



# DRAGON BOAT RACING VERSUS THE DRAGON OF BREAST CANCER

Perry Township resident Elaine Shea is board president of dragon boat team Indy SurviveOars

A seasoned nurse and educator for 42 years, Elaine Shea found her own breast lump, sought help and knew from the look on the doctor's face what was coming.

As a nursing director in the old Wishard system, she tapped into a network of local experts for help. In 2008 she agreed to participate in a trial program and took a tumor-shrinking medication for weeks before undergoing surgery. She stayed on the job during her illness.

Shea was between post-surgical radiation treatments when she ran into a friend at church. Take up dragon boat racing, the friend said, recommending a team of breast cancer survivors.

A dragon boat is slender, 40 feet in length, and decorated with a dragon head. The boat is propelled by 20 paddlers working in unison. Two more people are on the boat. One steers, and the other, called the drummer, leads the synchronization of the paddlers.

Shea visited the team at Geist Reservoir, where practice is held. She learned a bit of paddling technique and went out in a boat with others. "And I was hooked," she said.

Alluding to the song 'Kumbaya" as an expression of spiritual unity, Shea said she's not a "kumbaya person." But she will use the occasional "cool" and "super-cool" to describe the jubilation she feels when crossing the finish line with her team, the Indy SurviveOars.

The team held a gala in August at the Indiana State Museum to celebrate the 10th anniversary of Indy SurviveOars. The event yielded over \$70,000 after expenses, she said. In the midst of a twoyear term as president of the non-profit team's board, Shea has focused on strategic planning for the group, which bills itself as Indiana's "first and only" such team for breast cancer patients.

Founded by Kathy Martin Harrison, the team offers hope, inspiration, and camaraderie while focusing on health and physical activity, according to the mission statement.

The exercise from paddling a drag-

on boat helps to reduce lymphedema in breast cancer survivors, according to research by Dr. Don McKenzie, the Canadian physician who promoted the sport for patients.

During breast cancer surgery (mastectomy or lumpectomy), some lymph nodes in the underarm could be removed. As a result, lymph fluid collects and causes swelling in the arm, and possibly in the hand, fingers, chest or back.

Not all breast cancer patients have lymphedema, Shea said, but training workouts have additional benefits. A survey of the team shows that almost all respondents say their health has improved since they started paddling, she said.

The workouts also help to counter

the side effects of medication taken long-term after the acute intervention for breast cancer is complete.

Indy SurviveOars has 85 active members and they usually race against only breast cancer teams, she said. However, the local group has enough backers among friends and family that they can fill a second boat with supporters who compete alongside the breast cancer survivors. Shea said she was overcome by the spectacle of pink uniforms, boats and equipment at the first international race she went to in Peterborough in central Ontario, Canada. Competitors from around the world formed a sisterhood of survivors in "more pink than you've ever seen."

Joining the team has given her the opportunity to become friends with people she otherwise would never have met. The youngest racer is only age 28, and Shea is age 72. She lost two teammates to the illness within the last year. In the past decade, 11 racers have died.

Between her early days in nursing and

the time of her diagnosis, treatment of breast cancer shifted to targeted intervention and away from the one-size-fitsall approach, she said, adding that nurse navigators now provide patients with coordinated access to resources.

The racing season has ended for the year, and the boats were put to bed Oct. 11. But the educational activities of Indy SurviveOars will continue Oct. 20 with a symposium featuring Dr. McKenzie. "He put breast cancer survivors in the boat," Shea said.

McKenzie is director of Sports Medicine at The University of British Columbia. He will appear at Community Cancer Center North at a meeting sponsored by the cancer center and Indy SurviveOars.

Shea's year-round fitness routine includes working with a personal trainer, doing yoga, and playing in a golf league. The team also has group workouts with circuit training and rowing machines. The racers are tough enough to have finished second in a 2000-meter race, she said.


Married to Dan Shea, she lives in Perry Township and enjoys retirement, which includes travel. She just came back from a trip with her sister.

Shea wants to remain flexible enough to get down on the floor with her grandchildren. At a nursing class reunion she attended, someone said you can't get back up when you get down.

"That's the part I don't equate with," she said.

# Home values increase across the Southside

**Real estate** – Sellers on the Southside are seeing their home values increase, and their homes fly off the market faster in most cases. According to F.C. Tucker, in August 2017 the average price for homes sold in Greenwood was \$180,162, a 24.5 percent increase from August 2016; and Southport was \$140,745, a 7.8 percent increase from August 2016. In addition, homes sold in an average of 44 days in Greenwood and 39 days in Southport.

#### Former Jonathan Byrd's complex reopens with new name, tenants

**Commerce** – The Jonathan Byrd's building on Byrd Way, Greenwood (Indiana), now bears a new name – The Nest – featuring new tenants and available commercial space. The Nest's first tenant, Brickhouse Coffee Co., will be followed by The Nest Event Center, opening Nov. 1. Eight additional spaces are now available for lease.

Acquired and renovated by Randy Faulkner & Associates, The Nest's first tenant is Brickhouse Coffee Co. Owners Jared and Lora Stayton learned to roast coffee beans while working as missionaries in Spain. While there, they learned age-old coffee craftsmanship, and how community and relationships can develop over a cup of coffee. They continue that tradition at Brickhouse, roasting beans and crafting all-natural syrups and sauces in-house.

The Nest Event Center opens Nov. 1, with its first event scheduled just two days later. The event center will host small and large events from intimate gatherings to lavish banquets, and is the city's first building to offer environmental projection: the ability to use projectors to digitally "paint" walls with images and videos. A grand opening will take place after Thanksgiving.

Randy Faulkner & Associates and Faulkner Restoration, Inc., both owned by The Nest developers Randy and Julie Faulkner, will also be housed in the same building.

"The road to Gettysburg was littered with thousands of dead from both North and South. And the destruction of the reputations of commanding officers in both armies!"

It was somewhere along the rolling hills of the Pennsylvania Turnpike on a Thursday that it finally hit me... we were drawing closer to the Gettysburg battlefield. This trip – a bucket list item for my wife Laura and myself-and we were finally doing it! We were in anticipation. What lie ahead? As her fourcylinder Nissan engine strained along the dips and curves of the Appalachian Mountains (Laura: "Is my engine making a strange sound? Me: "No."), we took the Breezewood exit onto Highway 30 shooting south, passing through Chambersburg towards Gettysburg. Sixty-five miles later we rolled into town in the late afternoon. Traffic was brisk. (Is there a rush hour in Gettysburg?) We checked into our hotel four miles out of town on Emmitsburg Road, unpacked, and returned to meet up with our team for the next few days.

Laura had been speechless since we arrived. I myself—transfixed. Driving through the battlefield, just getting to the Eisenhower Hotel & Conference Center, was a setting of rolling hills, stark white monuments, cannons, and staggered post and rail fences lining the road. And... a sense of reverence regardless of any vehicular traffic, McDonald's, tourist offerings, or stop lights. We were in a historical time stamp transcending any of those things. A time stamp where past became present, and 150 years ago seemed only as yesterday. We couldn't have picked a better tour guide for this experience!

Friend, author, Irvington advocate and haunted tour guide, Alan Hunter, smiled when we arrived at the Appalachian Brewing Co. for dinner. He, his wife Rhonda, and the rest of the "Scooby Gang" were already seated. They made room for us. As a long time friend, I have come to rely on Alan's insight and historical perspectives. Yes, there's the paranormal ties also, weaving a thread in our association, but it's the history that draw and bind us. And, the fact that we're both Civil War buffs! Gettysburg, Penn. is the crowning jewel of a five-year battle that I still have problems wrapping my mind around. In 25 years Alan has visited and reflected upon the town and battlefield some 100 times. It won't end anytime soon! He invited us upon this journey. I believed he had a thing or two to offer. He did!

Thursday night, belly filled, tired from the drive, and thinking about some down time in the hotel room, Alan gave a whimsical smile to the group at dinner and said-"Let's go to Devil's Den." And that we did...

#### Center Grove Community Schools breaks ground on Walnut Grove Elementary

Center Grove Community School Corporation will have a new elementary school open its doors in August 2019. Celebrating the groundbreaking of Walnut Grove Elementary on Oct. 10, school officials shared of the modern and functional features that will go into the facility.

"We're excited to move forward on this project," said Dr. Rich Arkanoff, superintendent, at the groundbreaking. "Our White River Township community is growing and thriving. With that growth comes students. As of today, we are full in all of our elementaries except for one classroom. We have portables around two of our schools, so as you can imagine, August of 2019 cannot get here soon enough."

The two-story school, designed by Lancer + Beebe, LLC, will be constructed on the 57.5-acre property owned by the corporation on N. 450 West, approximately one mile north of State Road 144 in Bargersville.

The school will feature a solar array, which will not only make the facility more energy efficient, but allow students to look at the power usage and use that data in educational lessons. Walnut Grove will be themed around the tree of its namesake. The exterior of the school will feature a entry canopy, with walnut trees leading to the entrance. Inside, the schools is split into three wings: K through first grades, second and third grades and fourth and fifth grades. Each wing will have a color scheme that ties into features of a walnut tree such as green for grades K - one, representing spring and the colors of the tree's leaves. Each wing will also feature hearth room space for collaborative learning.

"The design is phenomenal," said Brian Proctor, current principal of North Grove Elementary who will serve as the first principal of Walnut Grove. "There are some neat features to this building that I think will set the standard, like the solar array field that's not common on an elementary property, or the hearth spaces and learning lab spaces inside. Those are really unique."

He continued, "When you stop to look at the finer details of the building, it really makes you value the facilities that we have in Center Grove. The district has done an unbelievable job of maintaining facilities that are student focused and progressive. This process has taught me to listen to the ideas of everyone and understand we're all in this together. We all have one purpose and our purpose is to make sure Center Grove is the best it can be. It starts with facilities and you pour in the students and their families."

#### The City of Southport and Southport Council presidency

During the City of Southport Council meeting Sept. 18, 2017, Southport Police Chief Tom Vaughn requested a no confidence vote of Southport Council President Shara Hostetler. Councilor Jim Cooney made a motion to the Southport Council to remove Council President Hostetler because of no confidence. Councilors Cooney, Winslow and Haley voted to remove Councilor Hostetler as president.

I, Councilor Tunget, voted no to removing Hostetler as president on moral and legal grounds. I could not morally vote to remove Councilor Hostetler as president because I find her to be an intelligent and hardworking single mother of five wonderful and happy children. She as Southport Councilor At Large has the highest regard for all of the people in Southport she serves. Council President Hostetler serves the community with honor and dignity. There was nothing in the council agenda to even discuss Councilor Hostetler's presidency, nor should there be. Councilor Cooney cited that she did not attend many meetings, none of which were council meetings which she always attended.

Councilor Cooney did not criticize Councilors Winslow and Haley for missing many meetings. Councilor Winslow and Haley did not cite themselves concerning meeting attendance. I have missed some meetings myself but I was not criticized.

The council meeting itself was not legal because the meeting did not follow the Robert's Rules of Order both in the violation of presenting a motion to remove Council President Hostetler that was not on the agenda and violating the voting rule as to the removal of a council president. The City of Southport Council is obligated to follow Robert's Rules of Order by Ordinance.

I believe that as a Southport second term councilor and with the support of my wife, former mayor of Southport for 17 years, have the credibility enough to protect and defend Southport Council President Hostetler's presidency at least until Dec. 31, 2017 and perhaps beyond.

 07-2016 - Republican party gives the seat to Shara Hostetler over his own committee's recommendations. She did not attend the interview process. The City of Southport in effect did not select Ms. Hostetler to represent them.
10-16 - Absent Storm Water meeting; Vote on city budget for 2017-4-0-1-

Hostetler abstained • 11-16 - Vote to purchase police car-4-0-1-Hostetler abstained; vote to purchase radar guns for all police cars-4-0-1-Hostetler abstained • 12-16 - Vote on no parking ordinance-4-0-1-Hostetler abstained; Weeds/Rank vegetation ordinance 2nd reading-4-0-1 Hostetler abstained

•01-17 - Absent special council meeting.

• 01-17 - Vote to purchase police car-4-0-1-Hostetler abstained; vote to up fit police car-4-0-1-Hostetler abstained; Weeds/Rank vegetation-3rd and final reading-4-0-1 Hostetler abstained. Previously she had been cited twice for high grass at her residence.

## The LEGO Ninjago Movie **Terribly disappointing**

If it ain't broke don't fix it. In no other industry is this saying more apparent than the entertainment field. Turn on the television and you'll eventually run into six different Law & Orders, five eerily similar sitcoms and CSI programs set in seven major U.S. cities. Head to the theater and chances are most of the films showing at any given time will be sequels, prequels or remakes. Keeping with this idea of churning out one like program after another, one such film recently opened in theaters.

The LEGO Ninjago Movie is the third film featuring characters constructed entirely out of the popular children's toy. Following the box office success of 2014's The LEGO Movie and this year's The LEGO Batman Movie, a third one was simply an inevitably. However, unlike the first two films, which are loosely connected, the third is a completely different story while introducing entirely new characters.

In the third entry of the LEGO film series, the evil Garmadon is once again threatening to take over and destroy the city of Ninjago. Fortunately for the residents of Ninjago there are some brave souls who have taken it upon themselves to stop Garmadon from completing his sinister plan. A group of teenage ninjas, each harnessing a special power specific to them, do battle against Garmadon and his evil henchmen. However, things go a bit awry when it's discovered that one of the ninjas has a personal connection to Garmadon. From that point forward, the ninjas must incorporate all of their training if they are to save themselves and the city from Garmadon's evil rule.

Much like the first two films, The LEGO Ninjago Movie has a short, sweet and easy to follow story. However, unlike the first two films, The LEGO Ninjago Movie is not nearly as well written. The charm of the first two films was that they were incredibly clever and easily enjoyed by both children and their parents. However, this is just not the case in this instance. While the film is mildly funny, with a witty line and here, it's not nearly as crafty with the jokes, wordplay as its predecessors.

Additionally, while the film suffers from a lack of creativity in the writing the department, it makes for a film that is more than often boring and difficult to watch. Long periods of time pass between from one mildly amusing joke to the next and interest in the film can and does suffer as a result.

The LEGO Ninjago Movie is a film that suffers in large part due to the success of its predecessors. The film never comes close to reaching the mark of either film in any aspect. Terribly disappointing. 2.5 out of 5.







#### SONG OF SOLOMON 2:4

Songs have been written using the theme "His banner over me is love." In this verse we are told that "He" brought me to the "banqueting house." We are also told that "His banner over me is love." This sets the scene for a

special event in a man and woman's life. A time of true love and the expression of it. In this we see Christ and His expression of love for His intended bride, the church.

The word used for "love" in this verse and the following verse is different than the word for "love" in preceding verses. In preceding verses the word for love is rayah. This is a term used that speaks of a moreor-less close female associate, not a lover. This can be a companion, a friend and even a neighbor.

But, in this verse the word ahabah is used which means love and affection.
