colts games. Some of his high school students remember him from performing at their elementary school.

"At times it drags, but when you see the light that most people have, it changes your attitude," Evans said. "Some kids are into it. There are still a few people that cringe. That's how it is. Some people like things, some people don't."

The Gordon Pipers will bring up to 40 members of its band to performances. For the Indy 500, they are usually joined by their "sister band" from Canada, which brings an extra 10 to 15 people. Evans said he looks forward to the 500 Parade every year, with the crowds of people watching as they continue the annual tradition.

"One of my first experiences, our founder, before he passed on, he took us around after we came out of the fourth turn; we went right down the middle of the pit," Evans said. "There were all these people in the pit. The thing about bagpipes, people realize you're there and get out of your way. It's like parting of the sea. People scramble to get out of the way. There's a lot of applause. We have band members who dance and they'll do that at the track. That's always a good time."

Getting to know Kent & the Gordon Pipers...

- Since we're a marching band, we play a lot of marching songs. I like the up beat songs. You have to play it quickly to make it sound good.
- The misconception most people have about the band is we do this for free.
 We do volunteer our time. But money goes back into the band.
- We're probably the only pipers who have two kilts. Our pipers wear dress green kilts and drummers wear red kilts. A kilt weighs eight or nine pounds. It's not a light thing. All the deep pleats add to the weight of it.
- It seems our fan base is on the Northside.

Provide a ride

Johnson County VFWs, Legions raise money with Biscuits & Gravy Breakfast, for disabled veteran transportation

For 12 years now, VFW and American Legion Posts of Johnson County have partnered to provide a Biscuits & Gravy Breakfast, in support of a cause that helps disabled veterans in Johnson County stay healthy.

This year's breakfast, on Memorial weekend, May 27, 7:30 - 10:30 a.m. at the New Whiteland VFW Post #6978, will accept donations of \$3 to \$5 per meal. This will benefit the Johnson County Community Van Fund at the Johnson County Community Foundation, which provides transportation to local veterans.

"For 12 years now, (the Greenwood) Bob Evans has been donating the biscuits & gravy," said Virgil Kappes, coordinator for the county van service. "Brenda Irwin, the manager, has supported us the last 12 years. The money we raise for our vans, we can't thank the service organizations enough: three American Legions, two VFWs, plus Eagles and Elks."

The Disabled Veterans Transportation Fund began 15 years ago, in partnership with Access Johnson County, transporting disabled veterans to VA clinics. Veterans must call 24 hours in advance of their appointment and Access Johnson County will pick them up at their home and take them to and from the VA clinic. This fund has taken more than 15,700 patients to the VA since its inception.

"Over the years, we found out we were running into a problem of veterans not going to the VA, not having transportation, too old to drive," Kappes said. "So we started the Johnson County Veterans Van Fund. This was started by Access. We will pick them up and take them to the stores, banks, any medical needs. The biggest need we found our veterans have is when their spouse is in the nursing home. They aren't driving and don't know how to get there." Kappes said the Johnson County Community Van Fund began a year ago last May, with funds managed by the Johnson County Community Foundation. Veterans can request transport to the grocery store, pharmacy, doctor's office, Johnson County Memorial Hospital, Community South Hospital or a nursing home. They must call Access Johnson County, (317) 738-5523, 48 hours in advance. The van service is available Monday through Friday, 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. Last quarter, the program helped take 91 people to different appointments.

"The western part of Johnson County, the vets in Center Grove, Bargersville, Ninevah, we have a harder time reaching those people," Kappes said. "All veterans in Johnson County need to realize we have services for them... Our motto is veterans helping veterans. We're just trying to help them maintain a good standard of medical healthcare."

Kappes said he encourages anyone with interest in the program to join them on Memorial Day and learn how it benefits the community.

"It's the thanks you get from the veterans," he said. "There's a veteran in Bargersville. I pick him up to take him to meetings. He's living alone. He has cancer in the throat. No one is there to monitor him. One day I won't be able to drive and someone will have to help me out."

Out of her home on Five Points Road, Brenda Taylor and her volunteers care for dozens of ferrets that have been given up by their former caretakers. Daily responsibilities include cleaning cages, doing laundry, and distributing food, water, and medicine. Playtime is the most exciting part of the day, because once the ferrets are let out of their cages, they run, hop, climb, and wrestle to their fluffy, little hearts' content.

"They're little troublemakers," Taylor said, "so you have to be a hop ahead."

Besides caring for the ferrets' physical needs, running a non-profit 501(c)3 also involves a good amount of grunt-work. Vaccination records must be kept up to date, trips to the vet must be taken, and funds must be raised to keep the shelter going.

That's where the Ferret 500 comes in, their biggest fundraiser of the year. The Ferret 500 will take place on June 3, 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., at the Marion County Fairgrounds with an admission/donation of \$5 for adults and \$2 for children ages 7 - \$15. For the sixth year running, the event will involve a championship ferret show, complete with judges and awards. Spectator events also include ferret races, a costume contest, and a paper bag escape.

In addition, the Ferret 500 also hosts a raffle

table, vendors, and education programs. Five Points Ferret Refuge is adamant that ferretowners know how to care for their pets properly. When a ferret is adopted from the shelter, the owner is given a book on ferret care.

"It's a constant frustration to me," Taylor said, "that the pet stores don't make any effort, in most cases, to educate people."

The event benefits the shelter not only by raising funds, but also by attracting new volunteers and prospective owners. This is especially important now, because the shelter is nearly over-capacity. Their goal is to keep around 30 ferrets at a time, but they currently have almost twice that amount in their care.

However, Taylor says that the work is well worth the effort. "If you get them in sick, and you're able to help them get well, or if you have somebody that comes in that's a bad biter, and you're able to get them turned around. Those are the things that are the up-side of it."

William Childs, who has volunteered at the shelter for over a year, agreed. "A lot of times, they come in from a bad situation, and then two months later, they're ready for adoption. It's a rags to riches story."

Aside from the satisfaction of seeing ferrets find a new home, Taylor says her favorite part is just holding them. "Because, oh, they're so sweet!"

Keenan-Stahl Boys and Girls Club unveils new teen and computer rooms

The Keenan-Stahl Boys and Girls Club of Indianapolis unveiled its newly-renovated Teen Room and upgraded Computer Room on May 17.

Lowe's Hardware store provided the Keenan-Stahl Club a \$50,000 donation in order to renovate the space. Lowe's offered a renovation donation to one Boys and Girls Club in each of the 50 states and The Keenan-Stahl club was the club selected in Indiana.

The new renovations create a brighter and fresher look within the facility.

"The Teen Room was once a section of the old gymnasium," said Executive Director Rick Whitten. "The entire room echoed and you could hear conversations others were having at the opposite end of the room. We've lowered the ceilings and replace the gym lighting with LED lights and it has created a more inviting and comfortable place for the kids." The club has been in operation for nearly 50 years and serves, on average, 250 children a day. Most of these kids live below the poverty line and the facility gives them a safe place to go after school. The new renovations will help keep things running smoothly and will create a place the children enjoy going.

"When the kids see it looking fresher," said Unit Director Michael Coleman, "it makes them want to invite more kids here and they want to be here. Hopefully we get to make an impact on their lives. We want this to be a safe environment, but we also want to make it a fun and positive place for the kids."

Many of the children have already seen some of the benefits of the newly renovated Teen Room. "I remember the old room," said teen Dixie Boyce. "This room is so much better than the old one, and it isn't as loud as before."

The Keenan-Stahl Club is located at 1949 E. Troy Ave., Indianapolis, IN 46203. It operates from 3 to 7 p.m. Monday thru Thursday for children ages 5-18 and 3pm to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday for Teens during the school year.

Goodwill on a gap year

Sarah Turo-Shields fundraises to take a Ugandan mission trip after she graduates from Perry Meridian

Sarah Turo-Shields has committed to attend Bellarmine University in Kentucky to study social justice and forensic psychology with a long-term goal of going into the Peace Corps. But first, she's taking a year off from school and traveling across the globe to go on a mission trip to Uganda.

"I love helping other people," she said. "Going to Africa is definitely going to help me mature and grow and be more open to ideas as I come back and go to college."

Turo-Shields is graduating from Perry Meridian High School, with its commencement on May 26.

Through St. Barnabas Catholic Church, she has gone on a mission trip every year, and is active in the youth ministry since middle school.

"My first mission trip was terrifying," she said. "There were about 30 teens and I knew none of them. I was working in New Mexico. It was a beautiful place. I loved the people. But I didn't fit in with the group I was with. It was hard to get a good feel for it. When I came back, I told my mom I would never do it again."

The lady in charge of the trips kept reaching out to her, so Turo-Shields decided to try one more mission, again to New Mexico.

"The second time was different," she said. "I loved it. We worked more with the children the first time and we had a sports club, a bible club. The second time we did more construction. We worked on these one-room houses. While we were doing that, the family that would be living there was hanging out, watching us. It was cool to hear their story. The second time was what pushed me to keep going."

When Turo-Shields was in sixth grade, she heard Sherry Meyer speak. Meyer has been a Comboni Missionary for 25 years. Turo-Shields said she told her mom she wanted to go on a trip there with Meyer, but her mother told her to wait until she finishes high school before making any plans.

"Sherry came back this past year, the summer going into my senior year, and I reached out to her," Turo-Shields said. She decided she would take a year off after high school to take the trip to Uganda where she will work for the Media Center of Radio Pacis, be a midwife and work with her uncle in his organization, Turo Foundation, building wells across Africa. Meyer has encouraged Turo-Shields to try different things, to see first-hand what suits her talents best. "I'm going to experience their commu-

nity and experience

their culture," she said. "I'll just be fitting into their community and working alongside of them. It's interesting because we always talk about how money makes the world go round. But these people live with basically nothing and they're happy, content. I hope this (upcoming Uganda) trip humbles me."

Turo-Shields has been working to fundraise for the trip, with a goal to raise \$5,484. She has also been saving her own money with her job at Penn Station. She has a page set up at gofundme.com/gap-year-to-arua-

uganda. She will host a fundraiser at Firehouse Subs, Greenwood, on June 1, handing out fliers. Anyone with her flier or who mentions they're there for her cause, 20 percent of their purchase will go to her trip. This will be her first mission trip outside of the U.S. She's planning to pack minimally, and isn't bringing her phone, only taking her laptop for communication with her family. Before she leaves, she will go on one more two-week mission this summer to Montana working in construction.

"This year has flown by," she said. "I'm waiting for the summer to fly by. I'm ready. I feel like I've be scared but it's a good type of scared."

Special Meeting, May 22

What happened:

The Board of Works approved a special contract between Citizens Energy and the City of Beech Grove at its meeting May 22. The city council then held a special meeting, approving the contract with a vote of 4 in approval, one abstained vote and two against.

What it means:

This contract removes the agreement that was previously in place with the city, which had a fixed capital improvement cost at the Southport Wastewater Treatment plant to which Beech Grove contributed. That fee would have been more than \$300,000 this year. Now it will be \$85,000 this year and \$85,000 in 2018, then goes away completely, said Mayor Dennis Buckley.

"This is good news for the ratepayers of Beech Grove because for the next almost two years, there will be no rate increase for the sewage works users," Buckley said. "All around us, the rates are going up. We for the next two years are going to hold the line on fees. That is good news for people on fixed income, especially. Later this year I will roll out some ordinances to help seniors who are on fixed income (with their sewage bills). I'm very happy about that."

The city retained a utility lawyer, who also represents Greenwood, Lawrence and Ben Davis. These cities/towns will all begin to pay the same rates the first day of 2019.

"This is a matter that we needed to get resolved real quick," Buckley said. "To sum it up, the ratepayers will save millions by the actions conducted by the board last night.

What's next:

The contract will take effect Jan. 1, 2019. The Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission (IURC) will hear this contract at its June 5 meeting.







Everything, Everything Nothing, nothing good here

MOVIE REVIEW


Emotions are extremely powerful things. They can cause human beings to act in abnormal, irrational or uncharacteristic ways. Additionally, they can also lead to spontaneous, undeserved expressions of kindness. Pick up a newspaper or turn on the television and acts driven by fear, sadness and anger seem to grab headlines on a daily basis. Unfortunately, displays of love and kindness are nearly absent from the 24-hour news cycle. But like those four lads from across the pond told us so long ago, love is all you really need, right? One new film builds upon this idea of love and its paramount importance in our lives.

Everything, Everything is the story of 18-year-old Maddy, who, due to a rare disease that makes her body unable to fight off even the most benign germs, is forced to live her entire life indoors. The air she breathes is highly filtered, the clothes she wears are put through a meticulous sanitization process and her only human interactions are with her mother and her nurse. The only things Maddy knows about life outside is what she's able to see through windows.

However, as luck would have it, Maddy spots Olly and his family moving in next door. Despite Maddy's initial reluctance to Olly's persistent efforts to establish communication, she gives in and they begin a relationship that consists of text messages and miming through windows. As they fall more and more infatuated with one another, they learn more about each other and themselves. As far as the story goes, there is very little that differentiates *Everything, Everything* from other similar stories. The only difference being she's sick and unable to go outside. Besides that, Everything, Everything is a badly written, bore of a story that is nothing more than an amalgamation of all the worst aspects of boy meets girl, girl and boy fall in love films. Nearly every single character is unbelievably dumb, who spout forced, cringe-worthy lines that evoke bouts of nervous laughter from the audience.

The only thing worse than the film's writing and acting is the infuriatingly stupid and lazy "twist" at the end. It's absolutely nothing that cannot be predicted from simply viewing the trailer. However, it's so embarrassingly cliché, trite and tacked on that it actually fits with the rest of the film.

If not for *Fifty Shades Darker, Everything, Everything* would be the worst film of the year. There is simply nothing, nothing good about this film.







Weekly Devotion



47 Wherefore I say unto thee, Her sins, which are many, are forgiven; for she loved much: but to whom little is forgiven, the same loveth little.

LUKE 7:47

One of the first things that we take note of in this verse is that this woman is forgiven of her many sins. This woman, according to some commentaries had been with Jesus before this time and He had forgiven her for her life of sin. Now, she does the unthinkable and comes into what is a male setting and breaks with all customs and taboos and walks immediately up to Jesus and begins to weep and to anoint His feet and dry them with her hair. She touches Him. This is not done in that part of the world to this day. A woman does not touch a man without his permission.

Simon, the Pharisee, began to protest her actions. Like all Pharisees, he is more disturbed by her actions than her having been forgiven of her sins by Jesus who is a guest in his home. The

outward appearance of things is more important to him than the salvation of this woman. So, Jesus does what Jesus does best. He corrects Simon's thinking. He explains that Simon did not offer to Him the common courtesy offered to even the humblest guest whom he has invited into his house. He did offer so much as a basin of water to wash His feet with and yet, this woman did not cease washing His feet with her tears and after she had washed them, she anointed them with the ointment from the alabaster box.

Now, which of the two gave more

honor to Christ? Not Simon!

How do you show honor to Christ with your life. How long ago was it or has it been since you was first forgiven of your sin if you have ever been forgiven? We go to Him with our prayer requests everyday but do we honor Him by "washing His feet with our tears and drying them with our hair" even in a symbolic way?
