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

Edgewood Elementary is alive in the minds of alumni

School reunion is about more than chicken and roast beef for dinner

The building is gone and so are the basketball goals. Yet Barry Hix can close his eyes and see everything. The mighty brick walls of Edgewood Elementary School stand once again next to the playground in a grove with a kissing-wishing tree. Just west of the intersection of Madison and Epler avenues on the Southside, the school was the hub of the universe for the Edgewood neighborhood from 1914 until 1980, he said.

More than 500 alumni like Hix have joined a Facebook group started by Ted M. Lobdell of Trafalgar to share memories. On Sept. 9 at least 150 former students will meet at the Atrium on Thompson Road in what could be the last reunion for many.

Lobdell posted, "At times, when I try to explain to people what our group is and what we stand for, people look at me like I have three heads! They just don't get how we can have this emotion for a school that has been torn down for over 35 years."

Hix volunteered to help to plan the reunion this year. Some elderly former teachers have confirmed they'll attend.

Now retired from the construction industry, Hix attended Edgewood Elementary from 1957 to 1963 and graduated from Southport H.S. He gets fired up reminiscing about the primary school.

The cooks in the cafeteria worked

with pride, he said. They had a "real nice way of doing fish sticks." Ravioli was popular, and so were freshly baked little slices of dessert cake.

On black-and-white TVs, students watched when NASA sent up rockets. Schoolwork halted until a launch was done.

Teachers focused on basic math, but the curriculum included art and music, he said. An alumna posted that her class went to the L.S. Ayres tearoom to perform "Fifty Nifty United States."

Through voluntary religious education, students could earn certificates of completion.

Alumni remember a 1956 train ride to Camp Atterbury for 1,700 Edgewood and Southport students.


The schoolhouse held meetings like a 1935 hearing on railroad crossing gates, and a 1942 session regarding civilian defense.

Hix singled out two administrators from his "Golden Age of America," Catherine Sanders and Paul L. Bailey. Teaching for 43 years, Sanders led the adjacent Riley complex for kindergarten through 2nd grade, and Bailey was principal of Edgewood for 34 years. This nugget from an old Indiana Central College (UIndy) Alumni News reveals the end of their story:

"Paul L. (Pete) Bailey '29, principal of Edgewood School in Perry Township, and Catherine Sanders, principal of Riley Elementary School, were married Dec. 15, 1968. They traveled to Michigan for the ceremony, which was performed by the groom's 97-year old father."

FINDING ROOM FOR GROWTH

SOUTHSIDE FIRE AND POLICE DEPARTMENTS LOOK INTO RENOVATING OR BUILDING NEW STATIONS

There appears to be a new trend on the Southside - police and fire departments in need of new buildings to house their growing demand. Some, like Southport and Greenwood Police Departments, are preparing to build and renovate while others, like Beech Grove Police and Fire Departments, are looking into what they are able to do about the lack of adequate space. Here, learn about some of those needs and what they're doing about it:

SALUTE TO HEROES

Beech Grove Fire Department

Beech Grove Fire Department currently operates out of two stations: 330 E. Churchman Ave., and 1202 Albany St. The Churchman station, Station 57, was built in 1970 for a staff of three to four people. Now, there are a minimum of seven people per shift. The Albany station, Station 56, has a similar story.

"We have outgrown the space provided that we need for daily operations," said Beech Grove Fire Chief Rob Cheshire. "Currently we run a medic, an engine and a battalion (vehicle) out of this station (Churchman). We don't have a gear washer or proper facilities for storage. There's a huge risk of toxic exposures from our gear which are known to cause cancer, and we do not have proper storage for our gear. Overall, the kitchen area is small for that amount of people. It's a residential kitchen. The workout facility is in the apparatus bay, with the fumes."

The station was also not designed for the amount of female employees it has today.

There isn't a separate bunk room or changing area. There could be three or four females per shift. The biggest challenge is that they all have to share one restroom.

"That is also the public bathroom," said Courtney Henderson, paramedic. "Like has happened to me three times, if we are exposed to bedbugs, we have to stand in line just to get a shower, just to (decontaminate). We don't have anywhere to put our toiletries. It's not ideal. We don't expect it to be the comforts of home, but it's necessary to have space and plenty of bathrooms for our women employees here at Beech Grove. We're growing. We still need about three more firefighters. Those could be women. We are here 24-hour shifts. We change our uniforms at least two times a day. We shower two, three times a day. We have to have adequate bathroom facilities for all of our personnel."

The Albany station is also out of space, but is facing more structural issues. It needs a new roof and concrete problems need to be addressed.

The fire department is having a needs

assessment done, with the information to be released in October. Cheshire said they are looking into combining the two stations into one, centralized location to house all of the same staff. The department would keep the Churchman station for ambulance services.


"The Beech Grove Fire Department will be able to run a national model for fire operations," Cheshire said. "I think what we're proposing is very beneficial to the community.


It will be a long-term goal. The long-term goal of our fire department is to be self sustained. A lot of the change with the station is to ensure the living facilities are up to standard and building code for gear, equipment, storage and maintenance."

Beech Grove Police Department

The Beech Grove Police Department has been looking into a new building for years. The station which was built in the early 1970s is busting at the seams.

"We're out of storage space," said Deputy Chief Michael Maurice. "We don't have up-to-date surveillance and interview equipment that can easily be shared with the prosecutor's office. Our system doesn't match theirs. This building was wired for all the technology we have now. We have cables laying around. We have out-of-date heating and cooling. There's no meeting space and nowhere to go. We've just grown. The building doesn't provide public safety. We have mold in the basement. The basement floods. Occasionally the women's restroom backs up because of the septic. We require officers to take a fitness assessment every two years. Our workout area is in the hallway downstairs. There's

no room to use it."

The police department is meeting with a company about the feasibility of updating the current building or building a new one, but Maurice said he feels they're all out of options as far as renovation.

"We've taken steps here," Maurice said. "We put a fence around the building. Once the IMPD North District started getting shot at, we put bulletproof glass in here. But there's only so much money you want to pour into the building."

The police department is up to 32 officers, and is looking to hire three more. From January to June of this year, the department had 11,547 police responses, up 3.7 percent from the same period in 2016. Of those responses, they made 617 criminal arrests, up 47.6 percent from last year. Incident reports and hotel runs are up, while apartment runs are down.

"The guys are busy," Maurice said. "I don't see it slowing down."

The department spoke with the city council at the August meeting about the needs. Many of the councilors took a tour of the building and voiced agreement.

"For the city to move forward the way it wants to, it will have to have a five year and ten year, 15 year plan. This should be part of that plan," Maurice said. "We don't have to have a new building tomorrow. But if they're serious about public safety, there has to be a plan, not just for public safety but for the entire city. There's got to be a creative way to fund it."

Southport Police Department

When Southport Police Chief Thomas Vaughn took the chief position in 2014, there were two things he was told he'd never achieve: getting a full-time officer and a new police station. The full-time officer was officially hired at the beginning of 2017, and a public groundbreaking is expected for a municipal complex, with a new police station, at the end of September.

Currently, the Southport Police Department is located at 6901 Derbyshire Rd. in a room in the same building as the offices of government officials, Perry Seniors and the Community Center. Chief Vaughn's office is an 8 by 10-foot space, which also contains filing cabinets used for storage.

"The roll call room is utilized by other agencies, for breathalyzers, fingerprints, people pick up police reports," Vaughn said. "There are so many things that the room is used for in addition to being a roll call room. You'll have someone doing a breathalyzer on a drunk, with someone getting their fingerprints for their government job and then a child sitting at a desk coloring in a coloring book. In today's society, those things are not acceptable."

With the help of Clerk/Treasurer Diana Bossingham, Vaughn began looking into options for a new police station. They knew the city still owned the land at 137 Worman St. For the past year, the city and police department have worked to construct plans, obtain funding and find a developer. Greg Martz, GM Development Group, will develop the project.

The initial idea was for the new building to be only for the police station, but that evolved. The building will now home government official's offices and a meeting room for the city council.

"We started talking about security in this building," Vaughn said. "There is no way for us to secure them the way an elected official should be secured when they're at work."

The council approved the \$1,003,000 project, funded by a bond that kicked in after a previous bond expired, after hosting public meetings where support was voiced from area residents.

The new 8,000 square-foot building will include secure entryways. The front door will always be unlocked with a safe room for those in trouble to contact the police. Guests will sign in and officers will take them back to the government offices.

Police officers will drive into their own area. There will be a room for breathalyzers, a room for interviews, a fireproof storage room for crucial city documents that are currently stored in the treasurer's office.

The right side of the building will include meeting space and a training center for the Southport Police Academy. The police academy was certified by the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy for Tier 2 training, but with the lack of space they've had to rent classrooms and training facilities. The academy trains not only Southport reserve officers, but other local small agencies as well.

"The community does support the police department and I think it would be great to hold the training inside the city so they can watch the officers running down the street," Vaughn said. "They can see them training. The officers will feel part of the community."

The current community center will not be abandoned. Perry Seniors will have more space to operate and space has been offered for the Lions Club of Southport to meet. The community center can still be rented out for events.

"In about 5 years, I don't think people will even recognize the city because of all the growth and new projects," Vaughn said. "It's pretty exciting."

The deadline to complete the project is June 30, 2018, but Bossingham said if weather cooperates, it could get done sooner.



Brewing up a good time

Oaken Barrel Brewing Company owner Kwang Casey partners with Greenwood to give back to the community that supported him

The Greenwood community has supported Kwang Casey since he opened Oaken Barrel Brewing Company 23 years ago. The business has seen steady growth, Casey said, and in return, he does whatever he can to give back to the Greenwood and Southside Indianapolis community.

"I like the rush of the business, on a busy night, handling three things at once," he said. "It's challenging, but when you sit back and watch the customers, you get to see familiar faces and see them enjoying dinner. That's why I feel like I owe something to the Greenwood community, or the Southside of Indianapolis community. They've given so much to us. There are 49 employees plus me here. They call this their home. They make a living. So I feel I have to give back to the community."

Casey came to the Southside of Indianapolis in 1977, where he continues to reside. A graduate of Southport High School, he's worked in restaurants his entire life. He ran Broad Ripple Steakhouse from 1990 to '94. There, he met the owners of Broad Ripple Brew Pub, the first craft brewery in Indiana, which sparked an interest in Casey to start making beer.

He opened Oaken Barrel, Indiana's second craft brewery, with two business partners, Bill Fulton and Brook Belli, in 1994.

"I wanted to open on the Southside," Casey said. "I know how Southside people are, what they like and dislike. We planted our roots here 23 years ago, before the craft boom. They said you guys are crazy."

Originally his concept was to sell beer and simple food like a bar, but his chef helped him make the business a full-service restaurant, for which Casey said he still thanks him to this day.

Not every business endeavor has worked. Nearly 20 years ago, Casey said they tried hard to get into production and get the Oaken Barrel craft beers on the market. Maybe Indianapolis wasn't ready for that at the time, but Casey eventually realized that's not where

he wanted to make his money. Instead, he focuses on local.

"There's more profit in selling more beer here, doing community events or beer festivals," Casey said. "So I refocused my business away from retail and focused more on in-house beer sales. It's worked for us."

Through the course of 20 years, the business has doubled in size. The brewing system has doubled which doubled brewing capacity, Oaken Barrel added a beer garden, packaging area and a second bar area.

Oaken Barrel partners with Greenwood for many of its festivals and events, such as the Summer Concert Series at Craig Park and Adults Only Swim Night at Freedom Springs.

"When I look at these events, we make money and that's great," Casey said. "Even if we don't make money, that's okay because it was a community event. You see people happy. Say only 200 people came to an event, but 200 people are happy, that's investment down the road. People tried your beers and know where we're at. You

don't do it to make a ton of money. You try to help the city have the

events grow. Knock on wood, we've been successful at these city events."

It was Casey's suggestion that sparked Rock the Clock, a community festival in downtown Greenwood which features live music, local wine and beer, food trucks and more for all ages. The purpose is to connect residents and visitors with the businesses in Greenwood.

"I've been to cities that a one-day festival turned into a three-day festival with a national act," Casey said. "They started out small. I jokingly said to the guys at the parks department to do something downtown Greenwood because it is centrally located. They had a new clock they wanted to show off. Last year was the first year. We kept it low-key on purpose to work out the kinks. Last year, people that came to the event, after the event was over, they went to Revery for dinner, Oaken Barrel for dinner, Mallow Run for wine and food. It went off without a hitch. People had a great time. We're hoping to make it bigger and better."

This year's Rock the Clock is Sept. 23, 1 to 8 p.m. in downtown Greenwood. The live music stage, with LivingProof, The Why Store and Tastes Like Chicken, will be on the street, making space for the new addition of a zip line.

Casey's investment in the Greenwood community goes beyond events. Casey and Bemis Group are partnering to open a banquet hall in Franklin, expected to open in the spring of 2018.

Last year, he and Bemis Group purchased the strip center where Oaken Barrel is located, and the city is helping develop the area.

"We want to make this when you come to downtown Greenwood, this is the gateway," Casey said. "I thought about purchasing it 10 years ago and I didn't do it. The landlord lives in Cleveland and he wanted out. Right now we want to redo the parking lot and curbs. We already installed new parking lot lights. We will work from the outside in, replace some of the older materials to modern building materials. This building is over 30 years old. It needs some new windows. Once we get the outside done, in a year or so, we might do some remodeling in here (Oaken Barrel), but a lot of our regular customers say don't change too much. They feel comfortable here."

No more stink

Franklin Township friends Dan Poore and Mike Mattingly make Indy's trash bins cleaner through Bin Cleanse

Indianapolis began distributing 96-gallon trash bins to residents served by Republic Services in 2014. In two years, all residents were to receive one of these bins, designed to make trash day cleaner and more efficient.

But those bins aren't always so clean. Trash leaks. It smells. The germs spread. No one wants to clean the bins, and even if they do, how do they keep the chemicals used to clean it from soaking into the ground?

Dan Poore and Mike Mattingly, Franklin Township residents and longtime friends, saw a need for those bins to be professionally cleaned on a regular basis. They engineered a truck that can take the empty bins, efficiently clean and sterilize them and properly dispose of the dirty water. The truck also has a commercial unit that can handle dumpsters.

They incorporated as Bin Cleanse in January and cleaned their first trash bins in July. Bin Cleanse serves customers across Central Indiana. Poore and Mattingly said they feel they're ahead of the curve on the business idea. Some cities, such as in California, mandate that the bins be cleaned.

'We're the only one in Indianapolis that does this," Poore said. "As our customers will tell you, they're over the moon with the service. The stink is gone. The cans are very clean. We deliver them back to their storage area. It's been very well received."

Why did you open this business?

"I used to live in LA and San Francisco. Mike was visiting me last December, right before Christmas. All of California has the big, wheeled bins, the blue and green bins that everyone uses... He says those bins right there, that's the next big thing. We started talking about it and Bin Cleanse was born, within in a day or two." - POORE

"I've always wanted to do something like this. I saw the need for it and came up with the truck to be able to do it. We saw the need for getting the bins cleaned and eco-friendly. I live in an area that the HOA requires you to keep them in your garage. It stinks up your garage." - MATTINGLY

What did you do to prepare for opening vour business?

"A lot of research in the truck, automating the truck, making sure it can handle the volume and the dirty water. Anyone can go clean their trash bin, but you have to break out a pressure washer. It won't be as clean and sterile as we can make it. The big thing is protecting the chemicals from going into the ground and the sewer system. We capture it and dispose of it properly. We can follow the trash truck routes when they empty them, then clean them before they're taken into the garage that evening." - MATTINGLY

Who is your ideal customer/client?

"The beauty about this business is every singe family home has at least one trash bin. Everyone can be a client. Our ideal home is families with kids, who throw coke bottles in the trash bins and it gets in the bottom of those bins. From our market research so far, the women of the household seem to be more concerned about it and see the value of it. If you think about it, it's probably the dirtiest thing in your house. I always had my son take it in and out. It's dirty, full of bacteria and then you have your kids handle it." - MATTINGLY

How do you plan to be successful?

"Every time, especially new customers, I do quality control checks. It's being consistent. It's the quality of service needs to be outstanding every single time." - POORE

"Our plan is to be out in the neighborhoods, have people consistently see the product and anything we can do to get in front of people. We have been posting in Facebook groups. Once they see the service they are incredibly impressed." - MATTINGLY

What would we be surprised to learn about you or your company?

"We went to high school at Roncalli. We've known each other for 30 years. So we're two Roncalli guys who came back together after decades a part." - POORE

Dreams, whether they are professional or personal, often require heavy investments in the form of both time and effort/work. And even then those lofty goals may not come to fruition. However, add layer upon layer of adversity and those ambitious intentions instantly become that much harder to achieve. One new film looks at goals and the pain, struggle most have to endure to have the opportunity to see those dreams realized.

Patti Cake\$ is the story of wannabe rapper Patti and her ensuing struggle. Patti aspires to a life of a recording artist, extemporaneously uttering rhymes and all the fame and fortune that would inevitably follow, often quite literally daydreaming of living this dream. However, Patti has some major obstacles in her way right from the get go. First of all, she doesn't exactly look the part of a rapper. She's a white overweight female, all three of which several characters remind her of on more than one occasion. Additionally, Patti's living environment isn't exactly the place where dreams flourish. One of Patti's biggest navsayers is her own mother, who seemingly takes her own career failures and frustrations out on her daughter.

Despite everything in her way, Patti remains undeterred. Thanks in large part to her best friend and fellow aspiring rapper Jheri, they both soldier on and take concrete steps on the road of achieving their dreams. In the end, Patti and Jheri learn more about themselves, one another and that it's not necessarily the destination, but instead the journey along the way that matters.

As far as story is concerned, much like the

film's characters, it starts off a bit lost, meandering and directionless. Thankfully after the first 20 minutes or so, the story begins moving, examining these characters that aspire to lives of fame of fortune while living in seemingly hopeless situations. While the story does go in some unexpected directions, adding another layer of authenticity to these already relatable characters, the story more times than not feels unoriginal and too much been-there-done-that.

While the story is somewhat run-of-themill, it's the performances that help to elevate and separate it from other such films. Danielle Macdonald as Patti is a treat to watch and her performance is easily worth the price of admission. While Macdonald shines brightest, there isn't a weak performance in the entire film.

Patti Cake\$ is a film that succeeds on nearly every level because of its authentic, relatable characters, strong direction and Macdonald's star-turning per-formance. Easily one of the year's



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Almond milk and carrageenan

NUTRITION

Seeking an alternative to dairy milk? The China Study found a strong connection between dairy consumption and cancer. Milk consumption has steady declined, dropping 25 percent from 1975 to 2012, according to USDA. If you're going to skip cow's milk, make sure you find a good source of calcium and protein elsewhere in your diet and supplement with vitamin D-3.

You can purchase almond milk easily enough, but along with those comes lots of not-so-natural ingredients. Some brands contain as little as 2.5 percent almonds. That's about six almonds per container. Or,

is it better to eat a handful of almonds?

Almonds are highly nutritious but what about that almond milk your drinking? Many brands contain sugar, Carrageenan and other unholy ingredients?

Almonds are an excellent source of hearthealthy unsaturated fatty acids, protein, vitamin E, riboflavin, magnesium, manganese, copper, zinc, fiber, potassium, iron, calcium, antioxidant flavonoids and phytosterols

Carrageenan is a seaweed used as a thickener and emulsifier in ice cream, candies, vitamin supplements and plant milks. Carrageenan can cause gastrointestinal inflammation, lesions and even colon cancer in animals. People suffering from inflammatory bowel conditions are advised to avoid products containing carrageenan.

Homemade Almond Milk

Makes about 2 cups

Ingredients

1.5 cups whole raw almonds4 cups filtered water

Optional: raw honey, stevia, sugar, agave, maple syrup, or vanilla extract to taste.

Equipment:

Bowls for soaking almonds Strainer Measuring cup Blender or food processor Cheesecloth

- Place almonds in a bowl, cover and soak 24 hours up to two days. They will plump as they absorb water. The longer they soak, the creamier the milk.
- Drain almonds; rinse thoroughly under cool running water. (almonds should feel a little squishy when you pinch them.)
- Place almonds in blender / Vita-Mix; cover with 1.5 cups water.
- Blend at high speed for 1 minute. Pulse a few times to break up almonds; blend continuously for 1 more minute. The almonds should

be broken down into a coarse meal and the water should be white and opaque.

- Line strainer with cheese cloth, and place over a bowl or large measuring cup. Pour the almond mixture into the strainer.
- Press all almond milk from the almond meal. Gather the nut bag or cheese cloth around the almond meal and twist close. Squeeze and press with clean hands to extract as much almond milk as possible.
 - Taste the milk. If a sweeter drink is wanted, add sweetener to taste.
 - Refrigerate almond milk in sealed containers in the fridge for up to two days.



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
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
