


Indy Backpack Attack announces kickoff event

Finding Mary Bryan

HAUNTS & JAUNTS

I don't stroll through cemeteries in the dark anymore, yet have no hesitation in doing so in the daylight. Especially when accompanied by my friend, Barry Browning, treasurer for the Perry Township/Southport Historical Society. We are in the "Old" Southport Cemetery on a mission: finding the grave of Mary Bryan, pioneer woman.

History's always been a puzzle. Dates can be off by a few years, some events may or may not have actually happened, the spelling of names change but one thing remains consistent: what has happened in the past in many ways defines our present. It's a story of people who lived their lives for a brief moment in the sun and events that have left imprints. Mary Bryan has her very own historical marker, standing prominently outside a small cemetery on busy Southport Road. We pass it every day; at least I do. What happened here is a slice of such history.

History dictates that Daniel Boone (an explorer and settler from Kentucky) brought other potential settlers west through the "Gap" in the Cumberland Mountains in the late 1770s. The route became known as "The Wilderness Road." Mary factored into this. She happened to be married to Boone's nephew, Samuel Bryan, a Revolutionary War soldier and actual pioneer man. The exact year they transitioned through the mountains into a new life and whether it was with Boone leading the way is lost in the fuzziness of history. We'll never know for sure. There are date discrepancies on her marker and a misleading statement: "One of the first

American women to cross the Cumberland Mountains." Not true! The American Indians had been crossing those mountains for hundreds of years prior. I believe there might have been a few women along those.

Mary Hunt married Samuel Bryan in Rowan County, North Carolina. They managed to rustle up 10 children before their next move in 1779 to Campbell County, Kentucky, where they lived for many years. Their final move, with a few of their children, was to Marion County, Indiana (Southport) somewhere between 1830 and 1834. Again... extreme fuzziness on the exact date. Samuel had barely enough time to unpack. He died in 1837. Mary followed five years later in 1842. There are reports that both were originally buried on the farm of their son, Luke, whom they were living with. They were later moved to the "Old" Southport Cemetery.

Barry and I found their plot in the cemetery. It wasn't hard to find, with old monuments mixed with new stones. A small wrought iron fence encircled three sides and adorned with flowers and American flags. We paused in respect. This was Southport in its infancy!


You might ask how the Bryan's factor into Southport history. How did they end up in this relatively small graveyard, looked over by the Gothic brick church to its east? And, whose land was this? Well, that's another story...

Several year ago, Donna Freeman was out running errands with her teenage son, Brian. As many growing boys do, the Center Grove student asked his mother for some money to grab a snack. After being gone for quite some time, Donna grew concerned and began walking the aisles. calling out Brian's name. Easing her worry, her son ran up to her and informed her to go ahead and keep shopping. He went on to share that he had encountered an elderly woman using a wheelchair that was alone at the store. Brian was hoping that he could sit and talk with the woman, keeping her company for a bit, while his mother finished her shopping. This was Brian Freeman.

Brian was a typical 16-year-old boy that loved mischief, girls and cheeseburgers. However, this young man's capacity for kindness exceeded far beyond the scope of that day shopping with his mother. He had a gift for knowing when people were feeling outcast or alone and always found ways to comfort them. There are multiple memories of the Center Grove teenager eating lunch with lonely students. In another instance, Brian saved up his money to take an elderly woman from his church on a "date." His sister, Kelli Sponsel, recalls a time in which their mother

informed them a young woman at the school she was working at did not have a date for prom.

"When my brother found out that she didn't have a prom date, he asked her if she would if she would like to go with him," she said. "He shined up the car, treated her to dinner and made her feel like a princess that night. Brian was a great dancer, but the young lady was not. So, not wanting to make her uncomfortable, Brian danced at her pace the entire evening."

A tragic twist of fate

On July 8, 1999, Brian briefly returned home from church camp to attend the funeral of his pastor's daughter with his family. The daughter was a part of Brian's youth group and being a small tight-knit congregation of nearly 200 hundred people, everyone took a day from camp to attend. After a moving service and time with his family, Brian returned to church camp with a calling in his heart. That evening, he knelt at an alter feeling drawn to be more of a leader in his youth group and at Center Grove High School, and in that moment, Brian recommitted his life to Christ. There was no doubt in

anyone's mind that this young man was destined to do great things.

The next day, Brian returned home from church camp and needed to pick up his paycheck from a local car dealership that he was working for that summer. There had been some intense thunderstorms throughout the day, leaving it very humid outside. Since his car did not have air conditioning, the teenager asked to take Donna's red Pontiac Grand Am. He left to run his errand and his parents headed out for dinner with friends.

After hours had passed without being able to reach their son, the Freemans decide to return home. Turning the corner onto their street, the couple was faced with the fear that no parent ever wants to encounter. An Indiana State Trooper was parked in their driveway waiting for them. Brian had been involved in a car accident on Curry Road where he had hit high water left from the heavy rains. He was not speeding and was wearing his seatbelt, but once the car began to hydroplane, Brian no longer had control of the vehicle as it crashed into a tree and the Center Grove teenager was killed instantly.

Challenging a community

The viewing was held at the family's small church but everyone was moved by how many came to pay their respects. More than 1,500 people came to honor Brian, with hundreds of them being teenagers. People spent more than seven hours in line as the family was showered with stories of their young man's undeniable impact on others. Due to the expected number at the funeral, the family moved the service to the Community Church of Greenwood. With hundreds of teenagers in attendance once again, Donna Freeman offered a testimony of Brian's faith and the importance of valuing each moment with Christ. While the moment was an incredibly powerful testament to Brian's life, the family had no idea of the impact that their son was still about to have on others.

Being a leader

Among the pain of their loss, the Freeman family still sought out a way to honor Brian and his love for others. In 2001, the Brian Freeman Memorial Foundation was established with a motto being "to encourage the spirit of fellowship, kindness and integrity that was Brian Freeman." "We knew that we wanted to do something to carry on his legacy of kindness, but it took us a couple of years to get it off the ground," Sponsel said. From 2001 to 2005, the foundation hosted two events: a run/walk event at Center Grove Middle School and a golf outing.

Over time, the family phased out the run/walk event as they were realizing the golf outing was growing in popularity and was consistently raising money for the foundation. Even more impactful is what the Brian Freeman Memorial Foundation is doing locally and globally with the money they have raised.

"We raise right around \$12,000 with each outing. We have been able to bless countless people over the last 17 years," she said.

These blessings have included building wells for fresh drinking water in Haiti, funding a custom shower for an amputee, providing multiple college scholarships, assisting with mission work in Africa, supporting a ministry for deaf children, helping a family with medical expenses after a firefighter lost his leg, purchasing motorcycles for pastors in India to travel more effectively, and covering funeral costs for a family who could not afford to bury their daughter. "We try to find the ones who may otherwise be overlooked, the way that Brian did. We try to support causes that would otherwise receive no support," Sponsol said.

Golfing to make a difference

The Brian Freeman Memorial Foundation golf tournament will be held June 28 at Dye's Walk Country Club in Greenwood and will mark the organization's 18th outing. A \$100 entry cost will enter golfers into a fourperson Florida scramble that includes a golf cart, range balls, a momento ball, soft drinks, lunch and door prizes. Registration will begin at 11:30 a.m. and a shotgun start will tee off at 1 p.m. The event is always accepting more players and sponsorship opportunities to help raise money for the Brian Freeman Memorial Foundation.

A lasting testimony

While Brian Freeman is no longer with us, his legacy continues to leaving a lasting mark on others. "We often say that he affected more live in 16 years than many people do in an entire lifetime," Sponsel added. It is only fitting that Brian's headstone reads, "His smile brightened the darkest room, his love touched the hardest heart" followed with an excerpt from Psalm 18:16-24, "He reached down from on high and took hold of me; He drew me out of deep waters... He recused me because He delighted in me." Through the work of the Brian Freeman Foundation, the Center Grove teenager is still brightening the darkest of rooms and hearts but now can help take a hold of others and help them out of the deep waters in their own lives.


Elizabeth was active in extra-curricular activities

Special Session should not have happened

As a candidate for State Representative in House District #90 in the upcoming November election, I wanted to share a few observations about the recent Special Session of the Indiana General Assembly. First, it should never have happened. No emergency existed. The House leadership didn't get their work completed the first time around (January – March), and so they had to spend an additional \$30,000 plus to convene for a one-day session on May 14.

Five bills were passed which required suspending the rules of the House in order to complete the process in one day. The normal Constitutional process was not followed. No public testimony or amendments were considered or even allowed. News reports project that several large companies will benefit from large tax cuts amounting to roughly \$185 million in lost revenues to Indiana over three years. Those monies certainly could have been put to good use in House District #90 to improve our infrastructure, fund our schools, and lower the cost of internet and cable services. Some folks have suggested it was a special session for the special interests.

Just since the end of the Special Session, we have experienced another tragic shooting at a high school in Texas. And I am happy to report that the General Assembly

passed a school security bill making \$5 million available to local schools for school security improvement grants. Unfortunately, these monies won't go very far in terms of what most projects cost and with over 370 school corporations in the state... that's less than \$14,000 per district. I would put this effort in the cover your rear category – and is clearly NOT a serious attempt to protect our children while in school.

The most important and far-reaching bill, in my judgment, was HEA 1335 which was proposed in response to ongoing financial challenges within several school corporations here in Indiana. The bill removed the authority of the local school board and transferred it to another public entity which will now appoint the school board members instead of having them duly elected by citizens in the district. This action is an outrageous and troubling precedent set by this General Assembly. Our current Representative, Mike Speedy, did not vote to protect the authority of local school boards. Instead, he was excused.

It strikes me that a bill of such consequence deserves a yes or no vote. In the future, if the Perry Township, Beech Grove, or Franklin Township School Corporations get into financial trouble, a precedent now exists which would allow for any school board to be stripped of its power and authority.

Eskenazi Health joins with Lilly and local partners to reduce diabetes in central Indiana

Earlier this month, Eskenazi Health, along with Eli Lilly and Company, Indiana University's Richard M. Fairbanks School of Public Health and other community partners announced the launch of a new \$7 million, five-year neighborhood-based, data-driven pilot program in Indianapolis to help address the high incidence of diabetes.

Data collected has shown that there are neighborhoods in central Indiana that have some of the most significant health disparities and highest incidence of diabetes in the country. In these neighborhoods projected rates of diabetes range between 17 and 20 percent. This is one-and-a-half to two times that of the national and global averages.

Eskenazi Health has neighborhood health centers throughout Marion County and we have health centers in each of the three identified neighborhoods.

In the effort to combat the issue of diabetes in the neighborhoods surrounding our three health centers, six full-time community health workers will be hired specifically for this effort. Three are being hired as part of the grant initiative and Eskenazi Health has agreed to match this number to bring the total to six.

These community health workers will be hired from within these communities. They will help engage their neighbors and assist them in navigating the health system and connect them to community resources.

They will not only be trusted, qualified individuals from each neighborhood but they will become a part of our health care team, allowing us to extend our reach outside the four walls of our health centers.

Once engaged, these individuals identified as high risk for diabetes will not only have the resources of the community health workers, but also the community partners and organizations that make up this critical collaboration to reduce diabetes. We also are able to get them linked to the vital care they need through the Eskenazi Health system.

We're eager to deepen our partnership with the residents of these neighborhoods to improve education about diabetes and to connect people to the care they need. We think this approach has broad applications across our entire system and across the health care landscape.

Solo: A Star Wars Story A prequel sure to please fans

There likely isn't a more dedicated and passionate fan base than *Star Wars* fans. However, legions of avid *Star Trek* enthusiasts would likely say otherwise. Regardless, despite there being a number of films, characters and planets in the *Star Wars* universe, truly devoted followers of the series are able to keep these intricate factoids straight with relative ease. Knowing this fanatical allegiance that *Star Wars* has built and been able to maintain for several decades, Disney is going to milk it for all its worth. This past weekend saw the release of the latest film in the *Star Wars* series.

Solo: A Star Wars Story is a prequel, telling the origin of a beloved figure in the Star Wars universe. Can you guess which one? As the film opens, we see the young but troubled Han as he's attempting to illegally commandeer a space cruiser. Looking to leave his life of crime behind and build a better future for himself and Oi'ra, they concoct a risky plan. But that doesn't work quite as expected and is forced to call an audible, making lemonade out of lemons.

Never one to stay down for long, young Han soon encounters a lifelong buddy through his series of unfortunate events. Oh, he also reverts back to his old, less than legal ways as Mr. Solo soon falls in line with a group of shady but albeit likeable characters. Han and his new buddies are then jet setting

across the galaxy on a seemingly impossible quest to secure copious amounts of a rare commodity for an even shadier and much less likable figure.

Solo: A Star Wars Story is a film that moves with an incredibly brisk and rapid pace. From the opening scene right up unto the closing credits, the action does not stop. The filmmakers assume that we're more than familiar with theses characters as there is little exposition, instead choosing to focus on the characters' mammoth quest. Strong writing and even stronger direction are seen in spades in this latest Star Wars entry.

Even though the writing and Ron Howard's direction are more than solid, it's not all perfect. For instance, Aiden Ehrenreich, as the young Solo, delivers a very vanilla performance. He's extremely bland, boring and forgettable as one of the *Star Wars*' series biggest characters. Additionally, Donald Glover as Lando Calrissian is likely the best thing about the entire film and he's given way too little screen time.

Solo: A Star Wars Story will most assuredly go on to gross a ton of cash. Even though it's not perfect, Star Wars fanatics and those with just a passing interest in the outer space saga will be more than pleased.

NUTRITION

Our primal urge to cook food over fire is deeply rooted. If you can outrun it, then kill it, cook it and eat it. And that applies to plant foods too, except they don't run. Our early ancestors discovered fire and used it to spit-roast meat and root vegetables, stay warm, ward off predators and venture into harsh climates. The oldest evidence dates back 300,000 - 400,000 years, associating the earliest control of fire with Homo sapiens and Neanderthals.

If you are the family grill master who has survived or is worried about cancer, I don't mean to grinch your picnic, but *Nutrition Review* and countless highly trustworthy sources all agree: cooking meat too close to open flame creates a black, carcinogenic black char. The National Cancer Institute urges avoiding direct exposure of meat to an open flame and lengthy cooking times, especially at high temperatures, can prevent formation of cancerous elements.

This is a serious matter. So serious that researchers are currently investigating the

association between meat intake, meat cooking methods and cancer risk. Ongoing studies include the NIH-AARP Diet and Health Study, the American Cancer Society's Cancer Prevention Study II, the Multiethnic Cohort, and studies from Harvard. Similar population research is being conducted in the European Prospective Investigation into Cancer and Nutrition (EPIC) study.

Chef Wendell's tips to enhance the grilling experience:

- Raise the grill so meats aren't licked by flames.
- · Slow down and enjoy the moment.
- · Remove charred portions.
- Cut produce into large enough chunks or you'll obliterate it.
- Brush with oil and grill sliced pineapple, peaches, bananas, peppers, asparagus and zucchini directly on the grates.
- For smaller fruit, use a grill basket or bamboo skewers soaked in water to prevent food falling onto the coals.
- Because of their lower sugar content, veggies can stand a slightly more intense fire than fruits.

- Baby red or Yukon gold potatoes come our better when parboiled before grilling so they will cook through without burning.
- Tossveggiesormushroomcapswithoil, salt and pepper before cooking over medium heat.
- Cut avocados in half, remove stone, brush with oil and place on a hot grill, green-side-down for several minutes to create grill lines. Drizzle with lemon salt and pepper and eat out of the shell with a spoon.
- Lightly salt eggplant about 30 minutes before grilling to draw out moisture and concentrate flavor.

one by Grammar Guy's most refined readers. So, grab your grammar ascots, because it's about to get fancy up in here.

In general, "different from" is the preferred phrase among grammar aficionados. It's an adjective phrase that is used to compare two things. Here are a few examples: Marty set himself apart from the rest of the field with his stunning flute solo. Although the new Space Wars movies had special effects different from the originals, I think they're all pretty much the same movie.

Although "different than" shouldn't be employed as often, it does have its merits. Like "different from," "different than" is an adjective phrase used to compare two things. What makes it unique is that the phrase often gets divided. For example: Brian picked a different balloon animal than the one Noah picked. I understood Barry's new neck tattoo to represent

something much different than your interpretation. Mike took a different route than I did to get to the monster truck rally.

"Different from" is seen as the gold standard among editors, linguists and grammarians, although some people can't really notice a difference (like in our wine example). In general, use "different from." An easy way to remember this is that "from" starts with "f," just like "formal" does. So, in any formal writing, make sure you use "different from"; the grammar enthusiasts will think you're one of them.



Weekly Devotion



Pray without ceasing. In everything give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you. Quench not the Spirit. Despise not prophesyings. Prove all things; hold fast that which is good. Abstain from all appearance of evil.

ITHESSALONIANS 5:17-22

Paul, in a few short phrases, gives some very good instructions. Prayer should precede everything else but not just any effort at praying. Prayer without faith in Jesus Christ and everything He stood for and taught is futile. It is written that Iesus said that where two or three are in agreement in prayer, what they ask for they will receive. They must ask in faith believing and be in agreement that what they are asking God for is something Christ would ask for and expect to get.

Once they have asked, they need to express gratitude for the answer God gives. It is not always the answer one expects but every time one prays they will get an answer. If we ask outside what is the will of God we will not and should not expect to receive anything from the Lord. James reminds us that a double-minded man will get nothing from God.

Next, we must be prepared to accept the will of God's Holy Spirit. We need to be very careful about quenching the Holy Spirit, which means that we should not reject His answers nor His appeals. He speaks the mind and the will of God to all of us and we need not debate with Him nor do anything to frustrate His works.

He, the Holy Spirit, is the Spirit of prophesy and to despise His words as expressed through God's anointed prophet is a very dangerous thing. However, one must give all things prophesied scrutiny and by that I mean those things have to be true to God's Word and His expression of it.

One has said that appearance is everything. It may not be everything but it is a lot of what everything is. We must do all we can to be aware of our surroundings and how we look to others as we go forward living for Christ. As Paul said there are things that may be alright for me but not expedient for the Gospel's sake. May we all take these words seriously as we move through this day and go and live for Christ.
